





In addition to the general intructions for community sanitation which are important in preventing poliomyelitis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent warning to every ndividual in Texas to practice strict personal hygiene to protect is own health and that of those

"Of course, cleanliness and personal hygiene are ordinarily tak-en for granted," Dr. Cox said, 'but at this time with the incidence of poliomyelitis having eached a total of 292 cases, would like to re-emphasize some personal sanitary measures which may help in preventing the spread this crippling and often fatal

The State Health Officer stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. quent bathing and immaculately clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passages should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough clear iness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures such as washing the dishes in soapy water: keeping sinks bathtubs and fixtures scoured clean







We are doing all we can to supply everybody with water-but we must bear in mind that demand for water has increased enormously. Just a few years ago we had only 300 water customers-now it has increased to nearly 900-and added to that we have some 300 air conditioners in town which require large amounts of water.

We are appealing to the public to use water on lawns very sparingly. Please do not use water for this purpose more than two hours per day. If this suggestion is not observed we may be forced to go back to winter rates in order to conserve water supply.

Please use water on your lawns and gardens. only between the hours of 6 and 8 p. m. each day during the present emergency.

Bear in mind that the people in the north part of town suffer first-and if too much water is used for lawns, they will not have water for house use. This last week one of the water pumps went out, and this is being taken care of as fast as we can. We are going to have to have another large well to take care of the situation but this takes time.

We need your help to cure the bad situation. Other towns are having the same trouble.

It would also help not to turn on water coolers in the homes until after noon.

Let's House the Oil People

The City Council, the Haskell Chambers of Commerce, the Haskell Lions Club and Haskell County are FOR COUNTY ATTORNEY: working feverishly this week to provide office and residence space for men and women who are here in connection with the new oil field and who would like to find places which are suitable for offices and living quarters. We are working to that end much through necessity, because if quarters are not provided for these people there FOR COUNTY TREASURER: is strong possibility they will look elsewhere for such ac-

Already we have slept on the job. Months ago Haskell should have been on its toes to see that dozens of FOR SHERIFF: these people had places to live. We know all about the housing shortage-but is it as bad as we try to make it seem? There are dozens of houses in Haskell which FOR COUNTY SUPT. OF PUBLIC could accommodate twice or three times as many people INSTRUCTION: as are now living in them.

If Haskell is to do two things our homes must be opened to these people whose work brings them to our doors. First of these things is live up to the tradition of the West. Our forefathers were noted for their hospiality and neighborliness. When strangers were found n their midst they didn't remain strangers, but were soon provded for so far as food and lodging were concerned. These are strenuous times but we have no right to depart from the practices of our predecessors.

Second, from strictly a business standpoint we cannot afford not to provide for these newcomers. They will FREC. No. 3. spend hundreds of thousands of dollars in the town in which they live within a year's time. Haskell is sorely hardicapped because she has no payroll, and spending power of employees of major oil companies would help us over many a financial hump. It's high time we awoke to the opportunity of proving ourselves good neighbors and good business people.

"Holding the Line"—In Retreat

What is being decided now in Congress' battle over OPA and in the efforts of merchants and consumers to "hold the line" on prices-is how fast the United States is going to retreat before inflation. Hope for complete FOR CONSTABLE, PREC. victory over inflation was lost the day the war was won NO. 1: and most of the wartime controls were lifted. Without rationing and priorities price controls could not begin to

When wage increases broke through it became no longer a question of holding the line but of conducting a holding action to delay the onrush of inflation. OPA has been a gallant, if sometimes unwise, rear guard. It is still needed to cover the retreat. As John R. Steelman, new reconversion director, declares in his quarterly report, nothing can take the place of price controls.

The Senate showed some recognition of the fact in eliminating the Taft amendment from the new bill it has sent to the House. The rejection of a decontrol plan which would have allowed rents to rise gradually by 15 per cent was probably also to fear of public anger. For rank C. Scott, M. D raises in rents constitute a big item-and one most likely to rouse resentment.

Dropping the Taft amendment makes the measure more possible to administer. But it has been so riddled with exemptions that it can be little more than a sieve, Ear, Nose, Throat - Fitting of delaying price rises in some lines. This factor seems to be gaining more attention from the critics of OPA. Since President Truman confronted them with the possibility of no price controls there has been a little more caution in their predictions that the operation of a "free market" could be counted on to bring prices down quickly. Likewise, since the threat of buyers' strikes has arisen, some of the friends of OPA are becoming a bit less reckless in their forecasts of skyrocketing prices.

Consumers are undoubtedly showing a new resistance to price gouging. Coupled with the self-restraint of the better merchants and producers, this may have a decisive effect in those lines where supplies can be quickly increased. Many foods should not go far above prices which will compensate for the dropping of subsidies. Wise processors are already curtailing their orders. But on some things prices may go a long way before buyers

Many prices are getting up to the levels of 1920, when buyers struck and a boom broke. But three factors today are different: 1. Wages are roughly double what they were in 1920. 2. Far more buying power, far larger consumer needs, have been penned up. 3. Some shortages cannot be quickly corrected even at skyrocket prices. Those who are counting on buyers' strikes and the normal operation of supply and demand to prevent the retreat before inflation becoming a rout should take note of these

It is good to hear President Truman promising Federal economies and Mr. Steelman calling for credit restrictions and no tax cuts. The emphasis on price inflation has hidden the fact that it is only one sector of the war against inflation and that fiscal policy is a vital part of the defense. The public should take more interest in fiscal policy. But the immediate battle is to retain adequeta reino controls as a rear guard .- The Christian Scince Monitor.




