FARM NEWS

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is beginning its eighth year of active operation with the sale of insurance for the 1947 winter wheat crop. County ACA offices are now accepting applications in Haskell County. All applications must be filed before the crop is seeded or before August 31, 1946, whichever is earlier.

With crop insurance, farmers can protect their investment in wheat against loss from all unavoidable causes—drought, flood, winter kill, hail, insects and other natural hazards that might damage their crops. Insurance covers the production of a specified number of bushels selected by the farmer.

Contracts now being signed will cover the 1946, 1947 and 1948 winter wheat crops.

From the beginning of the wheat insurance program in 1939, the Corporation paid out the equivalent of about 76,000,000 bushels of wheat to cover the losses of insured farmers. In Haskell County wheat farmers have collected almost 1,000,000 bushels more in losses than they have paid out in premiums.

Many Haskell County wheat growers are calling daily at the AAA office to learn the details of the wheat insurance, and how it will apply to their individual farms.

Producers are advised that application for wheat crop insurance must be made by signing the application before August 31, 1946. Applications cannot be accepted after that date.

S. J. R. No. 9
A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State; and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas; and

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas."

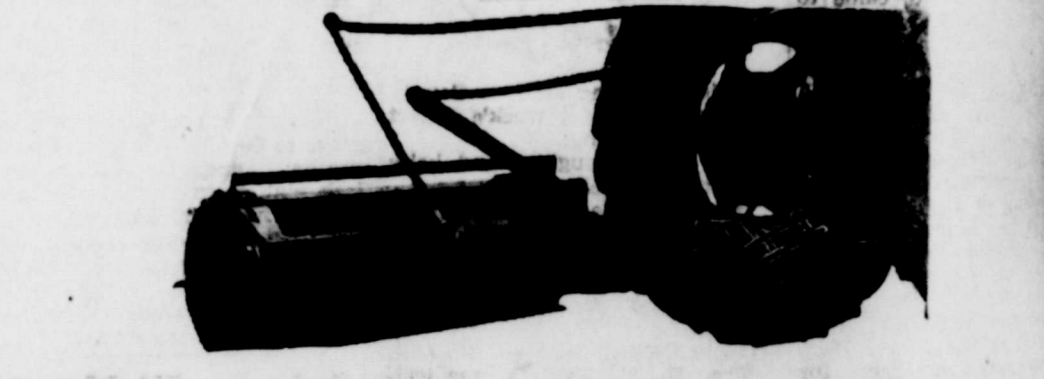
Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

H. J. R. No. 62

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-Five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of

Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (7) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be held to Texas Veterans as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of bonds, provided herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

We're Proud of Our Fire Department

The same thing has happened time after time over a long period of years, but for some reason or other the work done by members of Haskell's volunteer fire department Monday morning in putting down the blaze at the grain elevator seems outstanding and commendable. Without thought of pay, these men left their work in scores of Haskell business establishments, dismissed the fact that it was almost "dinner-time" and pitched in with all their might on a tough fire-fighting mission. Through cooperation and hard work they won.

It didn't mean so much to any individual member of the department whether or not the fire was checked before a building was destroyed, because firemen especially, as do the majority of us, know that losses on industrial buildings are generally compensated by insurance. Those firemen, all of them volunteers, accepted their hard task as a challenge to the well-being of their community. If they could prevent they were determined that no part of Haskell would burn. Not seen by spectators outside, the firefighters groped over winding stairways through blistering heat and stifling smoke to get at the start of the fire and bring it under control.

All of them tired and dirty, most of them dripping wet, these men wound up their work with the slow task of reloading hose on the trucks to be prepared for the next emergency. Not until this had been done did a single fireman apparently give thought to his own personal affairs.

Haskell has many civic organizations to her credit—and one of the most outstanding in service is the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department. We're proud of our firemen.

A Sense of Values

One of the worst results of war-time wages and prices will be damage to our sense of values. Our young people, in particular, can hardly escape the feeling that money is the only measure of value in life. When an uneducated and scantily clad girl serving food and drinks at a "drive-in" restaurant can make more money in a week than most highly trained teachers can make in a month, and a green farm hand in a war plant can make more than a brilliant preacher, there is something radically out of joint in our scheme of things.

A young friend of mine with a talent for music of the currently popular 'jive' style can make as much money in a few hours in one night with an orchestra as his father made in a week in his first job when he was supplying this young man with food, shelter, and three-cornered pants. How can we blame this charming youngster for a lack of enthusiasm about his school work when he sees all around him concrete evidence that those who cater to amusement lovers are more highly rewarded than those who contribute to the lasting qualities of mind and heart. He has not lived long enough with life and its tears and heartaches to realize that a jazz orchestra would not be an "ever present help in time of trouble" when the shadows gather, sorrow comes and the going gets rough.

It is hard to make clear the difference between real values and just money when a pipe welder can make more than a bank president and the owner of a hat-check concession in a night club can gross more profit than a legitimate merchant who contributes something wholesome and helpful to his community.

This is not an argument against good wages for real services rendered but if East Texas boys and girls ever get the idea that the only measure of value in the world is money and not worth-while service, we shall have lost some of the finer things in our community life.

Our pioneer ancestors were not concerned about hours and wages; many great scientists and inventors who have made life richer and easier for us all were failures in dollar income; some of our finest composers of prose and poetry whose words lift up our hearts and inspire us were poorly paid. Did Madam Curie and her brilliant husband think of their monthly income in dollars when in cold and hunger they pursued and revealed the magic secrets of radium for the healing of mankind? Are Robert Browning's words of wisdom and comfort less valuable than some filthy, modern, sexy book that sold the motion picture rights for a quarter of a million dollars while Browning never had a radio contract? Does the value of any lasting service to the community depend upon the pay received, or whether any pay was received?

Let's stop a minute in this dizzy whirl and get our sense of values straight.—Hubert M. Harrison, Manager, East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

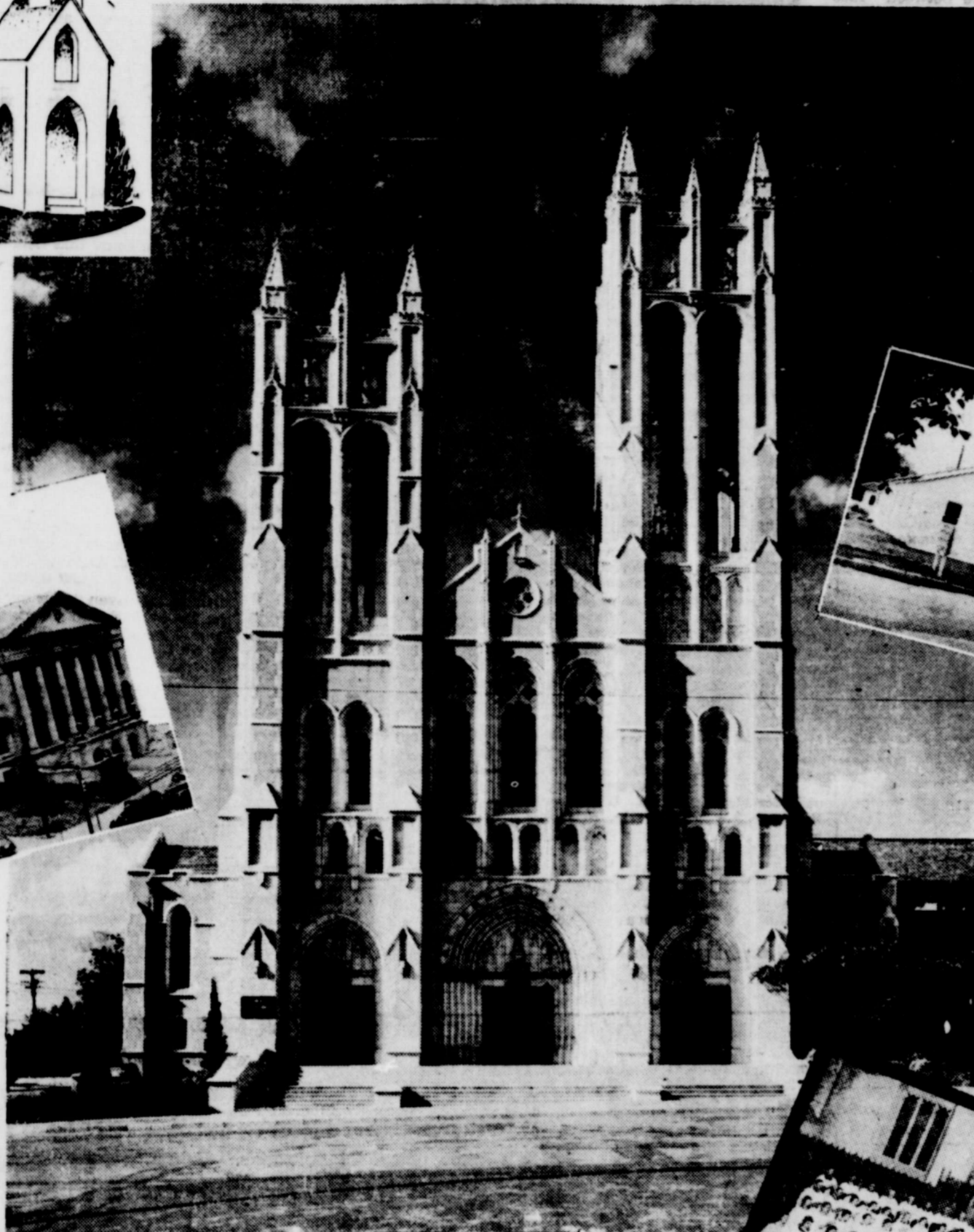

ACC Procures More Rooms for Students

On July 27 Abilene Christian College, Abilene, Texas, announced the procurement of rooming facilities for 235 additional students when school opens on Sept. 17, according to an announcement made by Don M. Morris, president of the college.

Students will be accepted according to the following schedule: 66 girls, 50 non-veteran men, 103 single veteran men, and apartments for 16 veteran couples. Reservations should be made at once with the registrar, President Morris said.

Total registration of the college is expected to be between 1200 and 1500.

Diabetes Rated As Health Problem

Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal life span, nevertheless diabetes took a toll of several hundred lives in Texas during the past year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"While the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria, and smallpox are annually causing a decreasing number of deaths in this country, diabetes is still taking a tragic number of human lives each year, especially in the middle aged group," Dr. Cox said.

"Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major health problem, but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed."

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack that white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors, since it seems a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupations call for manual labor are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox stated that simple, wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination, especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.
