H-D Club Members Have Good Record In Home Canning

Reports submitted by the education committees of seven home demonstration clubs in the county to the county home demonstration agent indicate a good home canning program for April, May, and June. Eighty-six farm families from Blue Bonnet, Center Point, Jossilet, Tonk Creek, New Mid, and Liberty reported canning 1,194 quarts of vegetables, 876 quarts of fruit, and 152 quarts of meat and poultry.

Of this group, 52 had gardens in production in June and 26 had planted additional field gardens. During the same period 37 families sold enough cream to add \$1,656 to the family budget along with \$1,622 in egg money and \$427 from poultry sales.

They also reported making 905 new garments and remodeling 276 garments for their own and their family's use.

Aspermont School For Vets Started

With a number of veterans enrolled, classes were organized this week in the Aspermont branch of the Haskell County Vocational Training School, according to J. Weldon Young, coordinator of the project.

First classes at Aspermont will be in agricultural instruction, with Raymond Johnson, city school superintendent as instructor, with an additional instructor to be added at an early date. Local advisory board for the Aspermont project is composed of Jim Robinson, chairman, D. A. Hudspeth and Mr. Cumble. The unit is under supervision of the Haskell County project.

According to Young, many veterans are continuing to enroll in classes being held here, at Rule and Rochester. To meet the growing enrollment, E. L. Tabor has been added to the staff of the Haskell school as instructor in distributive education.

For the benefit of prospective enrollees, Young said this week that it may become necessary to limit enrollment after September 1. He explained that after that date, it will be necessary for veterans to enroll for agriculture instruction to own or have rented their individual farms. At the present time, veterans can enroll for the course if they agree to rent or purchase a farm tract not later than January 1, 1947.

Grand jury for the April term of 39th District Court, recalled in session Monday, August 12, returned ten felony indictments Tuesday afternoon as a result of two days deliberation, during which 17 witnesses appeared before the investigating body.

Vets Visit Station Near Montague

Accompanied by O. B. Baird and D. H. Persons, instructors, 28 veterans enrolled in the agricultural class of the Haskell County Vocational Training School spent Friday at the State Experimental Station at Montague, where they studied at first hand results of horticultural work being done there.

Principal projects of the station are devoted to the development of peaches and grapes best suited to this area. Haskell students heard a talk by W. A. Randolph, superintendent of the station, in which he told results of research work being done, and made a tour of the grounds.

Water Situation Seen as Critical

Due to the heavy consumption of water during the prevailing drouth, the municipal water supply is inadequate to meet demands for lawns and gardens without jeopardizing the supply required for household purposes, city officials declared this week in asking cooperation of citizens in using less water for their lawns.

In order that definite compliance with this request can be secured, City Council has asked consumers to use water for lawns only three days a week—Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

A similar situation exists in numerous West Texas towns, city officials pointed out, and in some localities watering of lawns has been entirely prohibited.

Grass Fire Friday Burns Six Sections

A grass fire which started in the south part of the Sloan Ranch fifteen miles east of Haskell early Friday afternoon, burned over an area estimated at between six and eight sections of land on the adjoining property and spread to an adjoining ranch and a farm before finally being brought under control.

In addition to the large area on the Sloan Ranch, the fire burned over a small area on the adjoining Coody Ranch, which is under lease to Damron Bros., and also burned a narrow strip of grassland on the Joe Patterson farm.

Volunteers and trucks from the Haskell fire department and the State highway department answered a call to the fire, and helped throughout Friday afternoon and night in bringing the blaze under control.

In addition to the loss of winter pasturage, practically all fences on the Sloan Ranch in the burned-over area were destroyed and will have to be replaced.

Park Program for Boys and Girls Will Close Friday Night With Council Fire

Mrs. Fred Stockdale, area executive of Camp Fire Girls, outlined this week's program at Rice Springs Park and declared interest is growing in the project. The Day Camp is sponsored jointly by the Camp Fire Girls and the Boy Scouts.

This week has been designated as Knox and Haskell County day camp week. Rule and Knox City youngsters will be here one day. The usual picture show feature will be offered Thursday night and the park is to be sprayed with DDT twice during the day for park activities. Mosquitoes have given considerable trouble lately and every effort is being made to destroy them.

Friday's program also includes Camp Day for girls and they will check honors to be ready for Council Fire that night. The girls will cook the noon meal at the park, make fuz sticks, trapper's fire, use-pee fire and other projects. Boys also are invited to the park that day and are asked to bring a No. 10 and a No. 2 can, knife, fork and spoon, plate (not paper) and cup. The group will have wildness hash, raw vegetable salad, bread-on-a-stick and candied apples.

A treasure hunt will be staged Friday night and a Council Fire will conclude activities about 8:15. The public is invited to the Council Fire which will last only about 30 minutes, and especially are Camp Fire board members urged to attend.

Two Producers In Lawson Pool; New Tests Scheduled

Two completions in the Lawson pool, resumption of drilling on a wide outpost test, and applications for additional tests were featured this week as oil activity continued on the upturn in Haskell County.

Edw. C. Lawson, Tulsa, Okla., operator, completed his No. 7 C. C. Rose as one of the heaviest producers in the spreading field in which he first developed production several years ago. Potential of the well, east offset to Humphreys No. 1 Smith, awaits railroad commission test.

Second completion of the week was Thos. D. Humphreys No. 2 Miller in the L. Willoughby survey. Plug was drilled Wednesday into pay topped in the Canyon series and the well flowed natural through seven inch casing. Tubing was being run Thursday to determine potential.

Humphreys No. 3 Miller, 330 feet from the south and 1650 feet from the east line of the J. Z. Miller 528 acre tract, was drilling below 600 feet Wednesday night, due to top production around the last of the week.

In the spotlight as a wide outpost try, Humphreys No. 1 W. C. Norton, three miles northwest of the pool proper, was drilling again Thursday morning after motor trouble had halted operations earlier in the week. The 3,500 foot rotary test is located 3,300 feet from the south and 3,000 feet from the east line of the J. Scott survey.

Application has been filed for a wildcat test about a mile south of the Lawson pool, the M. E. Trapp No. 1 Couch, a proposed 8,000 foot rotary test.

Peculiarity of the application is that it is on a one acre lease, 104.5 acres from the north and west lines of J. Wilcox survey, and the single acre is the entire holding of the applicant, a former Governor of Oklahoma.

The midge test is an old school site which was left open when the area was blocked. Special hearing before the R. R. Commission has been set for Aug. 22 on the application.

Also due for an early start is the Estes and Wagoner No. 1 Mrs. W. Bruenstedt, located 330 feet from the south and east lines of block 25, J. Scott survey, contracted to 3,500 feet with rotary. The projected test is in the immediate area of the No. 1 Norton now being drilled by Humphreys.

Prospect for a wide try south-west of the Lawson pool was seen with the report that Cal-Star Petroleum Company, Los Angeles, Calif., were to make locations within ten days for a deep test on a block of approximately 2,000 acres in the area southeast of Haskell.

Acres blocked by the California operators include Subds. 9, 10, 11, 16, 21, 17, 18 and 27 in the H. O. Campbell survey and several tracts in the I. Ramos survey.

The local woman was present when Congress approved the loan bill to England, had a 30-minute interview with Senator Tom Connally two days after he returned from the peace conference in Paris. She visited a number of high government officials in connection with her school work.

Mrs. Odell also went to New York, Atlanta and other major cities, returning by way of New Orleans, from where she flew to West Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, shall be received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States Government; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas, and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to a deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946 at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

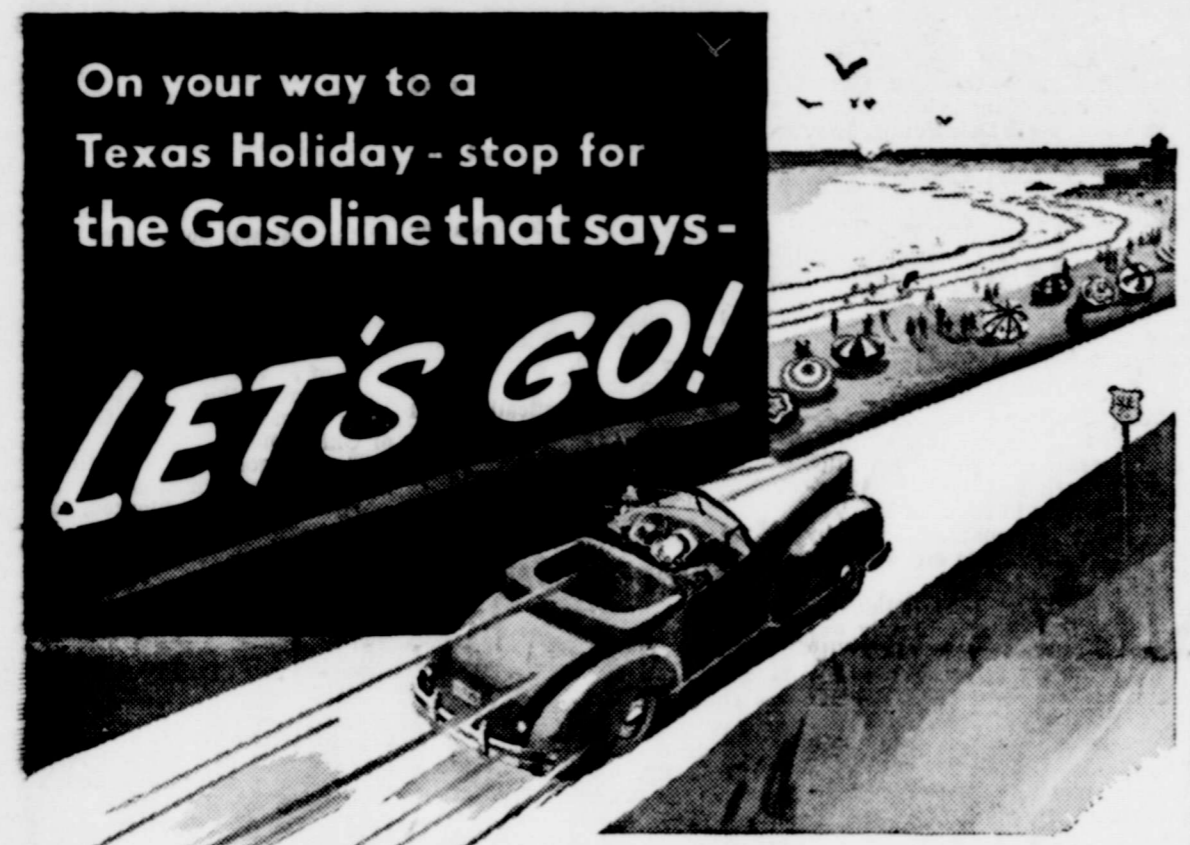

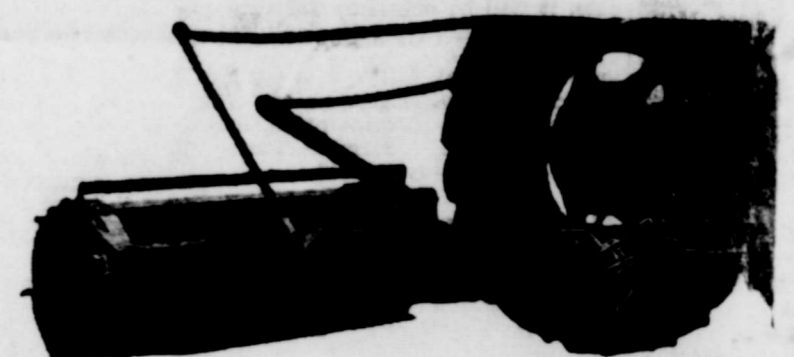

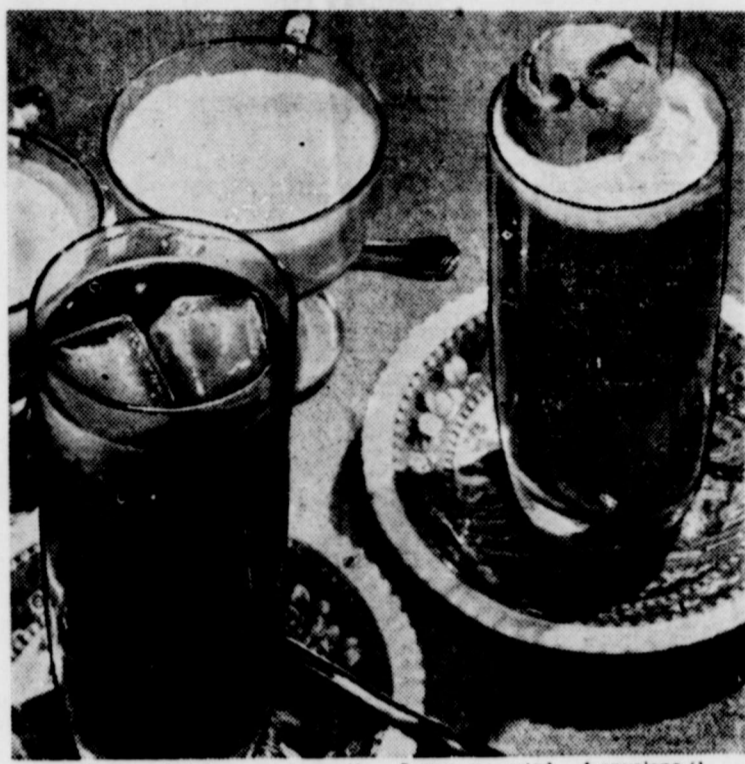

Undulant Socialism

A sick republic, like a human invalid, passes through a crisis in the course of almost any protracted illness. After the crisis, the patient rallies toward recovery or sinks with alarming haste toward the end.

There is something strangely final about it when a free people turns its course toward State Socialism. Liberty never comes back without a revolution and then it's not the same.

Now the ailment that prostrated John Bull has been communicated to Uncle Sam. The symptoms are unmistakable as undulant fever; wave upon wave of collectivist power, with a show of growing intensity.

The new contract will raise the price of coal 25c to 30c a ton and build up the "welfare" fund at the rate of 25 million dollars a year. The Senate has approved the executive department's right to impose this contract on the mine owners when they take their property back.

Government can now control the cost of coal to the owner of a mine. By fixing labor's wage, a ruler can make coal production cost whatever suits his fancy.

With the sanction of Congress, which I hope never comes, federal officials can do to any industry what they are doing to coal. Each assault on freedom will be one more attack of the dread disease, undulant socialism.

Parking Greatest Traffic 'Headache' in Small Towns

Angle and all-day parking are the two greatest contributors to street traffic congestion and parking shortages in small towns, according to Henry K. Evans, director of the traffic engineering division of the National Conservation Bureau.

Mr. Evans said that a recent traffic survey made by the National Conservation Bureau for Morristown, N. J., shows that "employees are cutting their own throats by allowing their own and their employees' cars to stand all day long at the curb, thereby blocking its use by customers."

In Morristown—a town of 20,000 population—the survey revealed 184 cars parked all day long at the curb in the business district. If these cars had been ruled off the streets or outside of the business streets, 920 shoppers could have used this popular curb space blocked by the 184 cars belonging mostly to employees or nearby offices or business houses.

Commenting on the survey, Police Chief Fred A. Roff of Morristown, who is also president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police said: "We recognized during 1945, as it became apparent that the axis powers were about to surrender, that our homefront enemies, traffic accidents and congestion, were only growing stronger and were due for a new lease on death and destruction once wartime travel restrictions were lifted."

"Therefore, as head man in charge of traffic in my town, I resolved to get the facts, to make a thorough reconnaissance of the enemy, before undertaking the campaign of traffic safety and facilitation. Several of the recommendations made by the National Conservation Bureau have already been put into effect, and we are now studying the remaining proposals with the idea of adopting as many of them as possible right away."

A highlight of the Morristown survey is the recommendation that the creation of a 166-car capacity lot one block from the main business street is vital to the solution of the parking problem. This lot, the survey points out, could be paid for by the installation of parking meters on the streets which would net the city approximately \$35,000 per year.

"The Morristown survey, of course, may be applied to the problems of the average small town, perhaps with some minor variations to meet unusual local conditions," Mr. Evans said.

vided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II." 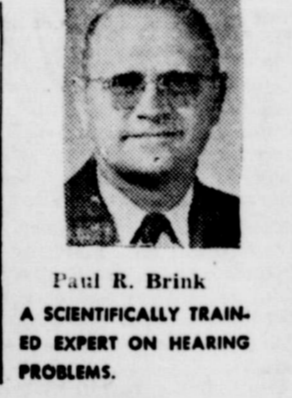

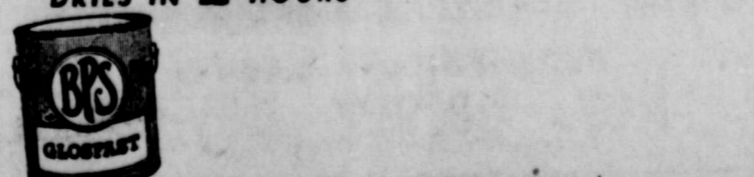

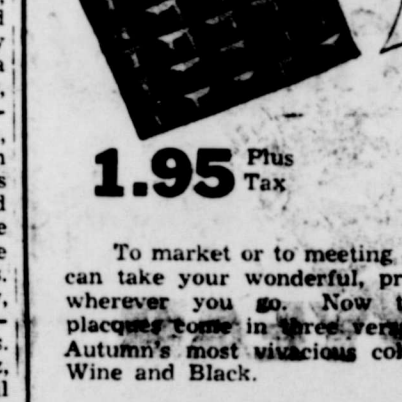

less than his normal number of hours and who receives less than \$23 per week should inquire at the nearest public employment office of the state unemployment compensation agency as to his eligibility for partial readjustment allowances.

Q. Can a veteran have a loan guaranteed or insured to buy or construct more than a single-family home?

A. Yes, but one veteran cannot get a guaranteed or insured loan to buy or build more than a four-family home. If more than one veteran is buying, then the basic four-family home is allowed for the group and this may be increased by one additional family unit for each veteran participating; thus two veterans can buy or build a six-family home, three veterans a seven-family home, etc.

Veterans' News

Q. How can a veteran get assistance with his unemployment problems?

A. The veteran may consult a veterans employment representative in a local office or in the state central office of the employment service, a local service organization, a school or a community veterans center.

Q. If a veteran is unable to find work, where can he obtain specific information concerning unemployment allowances?

A. Inquire at the public employment office or the office of the unemployment compensation agency in the state or territory in which the veteran resides.

Q. Are there any penalties in case the veteran accepts readjustment allowances to which he is not entitled?

A. Any veteran who knowingly accepts an allowance to which he is not entitled shall be ineligible to receive further readjustment allowances. Also, the law provides for fine and imprisonment for anyone who fraudulently obtains payment or makes a false statement in order to cause allowances to be issued under the act.

Q. Does a veteran who is partially unemployed have a right to readjustment allowances?

A. Yes, a veteran who works

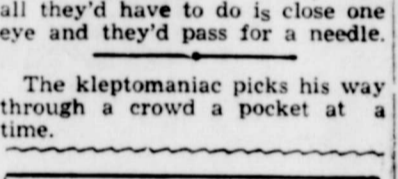
