





Deep Breaking of Sandy Soils

According to recent notification the depth for breaking sandy land for 1947 has been approved at ten inches, and the rate of payment has been approved at \$1.50 per acre, provided prior approval is obtained from the County Committee before any breaking is started. All producers should observe that the 10 inch specification is not applicable until after any breaking done this fall will necessarily have to be at the depth of twelve inches. In all ases however, a prior approval is necessary before any payment can be made. It is recommended that producers desiring to break sandy soil under the 1947 program make their application to do so soon after January 1, 1947. Producers desiring to break land 12 inches this fall are reminded that prior approval must be obtained before any breaking is started.

Questions and Answers

How can I arrange to have my National Service Life Insurance premiums deducted from the disability compensation checks I receive from Veterans Adminis-

A. You can do this if you will go to any Veterans Administration tals for treatment. office and fill out a form authorizing VA to make the deductions your compensation payments.

Q. I have been turned down by a lending institution for a G. I. guaranteed loan to buy a business. Does this mean that I can't get a G. I. guaranteed loan to go into

A. No. If one lender turns you down, try another one. The fact that one lender is not interested does not indicate that your propsition is not sound.

Q. Before the G. I. Bill was mended. I used up my whole guarantee of \$2,000 to buy a farm. Now that the maximum guarantee has been increased to \$4,000, would I be entitled to an additional \$2,000 loan-guarantee if I vish to purchase more land?

Yes. If you used part or all of your loan guarantee before Servicemen's Readjutment Act (G. I. Bill) was amended last that all interested in bettering winter, the amount of loan-guarantee credit used is deducted from the amount for which you are eligible under the amended bill, and the remainder is the amount of guaranteed credit which you may use in obtaining future loans.

Q. Can I change the beneficiary letting the beneficiaries know

anything about it? A. Yes. A veteran may change the beneficiary or beneficiaries of his National Service Life Insurance at any time without their office.

Q. Is the guaranty or insurance privilege of a veteran restored to its original amount when the indebtedness is repaid.



AS his own boss, the farmer has long since found out that a profit is not just an extra sum, above the bare cost of doing business, which can be used as you please. It is the main source of funds necessary to pay for a new silo, buy better machinery, and improve the house and the barn.

In spite of the great rise in income, farm profits are no more than necessary to keep the farm plant producing efficiently. It's the same with the iron and steel industry which makes the materials for the farmer's tools.

earnings have been declining.

In 1945 steel companies had left, after meeting all expenses but before paying dividends, only a little more than one-tenth of one cent on each pound of steel sold. The profit on each dollar invested was less than five cents. Year y year since 1941, when the war started,

Although last year's output of steel was 19

per cent greater than in 1940, the last prewar, year, pay rolls were nearly double but dividends were lower.

There are many misunderstandings and misrepresentations about profits. Some people forget that reasonable profits are a necessary incentive of the American system, which results in abundant low-cost farm products and abundant low-cost steel products.

It is up to those who know what profits are for, and what they can do, to see that they are not destroyed-and with them our high standard of living.




