





In proclaiming Fire Prevention Week, to be observed beginning October 6 this year, President Truman said: "Whereas fires threaten this year to exact the greatest toll of lives and the greatest waste of material resources that our nation has ever experienced; and

"Whereas this destruction is taking place at a time when the entire world is faced with distressing shortages of food and housing and nearly every commodity essential to speedy reconversion to a peacetime economy; and

"Whereas the vast majority of destructive fires are preventable by the exercise of greater caution on the part of all our citizens

"I ask every citizen to do his part by learning how to detect and eliminate all possible causes of fires in his Mr. Truman then rehome and in his business. . quested that state and local governments, business and labor organizations, churches, schools, the press, radio, gi and motion-picture industry and other such organizations Mrs. J. U. Fields returned Friday Building and says that work will also cooperate in "arousing the public to the awareness of the dread threat of fires.

The President has pointed to a terrible danger and an immediate need for action. Some 11,000 Americans will die one of the most horrible of deaths this year unless fire's toll is controlled. More than half_a-billion dollars worth of property, much of it virtually irreplace able at this time, will be destroyed as the consequence of our carelessness and ignorance, The duty of us all-it only on the selfish grounds of self protection-is clear.

Congress and the OPA

Manufacturers, retailers, distributors and others in volved, accepted the continuation of OPA in its presen modified form, with good grace. But, despite this, the great bulk of them have cooperated with OPA to the full in seeking to carry out the provisions of the law.

Even so, it is apparent that OPA cannot and is not "holding the price line." Cost of production of everything, whether we like it or not, continues to rise, and that must be reflected in the cost to the buyer. We are learning, for example, that we cannot have a public debt and record wages and prewar prices at the same time. When OPA does attempt to force prices be. low their natural level, as in the case of meat, supplies dwindle in the showcases of legitimate, law-abiding stores-and flow in abundance into eager black-market

What this all adds up to is that the natural forces of supply and demand can't long be avoided. In a free market, prices eventually will find their own level, wherever that may be. It will be a level based upon production, upon consumer desire, upon wage scales, upon material and operating costs, upon competition, and upon all the other factors which come into play in farm and factory and continue on down the line to the store where the ultimate customer makes his purchase. And the sooner we return to that free market, the better off we

It was obviously the desire of Congress that this return be made quickly. It revived OPA with great reluctance, partly because of pressure from the Administration, and partly because it believed that complete de. control was sound now. Condemn Poisoning of Pets To the Editor

Irate citizens of Haskell are orviction the person or persons responsible for the wholesale poioning of local pets. Never before in the history of Haskell has anything so dastardly or disgraceful been perpertrated against the population of the town. Some of the dogs lost recently were invaluable as protectors for the children of the families to which they belonged. The stories of kindnesses and heroism told by their owners are enough to make a person wonder if the most valuable citizen of Haskell could ever in a lifetime be worth as much to the people of Haskell as were the recently murdered dogs. Such wilful and unwarranted murder deserves the heaviest penalty within the law to impose.

The killing of an animal against the wishes of the owner constitutes a misdemeanor, with a maximum fine of \$200. Each animal so killed constitutes a separate offense with its additional pen-

The poisoning of dogs in Haskell has been a recurring fact for so many years that scarcely a family has never suffered such a loss. It seems that no concerted action has ever before been brought to bear to stop the practice. The time has come when we are determined to meet such losses with more than tears. Haskell citizens want to be able to attempt to replace their pets with the assur-ance that though they some day will die of old age, they will never die from poisoning.

The strychnine used for the rewholesale poisoning was placed in meat and not only scattered up and down the streets of Haskell, but was thrown into yards to be eaten by pets which have never been known to leave their own yards.

In one instance, the malefactor went into a front gate and around the house to poison a dog that was chained in the back yard. That dog was the dearest possession of a family of children whose widowed mother does housework to earn their living. When she heard that dogs were being poisoned, she went to the expense of buying


