### Children Susceptible To Many Winter Ills, Health Official Says

Young children may suffer as much from winter illnesses as they do from those commonly known as "summer complaints," in the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and his advice to parents as the winter season approaches is to guard babies and young children against these winter health hazards.

Influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, and asthma are included among those disease which may be dangerous winter illnesses among young children since they affect the respiratory or breathing system. Such disease as pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold, they may follow as an after-effect of measles or whooping cough, or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning.

"These winter diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread through the secretions from the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense," Dr. Cox cautioned, "is to strengthen the powers of resistance against disease; the second is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure they avoid contact with others who have coughs, colds, or fevers."

### EX-NAVY AND MARINES TO GET RANK IN ARMY

Under new War Department directives, men formerly in the Navy, Marines or Coast Guard may come into the Army at a grade commensurate with their experience in another branch, it has been announced by the Dallas U. S. Army Recruiting office. Former members of other services who have served as much as six months in a military specialty, and who were discharged after May 12, 1945, will be given rank up to T-Sgt. immediately upon enlistment. Base pay of a T-Sgt. is \$135.00 per month. Men who enlist before October 5, 1946, will still obtain full benefits of the GI Bill of Rights.

Condemn Poisoning of Pets To The Editor:

Irate citizens of Haskell are organizing forces to bring to conviction the person or persons responsible for the wholesale poisoning of local pets. Never before in the history of Haskell has anything so dastardly or disgraceful been perpetrated against the population of the town. Some of the dogs lost recently were invaluable as protectors for the children of the families to which they belonged. The stories of kindnesses and heroism told by their owners are enough to make a person wonder if the most valuable citizen of Haskell could ever in a lifetime be worth as much to the people of Haskell as were the recently murdered dogs. Such wilful and unwarranted murder deserves the heaviest penalty within the law to impose.

The killing of an animal against the wishes of the owner constitutes a misdemeanor, with a maximum fine of \$200. Each animal so killed constitutes a separate offense with its additional penalty.

The poisoning of dogs in Haskell has been a recurring fact for so many years that scarcely a family has never suffered such a loss. It seems that no concerted action has ever before been brought to bear to stop the practice. The time has come when we are determined to meet such losses with more than tears. Haskell citizens want to be able to attempt to replace their pets with the assurance that though they some day will die of old age, they will never die from poisoning.

The strychnine used for the recent wholesale poisoning was placed in meat and not only scattered up and down the streets of Haskell, but was thrown into yards to be eaten by pets which have never been known to leave their own yards.

In one instance, the malefactor went into a front gate and around the house to poison a dog that was chained in the back yard. That dog was the dearest possession of a family of children whose widowed mother does housework to earn their living. When she heard that dogs were being poisoned, she went to the expense of buying

a chain to insure their dog's safety. Each morning as the children left for school and she for work, they chained their dog behind the house so there would be no chance of his getting poison; but, unfortunately, precaution is of no avail against such deliberate and premeditated cruelty.

Some two months ago the city council of Haskell appointed a pound man to whom they promised to pay fifty cents per head for each dog he removed from the streets. According to city records, the city has paid for removing 48

dogs during the month of August and 50 in September. That number naturally does not include the many that were found dead in their own yards by the owners, who took it upon themselves to see that their beloved pets were not included among the "fifty cents per head" class.

The citizens of Haskell understand a great deal about the atrocity, and are anxious that the culprits do not escape their just punishment. Whatever proof you, fellow-citizens, have to help insure conviction for these crimes,

we invite you to turn it over to any of the undersigned citizens, all of whom suffered an irreparable loss in the poisoning of their dog.
