

Precautions Advised Against Tick Bite

With the hunting season now open, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging that all hunters or other persons spending time in wooded areas use all possible precautions against being bitten by ticks which may infect the victim with relapsing fever He further advises that when a tick is found, it be removed from the body as soon as possible and that care be taken not to crush the ticks in handling them.

"Tick-bite fever is contracted," Dr. Cox explained, "either from the bite of infected ticks or by absorbing the infectious material through breaks or scratches in the skin." According to Dr. Cox, the disease does not spread from person to person by direct contact but only through the bite of an infected tick or body louse. Prompt removal of the insect is of the utmost importance.

Relapsing fever, commonly called tick-bite fever, is characterized by sudden onset, intense headache located in the front part of the head and pains in the back and limbs. The fever lasts from three to five days before slowly declining. The temperature will





Security for Farm Families

Cash income of American farmers this year will b the highest in history, nationally speaking. What are the farmers going to do with this bumper harvest of extra eash? Spend it on scarce goods at high prices, or salt it down against the inevitable day when the long green is during the past week end. not so plentiful, but will you get more for a dollar?

Farm folks take pride in their common sense. There is only one common sense answer: PLAY IT SAFE. Save all you can while you've got it to save. Put it away like hay in the barnlot, to feed out when you need it. And be sure to put it in a barn that can't blow down in any financial storm that may come.

The Department of Agriculture is already warning of a possible drop in farm income next year. A recent bulletin of the American Bankers Association's Agricultural with wild game Commission says: "Gross farm income remains high - but production expenses are increasing, so farmers need to be prepared for a net income which may be materially reduced. In the first place there are not enough of the right kind and size of lights to adequately light the business district. With very little outlay of cash this embarrassing sluation could be remedied immeasurably. Not only would more lighting add to the attractiveness of the town, but would give local folks and those here from other areas a feeling of pride and security they cannot have at present.

We don't mean that darkness in Haskell makes it unsafe for her citizens and visitors to be on the streets after the sun goes down. But there is something about a welllighted business district which no other one feature can provde. Little folks and big folks too like to see and to be seen, and that isn't easy on Haskell's streets these nights.

Now, we had never thought of poor lighting and dirty streets going hand in hand. Always there has been a tendency on the part of lazy people to push dirt into dark corners where it cannot been seen, and it seems therein may lie a secret to the untidy condit on of Haskell's business section. Folks who are in town only at night can't see and feel the filth that is allowed to remain on the streets, sidewalks, alleys and around the courthouse. We hasten again to defend those few who are paid inadequately to keep the square clean. Both city and countf employees are doing a commendable job with what they have to work with and for the pay they receive.

It seems high time that a concerted effort is made to clean up this little town of ours, and to light her so that folks can well be proud of possible cleanliness. If such effort is not made, we cannot but expect that Haskell will remain small and unattractive, because it is a well-proven fact that people like the light and sanitation rather than darkness and filth.


