In their quest for homes, former servicemen noticed that the juvenile courthouse was empty. Inquiry disclosed that it hadn't been used for three years.


A petition to the county board of supervisors brought them the right to use the building for temporary homes. After some repairs, the veterans and their families moved in.



Successful Baking

One of the small but important these cakes. details for successful baking is the proper preparation of the pan. A lot of us are sometimes doubtful about whether to grease the pan, dust it with flour after greasing or to line the pan with paper

Louise Newman, county home demonstration agent, explains that flouring the pan after greasing is dded insurance against sticking, but it does have the disadvantage of forming a slight extra crust that many cooks dislike. As for greased paper, it protects breads nd cakes against scorching or ticking to the pan, but unless it pulled off immediately ofter baking, it may stick to the baked food. Paper scorches easily of course, and should be used only when baking is done in a slow

Either plain greasing, or greasing plus dusting with flour, may be used for mixtures like cakes and cookies that contain both fat and sugar. Greased pans and no paper are recommended for quick breads, like loaves and muffins and for yeast breads which bake t a high temperature.

POTATOES:

Huge Loss

As much as 20 million bushels of government-owned potatoes may go to waste following U. S. support of the 1946 crop in the face of a sagging market.

Originally, the government held title to 100 million bushels as the result of a bumper harvest. Making good on its agreement to maintain prices at at least 90 per cent of parity, the U. S. bought substantial stocks and covered other commitments with loans, redeemable if the market rose. The huge waste is expected to follow from rotting of the potatoes in inadequate storage on the farms.

To escape total loss, the govern ment resold millions of bushels to distillers and livestock feeders at bargain prices. Distillers of beverage and industrial alcohol bought over 26 million bushels. About 525,-000 bushels were resold for export to famine areas, with the amount held down by perishability and high

Public institutions and school lunch programs received about one million bushels of the surplus potatoes free.

While total debt doubled during the 1941-'45 period, federal debt jumped five times. In 1945 alone, fe.eral debt rose 42 bilion dellars while state, municipal and private obligations de-clined 7 billion.

BIG FARMS VS. SMALL FARMS WASHINGTON. - Inside fact behind the senate small business committee's release of the report on small-scale and large-scale farming is that the report had been suppressed for nearly two years by big California land interests.

The very fact that the bureau of agricultural economics dared make the study was one reason the last congress cut its research funds. The study so infuriated Representative Al Elliott, California Democrat and friend of the big farmers, that he has fought all appropriations for farm research ever since.

The study was begun in the sumliott was leading a fight to repeal the old law by which no one could own more than 160 acres of U. S. ley section of California's huge Central valley-one, Arvin, is composed mainly of workers on large industrimade up largely of people who own and work their own farms.

Our first realization, as individuals, must be that almost all fires are the result of the human element. A man is careless, a man is ignorant and destructive fire strikes. The fire which could not be prevented is extremely rare

We must understand, secondly, that the prevention of most fires is the simplest of tasks. A new lamp cord, a clean attic, a minor repair to a heating plant, a fire extinguisher or fire escape-such attentions as these would have prevented a very large part of last year's terrible loss of life and materials. This comes straight home to the individual, and no one can escape his share of the responsibility.

Third, there is obvious need for education of the individual in what to do if he is in a building attacked by fire. Ignorance in this field was the cause of many of the deaths in the recent hotel disasters. In Atlanta, men and women jumped to destruction from window ledges-in the face of pleas by firemen who were preparing nets and ladders. In both Chicago and Atlanta, people threw open doors and windows thus creating drafts that simply fan-

All of us should feel shame at 1946's terrible fire record. And all of us should resolve that it will be improved in 1947.






