Voters Will Ballot On School Tax Rate Saturday

Property owners and qualified voters residing in the Haskell Independent School District will vote Saturday on the proposal to set the local school tax rate at 1.25 on the \$100 valuation.

Trustees of the district ordered the election recently in response to a petition signed by a substantial number of residents in the district asking that the rate be fixed at 1.25. The election will be held at the City Hall during the hours prescribed by law.

Present tax rate in the district is \$1.50, and signers of the petition expressed the opinion that a rate of \$1.25 would be adequate to properly finance the Haskell schools on the present high scholastic standard, and would also meet requirements for receiving maximum benefits through State and Federal aid.

Extension of Water Mains Planned

City Water Superintendent Rogers Gilstrap announced this week that work of extending water mains in the south part of town would be started Monday, weather permitting, and would be completed as rapidly as possible. The project will provide service to a large number of consumers who have not had municipal water facilities.

The extension will begin at the corner of South 2nd street and Ave. F, thence to South 6th and Ave. F, from that point to South 6th on Ave. G, thence to South 12th Ave. G.

Property owners along the proposed extension who desire water connection should notify the City Water department in order that connections can be made as the main is being laid. The extensions will result in removal of a 26% fire insurance penalty now being charged property owners in that area. When the project is completed there will be no penalty on insurance as of the 1946 rate, Supt. Gilstrap pointed out.

Dr. H. L. Pritchett Will Be Speaker For Two-Day Institute To Be Held Mar. 10-11

Haskell Parent-Teacher Association, in cooperation with other civic organizations of the town will present Dr. H. L. Pritchett, a Sociologist and Mental Hygienist, specialist in Problems of Marriage and Family, in a two-day institute here Monday and Tuesday, March 10-11.

Dr. Pritchett has been called a practical counselor. Perhaps that is because, in addition to wide training and research, he has spent a good many years in personal counseling; and parent-child counseling. For more than fifteen years he has been a counselor of college students in The Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

Dr. Pritchett will address the Haskell High School students at 10:30 o'clock Monday morning on the subject of "Some Needs of Youth in a Modern World." He will speak at 2:30 p. m. at the Haskell High School to the parent groups. All civic and church groups of Haskell are cordially invited to hear this lecture. On Tuesday March 11, Dr. Pritchett will address the Lions Club at a 1 o'clock luncheon at the Activity building of the High School. He will address the Lions on "Social Change and Problems of Family Living." The last lecture will be given at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday evening in Haskell High School auditorium. The entire public is invited to hear Dr. Pritchett when he gives "Some Essentials of Successful Marriage." School officials and teachers from the adjoining counties have been invited to participate in this meeting.

Early Start Due On Paved Road To Paint Creek School

Construction is expected to start at an early date on a 9-mile stretch of paved road which will connect the Paint Creek community with Highway 24 at a point near the old Baldwin ranch five miles east of Haskell. The project is a part of the county's Farm to Market road program.

County Judge Virgil Reynolds and Commissioner M. E. Cobb, in whose precinct the project is located, said.

Engineers of the State Highway Department are staking right-of-way for the highway and actual construction work will be started as soon as right of way easements are secured, county officials said.

Fifteen Homeless After Fire Destroys Five-Room House

Fifteen Negroes, mostly children, were left homeless when fire destroyed the five room home of Leslie Johnson, colored, in North Haskell last Thursday afternoon. Living in the house were Johnson and his family, and a son-in-law and family who had been unable to find living quarters elsewhere. Both families lost all their household goods, and practically their clothing.

The fire, believed started from an overheated stove, had spread throughout the frame structure before fire department apparatus arrived, and firemen were hampered because the site was beyond reach of water mains.

Demand Slack For 1947 Car Tags

During the past month a record low of sales of automobile license plates was registered by the county Tax Assessor-Collector's office, R. A. Coburn reported this week.

Mr. Coburn stated Thursday morning that only 504 tags for passenger cars, 34 tags for farm trucks, 18 for commercial trucks, 7 trailers, one motorcycle and one truck tractor. He also issued two dealer tags.

When applying for license tags car owners should bring their certificate of title and last year's registration receipt, Coburn explained.

He estimated this year's sales at around 3250 tags and is urging car owners to come in early and avoid the last minute rush. Deadline for use of 1946 tags is March 31.

Motorists Warned Against Following Fire Trucks

Warning to motorists that they must strictly observe traffic regulations when a fire alarm is sounded, Chief of Police Harold H. Hodges called particular attention to two sections of the city's traffic code which will be strictly enforced in the future. The two sections are reprinted below:

Section 10. Operation of Vehicles on Approach of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. Upon approach of any authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles giving audible signal by bell, siren, or exhaust whistle, the operator of every other vehicle shall immediately drive the same to a position as possible and parallel to the right hand edge or curb of the street, clear of and intersection, and shall stop and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles shall have passed, unless otherwise directed by a police officer.

Section 11. Following Fire Apparatus Prohibited. Upon the sounding of gongs or warning devices used upon fire apparatus, operators shall stop their vehicles as near to the right curb as possible and shall remain standing until such fire apparatus has passed or until five minutes after the official fire siren has started sounding. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to follow any fire apparatus in response to a fire alarm closer than three hundred (300) feet from the rear of such apparatus.

Aldermen elected April 1 will succeed W. L. Richey and J. A. Bynum, whose terms on the City Council expire at that time.

According to F. W. Martin, County Agent, the boys have a good chance of winning some of the top premiums at the show, and will also sell their steers there.

Committees in charge of the af- fair said Thursday morning. More than two hundred reservations have already been made, many by citizens in surrounding towns and communities, with a heavy local demand during the next few days expected to exhaust the sup- ply of tickets well in advance of the banquet.

This year's meeting is being planned as a countywide affair instead of from a local angle. C. of C. officials pointed out. They express the belief that all towns in the county have a common interest in planning post-war development and in solving local problems, and that an interchange of ideas and suggestions at the coming meeting will prove valuable to the county as a whole.

Guest speaker for the annual meeting will be W. M. Ostenberg, of Coffeyville, Kans., and the Rev. Stuart Currie, Presbyterian minister, will be master of ceremonies.

Special guests at the banquet will be Ray Sims, Billy Middlebrook and James Miller, outstanding 4-H Club boys of Haskell County whose club projects won top honors at the recent 4-H and FFA Show in Haskell and Wichita Falls.

Culminating the evening's program will be the introduction of new officers and directors of the Chamber of Commerce for the coming year.

Parking Meters In Business District Being Considered

Penny parking meters for Haskell's business district are being considered by merchants, following an explanation of the system at a meeting held Friday afternoon at the City Hall.

City Councilman George Neely introduced to the group L. W. Richardson of the Karpark Corporation of Cincinnati, Ohio, who has made a traffic survey of the town, and has offered to install meters on a 6-month trial basis without any charge to the city.

He explained that meters would be installed, one-fourth of the revenue going to the city and three-fourths to the company. If at the end of the trial period, the meters have not solved the parking problem the city can ask that they be removed and all damage to the sidewalks repaired. However should the city decide to keep the meters all money collected by the company during the trial period would be applied on the purchase price of the meters.

The new type meter provides parking privileges at approximately the following rates:

- 1 penny for 12 minutes.
- 2 pennies for 24 minutes.
- 3 pennies for 36 minutes.

And so on up to 5 pennies for one hour. The meters will also take one or two nickels. Ordinarily one or two pennies provides sufficient time for shopping.

Plaintiff further alleges that the community property consist of household goods and live stock in the State of Washington, and that plaintiff and defendant have agreed that in event a divorce is granted that plaintiff have the household goods and that defendant have all other property.

Plaintiff alleges that her maiden name was Dorothy Mae Rogers and that it will be to her best interest to have her maiden name restored to her.

As is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

Q. How fast do rats reproduce?

A. Rats begin to breed at two to
three months of age, and the period
of gestation is about 21 days. The
average litter is probably ten, and
one female may have from three to
four litters a year. That is why it is
so important to guard against this
rodent and why rat control requires
constant attention.

Q. Are sheep ever infected with
Bang's disease?

A. Yes, there have been a few
cases reported, but the disease is
most common among dairy and beef
cattle, goats, and hogs.

Q. How much space is needed in
the brooder house for baby chicks?

A. The Ralston Purina Company's
Research Farm recommends not
more than two chicks per square
foot during the first six weeks. Pul-
lets up to 20 weeks should have
three square feet per bird, while 3½
to four square feet is recommended
per hen. Crowding retards growth
and causes uneven development.

Q. In fattening beef for market,
how do common grade steers com-
pare to good steers?

A. According to the U. S. Depart-
ment of Agriculture, common grade
steers are suited only to a very short
feeding period and are profitable
only when they can be bought very
cheaply. Good steers fattened in the
Southeastern Coastal Plains area
were superior to common steers and:

1. Required less feed per 100 lbs.
gain.
2. Made larger daily gain.
3. Carcasses graded one full grade
higher.
4. Dressed 1.75% more.
5. Fattened more rapidly.

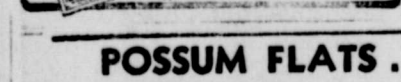
Q. How much feed is required to
raise a turkey in confinement from
poult to market?

A. The average amount of feed re-
quired from start until 26 weeks of
age is about 75 lbs., although this
will vary according to the bird's con-
dition, variety, and length of con-
finement.

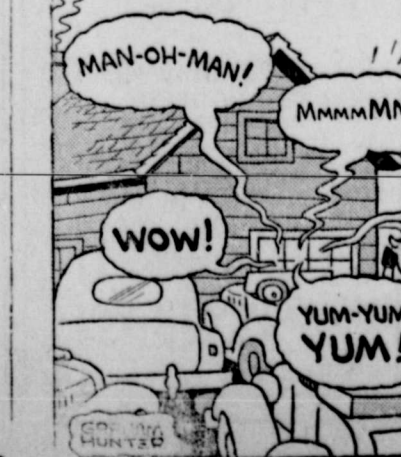

Two Haskell Men Attend Land Bank Meeting in Houston

W. E. Penick of Rule, member of the board of directors of the Haskell County National Farm Loan Association, attended the Federal Land Bank of Houston's annual stockholders meeting in Houston recently as the association representative. He was accompanied by W. H. McCandless, secretary-treasurer of the association who was again given a four day all expense paid trip to Houston as a guest of the Federal Land Bank. Invitations are extended each year to the twenty secretaries who make the best showing during the calendar year.

Mr. Penick, the association representative, said that the Land Bank, which is owned by the 144 national farm loan associations in Texas, is celebrating its 30th anniversary this spring. Local farmers and ranchers own the associations, which "are the foundation of the Land Bank system, and the meeting at Houston was featured by discussions of the operation of these organizations which are set up for providing, safe, long-term credit at low cost, to suit the needs of landowners."

Reports at the Houston meeting showed that 164,717 Land Bank and Commissioners' loans for a total of \$477,650,000 have been made in Texas during the last 30 years, many thousands of these loans having already resulted in debt-free ownership of farms. The Haskell county association which serves Haskell county now has \$62,000 in farmer and rancher capital has approximately one and one-half million dollars in outstanding loans, with surplus of \$40,000,000.

During the last twelve months a total of 10% dividends on stock has been paid to members in passing back part of the Land Banks System savings to the users of the loan service, another \$3,000 having gone into surplus to further strengthen the association in the future.

Home Improvement Main Objective of H-D Club Women

Haskell County Home Demonstration Club women have had a large part in making possible the highlights of 1946 home demonstration work in Extension Service District 3 in Northwest Texas

which were recently released by Ruth Thompson, former Extension district agent.

District 3 Extension Service is composed of a block of 20 Northwest Texas counties bordered on the west by Motley, Dickens and Kent Counties, and on the east by Montague and Wise Counties.

In this area, Miss Thompson reports that home demonstration club women were particularly

outstanding in home improvements. As a direct result of club work, 703 kitchens in the homes of these women were remodeled. In addition to kitchen improvement, 1466 other rooms in District 3 rural homes were improved and 133 sewing machines were put in better working order due to home demonstration training. Clothing work came in for a big share of attention, Miss Thompson reports, as District 3 club women and girls reported making or remodeling over 25,000 garments, as well as 381 hats and 1,642 accessories, chiefly purses. More than 5,000 garments were reported cleaned at home.

In food work, the women of this area prepared and stored in freezer lockers 278,800 pounds of meats, fruits and vegetables; they also grew 6,444 home gardens and planted 1300 fruit trees and 3500 berry vines.

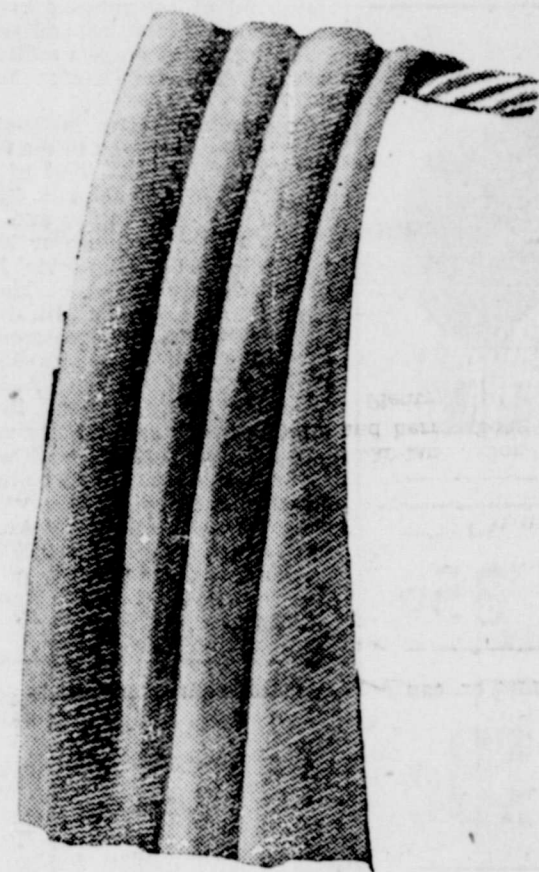
