### Ivy Poisoning Poses Threat to Picnickers

With the advent of summer and the ensuing exodus from city to country resorts and picnic spots the annual problem of ivy poisoning is once more making its appearance.

In order that city dwellers may guard against this poisonous and painful plant by instant recognition of it, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statement: "Poison ivy may be recognized by its leaves and its fruit. Each leaf is divided into three leaflets, the margins of which vary from smooth to more or less notched outlines. The small greenish flowers appear in May or June and the fruits which are the size of a small pea are pale green and poisonous when immature."

The symptoms of ivy poisoning range from slight redness and itching to exaggerated swelling and blisters, accompanied by severe burning sensations. There are all gradations between these extremes. In mild cases the skin is covered by numerous small blisters, containing a colorless serum which is not poisonous. The poison cannot spread from broken blisters but pustules may form and infections may result as secondary consequence. Recovery usually occurs in from 10 days to 3 weeks. Occasionally a persistent skin inflammation follows.

Dr. Cox advised persons planning picnics and outdoor excursions to learn to recognize poison ivy and thus be able to avoid it. Prevention is much easier to accomplish, than relief from ivy poisoning.

**Plant Bed Help To Early Gardeners**

Garden plants like tomatoes, cabbage, pepper, lettuce and egg plants can be started in plant beds six to eight weeks before time to plant them in the garden, Louise Newman, County Home Demonstration Agent, points out.

Lettuce and cabbage plants can be moved directly from the plant bed to the garden when they are two or three inches high but tomatoes, eggplants, and pepper need to be thinned and hardened before transplanting into the garden. The plants left in the plant bed should be thinned to a spacing of two to three inches apart and those thinned out moved into another box to grow three or four weeks more until they are sturdy enough to set out in the garden. Transplanting the vegetables into small paper cups or similar containers gives the gardener the advantage of a good mold of soil around the roots. These added weeks of protected growth will make the plants grow off more quickly and set fruit earlier than when small plants or seed are used, Miss Newman said.

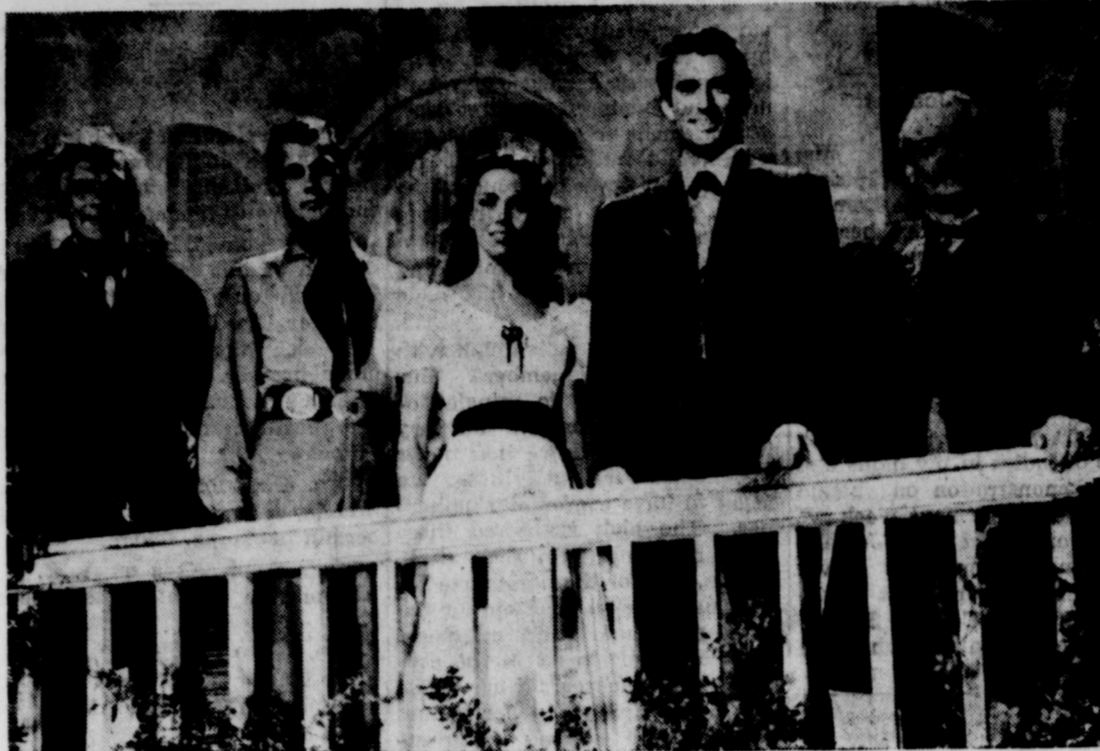

**Vaccination Against Typhoid Fever Is Advised**

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises Haskell County people who have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever during the last two or three years, that they go to their doctor or to the nearest health officer and take the three "shots" that will protect them against the disease.

"The three shots that will protect against typhoid are given at intervals of one week apart," Dr. Cox stated. "As it takes some time for the protective treatment to be established throughout the system, it is wise not to delay in having it done. My advice is, have it done now so that immunization may be complete before summer arrives and vacation trips are taken."

This advice was addressed particularly to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and other youngsters who are looking forward to spring and summer hikes and trips. It is, however, meant also for others, young and old, whose business or pleasure during the summer will take them to places where there may be doubt as to the purity or safety of the water supply, or as to the care with which food is handled.

The old adage that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is particularly applicable to this disease, which is so dangerous and debilitating when it does occur, and which can be prevented so easily through immunization.

What H-D Club Work Has Meant During Twenty Years

To begin my story, when Miss Matilda Gunn came to Haskell County as the first Home Demonstration Agent in 1927, I became very much interested in the work but I could not get anyone else in our community interested. In 1928 my mother-in-law, two of her daughters, another daughter-in-law, and several of the neighbors became interested, so on November 5, 1928, Miss Gunn met with a group of ladies in my home and gave a demonstration on bound button holes. The next week we met and organized the Josselet Home Demonstration Club. I was elected president and sent to the Short Course at College Station. It was there I realized what an ambitious farm woman could do.

I was taught self-reliance, to have faith and courage. The mistakes I made, I profited by. I had never had faith enough in myself to lay a piece of material down and risk cutting out a garment, but I entered our first dress contest, made my first dress and used bound button holes. I did not win, but I was so proud of the job I had done, my fears were gone, and I had learned to sew. When the criticism was made, my work was praised, and I had made few mistakes.

We had a very active club with eleven charter members. Our community began to mingle together where before we did very little visiting, and we had never thought of rural activities. We began to have community gatherings. The club sponsored these gatherings and furnished three leaders, one for the adults one for the young people, and one for the children. There were no meek, timid ones left to sit in the corner, for the sponsor put her whole self in her group and her games, and everyone enjoyed the evening.

The Recreation School that was organized in our county meant a lot to me. It helped train me as a leader and teach me to handle small groups or large ones as the occasion arose. I soon learned that the ladies trained in Home Demonstration work were far ahead of the society ladies of our town, and that there was more to entertaining than a lovely center piece for the dining room table.

In 1935 we embraced seven school district in membership, making Josselet the largest club in the county. By 1936 we realized our meeting places were getting too far apart, so we bought a club house and moved it to the center of our community, which is six miles north of Haskell on Highway 277 on C. A. Thomas' land by what was known as the Honeycutt Filling Station at that time, but is now owned and operated by Jess Matthews.

Our club was named Josselet, for it was the Josselet women who first became interested in club work in our community. We lost two charter members in death—Mrs. U. J. Josselet and Mrs. W. E. Taylor. The club has three charter members yet, they are: Mrs. C. A. Thomas, Mrs. J. L. Toliver and Mrs. Jess Josselet and these three are Josselets.

This work has meant a lot to me all down through the 19 years I have been a club member. For the past few years I could not be active in attendance, but I have always shared my part of the responsibilities. I have missed only one encampment in all these years—I had to go on crutches because of a broken leg one year, and the year I missed, I was in a brace or I would have tackled it them. I have always looked forward to the encampments to meet our friends from adjoining counties, and I have been sorry Baylor County withdrew for the three counties had such wonderful times together. Our motto was "Leave your troubles and cares at home. Come and have a good time." Time and space won't permit me to tell just how much I have learned since being a Home Demonstration Club member, but I love the work and we have had seven wonderful agents—in the past twenty years. That sounds like a very few agents for that period of time, but we kept them just as long as possible, and then encouraged Cupid to shoot his dart, so that we might keep them in Haskell County to remain in our hearts.

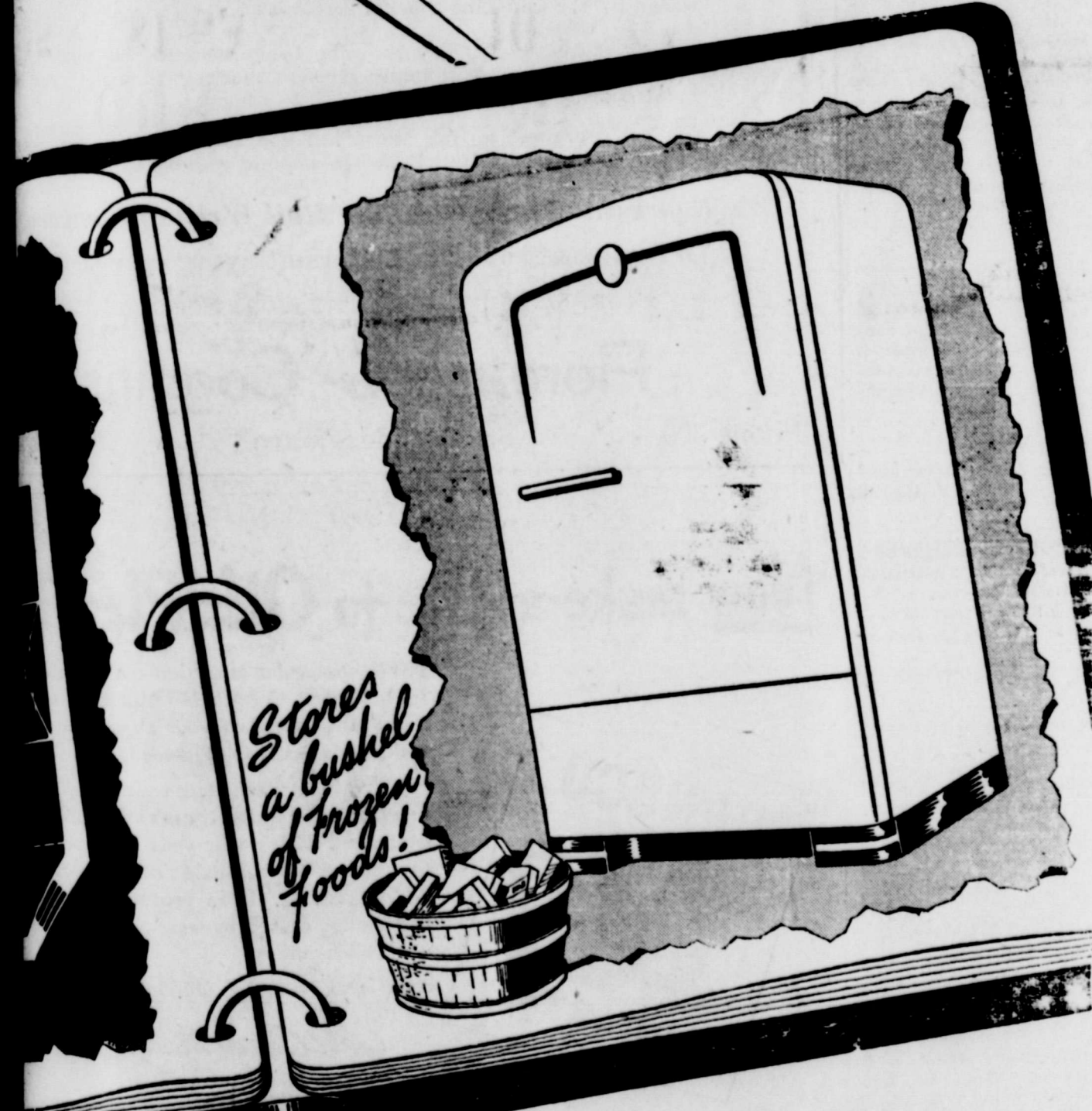



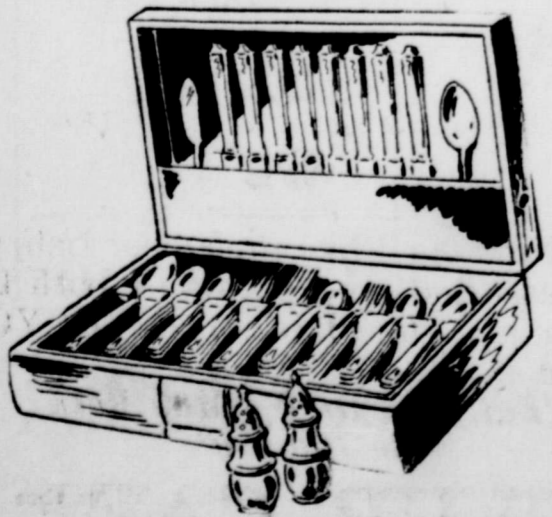

During the twenty years of organized work in the county, seven home demonstration agents have served: Matilda Gunn, 1927-1929; Eileen F. Partlow, now Mrs. Reynolds Wilson of Haskell, 1929-33; Johnnie Reed, 1933-34; Peggy Taylor, now Mrs. J. G. Vaughter of Haskell, 1934-37; Miss Mildred Vaughn, 1937-41; Cathryn Sands, now Home Demonstration Agent in Wichita County, 1941-44; and Louise Newman, the present Agent who began work in the county as successor to Miss Vaughn.

Under the present plan, each

club meets twice each month—the agent presents one demonstration on some phase of homemaking and club members prepare the programs or demonstrations for the other meeting. Unorganized or non-club members or groups and girls 4-H clubs are helped by both club members and the home demonstration agent.

In line with the motto for National Home Demonstration Week—"Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World"—the objectives of club work are:

# Veteran's News

### Questions and Answers

Q. I am an honorably discharged World War II veteran, and would like to know of what benefit is a guaranteed loan if I purchase a home under the G. I. Bill?  
A. The guaranty provides for increases the security you have to offer for a loan by the amount of the guaranty; it tends to induce the lender to lend more nearly the full purchase price of the property and to give you a better rate of interest, and finally 4 per cent of the amount guaranteed is paid to the lender by VA and is an outright gift to you.

Q. My wife and I plan to purchase a \$9,000 home. We are both World War II veterans. Can we acquire the property jointly and so increase the amount which may be guaranteed?  
A. Yes, you may acquire the property jointly, but the maximum guaranty may not exceed 50 per cent of the loan.

Q. I have a G. I. loan on my home and would like to know if I can have the loan extended?  
A. Yes, you can have the loan extended if the lender is willing to give you more time, but the extension must provide for complete payment of the loan within the 25-year maximum period provided by law.

Q. What is the largest amount I can borrow under the G. I. Bill and still have the loan guaranteed?  
A. There is no limit on the amount which can be borrowed under the G. I. Bill. The limitation by law is on the size of the government guaranty and not on the size of the loan.

### Sidelights From Washington

(By GEORGE MAHON)

The chorus of one of the favorite popular songs begins like this: "It's a good day for singing a song, It's a good day for moving along."

Well, the Republican-dominated 80th Congress is not moving along very fast. The Republican program is to cut government expenses, reduce taxes, and pass a few pieces of legislation otherwise. Government expenses are being cut. That comes as a necessary consequence of the conclusion of war spending. However, cuts being made are not as deep as had been promised. The House passed a tax reduction bill which will no doubt pass the Senate in a modified form.

Last week the Republicans, after much difficulty passed through the House a bill continuing rent control. Some of them who had promised the people freedom from all government war-time regulations hesitated to vote for the bill but did so under strong pressure from party leaders.

Also during the week an appropriation bill providing overdue G. I. Bill payments to veterans in college cleared both Houses and went to the President for his signature. Democrats chided the Republicans over the three months delay in getting action. This bill also carried funds to pay overdue cotton crop insurance claims.

Both political parties are reluctantly supporting the request for necessary funds to combat starvation overseas. These costs are very great to the American taxpayer. The principal relief item is wheat and grain prices have risen as the demands have increased.

The House finally passed a bill designed to prevent abuses by labor and management but as this is being written the Senate is still debating the question. Congress is further behind with its regular work than at any time in recent years, but Speaker Joe Martin is seeking to speed up the program with the hope of Congressional adjournment by July 15.

The Washington highlight of last week was the enthusiastic demonstration of welcome which greeted President Aleman of Mexico upon his arrival from Mexico

**Stamford Legion To Sponsor Dance**

**Lone Star Gas Co. Plans \$9,500,000 Improvements**

Lone Star Gas Company anticipates expenditures of more than \$9,500,000 for extensions and additions to physical properties this year to meet growing requirements for service, President D. A. Hulley has announced. This sum has been budgeted for construction and equipment over the gas system comprising 321 towns and cities, one of which is Haskell.

Anticipated expenditures for additions during 1947 will top expenditures for similar purposes during last year by about \$500,000, Mr. Hulley said. Some of the projects are already under way, while others will be started when materials are available.

Following are the principal expenditures: Service lines, street mains, meters, regulators and other facilities for serving customers \$3,279,513; acquiring leases and drilling wells to insure adequate gas supply for many years, \$2,560,230; pipe line construction from and in gas fields to tap additional reserves and to provide additional transmission capacity, \$1,732,100; dehydration, cycling and gasoline plants to treat gas and promote conservation, \$1,071,650; supplementing existing facilities, such as automotive equipment and machinery and tools and building improvements, \$996,105.

Healthy growth of Lone Star's territory is indicated by the fact that the company added more than 23,000 customers during the past year. Total operating expenses increased by \$1,132,019 in 1946 over the previous year. The tax bill was \$6,486,087 and represented approximately \$1.50 out of every customer bill rendered each month.

Mr. Hulley's announcement also reflected the company's program of natural gas conservation and development of reserves to meet additional fuel requirements.

"Approximately 40 per cent of the total gas transported by the company for more than twenty years has been casinghead gas from oil wells and there is no material amount of such gas wasted in friends from which the company obtains its gas supply," Mr. Hulley said. "If the company had not purchased this casinghead gas, large quantities would have been wasted as an incident to the production of oil and the company required to withdraw gas at a greater rate from other reserves."
