4-H'ers to Get Merit Awards for Bettering Farm Job Methods

4-H Club members in Texas again have an opportunity this year to win special recognition for developing methods that will simplify their farm and home jobs. Recognition in the form of merit awards will be given on county, state and national levels in the 4-H Better Methods Electric Activity, the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work has announced.

Members need not have electricity on their farms to take part in this activity, which may be applied to all types of 4-H Club work.

Last year county winners were named in Bowie, Camp, Cass, Clay, Eastland, Fort Bend, Frio, Grayson, Hale, Hardeman, Harris, Jones, Lavaca, Llano, Montgomery, Moore, Sabine, Somervell, Taylor, Wood, Potter and Waller counties. Each county winner receives a gold-filled medal of honor.

State and national winner in 1946 was Harold Rumpy, 16, of Lakeview, who received a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, and a \$200 college scholarship, provided by Westinghouse Educational Foundation. Among his work simplification accomplishments on the farm was that of studying the job of unloading "freshed sorghum into a granary. He proposed using a grain elevator powered with an electric motor. He recommends providing electricity on the farm and installing an electrically powered feed grinder electric brooder and other labor-saving farm and home appliances and machines.

Six state winners are selected for national honors, each receiving a \$200 college scholarship.

The activity is conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

Barbecue Planned At Texas Tech For Attorney General

Preparations are being made for entertaining about 700 guests at a barbecue at Texas Technological College June 2, honoring Hon. Tom Clark, attorney general of the United States.

Attorney General Clark will deliver the commencement address and will receive an honorary doctor of laws degree from the college at its 21st annual commencement exercises.

More than 300 out-of-town guests, including federal and state government officials, leading educators, army officers and other prominent persons have already accepted special invitations extended by the college to the barbecue and commencement exercises.

Mark McGee, vice-chairman of the college board of directors, will introduce Attorney General Clark at commencement. Dr. W. M. Whyburn, president of the college, will confer the honorary degree.

Summer Band School Announced at Texas Tech June 6-July 16

Approximately 120 band teachers and college and pre-college band students from over the state are expected to attend the 14th annual Summer Band school at Texas Technological College June 6 through July 16, according to Dr. D. O. Wiley, general director.

Classes will be conducted in instrumental music for all band instruments, theory, conducting, band maneuvering, twirling for drum majors and majorettes. Students will be grouped into two bands, concert and intermediate, to gain additional repertoire experience.

Cotton Short Course Dates Announced

A two week short course in cotton classing for benefit of ginners, cotton merchants, farmers and others interested in fundamentals of cotton classing and marketing, will be conducted at Texas Technological College June 9 through 20.

The daily program will include lectures, discussions and demonstrations as well as four hours of grading and stapling. Cotton processing and the relation of cotton quality to grade of spun yarn will be demonstrated. Facilities of the textile engineering department will be used for demonstration purposes.

L. E. Parsons, head of the college textile engineering department, will be in general charge of the school, assisted by staff members of the Lubbock USDA office and professional cotton classifiers. L. O. Buchanan, supervisor of the Lubbock USDA office cotton classing, will be in charge of the classing department. Other staff members will be announced later, Parsons said.

Classes will begin at 9 a. m. daily and continue until 5 p. m. Certificates will be issued to those completing the course. Registration fee will be \$12.50. Cotton classing short course being resumed by the college year for the first time since war.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by the addition of Sections 17 and 18 providing for the payment of pensions and providing for the payment of the cost of equipment and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for the reduction in the maximum state tax on providing for an election of a proclamation

RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read: "In lieu of the state tax on property of the One Hundred Dollars valuation permitted to be levied by Article 3, as amended, here is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of the State of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Five (5c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings, or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each of such institutions of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bond or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not to exceed ten (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest. "Funds raised from said Five (5c) Cents tax levy for the ten (10) year period beginning January 1, 1948, are hereby allocated to the following institutions of higher learning, and in the following proportions, to wit: Institution Per Cent of Total John Tarleton Agricultural College 5.72107 North Texas Agricultural College 6.17028 Texas State College for Women 11.52992 Texas College of Arts and Industries 4.75551 College of Mines and Metallurgy 4.71936 Texas Technological College 16.54877 East Texas State Teachers College 8.10657 North Texas State Teachers College 12.64522 Sam Houston State Teachers College 5.55068 Southwest State Teachers College 6.78474 Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College 4.55414 Sul Ross State Teachers College 2.15315 West Texas State Teachers College 5.41643 Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas 5.34416 "Not later than June 1st of the beginning year of each succeeding ten (10) year period, the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, based on the average long session full-time student enrollment for the preceding five (5) year period of time, shall re-allocate to the above designated institutions of higher learning then in existence, all funds to be derived from said Five (5c) Cent ad valorem tax for said ten (10) year period; and all such designated institutions of higher learning which participate in the allocation or re-allocation of such

funds shall not thereafter receive any other state funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Five (5c) Cents ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of other state funds. This amendment shall be self-enacting. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. "Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars, and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Ten Million (\$10,000,000.00) Dollars. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than twenty (20) years from their respective dates, and in no event later than twenty-five (25) years after the date of the adoption of this amendment. This amendment shall be self-enacting. "Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes. "All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1947, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 and providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas." "Against the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 and providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Sec. 11. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 12. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

What Is Management?

They manage as they buy a home, educate the children, plant a garden, pick out a car, a refrigerator, a piano. A hundred decisions a day around the house are management decisions.

Management occurs at all levels in government, charity, education, lodge. It is the plumber with his helper, the elevator starter, the superintendent of schools, the master of the grange.

But in America, management probably has had its most scientific application in business.

Business management, even before World War I, helped build up a volume of production surpassing that of any other nation. In World War II, the results were even more spectacular. America outproduced all other countries combined.

By 1941, the value of an hour of work in terms of the staples of life, bread and butter, had so been raised that an American could buy from two to eight times as much as a man in Europe. This didn't just happen. Neither the men and women in industry nor the money in industry can be effective without good management. Nothing else is so important to the workers' welfare, the investors' welfare or the public welfare.

U. S. Has 18,188,000 War Veterans

Seven out of nine living veterans of the nation's last five wars served in World War II, according to Veterans A.

The latest report shows an estimated total of 18,188,000 living veterans. Of this number, 14,267,000 served in World War II. The remaining 3,921,000 participated in World War I or the Spanish American War, or they still receive VA compensation or pension benefits for service in the peacetime forces, the Civil War or the Indian Wars.

Experiments Made in Fertilizing Crops By Plane

Latest trick in South Plains agriculture is fertilizing cotton by airplane.

Lubbock County Agricultural Agent W. D. Sherrill, who believes there is something new happening every day in West Texas farming and ranching, reports that a demonstration was held recently in that county to see how airplane fertilization goes on.

The demonstration took place on the L. J. West farm, 12 miles southwest of Lubbock. About 50 people watched a ship from a Lubbock flying service dust a cotton field with 4-12-4 fertilizer. Sherrill says a stiff breeze interfered with operations a bit, and the fertilizer did not settle as rapidly and evenly as it should. In fact, there probably was cotton fertilized free for miles around. If the method pans out as effective, however, you can bank on

Farmers Advised to Combat Hopper Menace

Farmers of the state are being urged by the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service to start control measures against millions of grasshoppers that are hatching now.

Entomologists of the Extension Service say that poison bait put out now to kill the young hoppers can prevent a lot of damage to the state's row crops. Grasshopper infestations were large last season and the hatch this spring points to another big year for the insects.

An early start on grasshopper control is being encouraged now because the insects, at present, are young and easy to kill; they are bunched together now after the hatch and therefore very little bait will kill them; and they are still on the edges of fields and have not as yet, done any damage to row crops.

According to information received by the Extension Service from the USDA Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine office at Waco, grasshopper surveys show that the insects have shown up in large numbers in the following counties: Erath, Jack, Archer, Wichita, Clay, Wise, Denton, Dallas, Collin, Hunt, Kaufman, Ellis, McLennan, Falls, Robertson, Brazos, Burleson, Washington, Austin, Bastrop, Gonzales, Karnes, Guadalupe, Caldwell, Hays, Travis and Williamson.

The Extension entomologists say that most all counties have grasshopper bait on hand, and that farmers may contact their county agricultural agent for help in getting the bait and putting it out.

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I was discharged from the U. S. Army in May, 1945. Are readjustment allowances still available to me?

A. Yes, readjustment allowances are available to any eligible veteran until 2 years after the date of his discharge or release, or until 2 years after the official termination of the war, whichever is later.

Q. I am a World War II veteran and have been ill for five months. At the end of my sixth month of total disability, will I have to continue paying my National Service Life Insurance premiums or is a waiver granted automatically?

A. No automatic waiver of premiums is ever granted. A veteran must be disabled for six months before he may apply for a waiver of premiums. You are entitled to file a claim for refund of those premiums you paid from the date on which the waiver becomes effective.

Q. I receive a portion of my husband's compensation because we are separated. Am I entitled to a widow's pension at his death?

A. At the death of your husband, you may be entitled to a widow's pension notwithstanding the separation, provided you are otherwise eligible.

Q. Under what conditions is a veteran entitled to out-patient treatment from the Veterans Administration?

A. A veteran whose disabilities are service connected may receive out-patient medical, surgical, and dental service for service connected diseases or injuries. Treatment may be given at a Veterans Administration field station, or VA may authorize it to be given by a physician or dentist in the applicant's place of residence.

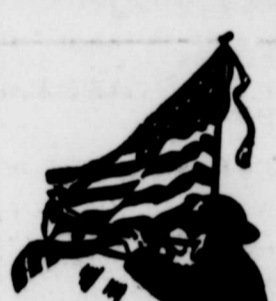
