





Good Relations Prevent Suspicion

The unfortunate incident in which a forty-nine-footrocket, weighing several tons, crossed the border of Mexico, after being fired in a test in this country and struck the hillside several miles from Juarez.

It is easy to imagine what would have happened if the rocket had struck inside the town. The possibility of many Mexicans being killed and injured is appalling and certainly the Army, which is conducting the rocket tests, will be very careful to avoid a repetition of the accident.

It seems that a defective gyroscope sent the rocket south instead of north and it traveled eighty miles through Mexico. The happy fact about the incident is that the relations between the two countries are now so cordial that there is no suspicion below the border that anything more than an accident occurred.

Had the incident taken place some thirty years ago, there would have been repercussions, suspicions and serious injury to the confidence which the Latin-American countries now have in this country.

\$32 Million For Vet Dependents

Nearly 879,000 dependents of 557,000 deceased veterans of all wars and peacetime service are receiving compensation and pension checks from the Veterans over \$32,000,000 a month, V-A Administration at the rate of reported this week.

More than 45 percent, or 396, 000, are dependents or deceased World War II veterans. Of these all but 3,525 are receiving compensation as the result of service connected death of the veteran Another 41 percent, or 363,000 are beneficiaries of deceased World War I veterans. Only 96,-000 of these are receiving benefits esulting from service-connected deaths. The rest are being conpensated in cases of veteran deaths which did not result from ser-

vice in the armed forces. The rolls also include 78,000 lependents of deceased Spanish-Americas War veterans, 19,000 from the Civil War, 2,345 from the Indian Wars, 47 from the Mexi can War, and nearly 20,000 dependents of veterans who died in peacetime service.
