Red Cross Provides Many Peace-Time Services

The majority of people do not realize the importance of the American Red Cross in peace time. The work of the organization, although evident during disaster, is little known in its every day functioning.

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Announcement was made Monday by A. C. Pierson, president of the Haskell National Bank of the purchase of total assets and properties of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank in this city. Consolidation of the two banking institutions was effective July 7, the announcement said.

The business of both institutions will be conducted at the Haskell National Bank at the present location, occupied since 1890. The disposition of the building formerly occupied by the Farmers and Merchants State Bank has not been announced.

Total assets of the two institutions are \$3,761,076.27 with total deposits of \$3,603,850.04 and loans of \$621,106.62. Capital stock of the Haskell National Bank is \$50,000 and that of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank was \$25,000. The statements of the two banks as of June 30, 1947, showed the highest deposits in the banking history of Haskell.

The Haskell National Bank was established in 1890, and its founder, M. S. Pierson was president until his death in 1909. Following his death, Mrs. Pierson became head of the institution, serving until January 1947, when she resigned and her son, A. C. Pierson was elected as the president.

A. C. Pierson began his career with the Haskell National Bank in 1920 as bookkeeper. In 1924 he was named cashier and in 1943 was elevated to the position of vice-president and cashier. The officers of the Haskell National Bank are: A. C. Pierson, president; J. W. Gholson, vice-president; W. R. Johnson, cashier; and Nettie McCollum, assistant cashier.

Members of the board of directors are Oliver Cunningham, J. W. Gholson, A. C. Pierson, Dr. L. F. Taylor, W. H. Wilson, Jr., and G. W. Waldrop.

The Haskell National Bank will continue operations with the present slate of officers and directors. A. M. Turner, president of the F. & M. Bank, will be associated with the Haskell National Bank in an executive capacity, and all personnel employed by the State Bank, with the exception of W. Q. Casey, who resigned July 1.

Turner, widely known in West Texas banking and business circles since 1915, became associated with the Haskell Farmers & Merchants Bank in 1933 as executive vice-president and was elevated to president in 1940.

Navy Recruiter Visits Haskell

Chief Petty Officer E. F. Thomas from the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station in Abilene, Texas, stated today that, "The U. S. Navy has just recently announced that there is a new and shorter period of enlistment in the regular Navy now in effect, the term of enlistment has been reduced from four years to three years for the first enlistments."

Chief Thomas said that he will be in Haskell on Wednesday, July 15 for the purpose of interviewing applicants for the Regular Navy and also the USNR V6 (inactive). Chief Thomas stated that he will remain in this city during Wednesday and Thursday, and that his headquarters will be in the Post Office building while here.

Chief Thomas further stated that he will be glad to speak before any groups during his stay here, on naval subjects, and that he would like the opportunity to point out the many advantages and opportunities offered by an enlistment in the U. S. Navy, or through a career with a generous retirement plan at the end of twenty years service.

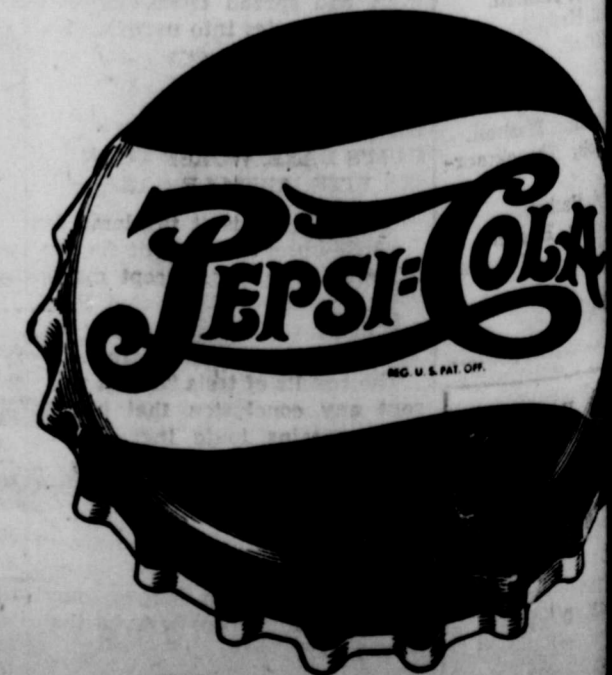

Many Veterans Are Studying Abroad Under GI Bill

VA has announced that more than 3,000 World War II veterans are studying abroad under the educational provisions of the GI Bill.

A VA report as of May 19 showed that the ex-GI's are en-

rolled in 322 foreign institutions in 34 countries. Most of the veterans are studying in the Philippine Republic, Canada, Mexico, England, France and Switzerland.

Veterans are eligible for overseas study on the same basis as in the United States. Those who wish to study abroad must arrange for their own passports, visas and transportation, VA said.

Wherefore plaintiff prays the court that defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition and that she have judgment dissolving said marriage relations, for custody of her minor child and for such other and further relief, special and general, in law and in equity, that plaintiff may prove herself entitled to and in duty bound will ever pray.

As is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

Medical Research Center Planned By VA

Plans for a medical research and laboratory center for the Southwest and appointment of Dr. Jacob Furth, one of America's leading research scientists to direct the project, have been announced by the Veterans Administration.

Area Farmers Find Profitable Yield From Love Grass

Cooperators in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District who have harvested their weeping love grass report a greater yield than any previous crop. Since its introduction to this locality, this love grass has pretty well established itself as well as an excellent protective against wind and water erosion. A few of the cooperators who have harvested grass are Alvie Russell, who estimates 40 lbs. from a plot of one acre. J. C. Saunders harvested 425 pounds on eight acres. S. D. Jones reports a yield of 700 pounds from fifteen acres. Charles Schumacher, located in the Rhineland Conservation group, harvested 950 lbs. from 20 acres.

H. D. Gammill from Rochester and a member of the board of supervisors of the Wichita Brazos District, reports an average of 200 pounds of Hairy Vetch seed to the acre on an eight acre plot. Several other cooperators of the dis-

trict have harvested vetch seed, but it is not known at this time what the yield is, since it is mixed with rye. This legume crop is a very important soil improving crop, and more farmers are planning on planting more of it this fall. The district supervisors and the Soil Conservation Service technicians are attempting to get this legume established in this area on the sandy land.

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What is meant by a guaranty of loan under the G. I. Bill?

A. The guaranty loan by Veterans Administration under the provisions of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill) is an agreement between a lender of money and VA that in event a veteran fails to pay his loan, the Government will pay the guaranteed portion of the loan.

Q. If I can't meet payments on my guaranteed loan is payment by the Government a gift to me?

A. No, the payment by the Government of your guaranteed loan is not a gift. It must be repaid, and if the government pays the guaranteed part of the loan to the lender, you are obligated to the Government for that part of the loan.

Q. I have a lender who will lend me the money I need, but he wants additional security. Does the law allow him to ask for security?

A. Yes. This is a matter between you and the lender. While Veterans Administration does not require that additional security be given, it does not object if the veteran is willing to give it.

Q. I am the widow of a World War I veteran and want to buy a home. Can I obtain a guaranty of loan?

A. No. The privilege is limited to veterans of World War II.
Q. Can I obtain a guaranteed loan to purchase household furnishings?
A. No.

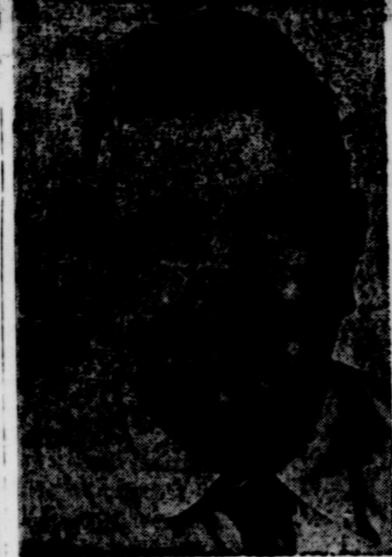

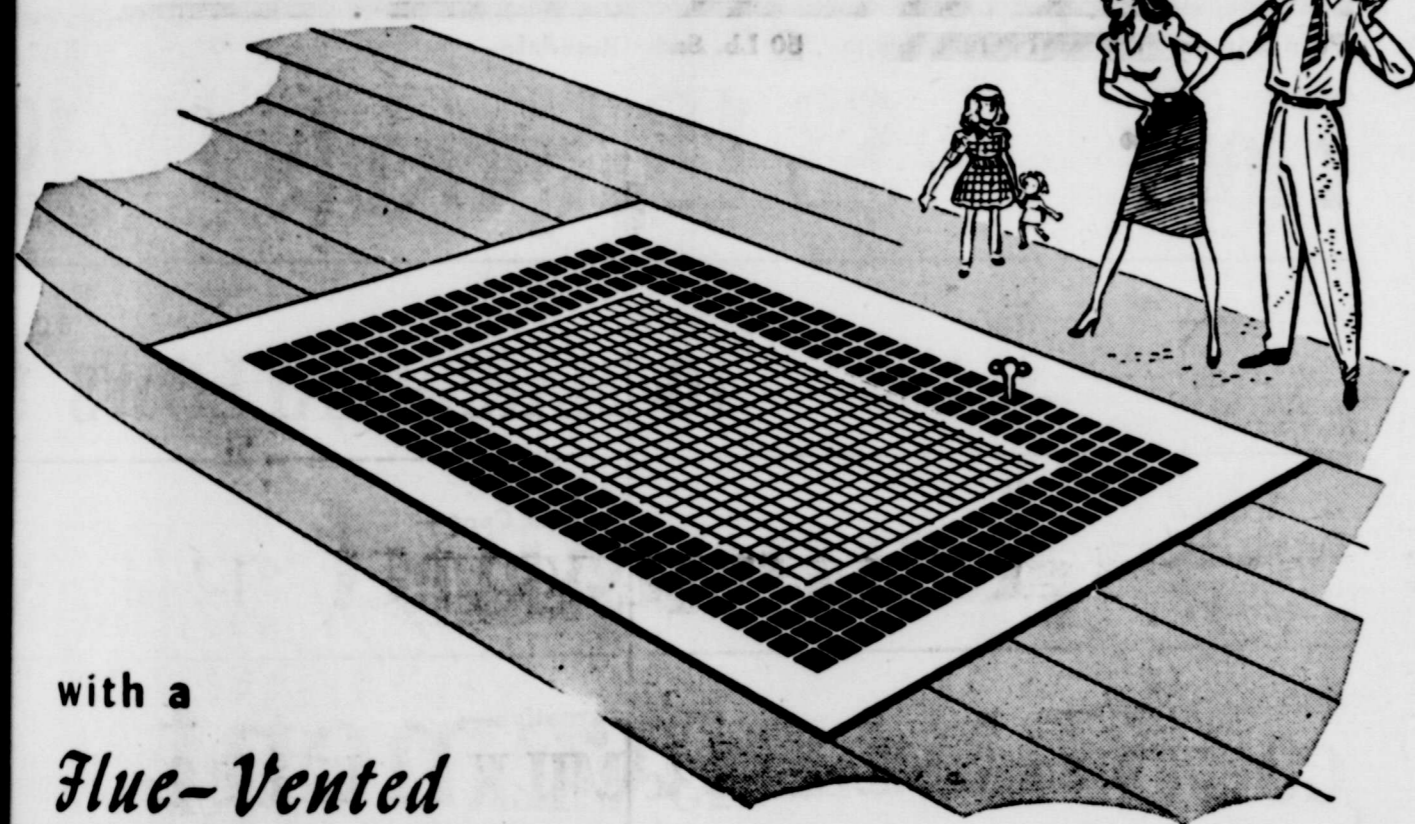

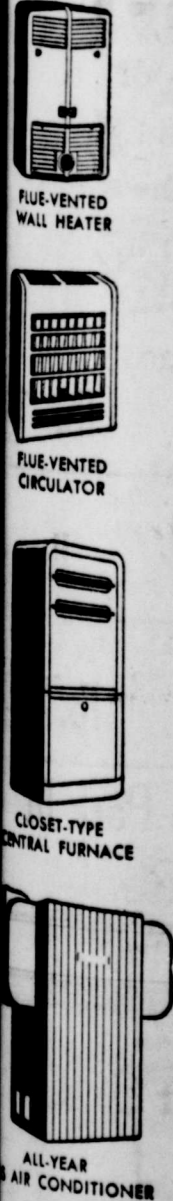

When Mr. Lantrip placed his farms under agreement with the California Creek Soil Conservation District, he was aware of the benefits that could be derived from his land by terracing, contour cultivation, stubble mulching, crop rotation as well as improve his pastures by good management. He built his first terraces with regular farm equipment and through use has found that wide terraces are more practical and profitable. He practices the rotation of crops in such manner that the same row crop will not be planted on the same land more than two years in succession. In 1946 a pond was constructed on his 100 acre farm being planned and staked by SCS technicians and partially paid for through the PMA program.

"This next fall I plan to plant cover crops on some of my sandy land southeast of Anson. This farm is in need of soil improvement and through the use of such adapted cover crops as vetch and rye, I believe I can improve it by reducing wind erosion and increasing its fertility," said Mr. Lantrip.

Swim Safely

For the benefit of readers of The Free Press who like to swim and in view of the fact that more than 7,000 Americans lose their lives every year from drowning, we call attention to some rules to be followed in connection with swimming.

For all swimmers, there are some general rules. Do not swim alone or go into the water immediately after eating; do not dive in unknown waters and do not swim far from shore unless accompanied by a person in a boat. In general, if possible, swim in patrolled waters and make it your business to learn the proper methods of saving lives.

A Trick On Nature

Man will play a trick on nature this month when water falling on the western slope of the Rocky Mountains will be diverted by a tunnel to the eastern slope in order to irrigate farm land in Northeastern Colorado.

For the first time, the water, which formerly went into the Colorado River and the Pacific Ocean, will move toward the Atlantic. The tunnel carries the water from the western to the eastern side in about three hours. It represents the culmination of plans, hopes and dreams of western irrigators.

Without knowing too much about the technical details, we understand that reservoirs have been constructed on the western slopes to impound water which is diverted into the tunnel and conveyed to the eastern side of the mountains for the purposes of irrigation.

Sponsor Series of Soil Lectures

It is expected that this train will leave Houston over the Burlington Lines the evening of Sunday, November 9th, the first scheduled stop to be in Corsicana on Monday, November 10th. Follow-

ing the November 10th meetings in Corsicana, the plans call for an all-day stop with afternoon and evening lectures in Fort Worth, November 11th; in Amarillo 12th; Lubbock, November 13th; Wichita Falls, November 14th; and Abilene, November 15th. Following the Abilene meetings the special train group will return to Houston through Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Dallas.

Totalitarian Great Britain Visualized by Sumner Welles

Grave danger that Great Britain may become a totalitarian nation is seen by Sumner Welles, former Secretary of State, and one of the keenest contemporary students of international affairs.

Whether the present Labor government can remain in power in Great Britain and what form of government will take its place if it fails are two questions of great importance for all Americans, Mr. Welles believes.

"There is growing danger that if the present British government fails, its liberal democracy may be replaced by extreme left wing totalitarianism," he states in an article which he wrote for the July issue of Cosmopolitan magazine.

"The safety of the United States depends upon the triumphant vindication of our form of democratic government in the eyes of the world," Mr. Welles declares. "A blow against democracy in Britain will weaken our safety. In fact, democracy in Britain today is as much of a bulwark for our security in the postwar world as the military resistance of Britain was a rampart of our military security during the Hitler blitzkrieg."

Mr. Welles points out that there are many indications that the left wing of the Labor Party is constantly gaining recruits, and that the independent voters are withdrawing their support from the government, and that if this cleavage persists the present Attlee cabinet cannot stand.

"In that event what are the alternatives?" Mr. Welles asks. "There are two," he declares. "Notwithstanding the denials from both Labor and Conservative headquarters, if the world situation continues to be as grave as it is today, and if Britain's economic situation continues to deteriorate, a national coalition government may yet be formed to meet a new national emergency, only this time under a

Labor Prime Minister. It would be composed of the chief figures in the present Attlee cabinet, together with some of the more progressive of the Conservative and Liberal leaders.

"If the voters reject the solution afforded by a national coalition, power would then pass into the hands of the left-wing Laborites. These could call for the co-operation of the British Communist Party, which is ably organized and directed by Harry Pollitt. Britain would then drop her American alignment. She would embark upon a form of socialism ostensibly national, and designed to meet the peculiar prejudice of the British people.

"However the policy of such a 'popular front' would undoubtedly favor the creation of a Communist-dominated Europe and bring about the establishment of a British state based upon political, social and economic authoritarianism.

"The short range prospect is altogether dark. The British have no longer any ground for hope that the present crisis can give way within any brief period to a brighter future. There is apparent in England, as there is throughout Western Europe, an increasing and fatalistic discouragement on the part of the masses of the population, and a willingness to try almost any expedient in exchange for the assurance that they can thereby obtain physical and economic security."

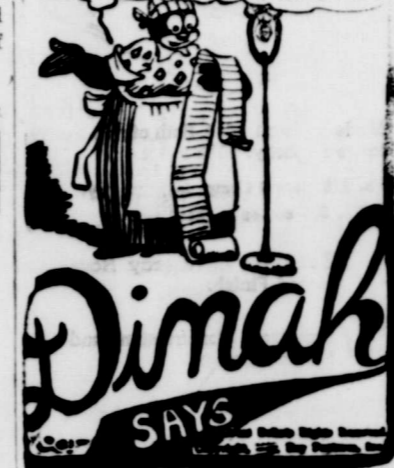

 An industrialist recently indulged in a bit of analysis: "The simple fact that our American-style processes of finance, production, distribution and selling actually produce more for more people than does any other set of processes ever devised by man, has never been planted deeply in the minds of our people—at least not to the extent that it becomes an ever present and active part of the public consciousness."

I am afraid this is too true. If we had actually sold ourselves on America through the years, we would never have seen the phenomenon of certain of our public figures playing peek-a-boo with the Communists. There would be genuine appreciation of the accomplishments and potentialities of America in every university chair in the land.

Campaign of Truth
 Against so many rampant, fanatical destroyers, a clean and constant campaign of truth, well organized and supported, can be effective. Against the doubters and the cynics, this great public relations program must be tied-in with all-out effort to produce goods for the American people, through an economy of abundance. Without good works, your theory falls flat. Only first understand the system, if you please, then it's easier to make it work.

Too many somehow have decided that business, in this "capitalistic" country, is altogether bad. These folks have not considered, however, how many cherished things they would have to give up if they got rid of "capitalism." Without private initiative in business and industry, in labor, and in professional life, we would sink to the level of some of our critics.

We take a lot of things for granted. Yet we have a job to do. If we are businessmen, let us not only sell the product we make, but let us sell the product as a symbol of the freedom under which it is made. If we are workmen, let us consider our jobs as by-products of the freedom under which we live. And no matter what we are, let us know that this sweet land of liberty offers us a freedom of opportunity as individuals that we can find nowhere else on this planet.

PLANS MADE FOR TRI-COUNTY GOLF TOURNAMENT

The biggest Tri-County tournament in the history of the Association is expected to be held at Seymour, beginning with July 13, when qualifying starts. This is to be completed by 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon of July 18.

Who Owns Business?

"Who owns American corporations?" That was the lead sentence of an Associated Press story released the other day. Point of this story was that the people own business. Stockholders of five big companies in representative fields added together number 1,684,868, or enough people to make the fourth largest city of the United States. That is correct, the people do own our corporations. It is right for people to own our business.

I have often contended that in America you have the people owning the wealth and resources of a nation in much more direct and complete manner than you could ever have under any of the socialistic dream-Utopias. This is the straight answer to the Communistic dodge that the people are the state to which must be added the fact that in totalitarian countries the state owns the people. In America the people, in a very real way, own the wealth and resources of the nation.

"Vested" Interests If you were to combine the population of Nevada, Wyoming and Delaware, according to the Associated Press story, you would still not have as many people as own the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. A city composed of the 700,000 A.T.&T. stockholders would be the tenth largest in the country. Moreover, it is significant that this corporation's stockholders far outnumber in number its 500,000 workers.

This is generally true of American corporations, and when you add the stockholders to the employees, you strengthen your picture of America as a place where the masses have "vested" interests in the wealth of the nation. The stockholders of the richest railroad in the land, the Pennsylvania, outnumber the employees almost four to three. They live in every state of the union, and on the average own 60 shares representing an individual investment of \$1,200.

We're All Dependent We think of General Motors, biggest automobile manufacturers, as having a lot of employees. Yet, except for a brief period at the peak of armament work during the war, General Motors stockholders have outnumbered employees for 17 years. More than a third of General Motors individual stockholders have holdings of 10 shares or fewer. No single person owns more than 1.5 per cent of all General Motors stock.

While it is remembered that sometimes large blocks of stock will be owned by other companies, it must be kept in mind that these companies in turn have many stockholders. Notable also is the fact that many educational, charitable, and religious institutions, as well as non-profit associations and foundations, are on the rolls of "big" business. No one knows just how many persons may be dependent upon the successful operations of our corporations. In the truest sense, all of us are, either directly or indirectly.

Most of the nation's wealth has its source in the enterprise of a carefully conducted business. Natural resources must first feel the hands of men at machines. I cannot imagine why any free American would wish to trade what we have in this country for any part of the vague economic systems that have produced only failure. Not only have these other systems failed to produce real blessings for their people in the form of higher living standards, but they have brought slavery instead of economic freedom.

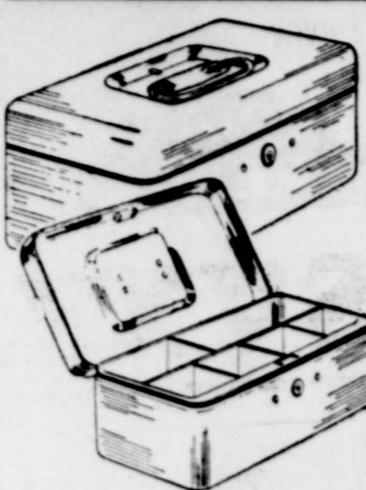
