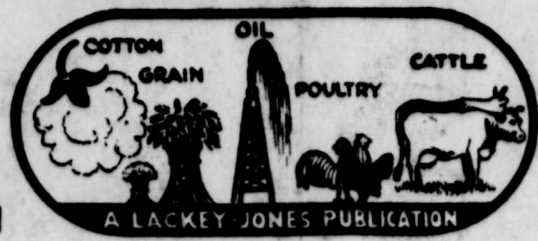

A. L. Martin, 65-year-old resident of Carrollton, Texas, and father of County Agent F. W. Martin of this city, died in a Dallas hospital Sunday Sept. 7th at 3 p. m. The Haskell man had been at the bedside of his father for most of the time during the past three weeks.

New Traffic Light Now In Operation

City Traffic Officer Harold H. Hodge announced this week that the newly repaired traffic signal had been placed in operation on the northwest corner of the square at the intersection of the north and south and east-west highways.

Chief Hodge reminded motorists that under the new State traffic codes, no right turns will be permitted on a red light, and that motorists must give required hand signals at the intersection. He urged the cooperation of motorists in observing traffic rules, and also pointed out that the rules apply to pedestrians as well. Persons crossing the street against the signal are personally liable if they are injured by traffic, Chief Hodge said.

Negro Is Stabbed During Affray Early Sunday

M. T. Coleman, Haskell negro, was wounded in an early Sunday morning altercation in the colored section of town, and Armistice Lewis, another negro, was charged with assault with intent to murder in connection with the affray. Sheriff Mart Clifton and Deputy Doss Fuller, who investigated the affair, said that Coleman suffered a severe knife wound in the lower right side. One rib was severed, attendants at the Haskell County Hospital said. However, Coleman's injuries were not believed serious. Lewis was released under \$1,000 bond to await action of the Grand Jury.

Planting Time For Cover Crops Near At Hand

The time for planting vetch, Austrian Winter Peas and weeping love grass is not far off, and those who plan to plant should secure seed and fertilizer just as soon as possible. Seed and fertilizer will be difficult to obtain later. It has been determined that the application of phosphate to legumes such as clovers, vetch and peas, increases the growth approximately 50 per cent.

Henry Black, located about ten miles northwest of Truscott, is a cooperater recently added to the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District. Mr. Black is planning to have some old terraces re-worked on his farm. Extremely dry weather has prevented a lot of work being done in the line of terracing and having old terraces worked over.

The Wichita Brazos District Supervisors will meet at Knox City next Friday afternoon to approve new applications for conservation assistance and coordinated plans for farms and ranches. Soil Conservation Service technicians plan, and help to establish these conservation plans, to improve farms and ranches in this district.

Cotton Estimate Set At 11,849,000 Bales

The agriculture department at Washington this week estimated this year's cotton crop, on the basis of Sept. 1 conditions, at 11,849,000 bales, up 3,200,000 from last year's small yield.

Despite the rise from last year, the bureau of agriculture economics said, the crop is expected to fall 550,000 bales short of the 19 year 1936-45 average.

The bureau's crop reporting board said in its monthly estimate of cotton prospects that a part of the increase is due to more favorable growing weather in the region east of the Mississippi River.

These conditions, the agriculture department added, offset the drought and high temperatures that prevailed in the western half of the cotton belt.

The high temperatures and light rainfall in these states tended to limit damage from boll weevils, the agriculture department reported. At the same time, these growing conditions helped hasten the maturing of the cotton.

Texas, on the other hand, reported that dry, hot weather had caused the state's prospects to decline by 50,000 bales during the month of August.

Fundamental Church Revival Meeting to Close Sunday

The revival meeting now in progress at the Fundamental Baptist Church in this city will close Sunday, Sept. 14, and a record attendance is expected during the remaining days of the meeting. Rev. C. Jones, pastor of the church, said Thursday.

Attendance at the revival has increased with every service, and a number of conversions have been reported, together with a revived interest in the church. The evangelist, Rev. Ben A. Etheredge of Oklahoma City, has announced a number of interesting messages during the remainder of this week, and all who hear him will gain inspiration from his straight-forward preaching of the Gospel. Classroom work in the Haskell public schools started Monday, with an increase in both high school and elementary enrollment over last year.

The term officially opened Sept. 3 when a general faculty meeting was held for teacher assignments. Registration of high school pupils was completed Thursday, and elementary grades Friday, according to Supt. S. H. Vaughter, with 184 students enrolled in high school.

New courses being offered in high school this year include Typing II, Boys Home Economics, Spanish II, Chemistry, and General Science.

The school lunchroom served 400 meals to students on the first day of school. Several improvements have been made in the lunchroom, including the addition of a new range and an automatic dishwasher. Venetian blinds have been added in the building. Despite rising food costs, the lunchroom will serve meals at the same price as last year.

Supt. Vaughter, who is beginning his second year as head of the school system, said that many improvements had been on the school plant. These include repainting woodwork, refinishing floors, and placing new finish on all blackboards.

Lease Problem Is Deterrent to Texas Farm Operation

The instability of occupancy by tenants is one of the biggest troubles involved in farm lease operations in Texas today. That is the basis on which Joe Motheral, rural life economist of Texas A. and M. College, has prepared a publication, "Notice of Termination — A Farm Lease Problem in Texas," which has been made available to county agricultural agents in the state. The report describes the character and growth of the occupancy problem and suggests possible solutions that are aimed to aid the farm tenant and landlord in arranging mutually satisfactory leasing agreements. Motheral's suggestions are based on a ten-year study of farm leases in Texas. Of several weaknesses in Texas' farm lease set-up, none has so often troubled landlords and tenants, nor slowed economical production on rented farms, as the instability of occupancy, says Motheral.

The economist has made this report available to county agents and other agricultural workers in the hope that improved tenant-landlord relationships will come to Texas farms.

The Department of Agriculture's research men are working on hybrid forest trees that may grow to harvesting size in one-half or one-third the time required for a good non hybrid tree to reach the same size.

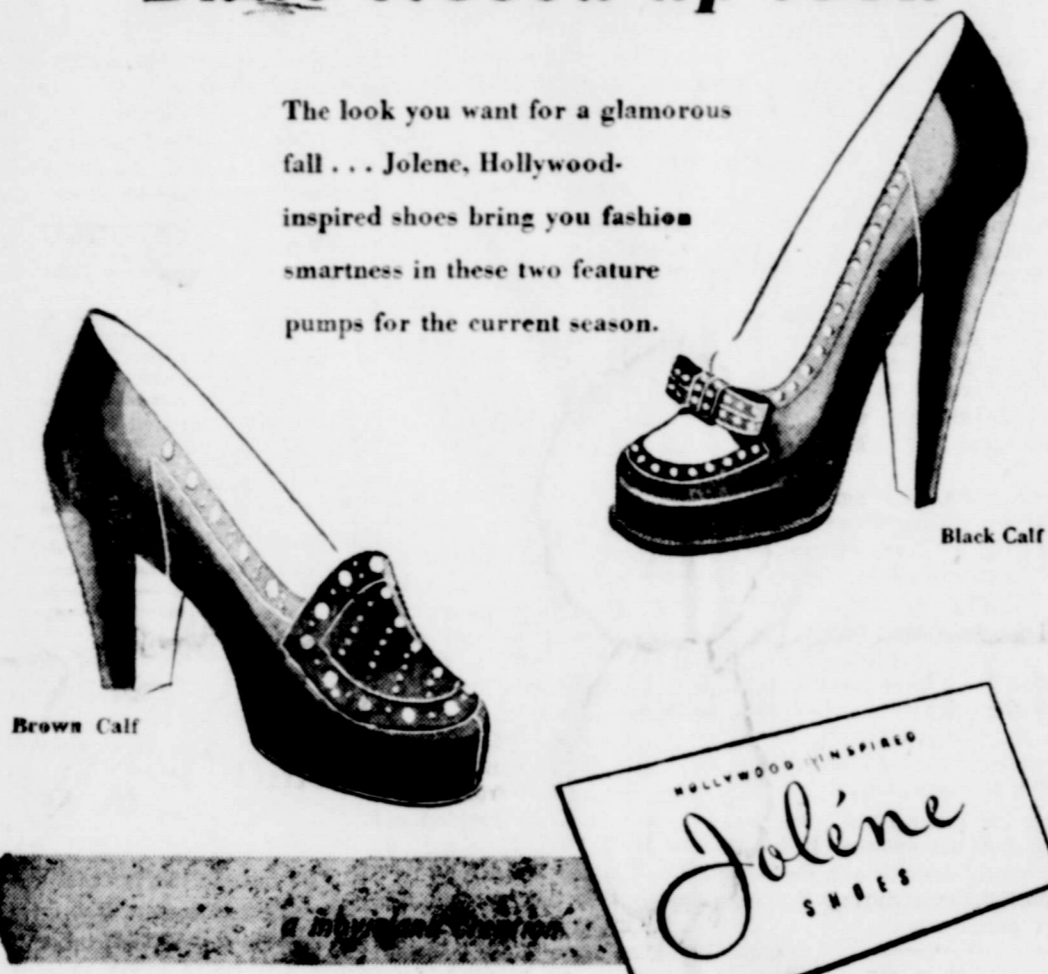

Partial Deafness Is Preventable With Proper Care

The child who cannot hear is badly handicapped. Hard-of-hearing children are often considered backward and become greatly retarded in school when in reality they may be highly intelligent but simply cannot hear much of what is said to them.

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, many injuries to the ear can be prevented by keeping foreign objects out of the ear canal, taking good care of the ears during colds and other diseases and observing certain precautions when swimming.

"The cause of middle ear trouble often is diving and swimming," Dr. Cox said. "Protect the ears by wearing a rubber cap, or ear plugs."

The State Health Officer declared that no hard instrument of any kind should be used in cleansing the ear canal since it may be injurious. Using ordinary precautions can do much to avoid minor ear trouble which may later lead to partial or complete deafness, the Doctor added.

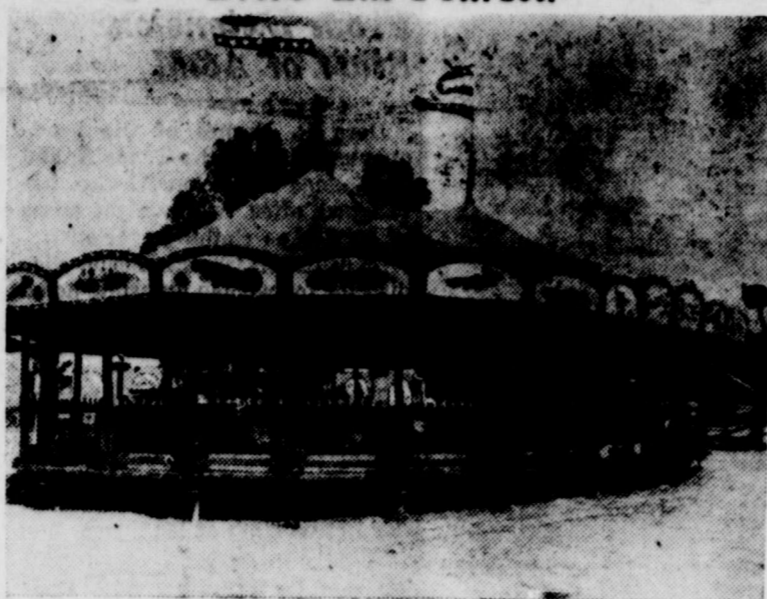

September Is Month To Place Lawns In Condition

Has your lawn failed to come up to your expectations this summer?

If so, there's something you can do about it now, say Extension horticulturists at Texas A. and M. College.

Filling in the low spots to make mowing easier is a good September lawn job. And if there are spots where your grass hasn't grown well because of poor lawn grasses like Dallis or smut grass have crowded it out, you can dig those grasses out, and fill in the

holes when you do the smoothing job. And while you're at it, you can make yourself a nice green winter lawn by sowing two pounds of Italian rye grass over 100 square feet of lawn area. Just scatter the rye grass seed over the surface of the lawn and cover it lightly with rich loam soil.

In some localities in Texas, say horticulturists, San Augustine grass has been damaged by a disease known as "brown patch". Areas several feet in diameter

turn brown, the grass has it is dying out and the appearance of the lawn is ruined. A pound of seed disinfected in eight gallons of water and applied to the browned areas ought to clear up the trouble a few days later, follow up with application of commercial fertilizer—one pound to 100 square feet. Best fertilizing time is late August, when you can spread the fertilizer and wash it into the soil.

34 Million Turkeys On Nation's Farms

U. S. farmers now have 34 million turkeys on the farm, and although that sounds like a lot of meat it's 16 per cent less than last year's production.

About 3,681,000 of those birds are in Texas, which is being out-ranked for first place by California, where almost 4 million turkeys are being raised.

All but three states in the union show decreases in turkeys raised compared with a year ago, according to USDA's Bureau of Agricultural Economics. The decrease, says the bureau, is due to unfavorable price relationships, unusually large stocks toward the end of last season, high feed costs and the uncertainty of 1947 turkey prices.

Texas turkey raisers have 13 per cent less birds than in 1946, when at this time of year there were better than 4,231,000 turkeys in the state.

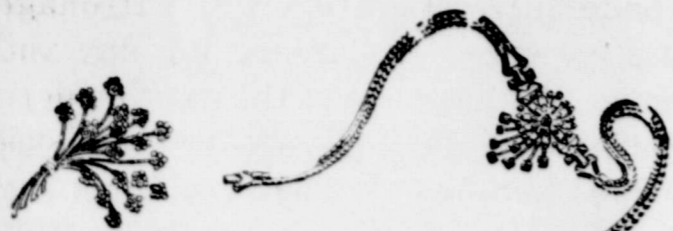

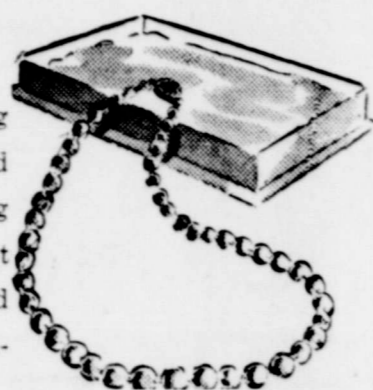

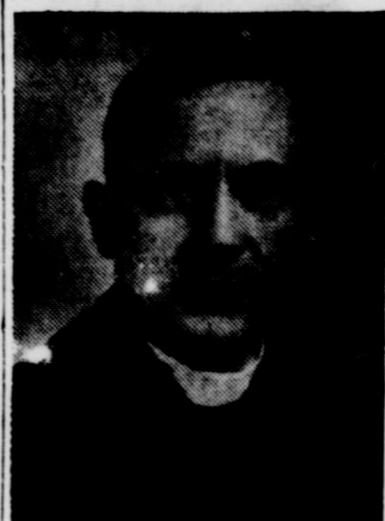

Important Changes in the Texas Certificate of Title Law

The following changes have been made in the Texas Certificate of Title Law:

- Mandatory Duties of Seller**
All used or second hand motor vehicles must be registered for the current registration year before being sold. The seller must deliver to the purchaser, at the time of the sale, the current registration receipt and properly assigned certificate of title. Any person, acting for himself or another, who sells, trades, or otherwise transfers any secondhand or used vehicle without delivering to the transferee at the time of delivery of the vehicle the license receipt for the current year and properly assigned Certificate of Title as herein required shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.)
- Mandatory Duties of Purchaser**
Any purchaser or transferee who accepts transfer papers as herein provided executed wholly or partly in blank or any person who alters, changes, or mutilates such transfer papers, or whoever violates any provisions for which no specific penalty is provided shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) nor exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

The purchaser must within ten days from the date of purchase make application for a Certificate of Title and a transfer of registration with the County Tax Collector of the County in which the purchaser resides. If the purchaser fails to make application for a Certificate of Title and Transfer of Registration within 10 days he must pay a penalty of Five Dollars (\$5.00) and the Tax Assessor-Collector and his bondsmen shall be liable for the collection of the penalty.

The above changes were passed by the last session of the Legislature as H. B. 75 but due to the necessity of changing the forms the Highway Department has advised that it will probably be about the 15th of September before the forms will be available for the beginning of actual registration transfers.

Helber's Get New Electronic Watch Testing Device

If the row slopes upward, for example, the watch is gaining; if the slope is downward, it's losing. The degree of slope, measured against graduations on the chart, reveals just how much the watch will gain or lose in 24 hours.

VA Will Set Up Diabetic Clinics

The Veterans Administration will establish diabetic clinics in all its Regional Offices in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi as the result of an experiment at Dallas which indicated large savings to tax payers and improve treatment for veterans afflicted with this disability.

The "pilot" project was initiated at Dallas three months ago to provide periodic out-patient treatment for service-connected diabetics instead of putting them in already overcrowded VA hospitals.

VA said one of the biggest advantages of the clinic is that they enable diabetic veterans to continue working to support themselves and their families. Without regular treatments at the clinics, hospitalization of from nine days to one month each year would have been necessary in most cases.

Clinics will be established at Waco, Houston, an Antonio, Lubbock, New Orleans, Shreveport and Jackson. The Dallas clinic will continue to operate.

Official Outlines Changes in Car Car Title Law

County Tax Assessor Collector R. A. Coburn this week called attention of purchasers and sellers of motor vehicles to recent changes in the law governing transfer of motor vehicles. Some of the suggestions he offered include:

Do not accept delivery of nor pay for a used or second hand motor vehicle until you have examined the title and know that it is in order. If in doubt consult the nearest Tax Assessor-Collector.

Do not accept an open title or a title that has not been completely filled out in ink or with type-writer. Check the signature of the seller to see if it is signed in ink and is signed as the name appears on the face of the title and sworn to before a Notary Public.

Do not accept the title unless the registration receipt for the current year is attached. If the registration receipt has been lost the seller must make application for a duplicate registration receipt to the Tax Assessor-Collector of the county in which the vehicle was registered and if the original receipt is not available must deliver the duplicate with the Certificate of Title.

See that the date of transfer is the same as the date you purchased the vehicle. This date will

Payment Extended To Vets Leaving Hospitals

The Veterans Administration has announced it will extend compensation payments to veterans who have been discharged from VA hospitals with arrested pulmonary tuberculosis but who need more time at home in which to recover sufficiently to take a job without endangering their health.

The new plan permits payment to be the date used in determining whether or not you are due to pay the penalty of \$5.00.

Take the Certificate of Title and current registration receipt to your tax collector immediately but not later than 10 days from the date of purchase and make application for a certificate of title and transfer of registration. If you wait longer than 10 days before making application for a certificate of title and transfer of registration a \$5.00 penalty will be imposed in addition to the 50c for certificate of title and 50c for the transfer of registration.

If you have purchased a motor vehicle and have not made application to the Tax Assessor-Collector for a certificate of title do so at once—it will probably save you money. If you have an open title get it in order today and make application for a certificate of title in your name.

ments to these veterans on a total-ly disabled basis up to two years from date of discharge from any VA hospital while they remain under close medical supervision. Previously, the payments were reduced by 50 per cent within six months of the veteran's discharge.

Under the new plan, these veterans will be examined every six months. If the examination indicates they are unable to resume employment safely, doctors will certify their findings so that VA may determine whether to continue full compensation payments for an additional six months.

VA expects this plan to result in better control of arrested pulmonary tuberculosis among veterans and thus reduce the necessity of hospitalizing them again.
