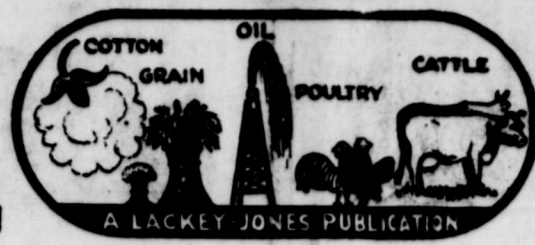

## Negro Farm Laborer Slain Near Rochester Monday

Young, negro cotton laborer, was shot in the Rochester area after 11 o'clock Monday morning as the result of a fight allegedly inflicted by Foreman, another laborer, admitted to investigators. Deputy Elton Corley, Sheriff and Deputy Doss, County Attorney Curran, and Deputy Sheriff of Haskell that he shot the laborer with a 12 gauge shotgun Monday morning about 11 o'clock. He claimed the slain laborer threatened him with a knife.

## Farm Fires Take Toll of 10 Lives Daily In U. S.

National observance of Fire Prevention Week has brought out the startling fact that 100 farm fires occur in the United States each day killing ten farmers. The Texas A. and M. College Extension Service is cooperating with the National Fire Protection Association and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, in an attempt to cut down this loss of life on farms in Texas, and is urging farm people to guard themselves and their farmsteads against fire.

What are the most dangerous causes of fires? The careless smoker still is Public Enemy No. 1, on the strength of his smoking in bed and in the barn and discarding lighted cigarettes and matches. The thoughtless housewife ranks second on the list, by continuing to stack papers, magazines, old clothing, broken toys and discarded furniture away in the attic, closets, basement, the barn and other buildings.

Dangerous storage of gasoline and kerosene, and the use of flammable cleaning fluids takes a high toll of life and property. Children playing with matches cause 26,000 fires annually. Dirty and improperly operating lanterns are a big threat, as well as the dust and cobwebs around motors, appliances and frayed electric cords.

### Financial Report of CWT Fair To Be Given Directors Friday

The final meeting of the directors of the Central West Texas Fair Association for the fiscal year is scheduled for Friday morning October 10 in the Chamber of Commerce office. The meeting will be devoted to a report from the secretary on the financial operations of the 1947 Fair and the permanent building funds. Scheduled also will be a report from the nominating committee for officers and six new directors to be elected. The nominating committee will also recommend the addition to the present list of officers, the office of treasurer which will be filled at this meeting, and a complete revision of the constitution and by-laws of the association.

### Cotton Estimate Falls Slightly

The Agriculture department at Washington Wednesday estimated this year's cotton crop at 11,508,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight. This estimate is a decrease of 341,000 bales from the 11,849,000 bales forecast a month ago. Production was 8,640,000 bales last year and 12,390,000 bales for the ten year (1936.45) average. The indicated yield of lint cotton per acre was reported at 261.3 pounds, compared with 269 a month ago, 235.3 last year and 250.6 for the ten year average.

**4-H Club Girls Map Plans for Another Year's Work**

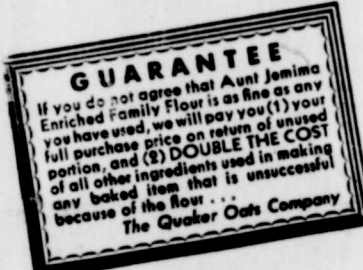

Officials of the Texas Forest Service tell us that they have almost 18 thousand seedlings for timber and windbreak purposes ready for shipment for a small handling fee by late December. The seedlings are not to be used for landscaping purposes. For the West Texas area red cedar, Arizona cypress, Russian mulberry, green ash, thornless honey locust, desert willow, western yellow pine, and pistacia have been recommended. If you are interested in planting a windbreak notify your club marketing chairman the number of each kind of trees you want. We want to get our order in to the nursery as soon as possible.

Lowered hemlines have brought about the problem of lengthening skirts without conspicuous and stubborn creases left by the old hemline showing. One suggestion for removing this crease is to dampen the crease on the wrong side and then roll it back and forth on the right side with the fingers to work out the crease and then press on the wrong side.

In steam pressing it is well to remember to cover the fabric with a dry wool pressing cloth and then with a wet cotton cloth dampened in warm water. Use a warm iron and press by putting the iron down and lifting it—not by sliding it back and forth. Light weight wool or wool that has a raised pattern in the weave should be steam pressed on the right side. If the shine is still showing try raising the nap with a clean suede brush or a rubber sponge.

Hems in heavy material should be at least two and one-half inches wide. Some of the local stores have had a hem tape or binding ready to use or a facing of bias two and one-half inches wide may be cut from scraps of the material or a matching color of lawn or percale.

This is the time of year to become peach-tree-borer conscious. If the peach trees in your orchard have patches of gum on the branches or trunk, or there is a collection of sawdust at the base of the trunk you can tell yourself that your trees have borers and jot down a note to get some ethylene dichloride the next time you are in town. After the leaves shed this fall, but while it is still warm weather clear the grass and weeds from around the trunk and build up a mound around the trunk above the place the base borers have been working and apply the diluted emulsion mixture on the ground around the tree. Cover the liquid with a few shovels of dirt. Directions for diluting the ethylene dichloride will be found on the manufacturer's container. For 2 to 4 year old trees use 1/2 pint of the diluted mixture per tree; mature bearing trees require 1/2 pint of the mixture. These borers will eventually kill the trees unless the trees are treated.

The ethylene dichloride treatment is newer than the paradichlorobenzene treatment formerly recommended.

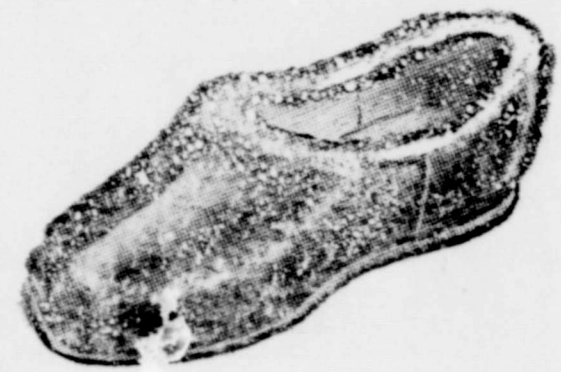

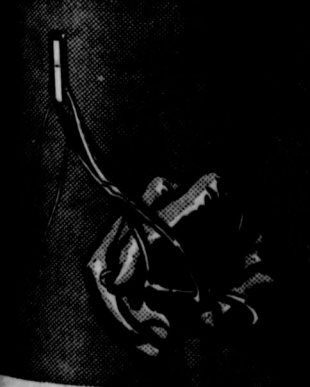

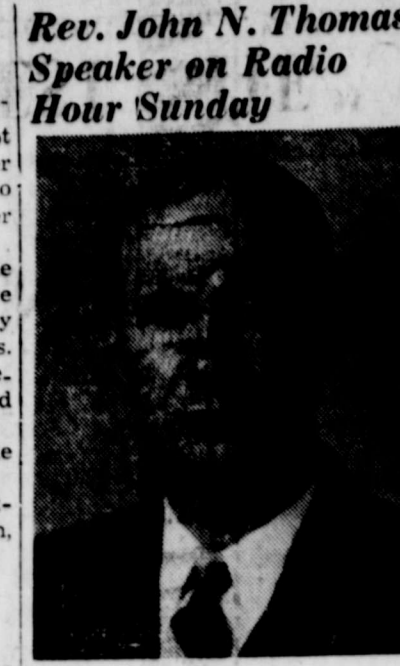
