In comparing 1947 against vious years, it is seen that 1907 is approximately normal with the past three years, with considerable more conservation work being carried out in 1944 due to the unlimited funds made available that year, and the curtailment of funds since that time.

Farmers are calling daily at the county AAA office to secure approvals for work at this time. Prior approval of the county committee must be obtained by the farmer before any work is begun. otherwise no funds can be expended for a practice for which prior approval is not granted to the time work is started.

Program procedures and rem lations are not complete at this time for 1948, but it is expected that available funds will be much less in 1948 than in 1947. However Haskell county farmers will again no doubt avail themselves of wha ever benefits that are available.

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, pneumonia caused approximately 2,460 deaths during the past year in Texas, a total which is entirely too high This disease is most prevalent in the winter and spring seasons.

Pneumonia is caused by a garm called the pneumococcus, which many of us have lurking in our throats ready to start trouble. when our resistance to it is lowered. We can keep up our resistance by avoiding undue fatigue and unnecessary exposure to extreme weather conditions. When we go outside in cold weather sufficient wraps should be worn to protect us. Keeping the temperature of our homes as low as is consistent with comfort will greatly lessen the difficulties encountered in adjusting ourselves to the cold when we leave the

He should follow his physician's advice until the cold has disappeared. A patient may really have beginning pneumonia when he thinks it is only a cold. 

It is no secret that the principal object of American foreign policy in Europe is to assist democratic peoples and prevent the extension of Communist terrorization and domination to the Atlantic Ocean, enveloping all Europe. If the Iron Curtain of Russian Communism comes to the Atlantic, billions of additional American dollars will have to be spent on our national defense program and American security will be in jeopardy. For right or wrong that is the prevailing viewpoint of our Government. No one knows for certain just what may develop: history will record whether our policy is right or wrong. We are taking a chance and if we lose, our efforts and our money may go for naught.

Greece has about the same population as Texas, but it is only one-fifth the size of our state. And what is more important, most of the country consists of a series of rugged mountain ranges and the land available for agriculture is very limited. Moreover the people depend principally on agriculture for a living as there is practically no ndustry. The annual rainfall is about the same as in West

We first went to Athens and then to Macedonia in northern Greece where much of the guerrilla warfare is being carried on. In company with Greek soldiers and officials, we went as far north as the Bulgarian and Yugoslav borders. In this part of Greence I saw scores of farms which would normally be planted to wheat lying idle because the people had fled from their farms and villages as a result of the terrorization program of the so called bandits and guerrillas. It is estimated that 250,000 have led from their homes because of the guerrilla menace, and they are living in the cities under unspeakable conditions.

There are about 16,000 of these bandits in widely separated areas who hide out in the mountains and conduct sporadic raids upon the villages.

Some of the bandits are accep. ting the offer of the Greek Government to surrender on a promise of no punishment. I talked to a number of these surrendered bandits in different localities.

The Greek cotton crop will not be adequate to meet the needs of the country. Greece normally raises about 60,000 bales of cotton. There is a surplus of olive oil and tobacco for export but the Greek currency is on such a weak footing that the export program is far from satisfactory. There is little confidence in the value of the currency.

The war devastation in Greece was terrific and many of the highways and railroads are impassable ,and the great ports for Athens and Salonika are not yet in full operation. It takes time to repair the ravages of war.

Of one thing I am sure, the rank and file of the people in Greece do not want Communism and they will not willingly accept it. They are close to the Communist states of Bulgaria, Jugoslavia and Russia and the rank and ifle want no part of it. But Communism operates through terrorist methods and when a police state is established freedom is lost. That is the principal reason why Communism is such a throughout the world.

If you are in doubt whether or not a Certificate of Title is properly signed do not accept the title until you are sure and by all means do not the title unless the Current Registration receipt is delivered with it.



Until now, the most widely accepted forecasts of United States population were contained in a book by Warren S. Thompson and P. K. Whelpton of the Scripps Foundation for Research in Population Problems

Population experts, judging by World War I, had expected the birth rate to drop during wartime. Instead, it went up. This was true not only in America but in England and France.

indicate that in America, the unexpected trend was mainly due to economic prosperity; to the fact that in the depression years many couples had postponed marriage or parenthood because of lack of money; and to a psychology which caused many young men to marry just before going

Some of these same reasons may have caused the unexpected rise in the birth rates of western Europe. But United States experts don't claim to know exactly.

They believe Russia's birth rate probably fell off during the war,

but have no accurate figures. The forthcoming report, according to a preliminary statement by the Census Bureau, does not presume to give the actual future population. Instead, the authors make different sets of predictions based on various combinations of "high," "low," and "medium" birth and death rates, and on va-

rious guesses as to immigration. Most of these forecasts won't be revealed until the report is pub-


