New House Paint Is Self-Cleansing

The "little white house by the side of the road" can stay white now longer than before the war years, says Louise Newman, Haskell County Home Demonstration Agent.

Even though raw materials for paints are still scarce, a little more is available now, and scientific studies by commercial companies have resulted in much improvement. They found that white was more popular as a house paint, and went to work to develop the white pigments that will shed dirt and renew the original whiteness.

The paint forms a tough, durable film which protects the surface from rot and decay. Its ability to stay white lies in the fact that, at the surface of the film, under normal conditions of exposure, a fine white powder will form which heavy rains wash away. Thus, soil and dust are removed, and the house looks nice and white again.

Miss Newman says these studies should be valuable to home owners who have trouble keeping paint on their houses because of climatic conditions which injure the surface.

Whip chilled milk with cold rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Put into 4 wet individual molds or cups. Chill until firm. Unmold; serve at once on lettuce or other salad greens. Makes 4 servings.

You Takes Yer Choice

I am an American worker. If I decide I'd rather work and live in Schenectady, I can go there. Or Racine, or Spokane. If I want to, I can settle down and make the San Fernando Valley home. If I've been a machinist, but decide that the radio industry is the place for me, there are ways I can train myself to get into radio. If I want to drive a Diesel locomotive instead of a bus, I can go into railroading.

Nobody tells me I can't. I can try as many jobs as I like. If I don't like the job, I can walk out the door. When I find a job that suits me, I can work right up to be manager of the department or even president of the company, if I have the ability and the enterprise. If I want to start my own business and become an employer, I can do that, too.

Nobody Says "No"

In America nobody tells me I can't do all these things. But if I lived in a totalitarian country, I would be told. A uniformed official would have the duty of telling me in what part of the country I could work. A representative of the State would inform me that I must train for a certain job. I would have no choice in the kind of job.

Being told to stay put, I would have little chance for advancement. My wages would be regulated entirely by the state, and there would be no redress of grievance. Leaving a job would be impossible. There would be no firing for unsatisfactory work. Instead, I could be thrown into a concentration camp or a slave labor battalion. There I would be taught completely how to become servant to the master, the State.

Is not this contrasting picture accurate? Yes, you agree. However, what you are probably thinking is that America can never become such a totalitarian state. Friend, we would have to ignore the history of the world to assume that such dangers do not confront America. When a nation is prosperous is just the moment that you may watch for decline to set in. We must be no less watchful because times are good. We cannot ignore danger signs.

Swap With Europe?

No American worker would want to swap places with the average European worker. Yet so many of us unhesitatingly accept ideas and methods that come right from the very countries that we have outperformed a hundred ways to breakfast. Not everything is bad simply because it originates in Russia or Europe, but it is time to look around and see that what we have put to totalitarian countries out of the running.

Yet, in a recent survey from a cross-section of 5,000 persons, 63 per cent of the college students and 43 per cent of the general population said they would get as much or more in America under government management and ownership of industries. In other words, a lot of folks apparently believe that state socialism or totalitarianism would be more efficient and more desirable than freedom of opportunity and freedom of the individual. How mistaken they are!

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. My husband receives compensation because of World War I service. Will I receive a pension?

A. If your husband dies from a disability proved to have been contracted in military or naval service, or if the death is from another cause and your income does not exceed \$1,000 a year, if childless, or \$2,500 if with minor children, you may be eligible for a pension.

Q. I receive compensation for injuries incurred while in the Army. Do I have to show the amount of compensation I receive in making out my income tax report?

A. No. It is unnecessary to show pension or compensation payments in an income tax report.

Q. I draw permanent total disability compensation because of injuries due to service in the Navy. Will I continue to draw my compensation if I move to Australia?

A. Yes. Residence has no bearing on compensation entitlement.

Q. Under what circumstances can I claim that my parents are my dependents?

A. Dependency may be held to exist if your parents do not have an income sufficient to provide reasonable maintenance for themselves and members of their family under legal aid.

Q. What books and equipment does Veterans Administration pay for or supply while a veteran is taking education or training under the GI Bill?

A. VA pays for all books and equipment that the school requires of all students in the same course.

Q. May I change the course I am taking for another that I like better and in which I feel there is a better future for me?

A. Yes. You may change your course providing you have VA's permission to do so. If the facts in your case indicate that change will be to your best interest, VA will grant authorization for the change.

Q. Is out patient treatment available to a veteran with a non service connected disability?

A. No.

Q. I was a member of the WAAC but did not continue in the service when it became the WAC. Am I entitled to hospitalization in a Veterans Administration hospital?

A. Yes, if you meet eligibility requirements.

Q. I work in the day and would like to know if I may enroll in a night school or take a part time course under the GI Bill?

A. Yes.

Many Veterans Reinstate NSL Insurance

Nearly 65,000 World War II veterans in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi reinstated lapsed National Service Life Insurance policies worth \$450,000,000 during the past eight months under the liberal provisions still in effect, the Veterans Administration announced.

Reinstatements in the tri-state area administered by VA's Dallas branch office were part of 900,000 reinstatements worth five and a half billion dollars for the entire nation during this period.

Holders of lapsed term policies who have not yet reinstated have only a little more than two months in which to do so under the plan now available, VA said.

Until January 1, 1948, such veterans need only fill out a three question application form and pay two monthly premiums, one for the 31 day grace period during which the insurance was continued without payment, and the other for the current month.

Beginning next January 1, veterans with policies which have been lapsed for more than three months will be required to take a physical examination and qual-

ify as insurable risks.

Term policies issued prior to January 1, 1946, may be continued on that basis up to eight years from date of issuance. For policies taken out after that date, the term period is five years.

These policies may be converted to any of the six permanent plans available at any time before expiration of the term. They are ordinary life, 20 payment life, 30 payment life, 20 year endowment, endowment at age 60, and endowment at age 65.

Stormproof Cotton Developed at Tech
 Haskell County farmers will be interested in the superiority of stormproof cotton varieties which were graphically demonstrated on the Texas Technological College farm during a recent severe thunderstorm, according to Dr. A. W. Young, head of the college plant industry department.
 Hard driving rain over a brief period caused heavy damage to open cotton of the ordinary varieties, but bolls grown from improved storm proof seed, developed recently by the agricultural experiment station at Lubbock, showed virtually no damage, Dr. Young stated.
 Principal advantage of planting stormproof cotton is that farmers will be able to wait until all bolls in the field are open and then harvest with machines, thus saving themselves money as well as labor problems, he said.
 The Lubbock station distributed small amounts of the new improved seed last year for production of seed blocks, Dr. Young said, and interested parties can find out where to obtain seed of these varieties by contacting the experiment station.

Optical Research Is Added at U-T

A study of atmospheric conditions, and of imperfections in optical systems will be made in a new program of optical research at the University of Texas this year.
 Dr. Howard S. Coleman, formerly director of the Optical Inspection Laboratory at Pennsylvania State College, is in charge of optics research in physics, and in optical aerodynamic research in the Defense Research Laboratory.
 "What we want to find out is how far and how much better one can see through optical instruments, and how the atmosphere limits the range of vision," Dr. Coleman said. "In addition to studying optical instruments, we will be concerned with atmospheric limitations over wooded areas, desert, and water."

A knowledge of soil conservation to prevent dust bowls is more important to the average American student than arithmetic, declares Clayton Seagears, New York State Superintendent of Conservation.

The soil conservation experts have repeatedly given us facts and figures to demonstrate the loss of rich earth that takes place every year in the United States.

In view of these statements, it seems important to teach students the value of proper methods in connection with the use of soil to produce crops. While the time may not be close, the fact is that persistent depletion of soil resources will eventually put the people of the United States on a starvation diet or else leave them dependent upon other areas for necessary food.

TWO WAYS TO LOSE LIBERTY

Lets not get too much off the beam, in regard to communism, that we overlook the other possibility.

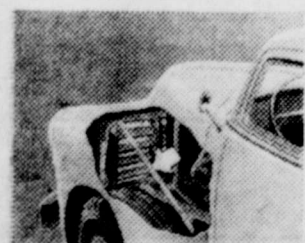
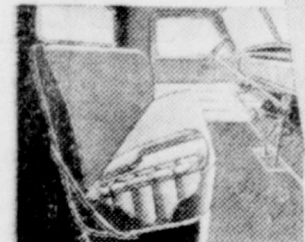

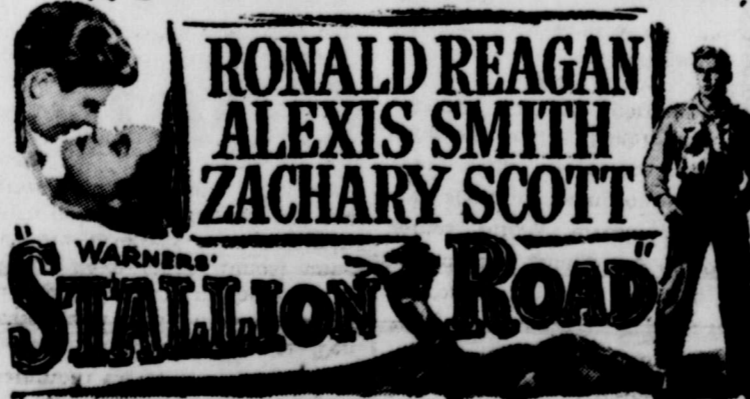
