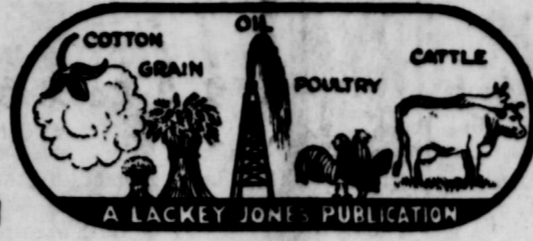

Rochester Rotary Club Hears Boy Scout Executive

Stressing the importance of institutional sponsorship in Scouting, Dale Hewgley, Field Executive of the Chisholm Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, addressed the Rochester Rotary Club in their regular meeting this week. The program also included the showing of a film of Boy Scout activities made by the Abilene Kiwanis Club at this year's Boy Scout annual meeting at Camp Tonkawa.

The Rotarians are sponsors of Troop 37 in Rochester and plans are underway for the complete reorganization of the troop. Felix Mullino, club president, presided over a short business session that included a report from a committee composed of Bob Speck and Hob Smith on the program of a sewer project for Rochester. The report indicated that the project was practically assured and that plans call for the issuance of \$66,000 in revenue bearing bonds for the installation of this sanitation system. This has been a major project of the club since its organization.

Other projects recently sponsored by the Rotarians and completed include the grading and gravel surfacing of thirteen blocks of city streets in the vicinity of school buildings and the opening of State Farm to Market highway 617 from Rochester to Weinert.

On December 2 the club will sponsor its first Farmer and Businessmen meeting when club members will invite farmers of the community as guests and more than 100 are expected to be in attendance. R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the Spur Experiment Station is to be the principal speaker. This is to be an annual affair.

Rule Prepares For Armistice Day Visitors

The City of Rule made plans this week to entertain thousands of visitors Monday and Tuesday of next week, when the annual Armistice Day celebration is held in that city under auspices of the Rule American Legion Post.

The event annually attracts a large number of visitors, and this year's celebration is being planned as the biggest and best ever held.

First event on the two days program will be Horse Races at 2 p. m. Monday, Nov. 10, with dances scheduled both Monday and Tuesday nights.

First attraction on the program for Nov. 11 will be an Old Fiddler's Contest at 9 a. m., followed by a Pet Parade at 9:30 a. m., and the huge Armistice Day Parade at 10:30. A barbecue lunch will be served at noon, followed by saddle horse judging at 12:30, and at 2:30 will be the annual football game between Rule and Rochester High School teams.

Carnival attractions and shows on the midway will be provided by J. R. Leeright carnival company.

To advertise the celebration, a motorcade of Rule boosters have scheduled visits to nearby towns on Thursday and Friday. Leaving Rule at 8:30 this morning the trippers will visit Aspermont, Hamlin, Anson, Lueders, and Stamford.

Friday's trip will take the boosters to Rochester, Knox City, Munday, Weinert, and Haskell.

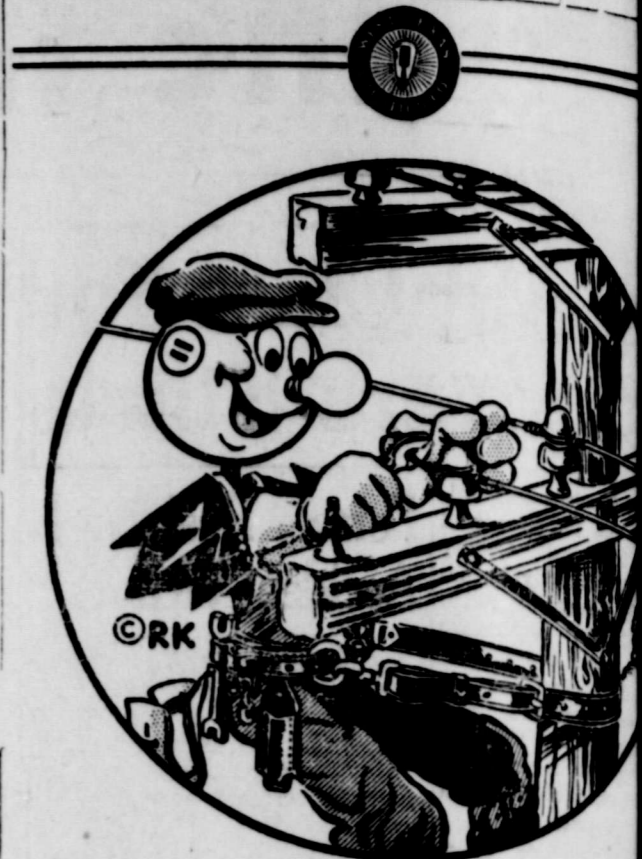
