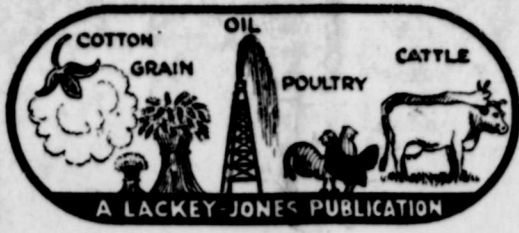

## Funeral Rites For Mrs. Kennedy Held Sunday

Mrs. Mary Adline Kennedy, who with her husband and family had lived in Haskell since 1909, died in the Haskell County Hospital, Feb. 13 at 2:20 p.m. She had been in failing health for some time and had been critically ill since Feb. 9.

Deceased was born Jan. 11, 1870, in Grayson county, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. B. Lowe. She married J. F. Kennedy August 21, 1891, at Poolville, Texas, and they later lived in Jack county before moving to this section. Mrs. Kennedy had been a member of the Methodist church since girlhood.

Survivors in addition to the husband, are five daughters: Mrs. J. B. Hunt of Buckeye, Ariz.; Mrs. Hettie Williams of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Roy Watson of Lubbock; Misses Ola Belle and Myrtle Kennedy of Haskell; three sisters, Mrs. Bessie Snow, Haskell; Mrs. Josephine Gilliland, Clovis, N. M.; Mrs. Belle Phillips, Plainview; and a brother, H. M. Lowe, of Jacksboro, Texas. Ten grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren also survive.

Funeral service for Mrs. Kennedy was held at the First Methodist church at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, with Rev. Owen W. Carter of Abilene conducting, assisted by Rev. James H. Harrell, local pastor.

## M. H. Brasher, 77, Former Haskell School Head, Dies

M. H. Brasher, 77, veteran Texas educator and former superintendent of the Haskell school system, died at his home in Abilene at 12:35 o'clock Sunday afternoon. He had been in poor health several years. He had been a resident of Abilene since 1923, going to that city after serving as head of the local schools for two years.

Mr. Brasher served 10 years as superintendent of the Texas State School for the Blind at Austin. He was superintendent of schools at Roswell, N. M., six years, at Big Spring six years, and at Haskell two years.

Born at Bona, Mo., Aug. 9, 1870, he married Miss Lulu Snow at California, Mo., in 1900.

Funeral services for Mr. Brasher were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the First Christian church in Abilene. Burial was in Cedar Hill cemetery in that city.

## Rule Club Girl Is Scholarship Winner

Novis Allison, 17-year-old 4-H Club girl, has been selected as the District III winner in the Maggie W. Barry Scholarship contest. Mrs. Myrtle D. Negy, district agent of the Texas Extension Service, announced here Monday. As district winner, Novis will be one of the nine girls in the state competing for the \$300 scholarship awarded annually by the Texas Home Demonstration association, to an outstanding senior 4-H Club girl.

Demonstrations carried during her eight years of club work include clothing projects during each year with a total of 211 garments made for herself and others; canning of 1300 quarts of fruit and vegetables, and storing 100 quarts of bacon in her food preservation projects, being responsible for the preparation of the family's meals during the eight years, and for planting 150 kinds of vegetables in the family garden as a part of her food supply demonstrations. She estimates that she has saved the family \$833 by doing the family laundry during the years she has been a club member. In 1947 she helped build a curb around the yard, level the yard, and plant shrub cuttings as a part of her yard improvement demonstration, and spent more than 100 hours painting the woodwork all over the interior of the house.

During her club career, Novis has served as club secretary in 1941, as clothing demonstrator in 1943, as club president in 1944. In 1943 she was the Gold Star winner for Haskell county, in 1944 her garden received the Green Thumb Award, and in 1946 she was one of the county delegates to the 4-H Club Roundup at College Station.

## Purity of Water Supply Goal of Department Employees

(By J. R. Gilstrap, Supt. City Water Dept.)

Insuring the purity of municipal water supplies has been the greatest problem facing towns and cities during the past several decades. A great increase in filtration of the country's public water supplies has served as the first protective step. Since 1908, water works men have taken steps to kill off the bacteria that might be present, by the use of chlorine. Whatever might be said by anyone against the use of chlorine in drinking water can be discounted by the simple fact that our people are alive and healthy because chlorination of drinking water has been recognized by water works men as a necessary element in protection of the quality of water.

Miss Maye Bell Taylor, Haskell Baptist missionary, begins her return trip to the foreign mission fields on February 15 when she leaves Haskell for New Orleans from where she will sail February 20 for Recife, Brazil in South America.

Miss Taylor, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L. F. Taylor of Haskell has been on an extended leave since December 1946 when she returned to the States following a period of seven years spent in Recife. During that time she was associated with Mrs. Mildred Cox Mien, daughter of Mrs. Tom Cox of Abilene in the Baptist mission field.

On her return to Brazil, Miss Taylor will be director of the W.M.U. Training School in Recife and her assistant will be Miss Catherine Smith, formerly of Olney. The school which she heads has an average of sixty-six girls enrolled—from all States in North Brazil.

## Negro's Trial on Murder Charge Set Monday In District Court

Trial of James Forman, negro farm laborer, under grand jury indictment for murder in connection with the slaying last October 8 of Marion Young, another negro, has been set for Monday, Feb. 23 in the 39th District Court here with District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman presiding.

The fatal shooting occurred on a farm three miles east of Rochester about 8:30 in the morning of Oct. 6, 1947. Forman was employed as a cotton picker on the farm. Young was shot four times with a 12 gauge shotgun and died several hours later in the Knox City hospital. A Haskell county grand jury subsequently indicted Forman for murder, and he has been at liberty under bond pending trial.

Prosecution of the case will be directed by District Attorney John H. Banks and County Attorney Curtis Pogue.

Counsel for the defendant will include the law firm of Guinn & Guinn of Rusk, Texas, and Ratliff & Ratliff of this city.

Court records show that twenty-three witnesses have been subpoenaed in the case, 11 by the defense and 12 by the State.

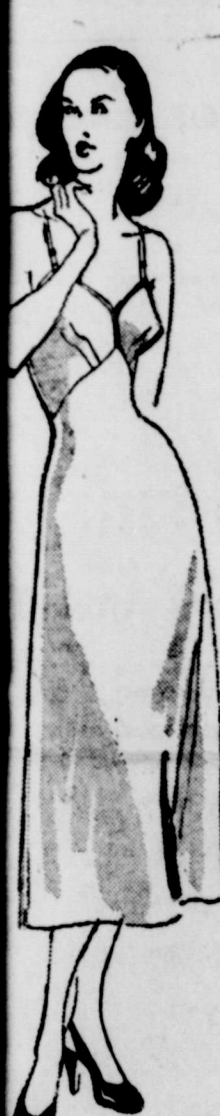

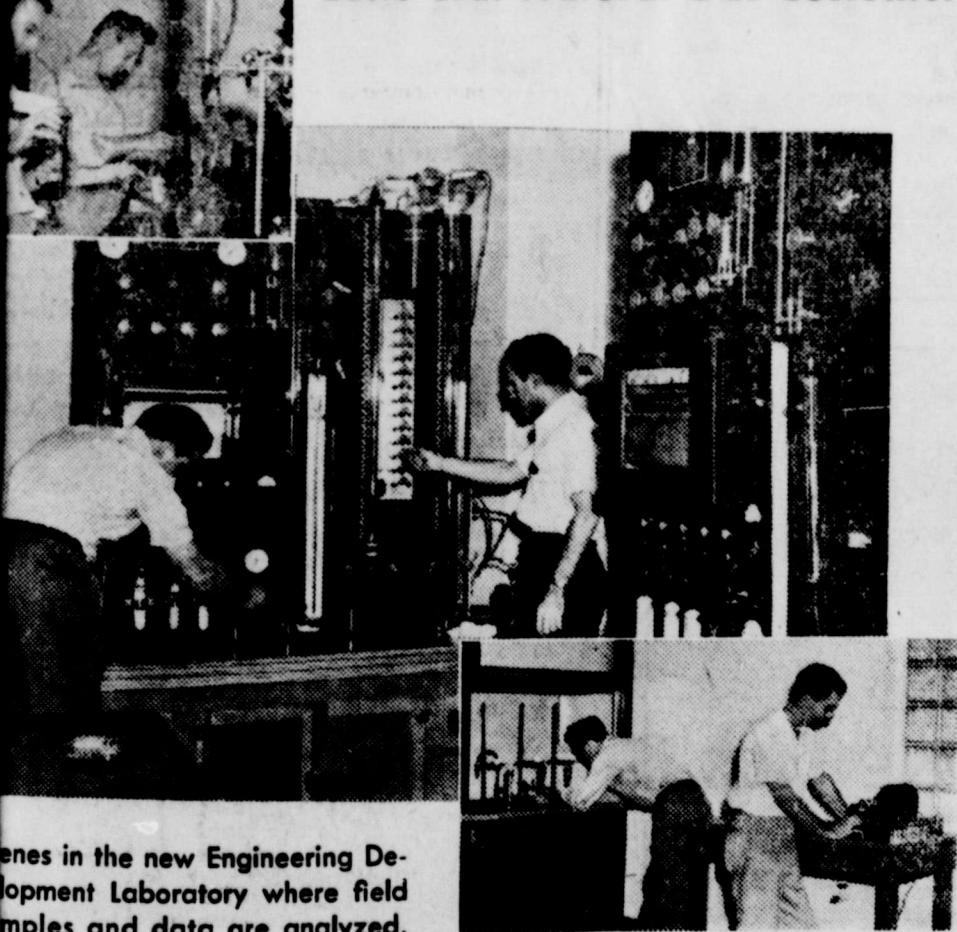

**Briton Plays Russia**

The foreign policy of the Soviet government, together with its "reckless propaganda," risks another war and impedes world economic recovery, according to Deputy Prime Minister Herbert Morrison, of Great Britain.

The British Labor Government official says that he cannot understand the motives of Russia "unless it be the old and evil doctrine that the more misery there is in the world, the better it is for revolutionary success, the doctrine of triumph through chaos."

Mr. Morrison points out that no one is seeking to upset the internal security of Russia but that, just the same, the British cannot be happy when country after country are subjected to undemocratic and unrepresentative Communist governments, with the suppression of other political parties and the freedom of the press. This is accompanied with "wholesale witch-hunting and even the very unjust execution of non-Communist political leaders."

**Dissipating Resources**

During the first eleven months of 1947, the United States exported to foreign countries far more goods than the foreign countries shipped into the United States.

The gap between exports and imports was \$8,038,600,000. This means that the people of this country have delivered to foreign countries a part of their resources without receiving in return resources to be used by the inhabitants of the United States.

The process can keep up for many years, we presume, before the loss of our resources will have a serious effect on our standard of living. Nevertheless, long continuance of such a drain will have an effect even on the incomparable resources of this great country.

**Health Letter**

Some folks are old at sixty; others are mentally and physically alert at eighty. The number of years one has lived may not be a true index to one's physical condition. Actually, the length of a person's life span is influenced by the condition of his arteries. Premature hardening of the arteries, often due to avoidable infections, improper diet, and possibly work and strain is to a certain extent, preventable, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer.

Many of the problems connected with the hygiene of old age are due to lowered mental power. Therefore, a cheerful and optimistic attitude toward the aged, especially during sickness, is essential to their well-being. Old people regard their condition as far less serious when they can be fully dressed and out of bed. When they can be up, the excretory organs function more satisfactorily, too. However, when an elderly person complains of being overtired, or otherwise not physically fit, a day of rest in bed is advisable. By providing light and easily digested food and applying warmth to the body of an aged patient, he is often tided over a mild or threatened illness.

Special attention should also be paid to proper clothing, diet, and exercise of the elderly. With reasonable attention to certain well-defined and easily followed principles of hygiene, it is possible to
