PRESBYTERIAN WOMENS AUXILIARY MEET

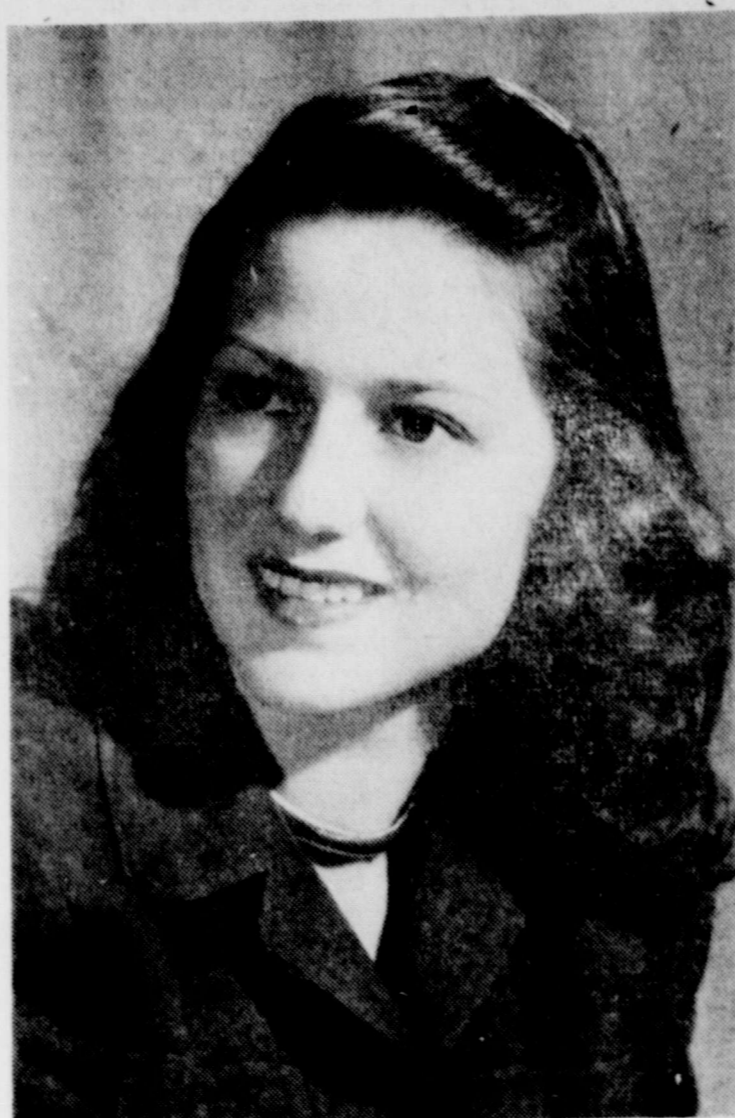

Clubs are reporting a good sale on tickets for the game party to be given in the Activity Building of Haskell High School, Friday, March 19 at 7:30 p.m.

Plant scientists tell us that enough water but not too much water is important for keeping potted plants in good condition in the house during the winter months. Frequently plants fail because they are drowned in too much water or because they are allowed to dry out in the warm dry atmosphere indoors. Plants that come with the pot wrapped in foil may suffer from lack of drainage unless a small hole is cut in the bottom of the foil cover.

A good potted cyclamen will bloom for several months if kept at a temperature of 65 to 68 degrees where it can get the morning light. The soil should never be allowed to dry out completely while the cyclamen is blooming. When it starts to lose leaves, allow the soil to dry, and then store it in a cool dark damp cellar to carry it over a second season.

Begonias need full sun during the winter months. Azaleas last much longer if kept in a cool humid atmosphere during the day, and will thrive at a temperature of 50 to 60 degrees. Moderate watering is the best. The soil needs to be kept acid. If the leaves start turning a yellowish green, dissolve a small amount of alum in the water used for watering.

Greens of the mustard family, kale, turnip tops and mustard, are superior in calcium and vitamin E to other types of greens. The addition of calcium to the soil builds up the calcium content of these greens. Many Americans have diets

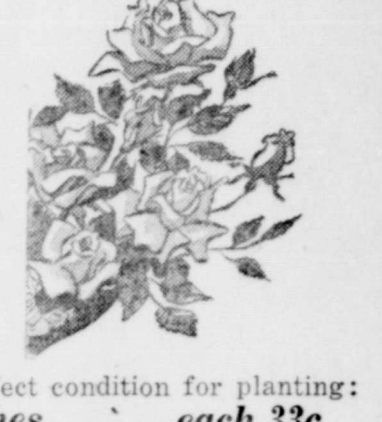

Advocates Firm Steps In Control Of Rabies

The recent death of a child in South Texas from rabies emphasizes the danger of this disease and its importance to public health.

According to a statement just released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer, there were 1,099 rabid animals discovered by laboratory examination in Texas last year. There were undoubtedly many more rabid animals running loose which were never examined.

Cities and towns should take firm steps to control the presence of stray and ownerless dogs since they remain unvaccinated and are the principal source of rabies.

"All dogs should be vaccinated annually as a rabies control measure," Dr. Cox wrote. "When a child is bitten by an infected dog, the dog should be penned up for observation for 10 days. If he shows no signs of illness in that time he is not rabid, but if he sickens, he should be killed in such a manner as not to injure the brain. The brain should be packed immediately in ice and sent to the State Health Department for examination. If rabies is shown to be present there is still time to begin anti-rabies treatment on the child."

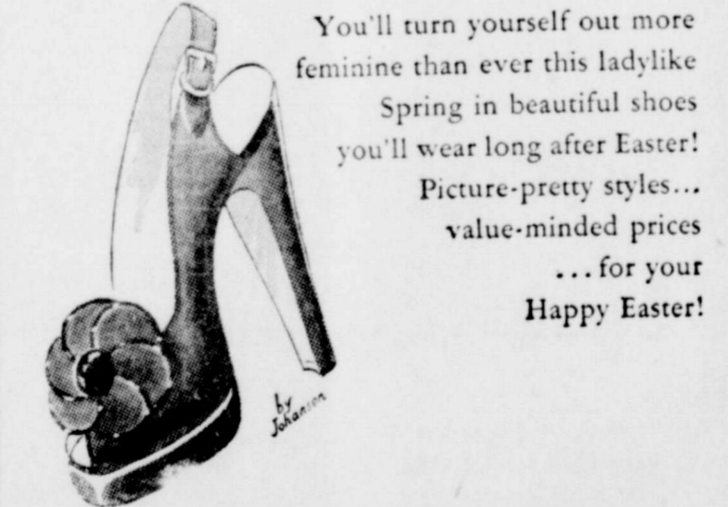
