

Mary Frances White Wins Third Place In PTA Contest

Mary Frances White, 8th grade pupil in Haskell schools, was winner of the third place award in a recent essay contest sponsored by the North Ward Parent-Teacher association. Text of her essay is reprinted below:

Treat Thy Neighbor As Thyself

Intolerance is something that is practiced more in the United States than any one would think. People of a certain race, color, religion, or nationality are refused work in many places in the United States. They are separated in public places according to race. In a few states people of different races must go to separate schools.

President Truman said "We believe that all men are entitled

to equal opportunities for jobs, for homes, for good health, and for education." He believed that Congress should strengthen the law guaranteeing civil rights.

The Declaration of Independence was written by Thomas Jefferson 172 years ago. It said "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights." The first ten amendments to the Constitution guarantee that a citizen of the United States has the freedom of worship as he pleases. He has freedom of speech, press, assembly, he cannot be seized without a warrant, and has a right to a speedy and public trial, to know of what he is accused, and cannot be forced to pay excessive bail or fines. He has a right to vote, no matter what race, color or sex. He cannot be deprived of life, liberty or property with a due trial by law.

If everyone would obey the rule "Treat Thy Neighbor as Thyself," this would be a better world.

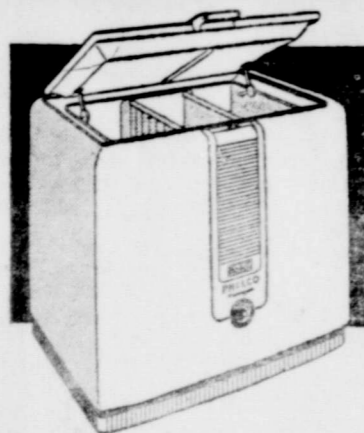

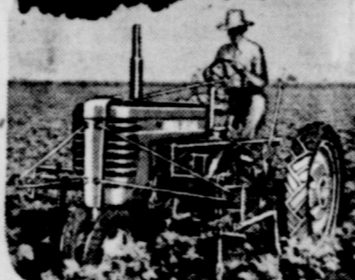

Haskell County Farmers Find Soil Building Legumes Profitable To Land

A few years ago the Blackland Experiment Station at Temple, Texas, made the following statement in its summary of progress: "Hubam clover in two year rotations of hubam-cotton and hubam-corn in 1942 gave substantial increases in the yield of cotton and corn, over a continuous cotton and corn and a cotton-corn rotation. The hubam preceding cotton and corn produced one ton per acre when used for hay and 400 pounds per acre when harvested as seed."

Clovers in this section are still a comparatively new crop, but within the last 3 or 4 years many progressive farmers have given them a trial and found them well adapted. Both Hubam and Madrid clovers have been raised successfully in the medium and heavy soils of the California Creek Soil Conservation District in Haskell and Jones counties. These crops have tremendous value in a rotation system. They provide seasonal grazing, a cash crop in the production of seed and hay, and will improve the soil in both structural and mineral value.

Hubam clover has also been used in fields where root-rot was a serious problem. Results show

that such areas planted to hubam clover increased yields on the following cotton crop and reduced root-rot infestation by more than 90 per cent. This sweet clover is an annual.

Madrid clover, a biennial sweet clover, improved the soil and provided considerable grazing in the growing season and early spring of the second year. Seed can be harvested with a combine.

Soil building legumes are going over in a big way in this section this year. Austrian winter peas, vetch, and clover are rapidly taking a place in the crop rotation of most farmers. Like other successful crops, the legumes are coming into their own because of the benefits they give to the soil to the producer.

Alfalfa is also a soil improving legume. It has been successfully grown under dry-land conditions by several cooperators of the California Creek Soil Conservation District. High yields of hay and seed have been reported. Most successful alfalfa plantings have been made in well drained bottomland soils which are not subject to overflows.
