

Ending Career of Thirty-One Years Teaching In Haskell Schools, Mrs. Ada Rike Retires from Faculty

Something has come over this American school system. Something good. Nowadays children like to go to school. They'll tell you so with engaging frankness until they reach the sophisticated age of 9 or so when it becomes fashionable to be more reticent.

There has been a quiet revolution in the teaching business and

during her 31 years in the Haskell schools, Mrs. Ada Rike has watched it gladly. She gives credit for the change to better understanding of child psychology and improved teaching methods. It never seems to occur to her that she's leaving out one important factor, persons like herself.

Mrs. Rike, who retires at the end of the semester, is one of



the new variety of education, who just naturally makes school an inviting place and teaching an exciting career. "There's nothing in the world more interesting than welcoming children into the school and watching them develop through the years," Mrs. Rike earnestly admits.

Her heart has been set on teaching since her high school days. After going away to school in Canyon she came back to her home town, Haskell, where she has taught and enjoyed her career. Later, she joyously gave up all that "career" to marry and be a housewife.

She is the mother of two children, John and Katherine. Her training was spent at home being an ideal mother.

One day she was left a widow and decided to return to her former profession. She went back to school at West Texas State Teachers college and the University of Wisconsin. She taught at the East Ward school, then moved to the North Ward, where she is at the present time.

During her 31 years in the Haskell schools, she has seen a fascinating parade of pupils, teachers, and parents in and out of the elementary grades. "I always loved to have them come,"

she says a bit wistfully, "and what will I do now that the corridors are empty." Mrs. Rike is closing the school room door for the last time.

There will be a busy life for Mrs. Rike, as she has always been active in the civic development of the community. She holds a life membership in the North Ward Parent-Teacher Association, the Magazine Club, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church. She has recently been honored by being made an honorary member of Delta Kappa Gamma, a national educational fraternity for women teachers who have been outstanding in the educational field.

Mrs. Rike says gravely, "I've always been grateful for motherhood because it has given me a sympathetic viewpoint where parents are concerned. I have shared their problems and anxieties and when I have been able to help them, I've often felt that was the reason."

Mrs. Rike will be leaving soon for Madison, Wis., to visit with her daughter and family. Later, she plans to return to Haskell and enjoy the social life, work has crowded out of her time.

Undoubtedly she will keep in touch with her "work" itself in the form of her beloved pupils because as she says: "I have been happy in Haskell. The children and parents have been wonderful. I'm deeply grateful for the confidence placed in me by the superintendents and boards of education all of these years."

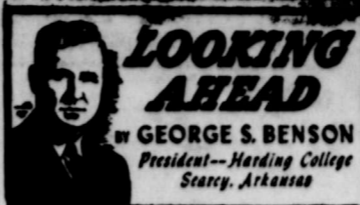

Congress in Action

Spectators at a recent Congressional inquiry guffawed. I hope that some of them got the point. A movie actor had just remarked, deadpan: "I've heard people say that we would have a more efficient government without Congress." A very serious point was contained in that statement, which apparently struck spectators as a humorous jibe at lawmakers, present and not present.

It is somewhat of an American custom to poke fun at our elected officials. Some steam is released that way, like the blowing off of a safety valve. That's all right. But that any sane American should suggest doing away with Congress is no laughing matter. You might as well say that we ought to give up our democratic way of life, in the interest of greater efficiency. One would be equivalent to the other. But who wants an efficient tyranny?

Our Safeguard I am going to say that I appreciate Congress. I am not ashamed to say it. Moreover, I am concerned that there are those who fail to recognize the essential dignity and worth of this branch of our government. Out of the welter of political turmoil in Washington, I think there is still room for a healthy respect for what our Congress does. And we must never forget that Congress represents the will of the people, of the majority. Congress is a mighty safeguard.

When any Congressional session is over, try looking back over the record. It will usually surprise you how much was accomplished. Especially so, if you are one of those Americans who like to chant: "Why, oh why, doesn't Congress do something?"

Accomplished Much When the recent Congress adjourned in late July, final action had been taken on at least 17 major issues. This was an array of achievements, when you recall that this Congress was the first new Congress following the war.

Action was taken on presidential tenure and succession, labor management relations, portal-to-portal pay, excise and social security taxes, National Science Foundation, continuation of the R.F.C. and the C.C.C., crop insurance, continuation of certain subsidies, Army-Navy unification, cashing of terminal leave bonds, executive reorganization, continuation of first class postal rates, rent control, and termination of existing credit regulations.

A Thankless Task This Congress was also economy-minded. It should be credited with saving between \$2 and \$3 billion for taxpayers, despite widespread "scare" tactics of a powerful and well-mobilized bureaucracy. Considering the fact that the American people already spend more for government—local, state, and national—than they spend for food, we should be grateful to an economy-minded Congress.

Fateful problems will face this same Congress in its special session and the regular session to follow. Our sincere commendation should go to legislators for their efforts, and for their sincere public service. Their thankless but necessary persistence will remain necessary as long as we wish to maintain this Republic.

TOO MUCH GIFT

PARIS, Ill. — The members of the American Legion were surprised when the field piece they had requested, for mounting on the public square as the Legion's contribution to the city's war memorial arrived. It was a 23-ton howitzer used by General Rommel's forces during the North African campaign. They didn't even try to move the 35-foot weapon from the flat car it monopolized. Two light 75-mm. guns to be placed on either side of a flagpole were substituted and the howitzer was shipped to the Terre Haute ordnance plant.

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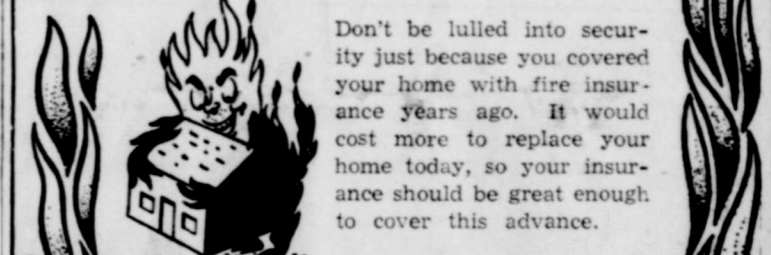

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Health Letter

"Although we may not be silk, we may be far from being well. There is a great and vital difference between high and buoyant health and the health of the average person, or of one who is only well enough to be out of bed." Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, said today.

"Unless we have the essentials of health in our daily habits of living, we are as sure to pay the penalty of impaired health, sickness and early death as we are of cause and effect in other situations," Dr. Cox continued. "We should ask ourselves, 'How long do I expect to live?' 'How long

can I retain my efficiency, both in work and play?' 'Do I want to become incapacitated soon after middle life?'"

The alternative, according to Dr. Cox's statement, is to adjust one's program of living to insure the fundamentals of health and thus, barring accidents, keep young and retain active efficiency to an age of 70 to 80, or more.

The essentials of health are simple: sufficient fresh and sunlight, good food and food habits, regular exercise and adequate rest. Yet, in checking the health of thousands of individuals who considered their health good, it has been rare indeed to find a single person who did not habitually disregard one or more of these essentials. Therefore, no matter how good or poor our health, we should check our daily program of living for health habits that are essentially faulty but of which we may be unaware.

Veterans News

Veterans Administration has warned veterans, builders and lenders against the consequences of making or accepting so-called "side payments" in the sale of home properties to veterans with the aid of GI loans.

VA said such side payments—usually made for the purpose of evading the prohibition against sales to veterans in excess of appraised "reasonable value"—are a direct violation of law and subject offenders to possible federal prosecution.

Many cases have been reported in which veterans have been induced to pay the builder or seller an amount over and above the sales price shown on the loan report submitted to VA, and upon which the Government loan guarantee is based.

Veterans who knowingly conspire to evade the law by making such side payments risk loss of their rights under all veterans' laws, VA warned.

VA said that any lender who submits a loan to VA for guaranty while possessing knowledge of a side payment in connection with the sale—even though the payment was made to a third party other than the lender—will be suspended from further participation in the GI loan program. Also, any guaranty issued in connection with the transaction will be invalidated.

Continuing its efforts to prevent overpayments of subsistence allowances, Veterans Administration again urges veteran-students and their schools to notify VA as soon as a veteran interrupts or completes his training program.

A veteran-student in training under the GI Bill is not entitled to subsistence allowances after the date he interrupts or completes his training. In some cases veterans stop their training and receive additional payments before VA is notified of their change in status.

All such payments must be refunded to the government. Advance notice is preferable whenever a veteran decides to discontinue his training. However, prompt notice immediately after a break in training will help to prevent most overpayments.

Q—How many veterans suffered speech impairment during World War II and what is being done to aid them in overcoming their handicap?
A—Approximately 100,000 World War II veterans suffered speech impairment in service. Special restorative training has been established by VA to help eligible veterans overcome the handicap.

Q—May I name more than one beneficiary to my National Service Life Insurance?
A—Yes. You may divide the amount of your policy between two or more beneficiaries. You may also name one or more contingent beneficiaries.

Q—Can a World War II veteran be denied benefits by Veterans Administration if he has fraudulently obtained subsistence payments under the GI Bill?
A—In a decision issued recently by Veterans Administration Central Office in Washington, the veteran who fraudulently obtained such subsistence payments would be barred from all rights to compensation, pension, hospitalization, unemployment allowances, education, job-training and other benefits to which veterans are normally entitled.

Picnic Fires Can Cause Damage

AUSTIN—Don't neglect a picnic fire at the expense of someone else's home, is the plea made to Texans by Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner.

Whether you are roasting weiners near a farm, fishing in a wooded lake area or picnicking on the neighborhood vacant lot, your carelessness fun around a fire can spell tragedy for someone else, he said.

The rules for having a safe fire on pleasure jaunts are simple, the commissioner stated. First, find out if the law allows you to build a fire at the desired spot. Then, extinguish the fire with water or sand and be sure it is completely out before you leave it.

Also be careful with matches and cigarettes, he cautioned. Always be sure your match is out and break it in two before throwing it away. This safety measure originated from an old cowboy custom which worked on the theory that if a person held a match long enough to break it in two, the flame would be out completely.

Cigarettes, cigars and pipe ashes should be crushed out on a rock or other nonflammable surfaces, he warned. They should also never be thrown out of an automobile window when traveling on the highway or in the woods, but placed in the car's ash receiver.

Most hazardous to life-safety

In the practice of using kerosene or gasoline to quicken a fire. Many a person has lost his life when such a fire flashed back engulfing his clothing and everything else nearby.

Hall reminded Texans that last year in the United States, forest fires burned enough trees of saw-tyber size to build about 86,000 five-room houses. If all wood burned were of saw-tyber size it would provide lumber to build over 200,000 homes.

"In the face of housing shortage, this is a shameful condition when we know that 90 per cent of the forest fires are caused by the carelessness of people," he stated.

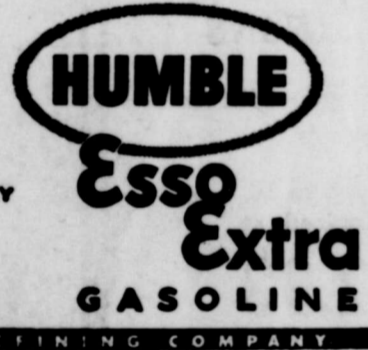

Health Letter

"Although we may not be silk, we may be far from being well. There is a great and vital difference between high and buoyant health and the health of the average person, or of one who is only well enough to be out of bed." Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, said today.

"Unless we have the essentials of health in our daily habits of living, we are as sure to pay the penalty of impaired health, sickness and early death as we are of cause and effect in other situations," Dr. Cox continued. "We should ask ourselves, 'How long do I expect to live?' 'How long

can I retain my efficiency, both in work and play?' 'Do I want to become incapacitated soon after middle life?'"

The alternative, according to Dr. Cox's statement, is to adjust one's program of living to insure the fundamentals of health and thus, barring accidents, keep young and retain active efficiency to an age of 70 to 80, or more.

The essentials of health are simple: sufficient fresh and sunlight, good food and food habits, regular exercise and adequate rest. Yet, in checking the health of thousands of individuals who considered their health good, it has been rare indeed to find a single person who did not habitually disregard one or more of these essentials. Therefore, no matter how good or poor our health, we should check our daily program of living for health habits that are essentially faulty but of which we may be unaware.

Veterans News

Veterans Administration has warned veterans, builders and lenders against the consequences of making or accepting so-called "side payments" in the sale of home properties to veterans with the aid of GI loans.

VA said such side payments—usually made for the purpose of evading the prohibition against sales to veterans in excess of appraised "reasonable value"—are a direct violation of law and subject offenders to possible federal prosecution.

Many cases have been reported in which veterans have been induced to pay the builder or seller an amount over and above the sales price shown on the loan report submitted to VA, and upon which the Government loan guarantee is based.

Veterans who knowingly conspire to evade the law by making such side payments risk loss of their rights under all veterans' laws, VA warned.

VA said that any lender who submits a loan to VA for guaranty while possessing knowledge of a side payment in connection with the sale—even though the payment was made to a third party other than the lender—will be suspended from further participation in the GI loan program. Also, any guaranty issued in connection with the transaction will be invalidated.

Continuing its efforts to prevent overpayments of subsistence allowances, Veterans Administration urges veteran-students and their schools to notify VA as soon as a veteran interrupts or completes his training program.

A veteran-student in training under the GI Bill is not entitled to subsistence allowances after the date he interrupts or completes his training. In some cases veterans stop their training and receive additional payments before VA is notified of their change in status.

All such payments must be refunded to the government. Advance notice is preferable whenever a veteran decides to discontinue his training. However, prompt notice immediately after a break in training will help to prevent most overpayments.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—Is it correct that training officers from Veterans Administration have been relieved of all responsibility for the direct supervision of World War II veterans training under the GI Bill?

A—Yes. The change will permit VA's training officers to devote more time to the needs of disabled veterans training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act. All state approval agencies, schools and training establishments have been asked to meet fully their obligations under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill).

Q—How many veterans suffered speech impairment during World War II and what is being done to aid them in overcoming their handicap?

A—Approximately 100,000 World War II veterans suffered speech impairment in service. Special restorative training has been established by VA to help eligible veterans overcome the handicap.

Q—May I name more than one beneficiary to my National Service Life Insurance?

A—Yes. You may divide the amount of your policy between two or more beneficiaries. You may also name one or more contingent beneficiaries.

Q—Can a World War II veteran be denied benefits by Veterans Administration if he has fraudulently obtained subsistence payments under the GI Bill?

A—In a decision issued recently by Veterans Administration Central Office in Washington, the veteran who fraudulently obtained such subsistence payments would be barred from all rights to compensation, pension, hospitalization, unemployment allowances, education, job-training and other benefits to which veterans are normally entitled.

Picnic Fires Can Cause Damage

AUSTIN—Don't neglect a picnic fire at the expense of someone else's home, is the plea made to Texans by Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner.

Whether you are roasting weiners near a farm, fishing in a wooded lake area or picnicking on the neighborhood vacant lot, your careless fun around a fire can spell ragedy for someone else, he said.

The rules for having a safe fire on pleasure jaunts are simple, the commissioner stated. First, find a fire at the desired spot. Then, extinguish the fire with water or sand and be sure it is completely out before you leave it.

Also be careful with matches and cigarettes, he cautioned. Always be sure your match is out and break it in two before throwing it away. This safety measure originated from an old cowboy custom which worked on the theory that if a person held a match long enough to break it in two, the flame would be out completely.

Cigarettes, cigars and pipe ashes should be crushed out on a rock or other nonflammable surfaces, he warned. They should also never be thrown out of an automobile window when traveling on the highway or in the woods, but placed in the car's ash receiver.

Most hazardous to life-safety

is the practice of using kerosene or gasoline to quicken a fire.

Many a person has lost his life when such a fire flashed back engulfing his clothing and everything else nearby.

Hall reminded Texans that last year in the United States, forest fires burned enough trees of saw-timber size to build about 86,000 five-room houses. If all wood burned were of saw-timber size it would provide lumber to build over 200,000 homes.

"In the face of housing shortage, this is a shameful condition when we know that 90 per cent of the forest fires are caused by the carelessness of people," he stated.



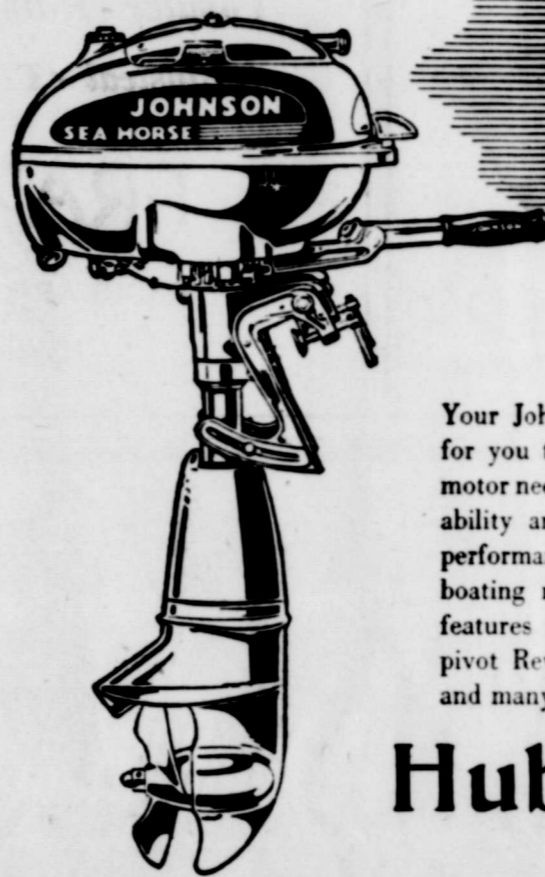

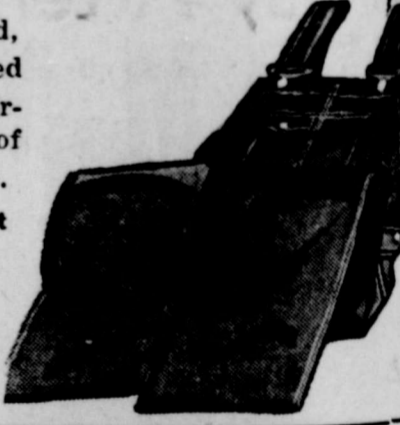

News From the County Agent

Pecan Nut Casebearer
One of the most important insects attacking the pecan is the pecan nut casebearer. In Texas it has often been reported as destroying from one-third to three-fourths of the total pecan crop.

The nut casebearer passes the winter as a partly grown larva in small, tightly woven cases, similar to those of the leaf casebearer, usually situated at the place where a bud joins the stem. The larvae become active during the latter part of March or early in April, the exact time depending upon the season and the latitude. At first they feed a short time on the buds to which the cocoons are attached; later they bore into the young tender shoots where a leaf joins the main stem. After feeding for 2 weeks or more, the larvae transform to the pupal, or resting stage within the tunneled hoods.

When mature, the larva is about half an inch long, and its general color is a dirty olive green. The pupa is about one-third of an inch long and when first formed has a decided olive green cast, but later it is brown and without striking markings. After a pupal period of 11 to 18 days, moths appear. The appearance of the maximum number of moths coincides fairly well with the setting of the nuts.

The moth is of a rather inconspicuous dark-gray color, with a ridge or tuft of long, dark scales extending across each forewing near the middle. It measures about five-eighths of an inch across the expanded wings. The moths usually begin to lay their tiny, inconspicuous, greenish-white eggs from 2 to 4 days after emergence, placing them singly on the outer end of the nut, and usually at or near the base of the calyx lobes. Apparently it is the habit of moths to lay but one or two eggs on a cluster of nuts.

The most important damage is caused by the first-generation larvae, which appear in May and early in June and bore into the recently set nuts. At the point of attack, near the stem end, they cast out characteristic masses of borings which are held together by fine silken threads, eventually forming a short silk-lined tube. The flimsy web thus formed probably protects the larvae from the attacks of predatory and parasite insects while they are entering the small nuts and also holds the nuts together in the cluster, preventing them from dropping to the ground before the larva is mature.

Control

Spray as soon as the brown end drops off the nut with 2 pounds of 50 per cent DDT in 100 gallons of water. Two applications about 15 days apart should get good control in Haskell county, according to F. W. Martin, county agent.

Rosette

In its earliest stages, or on slightly affected trees, rosette is indicated by a slight yellowish mottling of the leaves, particularly in the tops of the trees. In more advanced stages the leaflets are slightly narrowed and crinkled. When the trees are severely affected the leaflets are extremely narrowed, with higher reddish-brown areas or perforations between the veins. New shoot growth is checked, the internodes are shortened, and the foliage is bunched, resulting in a rosetted appearance. The name of the disease is derived from this characteristic. In the final stages of the disease the shoots die back from the tips.

Treatment

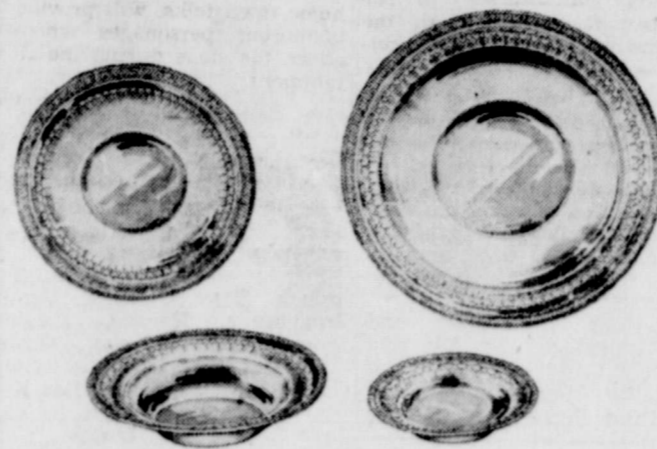
The application of zinc sulfate to the soil around orsetted trees is effective principally on trees growing in neutral, acid, and sandy alkaline soils.

On soils not having a high fixing power for the zinc, the rate of application should be 1-2 to 1 pound of zinc sulfate for each year of the tree's age, or from 1 2 pounds for each inch of the diameter of the tree trunk. The larger the dosage the greater will be the improvement from the diseased condition the first year. When used as a fertilizer the zinc sulfate should be applied in late February or early March, but can be done at any time of the year.

Control Measures Against Hoppers Is Advised

Young grasshoppers are now swarming in the ditchbanks, along the fence rows, turn rows, roadsides, railroad right-of-ways and around the edges of fields and pastures. They have not yet invaded the cultivated croplands, says H. G. Johnston, head of the Texas A. & M. college department of entomology. Dr. Johnston reports that this looks like the worst grasshopper infestation in many years.

The areas in Texas that have been hardest hit are in the blackland area from the Red River Valley southward to Seguin and Karnes City, and along the Brazos River bottoms from Waco to Bellville. The same situation holds true for the many other river and creek banks in this area, where the grasshoppers cover the vegetation in almost a solid mass.

There will be lots of damage from the grasshoppers in three or four weeks unless something is done about it now. M. H. Brown, Jr., Limestone county agent, held two demonstrations on spraying hoppers along ditch-

banks and field margins with toxaphene two weeks ago.

During recent years grass hoppers have been controlled with bran sawdust sodium fluosilicate bait poisons, but this year farmers are turning to the new insecticides oxaphene (chlorinated camphene), chlordane and benzene hexachloride (BHC.) Sprayed or dusted along the edges of fields, ditchbanks or fence rows, these poisons give a quicker control and continue to kill longer than the standard bait poisons. And one of the main reasons for this is that the poison is up on the grass where the hoppers are and not down on the ground.

As with nearly all poisons, there are a few precautions to take when dusting or spraying these insecticides. It is not a good idea to feed dairy cattle forage that has been treated with these sprays or dusts because there is a chance that the poisons might accumulate in the fatty tissues and later be passed on into the milk and butter.

Beef cattle are not harmed to any extent with small doses of these sprays or dusts on forage, but over a period of time, the meat may become unfit for food. For the same reason, it is not recommended to spray the entire pasture, since grazing cattle, in time, might easily be affected.
