

New '49 Ford Reveals Radical Departure from Traditional Styling and Engineering

The 1949 Ford, which reveals a radical departure from traditional Ford styling and engineering, was made public this week by the Ford Motor company, and Bill Wilson, owner of Bill Wilson Motor company here announced that the new models would be on display to the public for the first time on Friday, June 18.

"New standards of beauty, comfort, economy and performance in the 1948 Ford passenger cars advance them far ahead of others in the low-priced field," J. R. Davis, vice president and director of sales and advertising, said. "Styling of the new Ford definitely establishes it as the car of the year."

To develop and produce the 1948 Ford passenger cars, Ford Motor company has expended more than \$37,400,000 in tools, dies, jigs and fixtures.

Styling — The modern design has been molded along functional lines, resulting in a long, log, sweeping silhouette. The grille is distinctive, the hood massive but shorter and the body so wide the rear fenders have been eliminated. There are clean, unbroken lines from front to rear.

Comfort — Comfort has been one of the primary objectives in the new Ford. There is more room in the "lounge car" interiors than in many cars with much larger over-all dimensions. Front seat widths have been increased six inches and the rear seat nearly

eight inches. The body has been moved five inches forward with the seats cradled between the axles for a much smoother ride.

A new type of suspension system—"hydra-coil" springs — replaces the traditional transverse springs and the front axle. This system is centered around airplane type shock absorbers mounted within low frequency coil springs. In the rear, extra long longitudinal springs are complemented by airplane type shock absorbers.

The drive shaft tunnel has been decreased by adoption of the Hotchkiss drive and the hypoid rear axle. These engineering changes also minimized the transmission of road noises into the car.

Engine vibration has been reduced by literally floating the power plant on rubber mounts. A new heating system available in the new Fords brings year around comfort to driver and passengers. Fresh air is scooped into the car through large intakes just behind the grille.

The system, which has an auto-

matic temperature control, can be used as a fresh air ventilator, a fresh air heater or as a recirculating heater. Fresh air plus the pressure effect obtained by the car's forward motion reduces fogging and drafts.

Economy — Economy of operation has been increased up to 10 per cent improvement in gasoline mileage for the new six-cylinder engine and the extensively redesigned V-8. Both are offered as power plants in all Ford models. Other engineering features result in better performance and longer engine life.

A new intake manifold achieves better fuel distribution. It is attached to the engine so that it is horizontal to the ground, reducing the tendency of raw gasoline to flow toward the rear cylinders and smoothing engine operation.

The new "equa-flow" cooling system contributes to good performance under extreme conditions by improving general operating efficiency. Water flows in volume the full length of the block. Temperatures in "hot spots" in the six and eight cylinder engines have been decreased by as much as 12 degrees. There are larger water pumps in the V-8.

Improvements in the ignition system also have contributed to increased economy and efficiency. As much as 25 per cent improvement in gasoline economy may be achieved by taking advantage of the overdrive which is available as factory-installed optional equipment.

Safety — New standards of safety have been set in the rugged construction of the chassis and body. The box-type frame is of all-welded construction. Although the frame is lighter, there is 59 per cent more rigidity when combined with the body.

Lowering the over-all height by four inches and placing the seats between the axles results in a lower center of gravity, an aid in safe driving.

The windshield has been increased in height and width and the rear window now provides "picture window" visibility for driver and passengers. The rear window is larger than the ordinary windshield. There is as much as 20 square feet of windows in the new cars.

All doors hinge at the front. Inside handles push up instead of down to open the door. Both features combine to preclude accidental opening of the doors.

Performance — Increased performance values are one of the highlights of the new cars.

Steering has been greatly improved. The new Ford may be guided by a minimum of effort even under severe wind conditions. Rock shocks have been minimized. This is the result of a newly designed linkage in which the pivot point of the tie rods is on the same center line as the wheels.

Engineering changes in the engines, some of them already mentioned, contribute to smoothness of operation. These include the new cooling system, intake manifold, redesigned combustion chambers and improved crankcase ventilation system as well as other features.

The 114-inch wheelbase, convenient for parking and in moving through heavy traffic, has been retained.

The new six-cylinder develops 95-horsepower, providing better acceleration in passing and heavy traffic. The V-8 develops 100-horsepower.

Other Features — Interior styling is colorful and practical. Traditional, neutral-toned automobile fabrics have been discarded for new tweeds, broadcloths and mohairs retain the ability to absorb hard family usage.

Hardware is massive and attractive. Door handles and other hardware are much easier to operate. The doors have new type locks which eliminate all possibility of persons being locked out of the car with the keys inside.

The flight panel dash provides centralized grouping of instruments for quick, easy reference in line with the driver's view of the road. Fuel level, oil pressure, water temperature and battery charge indicators are placed outside the rim of the speedometer. The glove compartment on the right hand side has been enlarged.

Chrome trim, both inside and out, has been reduced.

There are two lines of cars, the Ford and the Ford Custom. Body styles in both lines include the four door sedan, two door sedan and club coupe. Convertible and station wagon models are obtained only in the Custom line and the three passenger coupe only in the Ford line.

There are eight durable new exterior colors — Bayview Blue Metallic, Birch Gray, Sea Mist Green, Arabian Green, Colony Blue, Gun Metal Gray Metallic, Midland Maroon Metallic and Black.

Two additional colors — Fez Red and Miami Cream — are available in the convertible only.

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Veterans News

The Veteran's Administration has revised its contract requirements to provide a firmer control over tuition rates charged by many private schools for training veterans under the GI Bill.

The changes, effective July 1, 1948, are being made in an attempt to correct and eliminate abuses in tuition charges that have been uncovered in recent months.

With the new contract standards, VA hopes to make certain that the federal government is not paying for more than the veteran actually receives during his training. VA emphasized that the new contract requirements affect only the following institutions whose enrollments consist mostly of veterans: (1) schools established since the passage of the GI Bill, and (2) schools whose charges increased materially since the GI Bill programs began.

No charge was made to VA's policy of accepting charges made by other private profit schools not affected by the new ruling.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. — Have I any recourse to civil courts if I do not like VA's decision on my claim for disability compensation?

A. — No. The law specifically provides that the decision of the administrator of veterans affairs in such matters is final and conclusive.

Q. — I am an ex-GI of World War II and receive disability compensation. If I take a three hour a day job, will my compensation be discontinued.

A. — So long as your disability remains compensable, it will be continued. The fact that you are employed does not bar payment of compensation if you are disabled as result of a service-connected condition.

Q. — I lost the use of my legs in line of duty during World War I, and would like to know if I can get a car from the Government?

A. — Under existing law, the authority to furnish automobiles is limited to World War II veterans.

Q. — What kind of insurance is National Service Life Insurance?

A. — NSLI is mutual insurance. All premium payments go into a trust fund maintained by the Treasury Department. This money is invested in government, interest-bearing securities. The interest accrues to the fund. The fund is known as the National Service Life Insurance Fund.

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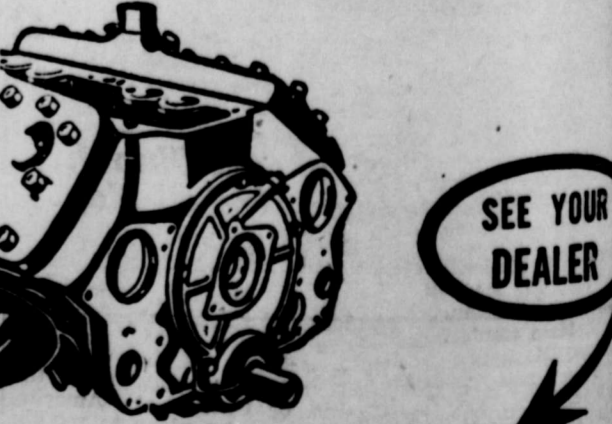

FORD CAR PRICES BOOSTED \$85 TO \$125

Henry Ford II boosted prices on his 1949 model Fords nearly nine per cent Saturday, possibly pacing the auto industry on another upward spiral.

He said the new cars would cost from \$85 to \$125 more than present models. He did not list prices per model.

The new models are due on public display June 18. Fords announcement was not unexpected. The auto industry had freely predicted for some time that the new Fords would cost the public more.

The current models cost from \$1,154 to \$1,972 delivered, plus state sales taxes and transportation charges.

General Motors corporation has said it will try to hold the price line on its current models despite the recent 11-cent an hour sliding wage settlement with its 225,000 CIO United Auto Workers.

Chrysler corporation, which gave its 75,000 employees a 13-cent an hour wage boost, has not said what effect, if any, this might have on its prices.

However, neither GM nor Chrysler, chief rivals of Ford in the lower-priced field, has brought out any drastically new model low-priced cars since the war. They plan to do so, probably before the end of the year.

When they do, sources in the industry predicted, they will follow Fords lead in hiking prices. It cost Ford \$90,000,000 in new tools to build the 1949 model, the company president said.

Ford also said his annual bill for materials and parts had increased \$45,000,000 in two years. His employees payroll jumped \$120,000,000 in that period even without a third round of postwar wage increases, he added.

The UAW-CIO is scheduled to begin negotiation with Ford June 14. The union is asking a 30 cent an hour wage boost. Ford currently pays an average wage

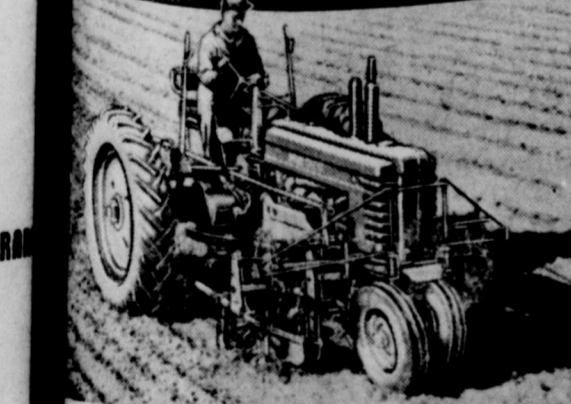

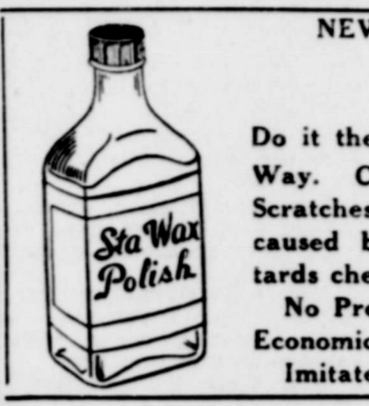

ANCIENT WEAPON UNEARTHED... RUSTED PISTOL BELIEVED RELIC OF EARLY DAY WESTEX ADVENTURER

A relic of some pioneer traveler who visited this section of West Texas was possibly 100 years ago, came to light recently when George Banks found a rusted "cap and ball" pistol while digging a sewer ditch on property of his mother, the late Mrs. J. M. Banks a block south of the courthouse.

The relic was found, Banks said, about three feet below the surface, on the banks of Spring Creek which flows southeasterly through the city limits. Stock of the weapon, presumably of wood, had rotted away but otherwise the gun's metal had resisted the ravages of time, with brass and steel sections of the pistol still intact but corroded with rust.

Banks left his find in the office of Justice of the Peace C. K. Jones in the courthouse where many curious persons have viewed the ancient firearm. A Lubbock resident, connected with the license division of the State Department of Public Safety and whose hobby is that of amateur gunsmith, was intrigued by the find. He believes the relic was made about 1840, when, according to collector's records, four hundred similar "pocket pistols" were manufactured after which the model was discarded for a heavier weapon.

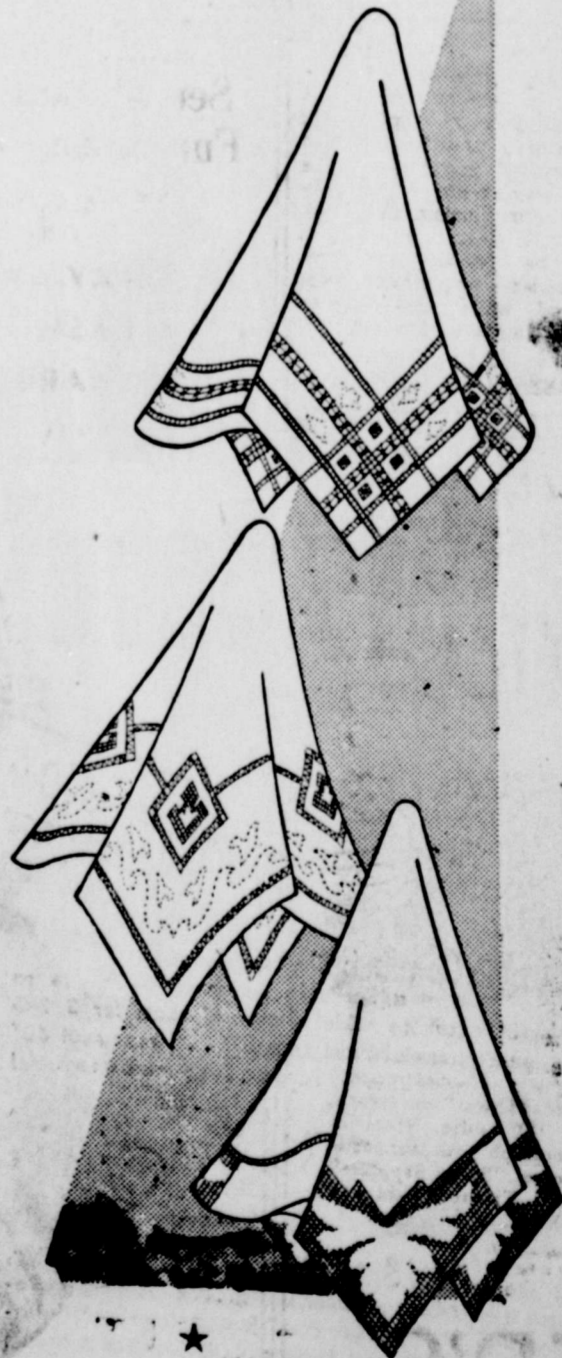

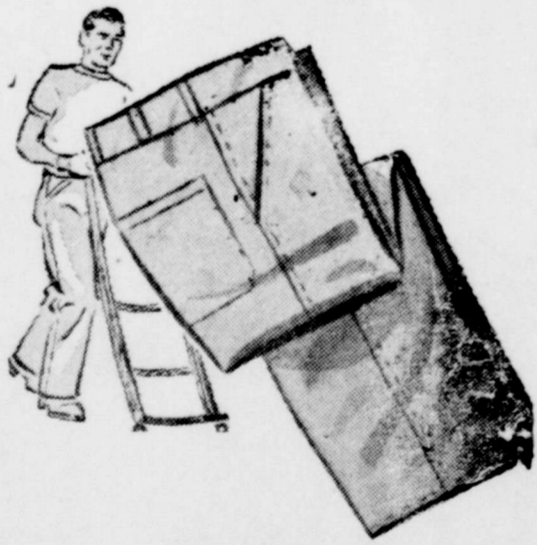

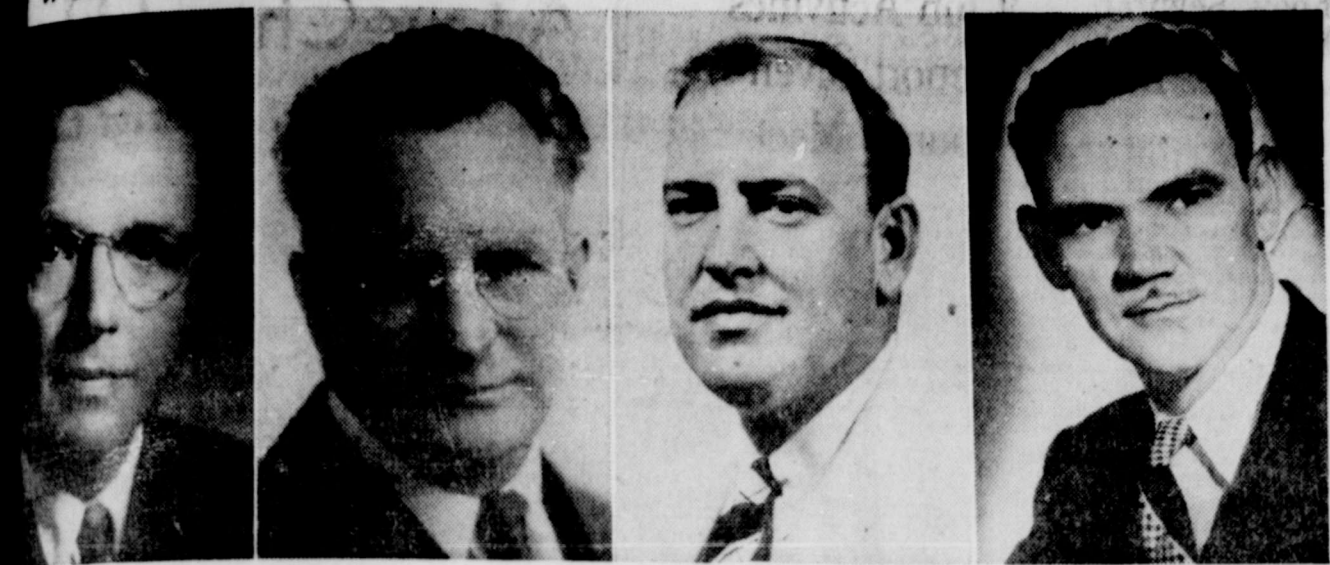

"ECONOMY COSTS MONEY"

In 1947 Congress, dominated by "economy-minded" representatives, slashed the appropriation of the Bureau of Internal Revenue by \$20,000,000.

The Bureau, as the reader knows, is charged with collecting income and corporation taxes. It maintains a staff of trained investigators for the purpose of checking tax returns and compelling reluctant, and tax-dodging persons and corporations to pay their legal income taxes.

Naturally, there was a large chorus of approval for the economy. Some of it came from those who were interested in limiting the investigations that could be made into income tax returns. Little all others will do, or be made to do the same.

President Truman scored the reduction made in the Bureau's funds, saying that the \$20,000,000 "saved" would cost the government at least \$400,000,000 in lost revenue.

CASH IS WHAT THEY WANT

There are many public leaders who stress the obligation of the United States to take the responsibility for world affairs but they couple their advocacy with warning that, unless we do this or that, the people of other countries will lose faith in America.

It is somewhat absurd for any intelligent person to conclude that the United States, which leads the world in its economy, its standard of living and its helpful attitude toward other peoples, is about to lose its influence because of something that happens in this country.

Another 5 Per Cent Dividend has been paid to the stockholders of the Haskell County National Farm Loan Association, which amounts to \$2.50 on each \$1,000 loan, quite a saving to the borrower, this saving made possible by the co-operative team work of the farmer borrower.

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Hot Weather To Bring Increase Of Summer Ills

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, has issued a warning to parents that this is the season for an increase in dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint."

"The chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk; water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the babies formula; and improper amount of food," Dr. Cox said.

"All foods should be fresh and clean, and left-overs should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox urged extreme care in the preparation of a feeding formula for infants. He said it should be prescribed by a physician, and that cleanliness and refrigeration were absolute essentials. Babies should be on a definite schedule, since their stomach and bowels can be easily upset if fed irregularly or whenever they are fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that dysentery is transmitted by flies and said every home should be well screened and free of flies.

"If dysentery or diarrhea develop, consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called 'summer complaint' can be a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

because, like the others, it will lose quality.

The best time for sudan and Johnson grass cuttings is as soon as the first seed heads begin to form, or even earlier in order to get high quality hay rich in protein. Cowpeas should be left until the first pods start to ripen.

Alfalfa hay is best harvested when the field is one-tenth to one-fourth in bloom, or when young shoots begin to show up at the base of the plants. In a new field it is important to let one cutting of alfalfa go to seed or at least to the full bloom stage to develop a stronger root system and build longer lived fields.

Cut sweet clover before the stems grow coarse and woody — before it begins to bloom. And remember to leave 5 or 6 inches of stem on sweet clover, since what clover you get in the second cutting will grow from the six-inch stem left from the first.

Grass hay may be left in the swath until fairly well cured, but legume hay — such as alfalfa, the clovers and cowpeas — must be raked into windrows before the leaves shatter.

If pickup balers are not available, stack the hay in piles or small stacks before the leaves shatter, and then bale or place in hay stacks when it is sufficiently cured.

The two important processes in hay curing are loss of water — from about 75 per cent to 15 or 20 per cent — and the chemical change known as "sweating" or

fermenting. During the "sweating" process the hay develops an aroma and becomes more palatable.

One of the most important things about hay curing, is getting rid of the moisture in the hay as quickly as possible and still keeping the green color of the hay.

European Sketch

A Midwestern acquaintance of mine recently gave to a group of businessmen what he called a report of "a roller skate trip over a very large subject." Sterling Morton, Chicago banker and industrialist, was reporting on a seven-weeks' trip to Europe. His remarks seemed to me worthy of a larger audience.

Excursion

This recent trip, according to Mr. Morton, was no V.I.P. excursion.

Important People

(The Very Important People sometimes arrive at conclusions that have been planned by their hosts in advance.) Actually, Mr. Morton

rented a small French car and drove it 2,500 miles, talking to everybody along the way. Because he speaks French fluently, our Midwesterner was taken for a Frenchman when outside France, for an Englishman when in France—but hardly for an American at any time.

Peacetime Damage

In France, Mr. Morton reported the cost of living up ten times over 1937, with wages having increased six times. "How an elevator operator, for instance, can live on 8,000 francs a month is a mystery. Or how a laborer can be content on the official ration of two-fifths of a pound of bread a day. Things are very much out of balance."

Recovery

However, Mr. Morton sees France on the road to recovery, in a physical way.

Government Employees

BUT: "France is cursed with government employees. There always were droves of them—now there are herds! One former Maqui suggested the way to improve conditions was to machine gun half the 'fonctionnaires'! Even Senator Byrd doesn't go that far! . . . French production figures are highly encouraging. If governmental expenses could be cut down, the printing of money stopped, confidence and prosperity would soon return."

Help Them Produce

Of the British: "One can have nothing but admiration for . . . what they went through so steadfastly. That they should be afflicted, in peace, with a government which has done, psychologically, financially and commercially, probably as much damage, is a cruel tragedy. Only the miracles of socialistic planning, applied to a fertile island underlaid with coal and surrounded by seas teeming with fish, could bring about a situation in which the people are cold and hungry."

Loans and Gifts

On loans and gifts: "I think it would be pouring money down a rat hole to make any more loans to governments, yet I feel that we should, for our own sake, help those who are willing to help themselves. My idea would be to make loans direct to private producers on very easy terms and for productive purposes only. . . . We can't stop Communism by giving corrupt or inefficient or minority governments the means of remaining in office."

Building Up

"We can stop it by building up the productive capacity of the threatened nations. . . . I doubt that Europe's economy will be healthy until Germany again is producing and consuming. . . . Britain, France, Italy, yes, Germany, too—help them to produce again. That is the way to bring stability and peace."

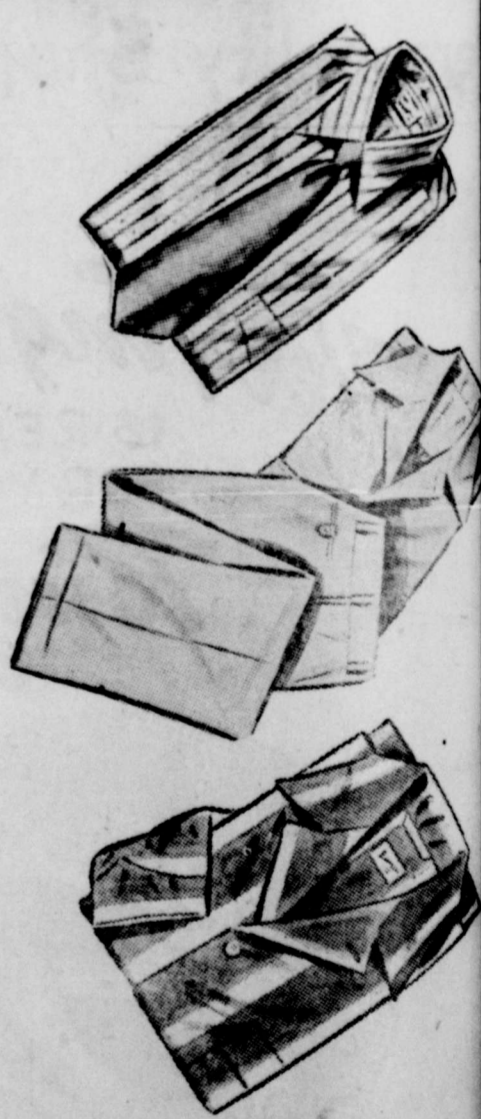

'Don't Listed On Child Labor

Some of the important "don'ts" for employers of this state on the employment of minors during the summer vacation period are listed by William J. Rogers, regional director of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions, U. S. Department of Labor, in the five southwestern states. He advised employers subject to the Fair Labor Standards Act (Federal Wage and Hour Law.)

Don't permit children 14 and 15 years old to work more than 40 hours a week when school is not in session, or more than three hours a day and 18 hours a week when school is in session.

Don't permit children 14 and 15 years old to work between 7 p. m. and 7 a. m.

Don't permit children 14 and 15 years old to work in manufacturing, mining or processing occupations, including occupations requiring the performance of any duties in workrooms or work-places where goods are manufactured, mined or otherwise processed.

Don't permit children 16 and 17 years old to work in occupations held to be hazardous—in plants manufacturing explosives; as motor vehicle drivers or helpers; in coal mines; in logging or sawmill occupations; around power-driven wood working machinery; operating power-driven hoisting apparatus, including elevators, and in jobs where they are exposed to radioactive substances.

Don't forget to get employment and age certificates and keep them on file.

Don't forget to pay minor employees at least the minimum wage set by law, and time and a half for overtime after 40 hours in any work week.

If the firm is working on a contract under the Walsh-Healey Act, he further advised.

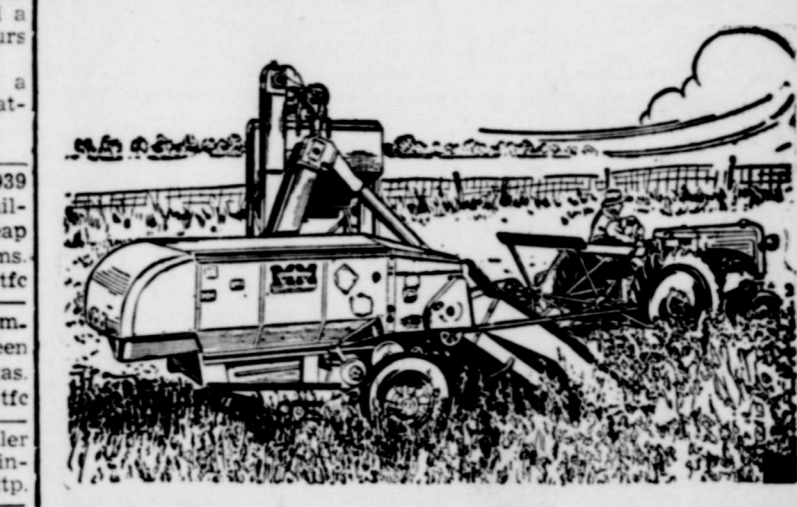

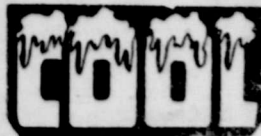

Waste of Tractor Fuels Cited By A. & M. Specialists

Texas farmers are wasting 18 million gallons of tractor fuel each year, Texas A. & M. College Extension Service specialists estimate.

"Shut off the motor when the tractor is not in use," W. L. Ulrich, agricultural engineer, advised the state's 780,000 tractor owners. "Store fuel in good drums and haul full loads whenever possible."

Ulrich also advised that carburetors be adjusted. Keep all equipment in good condition to avoid costly breakdowns, he added.

"Farmers should make fewer trips to town. They should have plenty of fuel storage capacity. They should anticipate their needs well in advance and then let fuel distributors know how much they will want," Ulrich said.

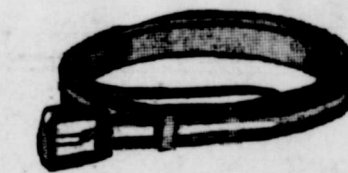
