Ballots for the July 24th Democratic Primary were printed Thursday, to be in readiness for the beginning of absentee voting Monday, July 5th.

The ballot lists the names of 48 candidates for State, Congressional and Senatorial offices. Largest number of candidates, eleven, are listed for the office of United States Senator, followed by eight candidates seeking the office of Governor.

Only county offices in which leading candidates will go into the second primary are the race for County Judge, with three aspirants and for Sheriff, in which four candidates seek the nomination.

In precinct races, three candidates seek the office of Commissioner in Precinct 1 and Precinct 2, while this post in Precinct 3 and 4 will be settled in the first primary, only two candidates being listed for Commissioner in the two precincts.

Run-off is also indicated in the race for Public Weigher of Precinct 1, in which five candidates seek the office, and for Weigher in Precinct 7, while four candidates seek the post.

Two office-seekers who had previously filed for a place on the ballot dropped out of the running this week. They were Mrs. Alice Johnson, who withdrew from the race for County Treasurer, and H. B. Brundiger, who had filed for Commissioner in Precinct 1.

Draft Registration Starts Aug. 16th. The first registration under the new peace-time draft will be on Aug. 16, national defense officials at Washington have announced.

The delay is necessary, they said, in order to give the proposed 4,000 draft boards throughout the nation a chance to get organized.

These officials estimated that by Aug. 30 the first questionnaires will be in the mail to draft-eligible men in the 19-through-25 age group. After they are classified, the oldest of the 1-A's will be called up first.

Just A Presidential Year

The nation is in the first phase of a presidential campaign that will result in an increase of partisan thinking and a decrease of intelligent voting.

President Truman, in his trip to the West, denounced Congress and his criticism was promptly taken up by Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio who suggested that Congress "might as well adjourn."

This is not the best atmosphere for an intelligent debate of the issues but it has been apparent for sometime that "politics" is more important than the issues that confront the country. Both parties have been guilty of playing politics, with the result that the general welfare of the nation suffers—even though the politicians pick up the support of certain minority groups.

A "New" Grass

A new "wonder" grass is reported by D. W. Fortenbery, of the Kentucky Seed Improvement Association, who says that it is almost impervious to drought, flooding, weeds and rust.

Farmers of Haskell County, interested in stock raising, might find the information profitable. The grass was discovered in 1887 by William M. Suiter, atop a rugged, eroding hillside. It has been under development at the University of Kentucky since 1946 and more than 50,000 acres of "Ky.-31 Fescue" are under cultivation. In addition, it is being used widely in some of the Southern States.

The grass is described as a rank, coarse, rapidly-growing, tall grass of the well-known Fescue type and its admirer says it can be used for erosion control, in clay, gravel or cinder areas on lawns.

Fescue is the popular name of a genus of grasses of wide geographical distribution but particularly numerous in the temperate regions. Some twenty-five species are found in North America. Some varieties attain a height of two or three feet, but, for the most part, they rarely grow higher than a foot. The grass produces fine herbage and the species has received the attention of agriculturists for a number of years.

Veterans News

The Veterans Administration has inaugurated a comprehensive follow-up program designed to enhance and prolong the effects of hospital treatment among the thousands of veterans suffering from tuberculosis.
 More than 13,000 veterans suffering from tuberculosis now are under the care of VA. A total of 80,763 veterans are receiving compensation or pensions for tuberculosis.
 Cooperating in the program are all of VA's 126 hospitals and 70 regional offices.
 VA's follow-up program is designed to discover relapses among tuberculosis sufferers early so that further treatment may be instituted promptly.
 It further is designed to help prevent advanced disease and thus contribute toward the safeguarding of others through the control of communicable tuberculosis.
 Seventy national and state organizations now are authorized to present and prosecute claims against the Veterans Administration in behalf of veterans and their dependents.
 They have been recognized by the Administrator of Veterans Affairs under section 200, Public Law 344, 74th Congress. Under the law, organizations' representatives may not charge for services rendered.
 VA generally may recognize only state or government services, or organizations granted a charter or recognition by an act of Congress.

TEC Will Aid Cotton Farmers Needing Seasonal Workers

Cotton Farmers are urged to contact The Texas Employment Commission whenever they need cotton choppers or other farm workers. The Stamford TEC Office serves both agricultural and non-agricultural employers in Haskell, Throckmorton, Stonewall and Jones Counties, Clay Beaver, Manager, emphasized today.
 In preparations for handling local and migratory labor during the cotton harvest season the TEC Office is now conducting an extensive survey among the farmers in the four counties served by the Stamford Office. In this survey it is hoped to obtain information concerning acreage, housing facilities available, number of workers needed for an average crop harvest, with other necessary information toward rendering a much needed service to the individual farmers and to the community as a whole. Mr. Beaver stated that the office is receiving excellent cooperation from farmers, ginners and others who are being contacted.

Simple Formula Will 'Green Up' Yellow Shrubs, Agent Says

Shrubs, shade trees or fruit trees in the yard that have yellow leaves on them can be given a little medicine to turn the leaves green again, says Louise Newman County Home Demonstration Agent.
 To correct the yellow color that comes into leaves in Haskell County landscapes about this time of year, add about a pound of copperas and sulphur for every large shrub or small tree. Fertilizers mixed with the soil at the same time will also help prevent yellow formation in the leaves.
 Spread a vegetable mulch four or five inches deep around the shrubs to keep their roots from dying out when the temperatures soar this summer. The mulch holds the moisture in the soil where the plant can get it. The mulch, spread over an area of several square feet and several inches thick, will gradually work itself into the ground.
 Several different things can be used for mulching plants. Compost, grass cuttings, straw or any material are all good. The grass cuttings are good plant materials furnishing nitrogen and other plant foods. Another advantage of grass clippings is that they help make the soil acid, making iron available to the plants. Do not use fresh Bermuda clippings as mulch for rose beds.
 Most of Texas soils have enough iron in them, but sometimes it is combined with other materials and cannot be used by the plants. However, when the soil is made slightly acid, the iron is released and taken up by the plant.
 In the blacklands, limestone regions and other areas where there is much lime in the soil, the iron may also be present but in combination with lime. This is another case where the iron is not available to plant uses. Ceniza guajillo and some of the other plants common to west and southwest Texas need alkaline or lime soils, and do not need the sulphur mixture.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—My brother was blinded while in service during World War II. Is he entitled to anything to help him overcome his handicap?
 A.—A blind veteran entitled to compensation for a service-connected disability may receive, at Government expense, a guide dog and various other devices necessary to assist him overcome his handicap.
 Q.—If I go to a private physician to determine whether I need hospital treatment or domiciliary care, will the government pay the cost of the examination?
 A.—The Government will pay the cost of examination by private physician only if Veterans Administration has given the physician prior authority for such examination.
 Q.—How much time do I have in which to complete my education under the provision of the G-I Bill?
 A.—Your education, under the benefits provided in the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G-I Bill) must be completed 9 years after July 25, 1947.
 Q.—What is the maximum period of training a disabled veteran may receive under the provision of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.
 A.—Four years is the maximum, but Veterans Administration may extend the time if factors in any case warrant an additional period for the rehabilitation of the disabled veteran.



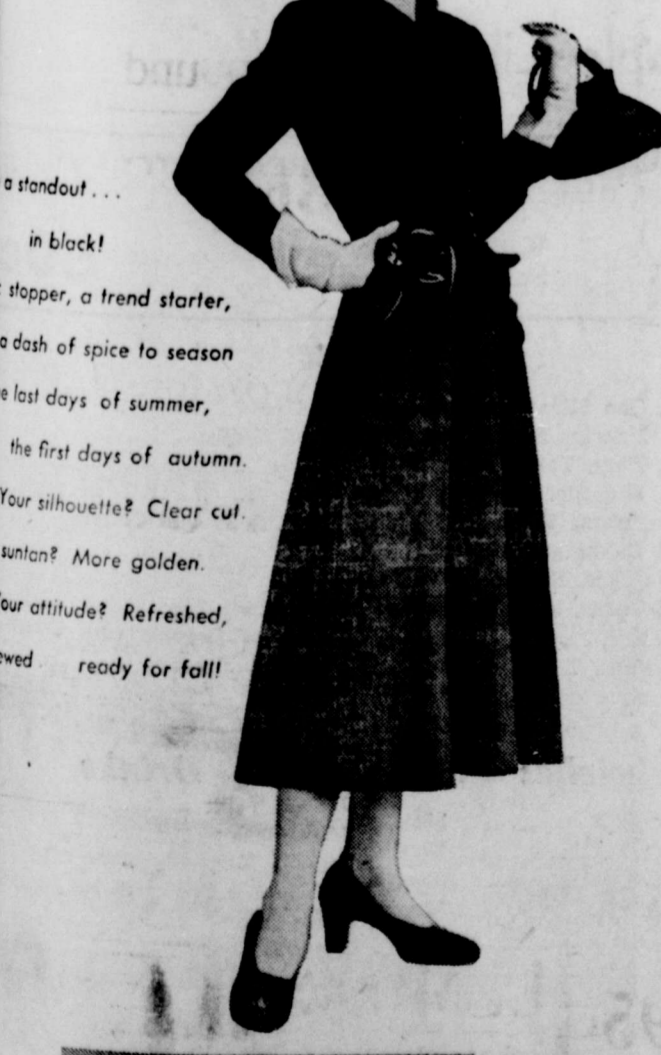

Wheat Support for 1948 Is Set At \$2 Per Bushel

The Agriculture Department announced Wednesday that it will support grower prices of 1948 crop wheat at a national average of \$2 a bushel at the farm.
This compares with a \$1.84 support price for last year's crop and with an average of \$2.11 received by farmers on June 15 from regular markets.
The department will support prices by means of loans to growers. However, government buying for shortage areas abroad will provide indirect support.
Loan rates will vary by locations where the grain is stored and by grades. Generally speaking, rates are the highest at terminal markets. Such rates cover cost of moving grain from the farm to markets.
Although terminal rates are considerably above the national farm average of \$2, a farmer would net no more on grain stored on farms. Transportation and handling costs make up the difference.
The support program is designed to assure growers at least 90 per cent of the parity price of grain as of July 1. The July 1 parity price was determined to be \$2.22 a bushel.

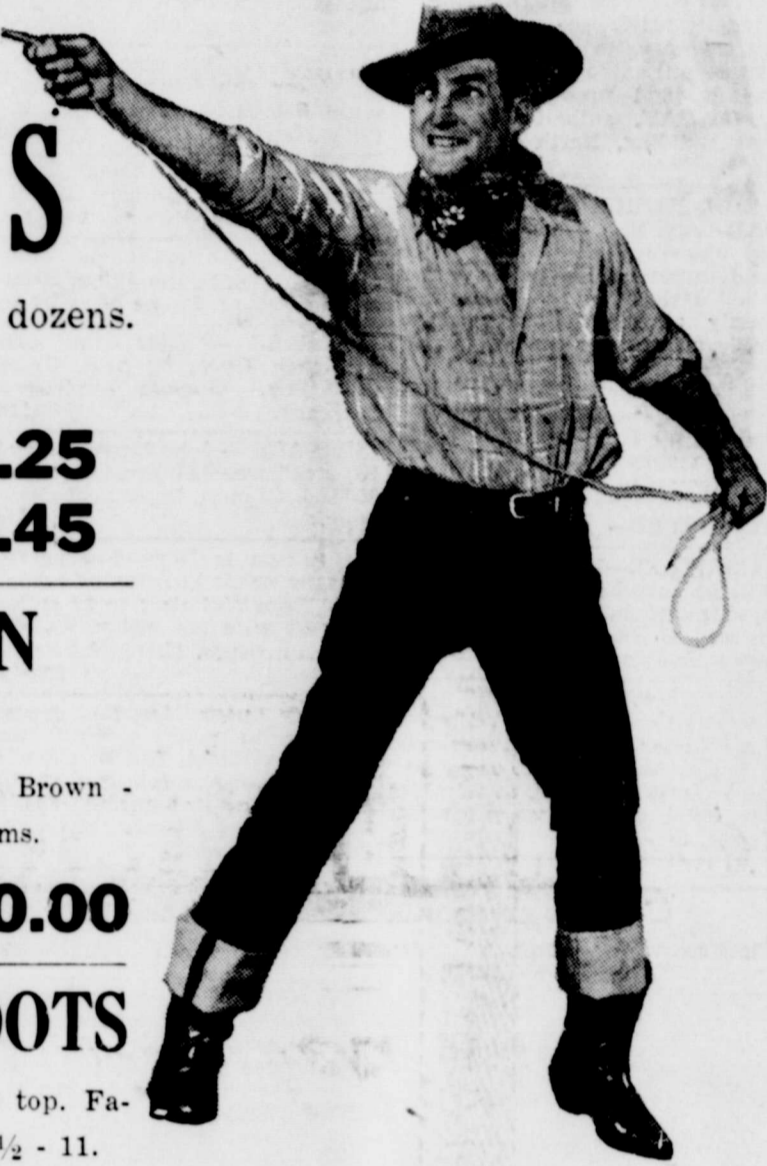
