Governor Jester Will Participate When Huge New Mill Opens In Ft. Worth

Gov. Beauford Jester of Texas will press the button which will set in motion the great machinery of the Burrus Feed Mills' new \$2,000,000 plant north of Fort Worth at the opening day ceremonies on July 22.

Acceptance by the Governor of the special invitation extended him was announced by Wiley Akins, manager of Burrus Feed Mills.

Besides starting the mill into operation, Governor Jester will speak. The ceremonies, beginning at 12:30 noon, will be carried on two radio networks, the Texas Quality Network and the Lone Star Chain.

"The new mill means much to our State and to our entire section of the nation and so we are happy that our Governor will honor the occasion with his presence," Akins said.

"Many leading business men, not only of Texas, but of the dozen states of the Southwest and Southeast into which our products go, will be present and

from almost a dozen Latin American nations, where likewise our feeds go, there will be representative business men and leading livestock raisers, dairymen, and poultrymen.

"Texas is traditional for its hospitality and the Governor embodies that tradition, personality and officially."

The new Texco mill is one of the largest feed mills in the world and engineers declare it the most modern ever built. The plant will offer an enlarged market for farm and ranch products and will produce, in an adequate volume, a full line of feeds.

★ It is recorded May 9, 1945, in 188 S.W. Reporter 2d series, page 276, that James P. Hart, opponent of Judge Rawlins, was one of the attorneys for the labor unions in their unsuccessful and ill-advised attempt to enjoin the State Officials from enforcing the Texas law regulating labor unions, which was passed with the view of protecting public interest.

★ The Appellate Court, in upholding the law forbidding the unions from collecting work permit fees from non-union employees, reorganized the policy expressed by the Legislature in the preamble to the Act: "The right to work is the right to live."

★ Judge John Rawlins is under no obligation to either labor or capital. He is now completing 20 years of service as a State Trial Judge. He is a family man, a World War veteran, and a church worker. He has the endorsement of the Dallas Bar Association and is interested only in administering the law fairly and impartially in the interest of the public at large. He is a graduate of Texas University and Texas Christian University.

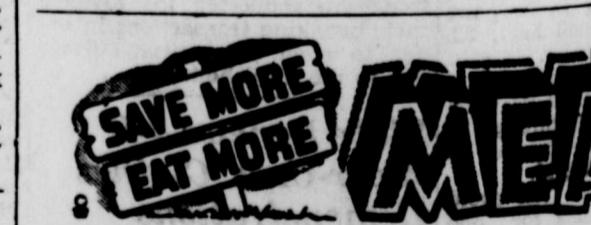

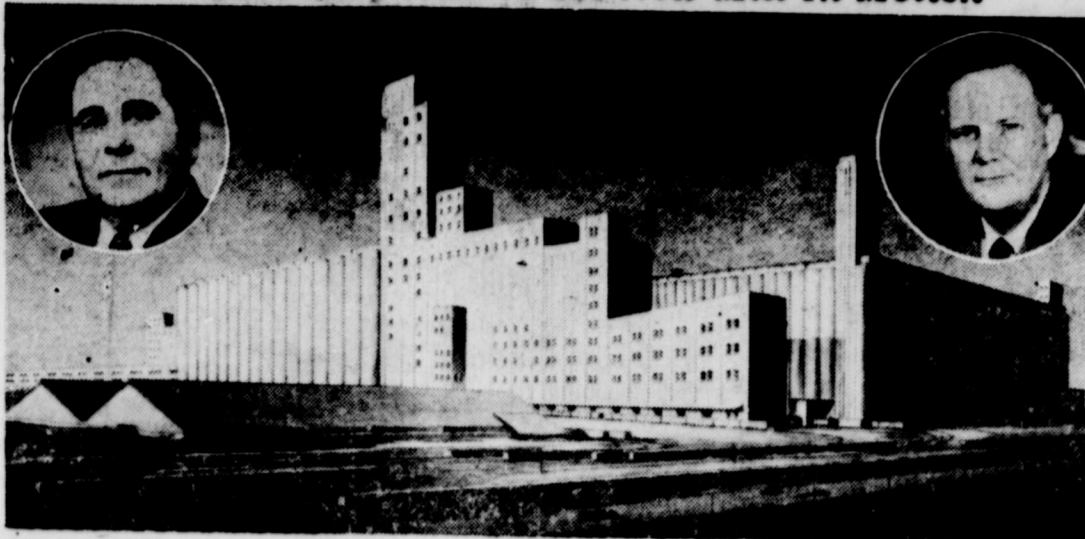

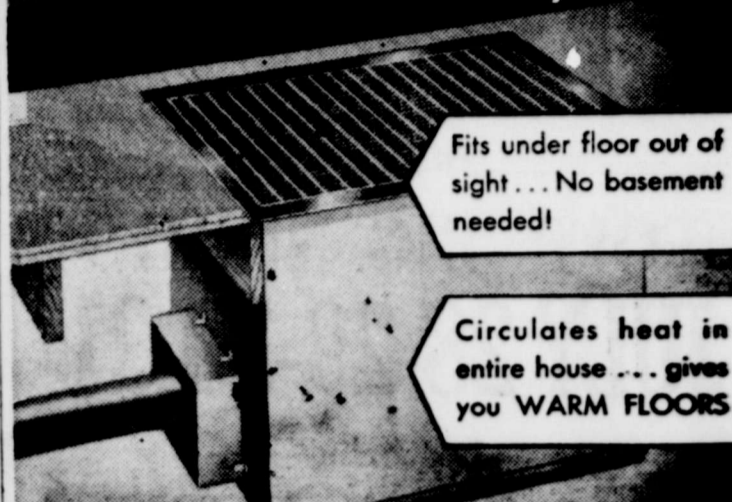

- Tomato Soup with Crisp Crackers
- Chef's Potato Salad (Recipe below)
- Pan Rolls Butter or Margarine
- Sliced Potatoes with Plain Cakes
- Iced Tea with Lemon Wedges

Chef's Potato Salad

Broadcast: July 24, 1948

- 1/2 cup finely cut onion
- 1 1/2 cups diced ham
- 2 tablespoons meat drippings*
- 1/2 cup diced American cheese
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 1/2 cups diced, cooked potatoes
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley (see note)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup cut-up pickles, sweet or dill
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 3 tablespoons water
- 1/2 cup Fat Milk

Cook onion slowly 5 min. in meat drippings. Blend in mixture of flour, sugar, dry mustard, salt and pepper. Stir in vinegar and water. Boil and stir 2 min., then stir into milk. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Do not chill, but serve at once. If desired, garnish with egg slices, salad greens and strips of cheese and meat. Makes 4 servings.

*Salad oil or vegetable shortening also can be used.

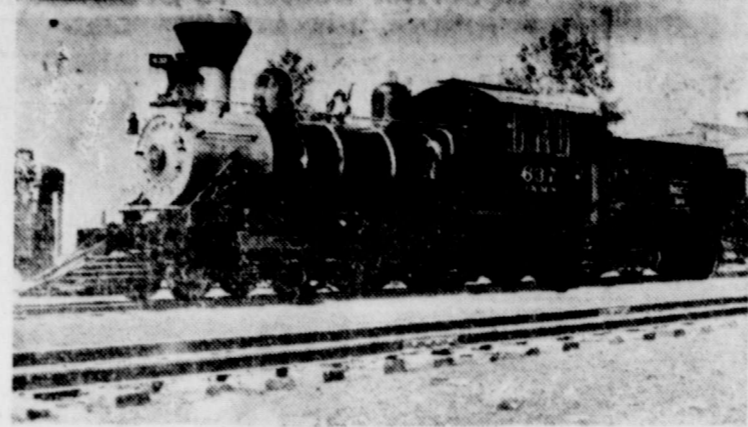

Veterans' Encampment
Women Will Host

Thousands of World War II veterans may lose the opportunity to reinstate National Service Life Insurance worth many millions of dollars unless they act before August 1, the Veterans Administrations says.

After July 31, veterans whose NSLI term policies have lapsed more than three months must take physical examinations to qualify as insurable risks. Before August 1, veterans have only to sign a comparative health statement.

Eligible veterans may reinstate any amount of term insurance up to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500 regardless of the length of time it has lapsed under present liberal regulations if they apply before August 1.

They need only fill out a simple application form, in which they state that their health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two years.

Members of the Veterans Administration provide automobile conveyances for World War II who in the past lost the use of one or more limbs.

Q. Where do I get an application blank to reinstate NSLI policies?
 A. VA form 9-353A should be filled out and mailed to VA or before July 31, 1948. Blanks can be obtained from the nearest VA office, the service officer of any veterans' organization, the American Red Cross or most insurance agents.

Q. How much will it cost to reinstate my GI insurance?
 A. Your application for reinstatement should be accompanied by at least two monthly premiums in the amount of insurance that you had at that time. If you wish a smaller amount, reduce your premium payment accordingly. For example, if you paid \$6.50 a month for \$10,000 while in service and you want only \$1,000 now, you should send VA two premiums of 65 cents each, and continue to pay 65 cents every 30 days to prevent further lapse.

Q. If I cannot afford the full \$10,000 can a lesser amount be reinstated?
 A. Yes. Application may be made for amount from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500.

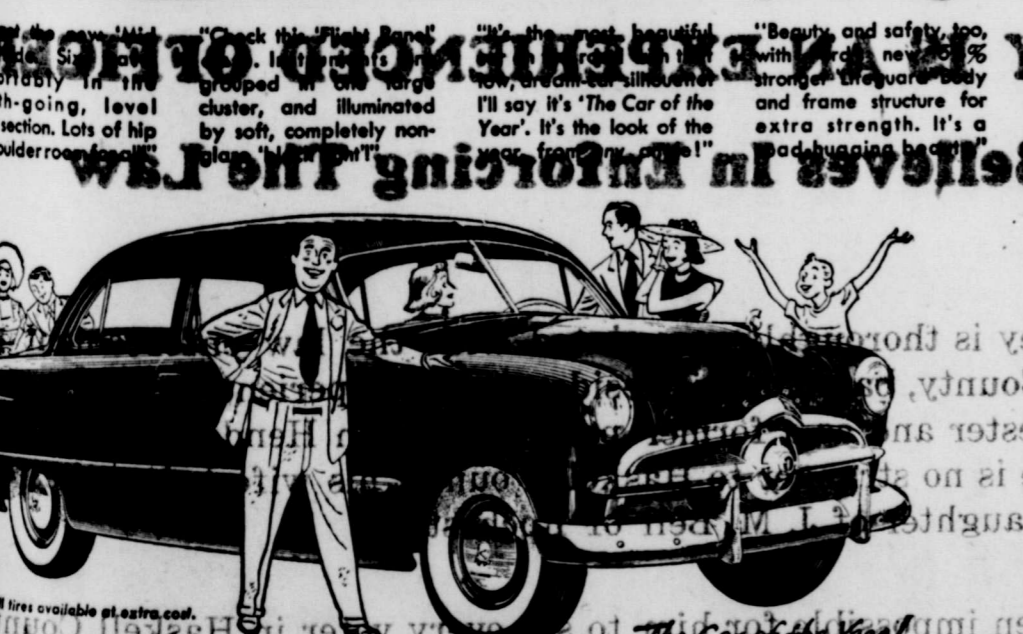

Four Chaplains Give Up Lifejackets To Troops; Awarded DSC Posthumously

Four army chaplains who gave their lifejackets to other men aboard a sinking troop transport have been posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the War Department announced today.

The chaplains, all first lieutenants, were Clark V. Poling, husband of Mrs. Elizabeth J. Poling of Schenectady, N. Y., and son of Dr. Daniel Poling, editor of "The Christian Herald"; John P. Washington, son of Mrs. Mary Washington of Newark, N. J.; Alexander D. Goode, husband of Mrs. Theresa F. Goode of Washington, D. C.; and George L. Fox, husband of Mrs. George Fox of Chicopee Falls, Mass.

Chaplains Poling, Fox, Goode, and Washington were passengers aboard the troop transport SS Dorchester when it was torpedoed off Greenland early on the morning of February 3, 1943. With complete disregard of their own safety, the chaplains made their way on deck and went among the confused, fear-stricken men, encouraging them, praying with them and assisting them into lifeboats and lifejackets.

According to affidavits of Dorchester survivors, fear of the icy water had made many aboard almost helpless, convinced as they were that such a plunge could bring only death. The chaplains calmed their fears, and are given credit for saving many men by persuading them to go overboard where there was a chance of rescue.

Throughout the whole episode, the chaplains set a supreme example of courage and calmness, the War Department declared.

Many of the survivors reported seeing the chaplains standing together on the Dorchester's forward deck, handing out lifebelts from a box. When the box was empty, each chaplain removed his own priceless lifejacket and gave it to another man. They must have known, it was pointed out, that in doing so they were sacrificing their own lives.

The ship was sinking by the bow when men in the water and in lifeboats saw the chaplains link arms and raise their voices in prayer. They were still on the deck together, praying, when the stricken ship made her final plunge.

"The extraordinary heroism and devotion of these men of God," Chaplain (Brigadier General) William R. Arnold, Chief of Chaplains, said, "has been an unwavering beacon for the thousands of chaplains of the armed forces. Their example has inspired and strengthened men everywhere.
