Electric Industry Serves Forty Million Customers

Forty-millionth customer of the electric industry came on the line sometime between Sept. 15, Ernest R. Campbell, president of the Edison Electric Institute, advised Price...

termed the extraordinary post-war growth of customer demand for electric service, Mr. Campbell pointed out that the demand for electric service in West Texas...

In keeping with its policy of anticipating future need, Mr. Campbell said, the West Texas Utilities Company is now engaged in an \$18,000,000 construction program to build new facilities and to enlarge and im-

prove existing ones. Much of the material for this program, which has been underway for many months, was ordered as early as Sept., 1946.

During the working-day hour in which the 40-millionth became a customer approximately 1200 other new customers were connected at that rate. Since V-J Day, three years ago, the electric industry has added more than 6 million customers. The first six months of 1948 have seen 1,123,000 new customers added to power lines. Of this number, 1,015,000 are rural and urban users, Mr. Acker pointed out.

About 88 per cent of the total of 40,000,000 customers are residential and rural consumers. Commercial customers, including such business enterprises as the smaller stores, shops, filling stations, theaters, and hotels, make up about 13 per cent of the total. The remaining 1 per cent includes large industrial plants, electrified railways and railroads, street and highway lighting, and government authorities.

Of a total of 39,750,000 family dwellings occupied in the U. S. at the end of 1947, according to a U. S. census estimate, about 97 per cent now have electricity available, and 94 per cent are actually taking service, Mr. Acker said. Although saturation in this field seems near at hand, new construction of homes and continued population growth will provide continuous increases in the number of customers during the coming years.

Of the 40-million customers taking electric service, about 32-million or over 82 per cent of the total, are customers of the business-managed electric companies. The remaining 7,100,000, about 18 per cent, are customers of government agencies of various types; REA cooperatives, state projects, and power districts serve only 2.6 million customers. Federal projects, such as TVA and Bonneville, serve a very small number of ultimate customers, mostly large industrial users.

Veterans' News

Thousands of veterans who contracted malaria overseas during World War II have been cured, the VA reports.

Within the next few years, the problem of relapse from war-acquired malaria will be an insignificant one, VA added.

The rate of cures is indicated by VA statistics. During June, 1947, approximately 130,000 veterans were receiving compensation for malaria incurred in service.

The number of relapses also has declined, from approximately 500,000 cases infected during the war to less than 10,000 at present.

The parasite eventually "burns itself out" in human bodies in from one to three years, although some cases are known to have remained infected for as long as 20 years.

Use of the drugs chloroquine, pamaquine (plasmochin), and the more recently synthesized 8-amino quinolines, such as pentaquine and isopentaquine, have given splendid results, VA said.

Nearly 5,000,000 veteran holders of National Service Life Insurance have not yet converted their term policies to permanent forms of insurance.

The term policies in force represent more than \$31 billion.

More than half of the veterans holding NSLI policies have selected 20-payment life plans. These number 832,190, or 55 per cent of the 1,512,150 permanent NSLI policies in force on June 30.

Permanent NSLI policies amounted to more than \$6.50 billions worth of insurance.

Questions and Answers

Q.—Does a veteran who has become eligible for a loan guaranty through separation from service, lose his eligibility by returning to active duty in the armed forces?

A.—If he has become eligible once, he remains eligible, provided he can meet the other requirements of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act and regulations in regard to the guaranty.

Q.—Is a veteran entitled to a loan guaranty while he is receiving compensation or while he is going to school under the G-1 Bill?

A.—Yes. Q.—I signed a statement before my discharge that I had a disability before I enlisted in the armed forces. Will this statement

A.—No. Under the law any statement of this nature which you may have made at discharge is considered null and void.

Q.—Under what circumstances are parents considered dependents?

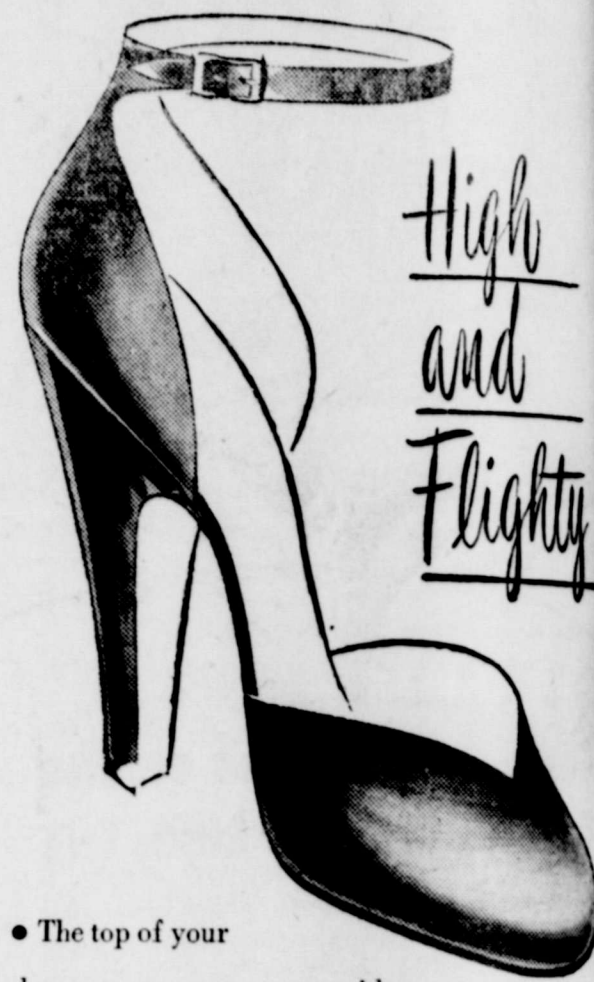

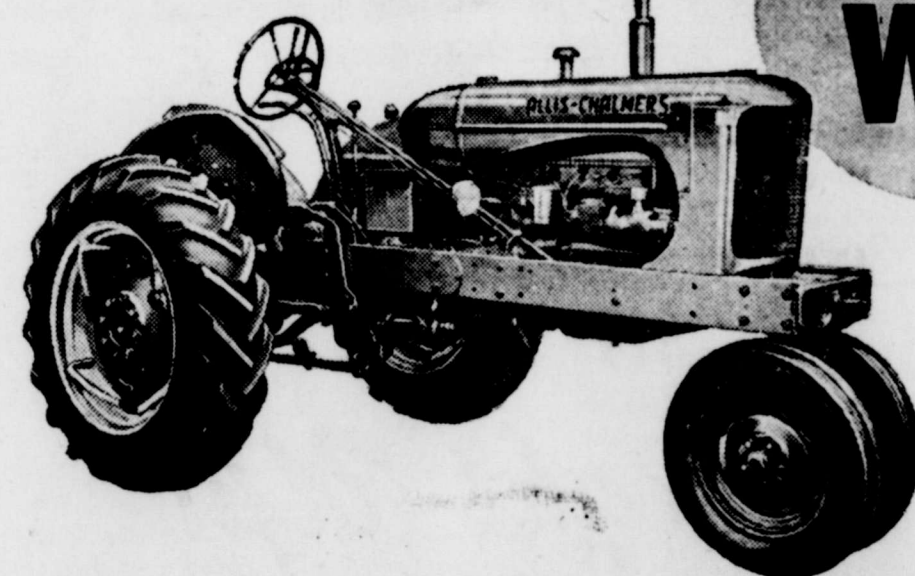

Farmers Advised to Prepare Land Now For Cover Crops

This is the time to prepare land for winter cover crops. Fall plantings of vetch and rye, Hubbard clover, Madrid clover, alfalfa, or Austrian winter peas should be made during the latter part of September up through November. These cover crops are well adapted to all the soils, while the clovers and peas grow well on the heavier soils. To get the most benefit from the legume crop for soil improvement and vigorous plants it is necessary to inoculate the seed with the correct inoculant just before planting. Complete instructions may be found on the can.

On the sandier soils it has been found advantageous to apply 200 to 300 pounds of superphosphate fertilizer on the land and risk it under in order to have it close to the seed when they are planted. Superphosphate and the seed can be drilled into the land in a single operation. This applies especially to vetch. Clover is usually planted in 36 inch rows.

Additional information regarding these crops follows: Austrian winter peas are annual winter legumes which may be used for green manure, erosion control, and hay when grown with small grain. The seed weigh sixty lbs. per bushel. They are well adapted

to the well drained heavy and medium textured soils of this locality. The seed should be planted in September or October. If drilled alone, plant 30 to 35 pounds per acre. If broadcast alone, plant 35 to 40 pounds per acre. Plant 15 to 20 pounds per acre with small grain. Cover about 2 inches deep in moist soil or 3 inches deep in dry soil. Use commercial inoculant on all fields.

Sweet clovers are useful as erosion control, soil improving, hay, or grazing crops. The Hubbard sweet clover is an annual white clover which is best adapted to well drained heavy soils, while the Madrid sweet clover is a biennial yellow clover. Clean seed weigh 60 pounds per bushel. When planted in rows, during September or October, plant 3 to 5 pounds per acre, and cover with about one half or three fourths inch of soil. Clover will yield 200 to 300 pounds of seed per acre, and provide 1/2 to one animal unit grazing per acre.

Vetch is a widely adapted annual winter legume which is used as green manure, erosion control, grazing and hay crop when grown with small grain. This crop is best adapted to medium

and sandy soils, but also does well on the heavy well drained soils. It is advisable to inoculate the seed before planting. September and October are the best months for planting. Seed should be covered 2 or 3 planting rates for vetch and small grain are recommended by the California Creek Soil Conservation District: Vetch and rye; on tight land, 15 lbs. vetch and 15 pounds abruzzi rye, or 10 pounds Balboa rye; on sandy loam, 12 pounds vetch and 20 pounds abruzzi rye; on sandy land, 10 pounds vetch and 30 pounds abruzzi rye or 20 lbs. Balboa rye. Vetch and oats; on tight land or sandy loam, 10 pounds vetch and 1 bushel oats. On deep sands do not use together, plant rye only with vetch. Vetch and wheat; on tight land and sandy loam, plant 10 pounds vetch and 25 pounds of wheat. Do not plant vetch with wheat on deep sands, plant with rye.

Even though legume seeds are scarce, the indications are that a lot of land will be put to their use. Those of you who plan to plant a winter cover crop of vetch, clovers, peas, or alfalfa, may find seed at your neighbors, or at local seed dealers. This is

Care Advised In Conversion of Gas Appliances

With the coming of cool weather, J. E. Walling, Jr., president of the Texas Butane Dealers Association, issued a warning to users and prospective users of butane and propane gas against trying to convert natural gas appliances to the use of butane and propane, due to the radical differences in the two gases, and the difference in design of the two types of appliances.

Not only is this practice illegal according to the regulations of the Texas Railroad Commission, but it is also unsafe and minimizes the efficiency of such appliances, he explained.

Since butane and propane both have certain characteristics which require special engineering

adaptations in burner construction, it is considered unwise and hazardous for inexperienced and non-licensed persons to install or adjust appliances using these fuels. Persons getting ready for

the winter should have their fuel dealer check the burner and appliances explained Walling.

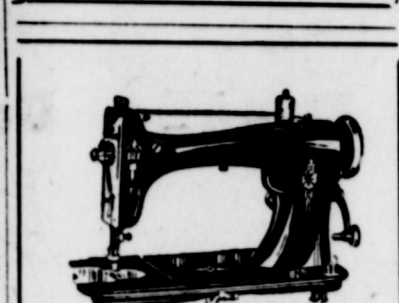

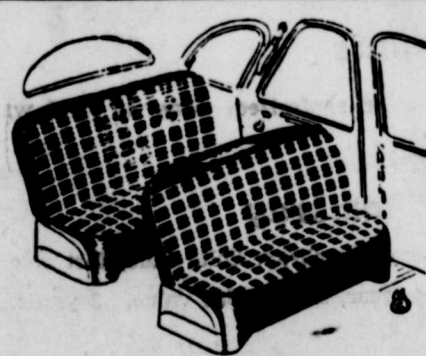

of which normally are deducted from the combined fees and ex-officio salary so as to arrive at the Sheriff's net salary of \$3,750 and then any excess must be paid back to the County. For the years from 1940 through 1946, the average grocery bill for feeding prisoners was approximately \$2,300.00 per year, which was deducted as expense, without exception. In September, 1947, the Commissioners Court placed a limit of \$720.00 per year on the feeding of prisoners and the balance the Sheriff must pay out of his own net salary regardless of the number of prisoners kept. This is only one expense deduction taken away in addition to others. In effect, it forces the Sheriff, after making his salary to pay a substantial portion of this supposedly net salary back for normal expenses of office, expense which should, and have been previously deductible as expenses.

"I have repeatedly requested the County Judge and the Commissioners Court to pay the expenses as listed above, furnish one automobile for the Sheriff's Department and pay the annual salary as set by Statute. This they have persistently refused to do.

"I shall be most happy to pay any amount in excess fees I have received on the basis of an equitable and fair expense deduction allowed to Sheriffs of Haskell County previous to my office, plus a corrected audit. Until this is done, I have no alternative but to refuse.

"For the year 1946, my gross income from the Sheriff's office was more than the year 1947. During that year (1946) the recorded audit will show that I lacked \$836.11 of receiving my \$3,750.00 maximum. In the year 1947, the same auditor who audited my books in 1946, claims that with less gross income in 1947, I owe the County the sum of \$2,198.67 for that year (1947), making a difference of over \$3,000.00.

"If this is a legitimate claim against me as Sheriff, why does the Commissioners Court not go into a Court of Law where the case will be adjudicated on its merits instead of arbitrarily taking it upon themselves to adjudicate it by their act of cutting off the Sheriff's salary. I feel that this action is a greater injustice to Haskell County rather than me personally due to the fact that it does not permit me to have the necessary help for the protection of the citizens.

"In all fairness, I will state that from the beginning of my administration in 1945, there was never any disagreement nor misunderstanding between the Sheriff's Department and the Commissioners Court and County Judge until June, 1947.

"Since I feel that the people of this County are entitled to know more of the particulars involved in this case, I have taken this means to advise you accordingly.

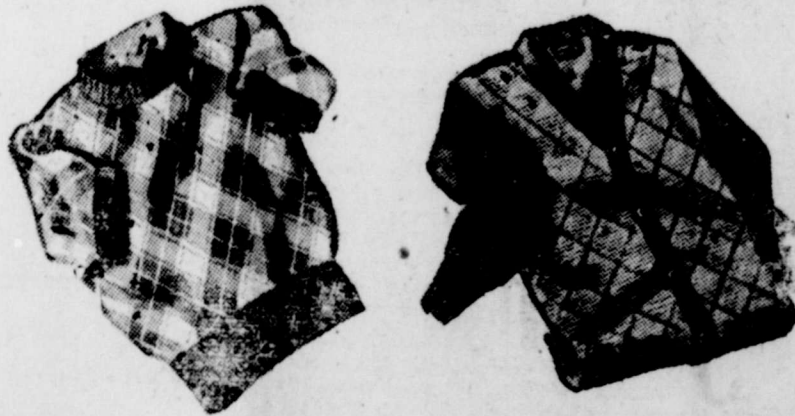
