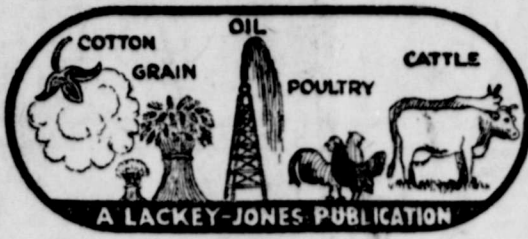

Mexican Farmer Fatally Injured In Unusual Accident On Sego Farm Tuesday Afternoon

John Acosta, 50-year-old Mexican farmer of Haskell, died from loss of blood in the Haskell County Hospital Tuesday following an accident on the farm of Bob Sego 6 miles west of Haskell.

As an aftermath of the accident, a charge of drunken driving was filed against Perez, and he was fined \$100 and his driver's license revoked.

Acosta was working in a cotton field on the Sego farm Tuesday afternoon when a car, driven by another Mexican, George Perez of Haskell, went out of control and ran through a barbed wire fence into an adjacent cotton field and swerved back through the fence a second time. A length of barbed wire caught on the car was dragged against Acosta's right leg at the back of the knee, causing a deep laceration and almost severing his leg. Acosta was brought to the Haskell hospital where he died a short time after the accident.

Veterans News

Prior notice from the VA will be sent to veterans whose National Service Life Insurance term policies will start expiring on or after Oct. 8, 1948.

The notice will be sent two months before the expiration date of the original policies. This will give the veterans time to convert term insurance to a permanent NSLI plan or renew their term insurance for an additional 5-year period. Renewals may be made without a physical examination, but at a higher premium rate based on the veterans' attained age at the time of renewal.

VA stressed the fact that veterans who plan to renew their term insurance should submit their renewal application, plus a premium payment, prior to the expiration date of the original term policy.

More than a million and a half veterans were in training under the provisions of the GI bill on Sept. 1, 1948, VA reported. Over half—\$71,000—were studying in schools and colleges, with 267,000 enrolled for institutional on-farm training and 414,930 taking training on-the-job.

Encouraging progress, especially in the development of new methods of diagnosis, is revealed in first reports from doctors working with the VA radio-isotope research program.

VA revealed that leukemia patients are now being treated with radio-phosphorus in most of the VA hospitals having radio-isotope units. Radio-iodine is being employed to treat some thyroid diseases.

Questions and Answers

Q—I am a World War II veteran and would like to know if VA will pay my doctor if I go to him for an examination to determine whether I need hospital treatment or domiciliary care?

A.—The government will pay the cost of examinations by a private physician only if VA has given the physician prior authority for such examination.

Q—I have purchased my home without a G-I loan. May I secure a guaranteed loan to buy furniture?

A.—No. Q—I am enrolling under the G-I Bill in a college that collects tuition in advance. There is a chance that I will be forced to drop out before the end of the semester. Must I refund any money to VA?

A.—You must refund the tuition that VA paid for the time you did not attend, or lose the

Brief Items Taken from Old Copies of The Free Press

20 Years Ago—Oct. 11, 1928 W. D. Jones, building contractor of Stamford, burned to death in a fire which destroyed the Evans Hotel in that city Sunday morning.

J. Frank Norris of Ft. Worth addressed a large crowd on the courthouse lawn Wednesday afternoon, discussing issues in the presidential race.

W. N. Wellford and Glenn Edgar, both of Abilene, have purchased the Henderson Tailor Shop and took charge of the business this week.

Last Wednesday night, burglars entered the office of the Wichita Valley depot, and after knocking the knob from the safe, secured about \$19.70 in money, according to Agent Leo Southern, who discovered the theft Thursday morning. Wichita Valley stations at Goree, Seymour and Bomarton also were burglarized the same night, railway officials disclosed.

Thieves entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Murchison last Thursday night while the family was at the fairgrounds, and secured diamonds and jewelry valued at \$2,000 and a small amount of money. The loss was not discovered until the next morning.

The fire department was called to the county jail about noon Saturday, when the ceiling of the west porch on the building was discovered ablaze. The fire was extinguished with only small damage resulting.

Sam Jackson, a Negro, was killed about 10:30 Tuesday night following an altercation with another negro man during a gambling game, Haskell County officials report. Jackson was hit in the head several times with an axe, killing him instantly. The affair occurred on a farm about ten miles northeast of Weimert, and the alleged slayer reported the killing to his employer the following morning.

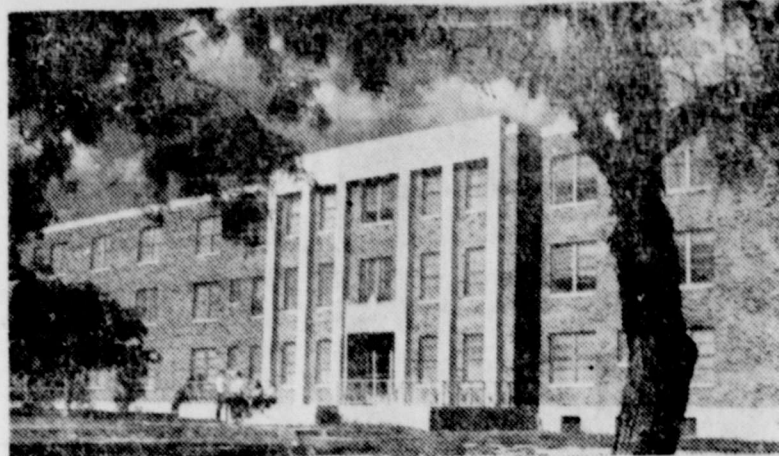
Hunter Memorial Hall Will be Presented To H-SU In Ceremony To Be Held Oct. 13

Abilene will be the world capital of the petroleum industry October 13 when oil and gas executives from all over the

U. S. gather in tribute to the late Judge J. C. Hunter, Abilene oil man, church and civic leader.

Quietly and unknown to the public, American oil men for more than a year have been making personal contributions to a J. C. Hunter Memorial Fund. Not until Sept. 25, when Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, president of Hardin-Simmons University, received notice that the petroleum industry would retire the bank loan on a three-story dormitory for girls, did the news reach the public.

Dr. Richardson said he was proud that so many leaders of the petroleum industry were Texans who had not forgotten the church schools where they obtained their religious and ac-

In the true American way, these successful men have risen to the top by their own efforts. Yet they still remember the schools from which they came, he stated.

Dr. Richardson said that many of the oil leaders were Hardin-Simmons alumni. One of them, Eugene Holman, president of Standard Oil of New Jersey, will speak at the dedication ceremonies.

Judge Hunter, at the time of his death in 1945, was president of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, an organization of gas and oil men operating throughout the middle portion of the U. S. Before the war he was a member of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission. During World War II he served on the Petroleum Industry War Council.

Judge Hunter was chairman of the Hardin-Simmons board of trustees. Before his death he was engaged in a building program at the university.

West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association officials reported that some 600 leaders of the oil industry, independent operators and officials of major companies, would be in Abilene for the dedication.

George A. Hill, Jr., president of the Houston Oil Company, will represent the industry by making the memorial address at the university.

Immediately after the announcement of the October 13 ceremonies in Abilene, independent operators and major oil company officials from the following towns made hotel reservations: New York, Washington, Austin, Houston, Wichita Falls, Vernon, Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Dallas, Corpus Christi, Fort Worth, Tyler, Midland and San Antonio.

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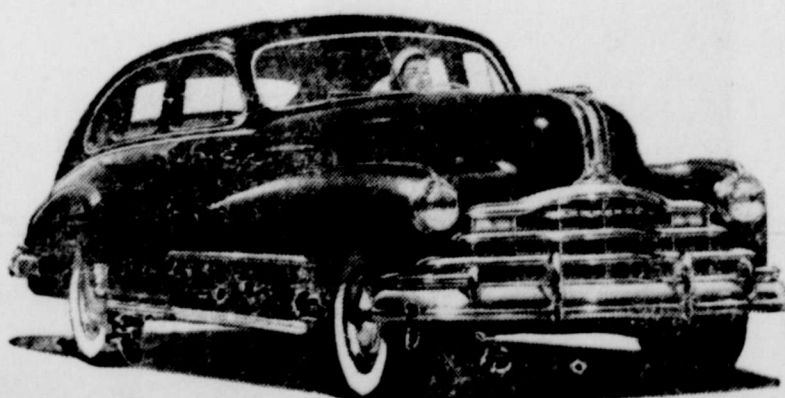

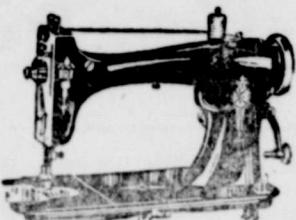

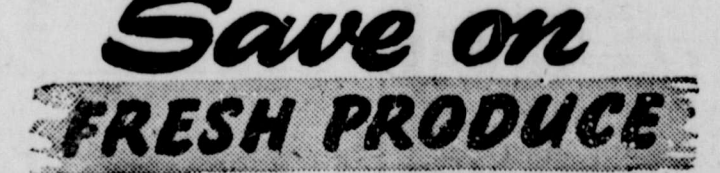

Larger Carry-Over Of Wheat Indicated From '49 Crop

What's ahead for wheat, ask Texas farmers. Here's the answer. Facts and figures in the government wheat outlook sound a note of caution. Now that fall seeding is under way, here are the facts as they are seen by E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, and C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A&M College.

Here's what the wheat growers like. The continued strong demand here in this country should take up 750 million bushels of this year's big crop. This would mean only 20 million bushels less than what we used last year. The European Recovery Program will use around 450 million bushels. The wheat price support for the 1949 crop is 90 per cent of parity through loan and purchase agreements.

And here are a few gloomy facts. The carry-over of wheat stocks next July 1, is expected to be up nearly one-fifth above the prewar level. European wheat production has improved, and will approach the yields they had before the war, if they do not get a stack of bad weather. The U. S. acreage goal has been set 8 per cent below last year's goal, and Texas' recommended seedling goal is down 10 per cent. The storage bins are heavily loaded with this year's big wheat grain sorghum and corn crops.

All in all, it looks like the U. S. and world supplies have improved a bit. Next year's carry-over certainly will be up, and the situation could look a little tough if average yields are had from the acreage goal. The average yields are 71.5 million for the U. S., and 6.5 million for Texas. And another bumper wheat crop in 1949 would probably require marketing quotas for all growers in 1950.

So, it looks like good business to face the facts, says Bates and Miller. If some marginal acres have been in crops that should be returned to pastures, better plan to begin re-sodding now. Increase your summer following and erosion control practices, say these extension specialists, and plant soil-building legumes wherever they are needed.

Plan ahead, plant wisely, and give your soil a break.
