
The Haskell Indians turned in a sparkling performance on Indian Field Friday night in battling the highly-rated Ballinger Bearcats to a 6-6 deadlock.

for Austrian winter pea seed. Mr. J. M. Burns, District co-operator northeast of Sunset school, says that the peas he planted increased his maize yield and gave extra life to his land. Mr. Burns plans to plant more of the peas this year.

These conservation crops are being planted to increase the organic matter in the soil and to prevent blowing in the spring, and for increased production of the cash crops.

Eight Constitutional Amendments will be voted on November 2nd. Have you informed yourself on the merits or demerits of the Amendments?

Believing that many average voters have not had the opportunity to inform themselves on the merits of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted November 2nd, we give you our version of each amendment for what it is worth to you.

AMENDMENT No. 1.

H. J. R. No. 30 On Insurance for County Employees

This Amendment was lobbied through the 50th Legislature by Insurance Companies and other interested organizations. It provides that the Legislature provide for eligibility for County officers and employees. Boiled down, it means the Taxpayer pays the premium on insurance for all County employees.

Study this and vote as your conscience dictates. It means more Taxes.

AMENDMENT No. 7.

H. J. R. No. 24 — On Abolishing State Ad Valorem Tax

H. J. R. No. 24 is a proposed Constitutional Amendment which has for its purpose to repeal your Ad Valorem tax to Farm to Market Road, Soil Conservation, Flood Control. This Amendment is grossly misrepresented and camouflaged to intent and purpose. The real purpose is to repeal the Ad Valorem tax from the Big Corporations, Public Carriers, Public Service Corporations and big property owners, who pay 65% of our Ad Valorem tax, and who live beyond the borders of our state.

Our Ad Valorem tax was written into Constitution more than one hundred years ago. It was levied, if and when needed. Our automobile board did not levy an Ad Valorem tax for 1948, and if we continue to have property tax there will not be an Ad Valorem tax levied in other decade, but we have it as a shock absorber to be used in case of need. If you repeal this your commissioners court can at any time, by proper petition, order an election and assess property the 30 cents, and they would have power to double your renditions on your property.

This Amendment is dangerous, it was lobbied through the 50th Legislature by retained legislators and big corporation lobbyist. It is being lobbied by big corporations, also by some power service organizations who are dominated by the organizations.

The sponsors for repeal of the Ad Valorem tax are the same organizations and personnel who favor a general sales tax. They are the same who favor a ceiling on our social welfare; also, the same sponsors for taking the gasoline refund from the farmer. Also, the Bullwinkle Bill, extending railroads from anti trust laws.

You should consider it a privilege to walk mile to vote against this Amendment. The special interest group will turn out and vote for this amendment; you should help defeat it.

AMENDMENT No. 2.

S. J. R. No. 2 — On Legislative Redistricting

Without detail, this Amendment provides for a Committee to be empowered; same consisting of our Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Attorney General, Land Commissioner, State Comptroller, which will be charged with the task of redistricting; in case our 51st Legislature fails or refuses to redistrict.

We think it to the best interests of West Texas to pass the Amendment, and we shall vote for it.

AMENDMENT No. 3.

H. J. R. No. 13 — On Community Property Laws

This Amendment, if passed, will permit husband and wife to partition their property among themselves; this applies to each for property owned prior to marriage; either may declare their property community property.

Passage of this Amendment will probably strengthen our community property laws, also, offers relief from burdensome inheritance tax. We recommend the passage of this Amendment.

AMENDMENT No. 4.

H. J. R. No. 7 — On Succession to State Office

This Amendment is only to clarify our Constitution in case of death of State Officer Elect prior to inauguration.

While not important, we will vote for this Amendment.

AMENDMENT No. 5.

H. J. R. No. 35 — On Homestead Exemption

PLEASE NOTE THIS AMENDMENT: This Amendment is a companion Amendment to No. 7, H. J. R. No. 24.

Your homestead is already exempt from state Ad Valorem tax. This amendment is to exempt your home from Ad Valorem tax, in case Amendment No. 7, H. J. R. No. 24 should carry, which would repeal the exemption on your homestead.

We will vote for this Amendment, but we caution you to vote against No. 7 Amendment.

AMENDMENT No. 6.

H. J. R. No. 36 — On Elimination Fee System

This Amendment, if carries, will permit Counties to compensate District and County officers, and all County enforcement officers, to be compensated on a salary basis rather than fee basis.

This Amendment may have some merit; it may add to more efficiency in office, but more tax money.

AMENDMENT No. 8.

H. J. R. No. 39 — On Retirement of Judges

This Amendment is a proposed Constitutional Amendment which authorizes the Legislature establish a retirement system for judges and commissioners of the Appellate Courts and judges of the District and Criminal Courts on account of service, age, etc.

We are asked to vote on Amendments of nature every two years. Why not provide retirement for aged merchants, farmers; the Butcher, the Baker, the Candlestick maker. Don't the judges ask to be elected to these offices? Isn't compensation fair, or as much or more than they could make in regular practice. Are not these offices filled by men who seek the office for the money and what it pays?

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce, a vice organization of wide influence, is giving and lobbying for the passage of all eight of the amendments; knowing it will cost the Taxpayer of Texas multiplied millions of dollars, still to come out with a State Budget Policy of:

1. No increase in current tax rates.
2. No new sources of revenue.
3. No new type of expenditures.
4. No increase in recurring expenditures except to meet emergencies as to existing service.
5. Use of surplus only for nonrecurring and necessary capital expenditures.

### Man's Son, Native of West Texas, Is ed 80th Patent on Electrical Device

A promising young engineer from West Texas has just been granted the 80th patent on an electrical device. That beautiful Texas streak on an inventive streak that consistently chalks up patents in the complex field of electronics.

Today, after 21 years with General Electric, Burnice D. Bedford, 524 Riverside Ave., Scotia, N. Y., who is a section engineer in the General Engineering and Consulting Laboratory, has added 80 additional patented inventions to his first

one, for an average of about 4 for each year with the company. His 81st and latest patent, all dealing with electronics, was his innovation to a part of a control circuit of a large electronic frequency changer that was installed in the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation in Braddock, Pa.

The majority of his patents are concerned with power tubes and the conversion of electricity into frequencies used for specialized industrial operations. Much of the country's industrial equipment cannot be operated with the usual 60-cycle current, he explained, so we have to change it over to the frequency required.

Inventing seems to run in the Bedford family — from every direction. His father, who operated the Bedford farm near Winters, Texas, until 1920, was pretty handy when it came to whipping up new gadgets to keep things running smoothly on the farm. One of them was a home-made device that stopped the windmill when it pumped the water in the well below a certain level.

Brother Alda, a former engineer in the G-E Research Lab-

oratory and now a television development engineer, also has more than 80 patents to his credit.

Bedford's aptitude for inventing was evident during his boyhood. On one occasion he and his brother harnessed the power of a windmill to crank a butter churn which saved a lot of physical effort on their part, and also gave them time to build wagons and other toys.

Even while in college he had ideas for prospective inventions in the back of his mind, the principal one being a means for making a variable resistance rotor for a squirrel cage induction motor.

His 11-year old son, Alan, now in the 6th grade at Mohawk School, is already showing signs of developing into his father's footsteps. Showing a marked interest in electrical gadgets, Alan not long ago rigged up an electric buzzer run by batteries and made from parts of an erector set. In drawing class at school he turns in mechanical diagrams and sketches, and has also made elaborate sketches of a design for a soapbox derby car.

Mr. Bedford is one of the nations outstanding authorities on circuit and power controls. During the war years he assisted in designing the controls for the power supply system at the Oak Ridge, Tenn., atomic energy plant.

A native of Winters, Texas, Bedford was graduated from the University of Texas in 1927 with a degree in electrical engineering. He came to General Electric at Schenectady the same year as a student engineer on the Test Course, and later joined the Advanced Engineering Course. Since then he has worked in the electronics department, the G-E Research Laboratory, and for the past 3½ years, in the General Engineering and Consulting Laboratory.

He is the son of J. J. Bedford, resident of Haskell for the past four years.

As homecraft and community living are integral parts of Camp Fire training, it is not surprising that Camp Fire Girls are aware that the number one problem in the home today is the high cost of food.

During Better Breakfast Week, Camp Fire Girls plan to publicize such facts about breakfast and economy as these: A breakfast supplying from one-quarter to one-third of an individual's daily nutritional requirements can be served at a cost of only 15 cents per person in the home. This is a breakfast that follows a basic pattern of fruit, cereal, milk, bread and butter. When compared with the cost of other meals, breakfast stands out as the thriftiest meal of the day. The cost of breakfast this year hasn't risen a penny over last year's figure. It's the only meal that has succeeded in holding the line against rising food costs.

Double emphasis on the economy of breakfast is given by a recent bulletin from the U. S. Department of Agriculture which states that the most efficient use of food is made early in the day. Studies prove that food eaten early in the day—as at breakfast—is digested and absorbed largely during the most active daytime hours.

Recent Changes In Federal Social Security Act Increases Payments To Aged People

Payments to those who are dependent upon Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children will be increased an average of about \$2.00 on October 1, 1948, as a result of recent changes in the Federal Social Security Act, according to Mrs. Ita R. Parrish, Field Worker of the Department of Public Welfare, Haskell.

In the regular session of the 80th Congress, the Federal formula was changed and provides about 44 per cent Federal to 36 per cent State. There is no Federal money allocated any State except on this matching basis.

Had not additional Federal money been made available, it would have been necessary to reduce old age assistance checks between \$2.00 and \$3.00 for each month of the present fiscal year, starting with September, but it is now possible to raise all recipients of old age assistance and aid to Needy Blind about \$2.00, and to adopt a maximum of \$50.00 for these two programs and \$27.00 for the first child in the family and \$18.00 for each additional child in the Aid to Dependent Children Program. The additional funds will be used in these three ways: To avoid what would have been a \$2.00 to \$3.00 cut in payments each month; to increase payments approximately \$2.00; and to provide for payments to new persons coming on the rolls.

In September there were 207,143 old age assistance checks mailed out, averaging \$31.57. In October this average will be about \$33.57, with a similar raise in aid to Needy Blind and aid to dependent children.

The Texas Constitution prohibits expenditure of more than 35 million dollars for the three assistance programs in any one year in the state. The Legislature has appropriated this amount as follows:

\$1 million for old age assistance; 3 million for aid to dependent children; and 1 million for aid to the needy blind.

Other areas reporting substantial additions to payrolls were Dallas, 1200; Corpus Christi, 800; Fort Worth, 700; San Antonio, 600; Lubbock, 600; and Amarillo 300. Decreases in employment appeared in the Harlingen - Brownsville area; Beaumont-Port Arthur; Galveston-Texas City and minor losses were noted in the Texarkana and San Angelo areas.

Employment At Record Peak In State

An all-time high for non-agricultural employment by mid-October was predicted Saturday by the Texas Employment Commission.

Such employment passed the 2,279,000 mark in August and a mid-October total of 2,313,000 workers gainfully employed was forecast.

TEC based its mid-October forecast on non-agricultural employment upon employers' statements that 33,700 additional workers will be added to Texas' already bulging labor market. Seven thousand two hundred of these new workers will be added by factories.

Retail trade enjoyed the greatest gain in August with the addition of 2,300 employees. Gains were scattered but showed up more consistently in the northern and western parts of the state.

Wholesale trade employment advanced sporadically, but a net loss was attributed chiefly to seasonal slow-down in food processing. Governmental establishments picked up 2,000 workers with San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Texarkana, Wichita Falls, and Brownsville showing most substantial gains.







Mr. and Mrs. Burwell Cox, Pioneer Haskell Couple, Observe 50th Wedding Anniversary

Mr. and Mrs. Burwell Cox, one of the first couples to settle permanently in Haskell at the turn of the century when this section was first being developed, and who have been actively identified with church and civic progress of the community for almost half a century, celebrated their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary October 4th at their home in this city. Highlight of the observance was a dinner at the family home with their children and grandchildren present.

Mr. and Mrs. Cox are truly Haskell pioneers. In 1888, when Burwell Cox was only 17 years old, he left his home in Evansville, Ark., and came to Texas alone. He herded sheep for his brother in Throckmorton and Haskell counties, until he could save up enough money to buy sheep of his own.

At first he herded his sheep on the open range—moving them from place to place to get the best grass. Most of the time he lived in a tent or sheep camp.

His sheep ranged from Young and Throckmorton counties to Greer county, Oklahoma. He finally bought a ranch nine miles north of Haskell.

In 1922, he returned to Evansville, Ark., and married Corn Inez Lahar on Oct. 4th. Immediately afterward he brought his bride to Texas.

In May, 1926, Mr. Cox sold his ranch and bought a partnership in the hardware store on the southwest corner of the square in Haskell, then known as Casa, Cox & Co. Several years later, Mr. Cox sold his interest to John Jones of Abilene. Mr. Jones' stock was later bought by Mr. Cox, but the firm still goes by the name, Jones, Cox & Co.

Although devoting a major part of his time to business affairs, Mr. Cox gave generously of his time and means to church and civic affairs over a long period of years.

He was a member of the Board of Stewards of First Methodist Church for 35 years, and served as chairman of the Board for a number of years.

He also served for many years on the Haskell School Board, and was chairman of the body, and was instrumental with fellow members of the board in laying the foundation for the city's splendid school system of today.

Mr. Cox is also a past chairman of United Charities in Haskell, and has worked for many years with other humanitarian organizations and community welfare groups.

Mrs. Cox, whose life has been dedicated to her home and family, has, like her pioneer husband, been an active worker and leader in church affairs.

**Spoiled Foods Are Cause of Disease Outbreaks**

From statistics compiled by the State Health Department, Dr. Cox said this was especially obvious in view of the fact that no disease outbreak has as yet been traced to pasteurized grade A milk which had been adequately refrigerated.  
The food poisoning was caused from contamination through insanitary conditions, infections of food handlers, or of even more significance, lack of early and adequate refrigeration. Dr. Cox said. Even when contaminated, foods will seldom develop toxins sufficient to cause poisoning if properly refrigerated promptly after preparation. Outbreaks caused from foods have totaled nearly six times the number caused from water or milk.  
The State Health Officer pointed out that the consuming public is, in many areas, protected by proper sanitation standards for eating establishments such as are set up in the U. S. Public Health Service Milk Ordinance and Code. The public is entitled to a good, clean, safe and wholesome food supply, including milk which has been produced under strict sanitary conditions and properly refrigerated. This is a great protection against disease

outbreaks caused by contaminated foods of various kinds, and Dr. Cox said this was especially obvious in view of the fact that no disease outbreak has as yet been traced to pasteurized grade A milk which had been adequately refrigerated.







Several women said they were going home to try their hand at making the Tea Rings after they saw these on exhibit at the fair. If you missed copying the recipe there, here is the recipe for a basic sweet dough that might be made into almost any form of sweet roll or into coffee cake:

- 1 1/2 cups compressed yeast soaked in 1/4 cup lukewarm water.
- 1 cup milk.
- 1/2 cup butter.
- 1 level teaspoon salt.
- 1/2 cup sugar.
- 2 to 3 cups all-purpose flour.
- 2 eggs.
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg, mace, cinnamon, or cardamom.
- Rind and juice of 1/2 lemon.
- 3/4 cups chopped nuts, raisins, or dried fruits.

Scald the milk, cool. Cream together butter, salt, and sugar, add slightly beaten eggs, lemon, spice, lukewarm milk, and soaked yeast. Work in the flour, knead until smooth, place in a greased bowl until the dough has doubled in bulk, punch down, and let rise a second time. After the second rising, gently roll the dough into a rectangle 1/4 inch thick, 15 inches wide, and any length. Brush with butter, and sprinkle with a mixture of 1 part of cinnamon to three parts sugar. Sprinkle chopped nuts and raisins over the dough and roll like a jelly roll. Press down the last edge firmly, curve the long roll into a ring, joining the ends. Place in a

**Crippled Children Entitled to Help From State**

In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has released the following statement:

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are infantile paralysis, osteomyelitis, club feet, hernia and cleft palate, burns, curvature of the spine, arthritis, bow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet, congenitally dislocated hip, muscular dystrophy, supernumary fingers and toes, wry neck, elephantiasis, spina bifida, brachial palsy, Pott's Disease, congenital anomalies, spondylolisthesis, amputation, webbed fingers, epiphitis, and sarcoma.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit.

Full information about local groups and organizations in the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, "Handbook on Agencies." **Farmers In Area Seeding Winter Cover Crops**

Many farmers in this area will be planting such winter cover crops and soil improving crops as vetch and small grain, clovers and Austrian winter peas as soon as the soil is dry enough. The recent rains put a favorable season in the soil for successful growth of these legumes. These crops are of value to the land and to the farmer in several ways: they supply the soil with additional plant foods, protect the soil from erosion and furnish grazing, and if the seed are harrowed, provide a cash crop from the sale of the seed.

Farmers who have raised these crops in this California Creek Soil Conservation District report that they have had increased yields in the following crops of small grain, cotton, and feed crops when comparing with areas not following legumes. Many of these farmers report that the tilth of the soil was improved, and extra water was held in the soil. Sandy land farmers have praised the value of these winter cover crops in their ability to prevent soil blowing and washing.

The planting of these legumes, after inoculation with the right inoculant, will also increase the fertility of the soil. Legumes are the only plants that have the ability to take nitrogen from the soil air and store it in the soil for the following crops. A good crop of vetch, clover, or peas turned under as a green manure crop is equivalent to about 30 pounds of commercial nitrogen in increasing yields.

There are several important factors to consider when planting these legumes. Some of the more important ones include, using the right inoculant to insure nitrogen replacement; application of phosphorus fertilizer, (about 200 pounds per acre in light sandy soils); proper seed bed preparation; time of planting and methods of planting.

When inoculating legume seed, moisten the seed very lightly and stir the inoculant seed the seed until the seed are covered with a fine film of the inoculant. For vetch and Austrian peas use about one-half pint can of Nitrogen "C" to each 100 pounds of seed; for sweet clover use a smaller can to each bushel of seed.

Legumes respond well to applications of phosphate fertilizers, especially in the sandier soils. Applications of 200 pounds per acre have been tried in various parts of the district and have

produced satisfactory results. Best results are obtained when fertilizer is applied with a combination grain and fertilizer drill a row planter where the seed and fertilizer come out of the same spout.

A firm seed bed is important. No seed bed preparation is needed on land previously planted to inter-tilled crops like cotton or peanuts. On maize land, crop residues should be utilized. Stalks should be cut and plowed shallow with a tandem

Memorial flowers will be placed aboard Naval vessels at various bases in the U. S. and overseas that day after appropriate dockside ceremonies. The vessels will then proceed to sea where the flowers will be scattered upon the water in memory of the dead. Twenty-six ports in the U. S. and overseas have been designated to receive the memorial flowers.

**3,250,000-Bale Cotton Crop In State Forecast**

The Agriculture Department Friday estimated a cotton crop this year of 15,079,000 bales of which it said Texas should provide 3,250,000. The department said dry weather in Texas, Missouri, and some parts of the Southeast cut yield prospects during the past month, but all the crop still promises to top all others in value. Texas should harvest 3,250,000 bales of 8,998,000 acres, with an average yield of 173 pounds of lint cotton an acre, the department said. Nationally the crop was put at about one per cent less than the 15,219,000 forecast a month ago. But the estimate as of Oct. 1 was far above last year's 11,857,000 bales. Production for the 1937-46 ten year period averaged 12,014,000 bales. Current prices make the crop worth about \$2,736,000,000. That includes \$14,000,000 for cotton seed and \$2,322,000,000 for lint. Last year's crop was valued at \$2,219,202,000. The previous record was \$2,348,000,000 in 1919. The condition of the Texas crop was placed at 67 per cent of normal, and the condition nationally at 82 per cent. A national average yield of 310.3 lbs. an acre was indicated, compared to 267.3 pounds last year and 254.2 for a ten-year average. Free Press Want Ads always get results.



## Veterans' News

Some American citizens who served with the Royal Canadian Air Force and are eligible to receive "War Service Gratuities" from the Canadian Government, have not applied for those payments although the RCAF has been trying to locate them since the end of the war.

The men, many of whom joined the U.S. Air Force after service with RCAF, are entitled to a bonus of \$7.50 for every 30 days' service in the RCAF, plus an extra 25 cents for every day of overseas service. In addition, for each period of 183 days of overseas service in the RCAF, an amount will be paid equaling seven days' pay and allowances computed on the rank held at the time of discharge from the RCAF.

Those eligible to receive the payments may apply in writing to: The Air Member, Canadian Joint Staff, 1760 N. Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.

More than five and one-quarter million World War II veterans had taken some type of training under the GI Bill from the inception of the program until September 1, 1948, the VA reports.

On that date, 1,553,000 were still in training and 3,742,000 had completed or discontinued their training.

The number of veterans of all wars reached 18,744,000 on May 1, 1948, VA said. Of these, 14,887,000 served in World War II. The remainder were veterans of World War I and other wars.

When the nation's population of veterans and members of their families reaches its expected peak in 1955, VA predicts that the number of veterans of all wars will be 17,200,000 and the number of persons in their families, 42,900,000.

Questions and Answers

Q.—I am a disabled veteran. Am I entitled to increased compensation because of my dependents?

A.—If your disability rating is 60 per cent or more, you should submit to VA documentary evidence of the existence of

A wife or child or evidence of dependency of your parents so that you may qualify for increased compensation payments under Public Law 877 of the 80th Congress.

Q.—My father is supporting a large family. May I claim him as a dependent while I am in training under the GI Bill?

A.—Dependency will be held to exist if your father does not have an income sufficient to provide reasonable maintenance for himself and members of his family under legal age, or members of his family otherwise dependent by reason of mental or physical incapacity.

Q.—I am going to college under the GI Bill and would like to know whether I will have to refund the tuition if I leave school before the end of the school year?

A.—If you drop out of college before the end of the period for which tuition has to be paid by VA, you will have to pay VA for the time you did not attend school or you will lose the training time covered by the payments.

Q.—Is the amount of disability compensation in any way affected by the amount of money I earn or receive from other sources?

A.—No.

Q.—On what priority basis is a World War I veteran admitted to a VA hospital?

A.—Emergency cases have first priority; those suffering from injuries in or aggravated by war-time service are next on the priority list, and those who swear they are unable to pay hospital charges for non-service-connected disabilities or illnesses are third. The latter must wait until a bed is available.

Q.—Are dependents of a World War I veteran, who died of causes not due to service, entitled to death pension?

A.—In most cases, they are entitled to death pension benefits. The widow is disqualified if her annual income exceeds \$1000, or \$2500 if she has a child or children. A child is ineligible if his or her income exceeds \$1000 per year. A widow loses her entitlement upon remarriage, and children normally become ineligible when they reach age 18.

Q.—I am a World War I veteran and was discharged from the U. S. Army in 1938. I would like to know if I am eligible for the education, readjustment allowance and guaranty loan provisions of the G-I Bill?

A.—No. Benefits of the G-I Bill are available only to World War II veterans.
