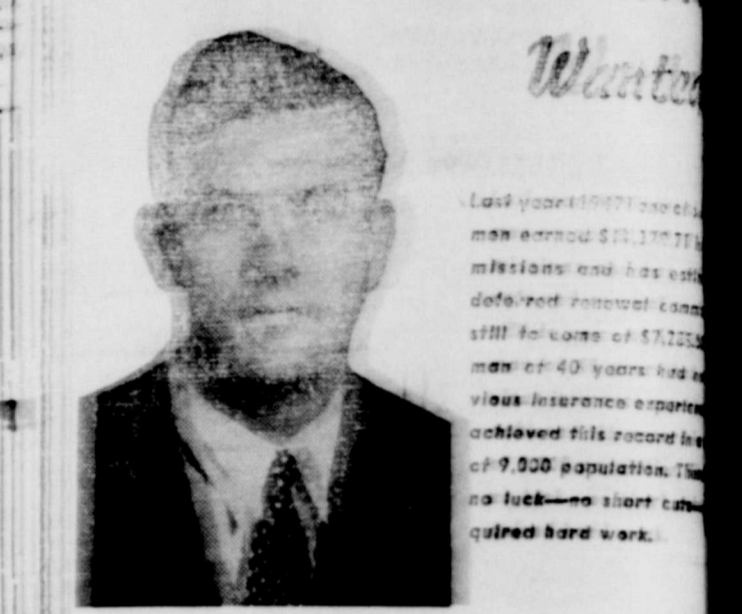

TREES IN COLD STORAGE

Nature dropped a coating of ice over two-thirds or more of the state recently—at least once, anyway.

This chilly pastime of Old Man Winter has literally put many of the trees and shrubs in cold storage. And a cloak of ice usually does more harm than good to our ornamental plants used in landscaping home yards and lawns.

First aid is generally necessary for these thousands of shrubs damaged by ice storms if these plantings are to regain their natural shape and beauty. Broken, split and bent branches and wounds need a different treatment. Where the weight of ice has caused branches to break several feet from the trunk, pruning will help. Remove the hanging

limb where it has broken off, then select a side branch between the break and the tree trunk. Cut off the limb at this point. Follow up by pruning to reshape the plant.

F. W. Martin, County Agent, says that badly split branches won't grow back and heal over even though they are tied in place. Such split limbs should be removed at the trunk, leaving no stub at all. It's usually safer to prune off the split branches, and all the splintered and rough edges should be smoother off before a wound paint is applied.

White or orange shellac makes good wound paint. Or you may make a mixture of your own if you desire. Here's how: Heat 8 parts (by weight) of resin, and 3 parts of boiled linseed oil. Paint this mixture on to the bark ring and hardwood area.

Branches that are merely bent over by the weight of the ice do not need quite as much care. They may be pulled back into place and held with strips of gunny sacks or cloth. It is advisable not to use wire and hard strings, as they may cut and injure the limbs. By the time the cloth rots away, the tree limbs ought to be growing back in their original to put out some fruit trees.

Ornamentals such as the arbovitae which have been disfigured by the weight of ice may be sheared. However, they can usually be bent back into their original shape.

So if you've had any shrubs or trees that were put in cold storage by Old Man Winter, there may be some first aid work needed in your own front yard.

SETTING OUT FRUIT TREES

As soon as the weather warms up a little it will be a good time to set out some fruit trees.

In selecting fruit trees, the trees should be bought from a reliable nursery which will insure that the tree is vigorous and free from disease.

As soon as the fruit trees arrive from the nursery they should be set out if possible. If, however, it is not possible to set the tree, they should be "heeled in" by digging a trench sufficiently wide and deep to cover roots good. It would probably be advisable to water roots at this time also.

The trees should be cut back at the time of planting to more nearly balance the roots and the tops. Small trees, 12 to 14 inches in height do not need to be pruned when planted. Medium to large peach and plum trees should be cut back to 18 to 20 inches, while pears should be cut back to about 30 inches.

In setting out the trees make the holes large enough so that all the roots will fit in without being bent, and do not set the tree any lower in the ground than it was when it came out of the nursery. After setting the tree in the hole it is a good idea to water the tree good and get the soil worked in firmly around the roots.

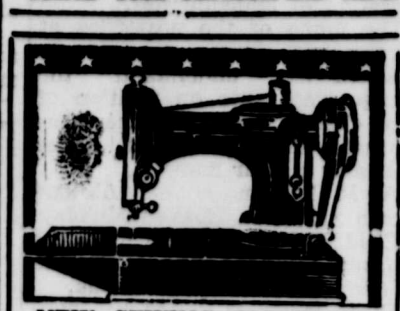

cause considerable damage by eating the bark off the trees. The following formula will prevent rabbit damage: 2 pounds of sulphur, 2 pounds Ochre (pigment), one-fourth pint of turpentine, one-fourth pint of linseed oil, 1 ounce of asafetida, 4 eggs, one-half pint wheat flour, mix with ski milk and apply with paint brush as high up as rabbits can reach.

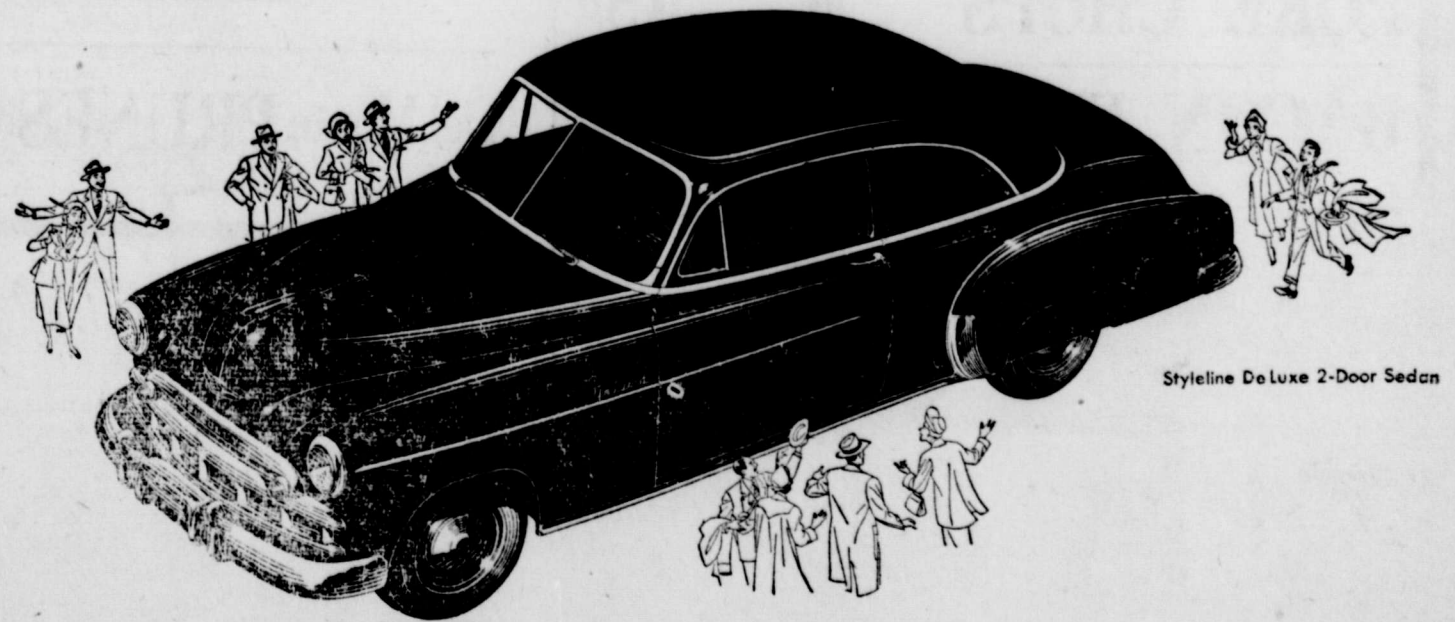

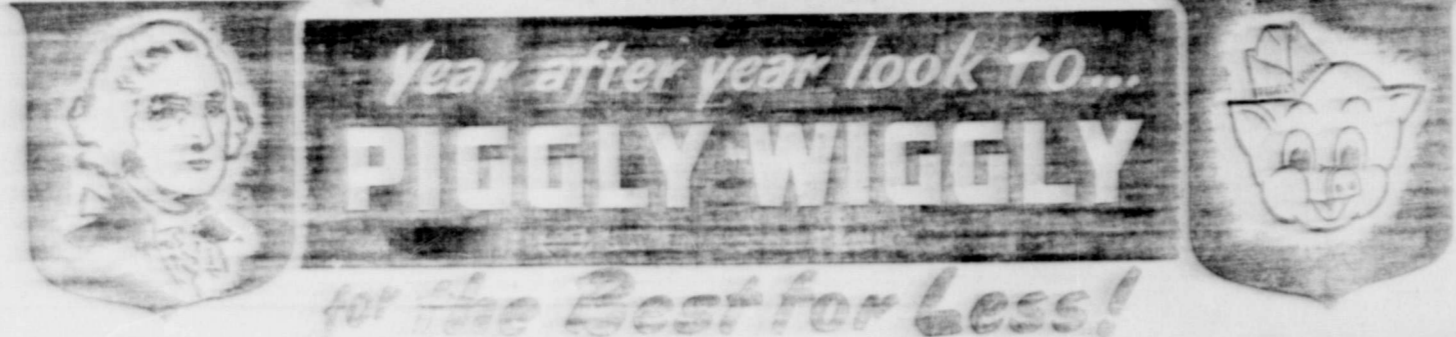

Proper Start Means Most in Having 'Bigger' Garden

Bigger than the neighbor's. That's the ambition of every home gardener. Everybody who grows vegetables for the family table wants to be able to boast the biggest—both in size and yield—in the neighborhood.

In order to do this, F. W. Martin, County Agent, suggests getting a big start with even the smallest seed. This calls for seed treatment and inoculation. From the standpoint of the home gardener, the easiest way to treat the seed is to get a packet of seed disinfectant from the local seed store. Then tear the top of the seed packet off, and sprinkle a small amount of the disinfectant dust inside. Then, all you have to do is shake the packet well. Make sure the shaking is thorough enough to cover every seed in the packet.

It is best to plant the treated seed right away. Seed treatment not only destroys certain seed-borne diseases, but also helps along the process of germination. There are certain fungus molds that often damage seed at the time of germination, and seed treatment gives a higher percentage of vigorous plants at the soil surface.

Inoculation of legume seed stimulates early growth because of certain bacteria in the soil. So, when you plant English peas in the next few weeks, Martin suggests, trying this inoculation process to get an early start. Later in the season you might also inoculate your early plantings of beans, as well as the black-eyed peas or purple hulls and cream peas.

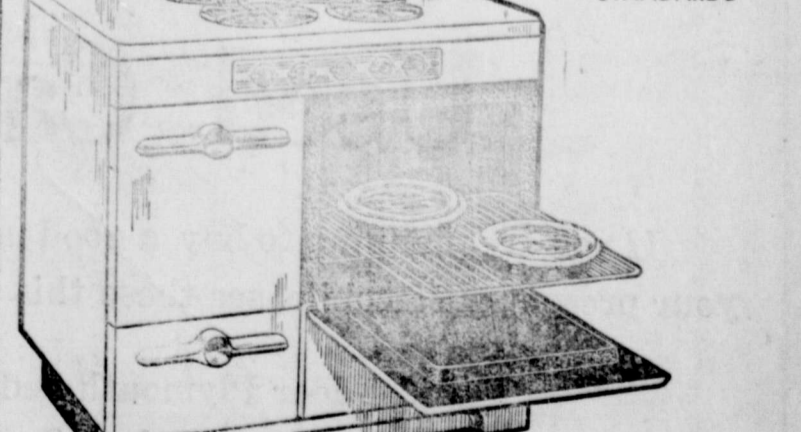

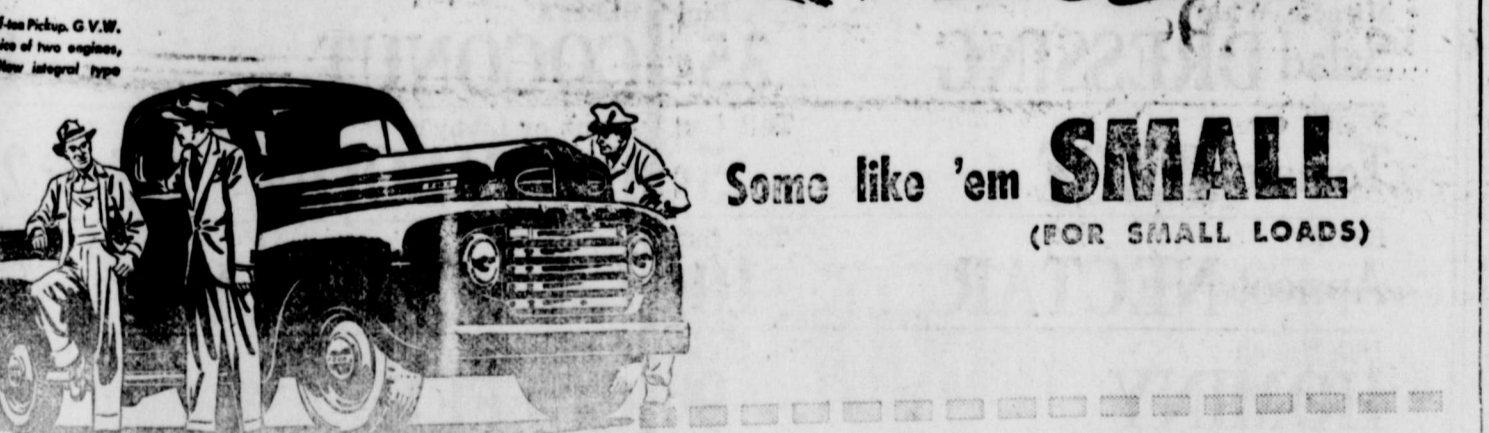
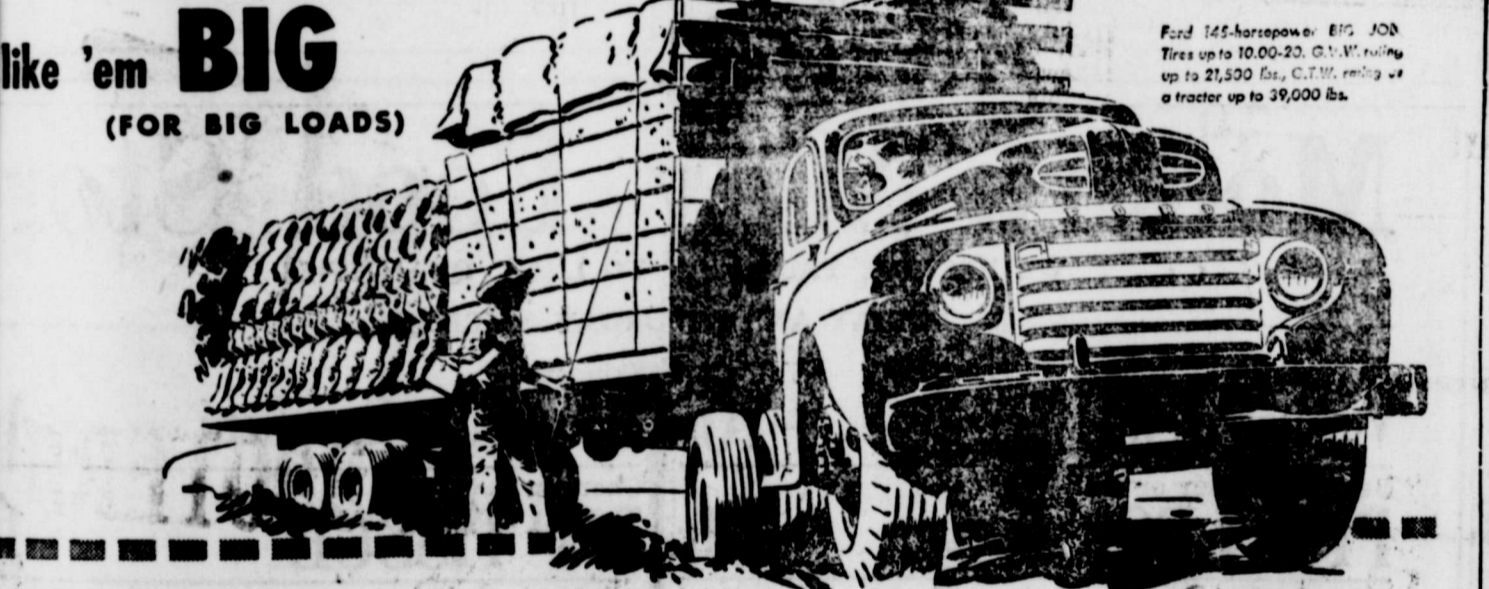

Veterans' News

Veteran enrollments in colleges and universities under Federal training programs on Nov. 30, 1948, dropped 15 per cent below enrollments on Nov. 30, 1947, the VA reports.

Similarly, enrollments on Oct. 31, 1948, were 17 per cent under the totals for Oct. 31, 1947.

This fall's drop in the number of veterans in institutions of higher learning under the GI Bill and Public Law 16 (for the disabled) marked the reversal of a general upward trend that had continued since both laws went into effect.

The number of veterans in colleges and universities on Nov. 30, 1948, under both laws was 1,050,668, compared with 1,233,761 as of a year ago.

The October 31, 1948, total was 853,247, while the figure for Oct. 31, 1947, was 1,149,933.

Despite the drop in college enrollments, the number of veterans in schools below the college level under the GI Bill and Public Law 16 showed a slight increase this fall over last fall.

On Nov. 30, 1948, there were 701,121 veterans in such schools under the two laws—a two per cent increase over the 696,664 total of a year ago.

Surplus textbook project under which the VA saved about \$5,000,000 is coming to an end.

The project called for textbooks declared surplus by the armed forces to be distributed to veterans studying under the GI Bill and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act for the disabled.

During the year and five months the project was in operation—from May 15, 1946 to Oct. 15, 1947—approximately 2,000,000 surplus books were sent to 2,636 educational institutions for possible use by veteran-students.

Questions and Answers

Q—My husband, a World War I veteran, holds a bad conduct discharge. Is he entitled to benefits under the GI Bill?

A—Since your husband holds neither an honorable nor a dishonorable discharge from the armed services, it will be necessary for him to ask his nearest VA office for a decision as to whether he was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. He may also apply to the Army or Navy for a revision of discharge.

Q—Is my aunt, the daughter of a Civil War veteran, eligible for pension? She and her mother were dependent on the veteran at the time of his death. The widow received a pension until her death, leaving her daughter, aged 75.

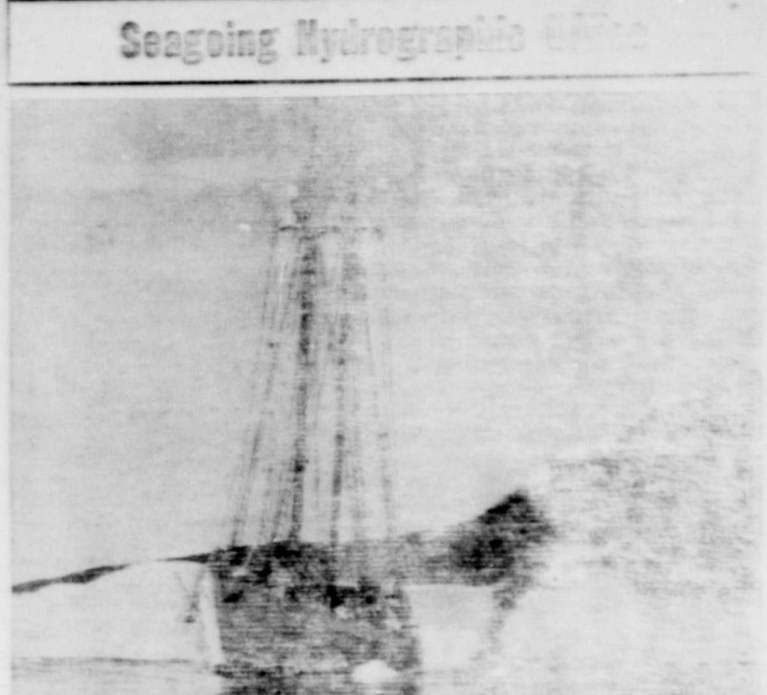
A—Unless your aunt was permanently helpless by reason of physical or mental disability prior to having reached the age of 16, she could not now qualify for a pension based on her father's service.

Q—Is there any time limit to the duration of a business loan? A—Yes. A non-real estate business must be repaid in 10 years or less; real estate loans may run up to 25 years.

Q—Am I eligible for a GI loan to buy a share in a going business in another city?

A—You are eligible if you devote your personal labor or supervise the business either on a full-time or part-time basis.

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KITCHEN MEMO
JEAN CLARKE

If you don't feel like turning on the oven to bake cookies, try Grid 'n Cookies cooked over the top burner. Preheat griddle for three minutes with flame full on, then turn down to low simmer for entire cooking period. Best heat test is a drop of water which should dance, rather than steam, on the griddle surface. Put 2 eggs slightly beaten, into 1/2 cup milk. Add 2 cup raisins. Sift once 1/2 cup all-purpose flour, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 tsp baking powder, 1/2 tsp baking soda, 1/2 tsp salt, 1/2 tsp vanilla. Mix dry ingredients with beaten blender until nearly meal. Then pour into the milk egg and raisin mixture. Mix. When dough is wet paper, chill in refrigerator 1 hour. Roll out 1/4" thick. Cut with cookie cutter. Brown on slightly greased griddle on one side, then on the other. Makes 24 cookies.

Don't worry about boilers on your top burners. Just wipe them up with a cloth dampened in warm water. Later, when your gas range has cooled, you can do a more thorough cleaning job.

Neither hot water nor gas is wasted when you have an automatic regulator on your gas water heater because gas is turned on and off automatically only as hot water is needed.

The built-in towel drier and movable racks of some new gas ranges not only save precious space but also hide unsightly dish towels and cloths.

An ordinary vegetable purer is a good tool to use for grating chocolate or cheese and certainly easier to clean than a grater.

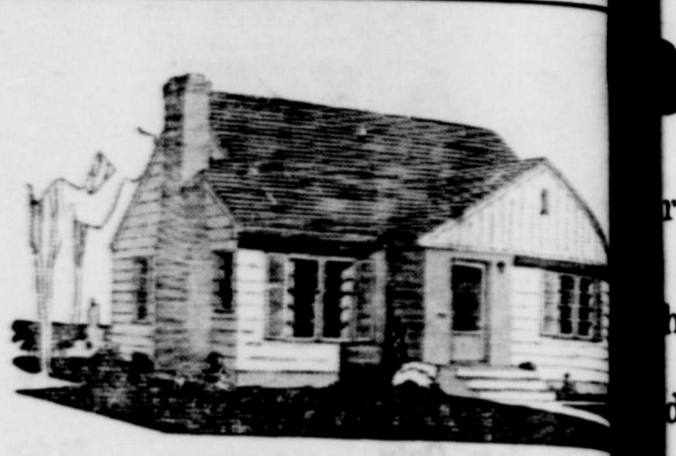

1 cup Fat Milk 1 cup drained, canned sliced peaches**
1 cup water

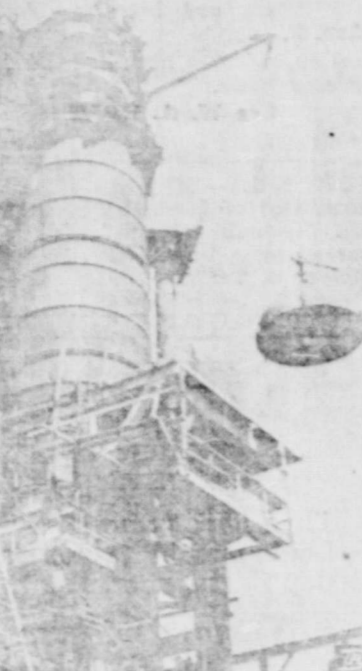

Legend of Buried Westex Treasure Told by Historian

A treasure in Spanish gold is still buried somewhere in West Texas, according to a legend recounted in the current issue of the Junior Historian by Frieda Lucas of Wichita Falls. Writing for the magazine which has publication headquarters in the Texas Historical Association offices at the University of Texas, Miss Lucas relates that many mines have been located in the state since the 1500's, and that a treasure of gold and other treasure, reportedly buried by the Spaniards between Clyde and Abilene. The original story, according to Miss Lucas, states that leaders of a Spanish pack train transporting the gold to the coast, heard Indians were planning to attack them and buried the treasure. The map indicating the treasure's location was sent to Spain where it was found many years later in a cathedral, and returned to Texas. As late as 1937 men were digging at the site where the treasure is believed to be buried, the young author writes. Other contributors to the current issue are from chapters in schools in Texas City, Fort Worth, San Marcos, Palestine, Baytown, Huntsville, Wichita Falls, Cuero, Dallas, Henderson, San Antonio, and Iraan.

Mahon Backs 90 Per Cent Parity Loan on Sorghums

(By Congressman Geo. Mahon)

The present law permits but does not guarantee a loan, usually referred to as a support price, on grain sorghum. I have joined others here in appealing to the Secretary of Agriculture to announce immediately a 90 per cent parity loan on grain sorghum for the 1949 crop. I am also supporting legislation which would require such a loan support. Producers need to know what to expect in the way of support prices long in advance of planting time. The Secretary has authority to announce a 90 per cent parity loan, or a loan at any rate lower than 90 per cent. A loan of less than 90 per cent would be unsatisfactory and inadequate. What the Secretary may do and what Congress may do is not yet known. I hope we can secure passage of a long range farm program assuring a support of at least 90 per cent of parity on grain sorghum, cotton, and other important crops. Producers should be on the alert for developments, particularly in connection with the 1949 crop. Here is the situation as to cotton. The present law assures a support price of 90 per cent of parity for 1949, but after 1949 the support could be as low as 60 per cent of parity. A 60 per cent support would be practically worthless, and we hope to fix the figure for the long range program at not less than 90 per cent.

Two important questions as to cotton may be decided by Congress within the next few weeks. First, will acreage planted to cotton in 1949 be considered in arriving at cotton quotas on individual farms in 1950? Second, what is the cotton acreage quota for the states, counties and individual farms in 1950 and after 1950? It is assumed that if there is a support price on cotton in 1950 there will be a cotton acreage control program in 1950. Production controls, however, will not be placed in operation without an affirmative vote of the producers themselves. If Congress decides that 1949 should be counted as a base year, West Texas farmers will probably go the limit in seeding land to cotton. But, at the same time, many Central and East Texas farmers who have about gone out of the cotton business would probably plant a big cotton acreage, and it has been argued that West Texas might possibly sustain a net loss in cotton quotas. Members of the House Committee on Agriculture are seeking passage of a resolution specifying that the year 1949 shall not be considered as a base year in fixing 1950 acreage quotas. Terracing Program Under Way On Area Farms

The terracing program is in full swing at this time in the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District with terrace lines being run on the following farms: H. E. Wall, C. H. Chaffin, Mrs. S. M. Clonts and C. M. Conner. These farmers believe that terraces are necessary to hold what is left of their soil and to conserve the moisture to be used during the summer. With the help of some legume crops in a good rotation, these farmers are on the way to improve their soil and to get the utmost benefit from the moisture that we get. M. H. Mansfield says that his terraces, with the help of a cover crop of rye and hairy vetch, increased his production about one-third this last year. He also says that he loses very little water from his land, which is rather steep in places. Gullies which were deep in places are healing over in one year's time, so that trouble with machinery in crossing them is a thing of the past. Mr. Mansfield worked his conservation plan out with the help of the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service technicians.
