

Mr. Smith spent a short time in Bogota, capital city of Columbia, which shortly after his return to the U.S., was severely damaged in one of worst revolutions in that nation's history, following the assassination of Dr. Jorge Gaitan well known and greatly loved

Save Leaves For Nature's Fertilizer

Don't burn the leaves. Instead turn them into a leaf mold or a compost. By burning the leaves, you lose the value of organic matter and kill off the grass already growing.

Other plant refuse besides the leaves works fine in a compost too, such as clippings, weeds and vegetable tops, says Sadie Hat-field, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A&M College.

Nature is constantly making fertilizers. Dead wood, old leaves, and other plant materials make acid which releases minplant food already in the When released, this matter can be used by plants and tree roots

A simple enclosure of scrap umber, brick or stone should be provided to mold the compos together. In sections of the state where high winds are a daily thing a compost pit is prefer able—almost a necessity, says Miss Hatfield. If a pit is available(spread a thin layer of soil over its contents, after adding the leaves or grass clippings. In the dry part of the year when there is not much rainfall, it is a good idea to wet the entire pit once or twice a month to insure a well-rotted compost. If a well balanced food mix-

ture is desired, all a 100 pounds of 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer to a wagon load of compost mixture. Sprinkle the fertilizer over the pit before covering it with a layer of soil. The fertilizer speeds up the leaf rotting process.

In acid soil areas such as the eastern part of the state, add 100 pounds of lime as well as the fertilizer to the pit contents. Compost of this type is especial ly good for soils which tend to pack, or become hard and crusty during the day periods. It usually takes about three

months for leaves. weeds and small limbs to rot. Use a half pound to a pound per foot of row space for flowers, vegetables or shrubs. Mix the compost thoroughly into the soil before seed-
