Because of a late Easter, nondurable goods store sales rose 7 per cent above March to lead durable goods. which usualty don inates Texas retail sales.

Fiorist's sales in April, with 2 - rer cent gain over March. showed the greatest increase among nondurable goods stores. Tales of men's and boy's clothing stores climbed 24 per cent; shoe stores, 22 per cent; and fam y c' thing stores, 21 per cent.

Sales of gracity stores without meat and combination stores, ris ng 5 and 3 per cent, respectively contributed to the 2 cent hike in the over-all food

picture. small grains over March were recorded by jewelry (1 per cent) and furniture and household stores, 3 per cent, durable goods store sales declined 5 per cent from the previous der.

Over the April-to-April span wider fluctuations were registered by Texas retailers. Cotton Trading Continues Fairly Active Past Week

Cotton trading moved at a fairly active pace last week in both Oklahoma and Texas spot markets as export inquiries increased reports the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Qualities most in demand were Low Middling White cotton ranging in staple lengths 13/16 inch through one inch to apply on sales to Japan. European countries wanted mostly. Strict Low Middling through Strict Middling White cotton ranging in staple lengths 31/32 inch 1-1/16 inch.

Cotton exports for March jumped to 577.000 bales, the largest monthly shipment in more than a decade.

Recent ECA purchase authorizations for American raw cotton totaled 70 million dollars involvng more than 400,000 bales for second quarter shipments.

Domestic mill interest remained quiet, although some inquiries were made for prompt shipments

Except for a dip of one dollar per bale on Thursday, cotton prices held about steady this week, closing Friday at Monday's level at Dallas and Galveston but down 50 cents at Houston. Prices at these markets on the corresponding Friday last year stood around \$23 to \$27 per bale
