New Oil Pool Seen With Production In Burson No. 1

North Haskell County had tangible evidence this week of a new oil field as Humble Oil & Refining Company proceeded with testing at its No. 1 Burson six miles southwest of Weimert and ten miles east of the Jud field, opened recently by Danciger Oil and Gas.

The Humble prospect, located in block 12, J. Koris subdivision, was estimated good for 200 barrels daily from Strawn sand at 4,735-55 feet. After exploding ninety quarts of nitro in the section, the wildcat made heads of twenty-five and fifty barrels and continued cleaning out. The hole was plugged back from the Ellenburger, which was dry.

Retail Sales In State Show Gain During April

Estimated retail sales for Texas, exceeding \$424 million, increased 1 per cent in April over the preceding month, but declined 1 per cent from a year earlier, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Because of a late Easter, nondurable goods store sales rose 7 per cent above March to lead durable goods, which usually dominates Texas retail sales.

Fierist's sales in April, with a 2.7 per cent gain over March, showed the greatest increase among nondurable goods stores. Sales of men's and boy's clothing stores climbed 24 per cent; shoe stores, 22 per cent; and family clothing stores, 21 per cent.

Sales of grocery stores without meat and combination stores, rising 5 and 4 per cent, respectively, contributed to the 2 per cent hike in the over-all food picture.

Although small grains over March were recorded by jewelry (1 per cent) and furniture and household stores, 3 per cent, durable goods store sales declined 5 per cent from the previous

month. Sales of lumber and building material dealers fell 10 per cent; farm implements, 9 per cent; and motor vehicles, 6 per cent.

Over the April-to-April span wider fluctuations were registered by Texas retailers. Sales of motor vehicle dealers went up 19 per cent; and automotive stores, 14 per cent; while building material, lumber and hardware sales slipped 25 per cent; jewelry 17 per cent; and furniture stores, 15 per cent.

Retail sales of nondurable goods remained almost unchanged from a year earlier, with florists' sales jumping 42 per cent over the 12-month period. Next closest gains showed shoe stores rising 23 per cent, and women's specialty shops, 11 per cent.

Filling station sales dropped 16 per cent in April below April 1948 to show the deepest decline, being followed by country general stores, down 6 per cent, and boy's clothing stores, both down 6 per cent.

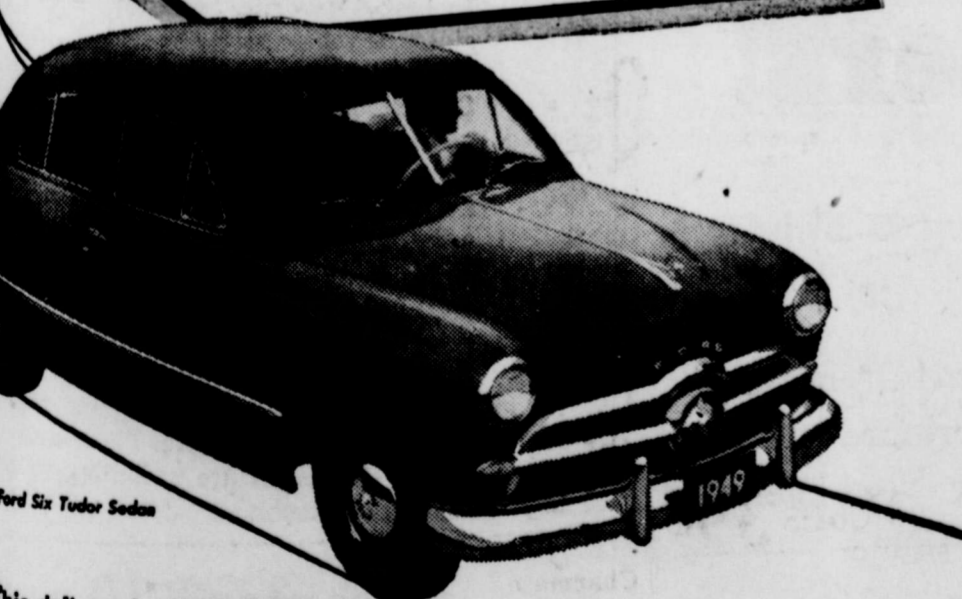
