The loan rate has been temporarily announced at \$1.87 per bushel, from which a service fee of lc per bushel win be deducted, leaving a net to the farmer of \$1.86. Delivery charges at the end of the loan period will have to be borne by the farmer. Following is a list of general

1. Grain must be stored at least 30 days before a request is made for a loan. 2. Grain must test 13% moisture, or under, to be eligible.

3. Prior liens against the grain must be released in favor of the CCC 4. Loan rates are based on No.

dropped to 6,000 bales. Being unable to secure U. S cotton. Spain has been forced to buy in the sterling markets. principally Brazil and India. It is estimated that Spains' requirements will total 600,000 bales of U. S. cotton in the next two year period. She will also need substantial quantities of wheat tobacco, and edible oilprincipally those derived from cottonseed and soybeans. It is believed Spain can repay the loans for purchase of these commodities fro mher exports of olives, olive oils, fruits, and strategic and critical ores such as antimony, lead, mercury, manganese, tung-

sten, and zin. Following the meeting attended by the American and Spanish bankers a committee of the Sen-ate headed by Senator Connally was appointed to explore further the question of extending Spanish credits.

Storage For Green Forage Crops

A feast or a famine is a pret-ty good description of the feed Mr. and Mrs. Joe Scheets of situation many cows face every years. Green growing crops have plenty of all the nutrients needed in a good ration, especially protein and vitamin A.

And the silo offers the best storage means for these nutrients until they're needed, says G. G. Gibson, extension dairy husbandryman of Texas A&M College. Making good hay early in the season presents aproblem because spring weather favors growth rather than drying out processes needed for silage.

As a result, lots of good hay is ost or hay of poor quality is made into silage. With every crop there's a best time for harvesting to get the highest nutrient value. Good silage can be made from hay and grass crops without the use of preservative by means of the wilting method,

says Gibson.
With a little practice farmers can learn to tell the best time the crop is ready for siloing. When a crop has wilted slightly it appears a little lighter in color, and the leaves and stems will be limp but not dry and curled. Twisting will bring the moisture but no free out of the stems, moisture will run off.

Too much of the Texas grass and hay land yields a low tonnage per acre, Gibson says. However, through fertilization, pasture management and seeding many farmers are changing this situation. High yields are becoming more common.

The silo is the best method for storing the early growth. Hay can be made later in the season when curing conditions are more

The five "S's" of poultry laying house sanitation introduce the new poultry circular recently released by extension poultry husbandmen of Texas A&M Col-

Cleaning and disinfecting the And it's one of the first important steps in getting maximum egg production. five "S's" of laying house sanitation are scrape, sweep, scald,

The new circular, officially known as C-260, Keep Hens Happy, also has information on disease and parasite control including cocidiosis, fowl pox vaccination, and the reduction of internal parasites by frequently moving the range shelters to clean areas.

Two other points brought out in the new circular are separation of old hens from the ounger pullets and the space needed per bird in the henhouse. Older birds are sometimes disease cerriers of roup 'and range paralysis, and for this reason the old hens should be kept apart from the young pullets.

Each hen needs three to four feet of floor space, eight to ten inches of roosting space, three to four inches of feeder space and one nest for every five hens. And keep them supplied with plenty of clean water and feed, the specialists say.

You can freeze your tter at home and store it in home freezer for as long as x months if it is good quality 'his way, you'll have plenty of outter when the milk production irops off during the later part of

Miss Jackson says it's best not o even try to freeze poorly madd butter. It doesn't keep well, even the freezer.

Before freezing the butter wash it well to get all the milk out. Mold it and wrap it in parchment paper. Then press all the air out that gets caught between the paper and the butter. Then it's ready to pack in wax car-
