Distress wheat loans for a wide West Texas area, in which Haskell county is included, were approved Tuesday by the State Production and Marketing committee. The loan areas were announced by State PMA Director B. F. Vance.

District loans are made at 75 per cent of the regular loan rate, which varies with counties. Loan rate in Haskell county is \$1.87 per bushel. The distress loans are made on wheat piled on the ground or placed in temporary storage within 90 days from the date of the distress loan. Application for a distress loan must be made within 30 days after the harvest.

With Harvest Nearly Complete, Combines Resuming Operations

With Haskell county's wheat harvest estimated at 95 per cent complete, combines were making another attempt Wednesday to get into fields where the grain had not ripened sufficiently to be harvested before recent heavy rains halted attempts to gather the grain.

In some respects, the marketing picture for late harvested grain looked better to those producers who started their wheat to local markets in a small trickle Wednesday. The price was up to \$1.70 per bushel on the Haskell market as compared to the \$1.51-55 quotation on earlier marketed wheat. On the other hand, quality of the grain buffeted by hard rains, hail and winds, may not grade as high as the early harvested wheat, local buyers pointed out.

Fly Eradication Campaign Praised By Health Official

During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, many Civic Organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that far taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B.O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

Highway Center Stripes Reduce Head-On Crashes

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Head-on collisions, the deadliest and most gruesome of all traffic accidents are averted many times a day by a simple line of paint on a highway pavement. Charles M. Upham, engineer-director of the American Road Builders' Association pointed out here to-day in discussing safety measures in connection with the opening of the 1949 touring season. He stressed the psychological effect of the center stripe in saving thousands of lives by keeping motorists in their proper lane.

"Separating traffic streams removes one of the greatest hazards of the road," Mr. Upham continued. "The center median strip is the best method, but where it cannot be provided, as on two-lane highways, the painted or inset center stripe offers a valuable substitute which all states are now using on their heavily travelled roads."

Experts of the Public Roads Administration estimate that one-third of America's surfaced highways are now center striped. Mr. Upham cited. The cost of striping and restriping this 100,000 miles of highways each year is estimated at \$2,800,000 or an average cost per mile of \$28.00, according to PRA.

Studies by ARBA based on these estimates show that in spite of all efforts to secure uniformity, center striping is still widely diversified. Some states use solid lines, others broken lines. Widths vary, as do colors, with white and yellow predominating. One state is using a built-in black center line on new concrete pavements. This is done by working in black iron oxide before the pavement sets. A slightly raised separation obtained by concrete points, such as curves, intersections where prohibition of passing and left turn is especially important. However, this offers disadvantages in snow removal.

The high cost of painting the center stripe is causing considerable experimentation by state highway departments, the study shows. Several states have developed motor driven striping equipment of special design in an effort to cut costs. Tests are also being made with different types of paints. "Effectiveness, however, is still the prime consideration, despite the expense," Mr. Upham commented.

"Wherever he may be this summer, the tourist cannot mistake the meaning and purpose of the center stripe. If all tourists will regard this simple warning, we will go far toward reducing the annual death rate of 32,000 deplored by President Truman in recent safety conference in Washington.

Spray Insects In Pecans Now

It's not too late to help next fall's pecan crop if you get to work right away. That means spraying the trees for the pecan nut casebearer. He's a small gray worm also known as the pecan worm or the pecan borer worm. And wherever pecans grow, you'll find him.

After they hatch out, these little worms move down the twig to the nut cluster and begin feeding on the second or third bud below the nuts. After a four- or five-day meal on the buds, the casebearer bores a hole in the pecan and goes inside to destroy the kernel.

Allen C. Gunter, associate extension entomologist of Texas A&M College, says the only time to spray the trees effectively is the 10 or 12 day period from the time the eggs are laid until the worms enter the pecans. But once they have gone inside the nuts, spraying is useless.

So you've got to catch them at the right time, and you've got to do a thorough job of wetting each limb from top to bottom with the spray. A power spray that puts out 20 to 35 gallons per minute at a pressure of 200 to 600 pounds is recommended for the job, says Gunter.

And the spray is three pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder and six to eight pounds of wettable sulphur for every 100 gallons of water.

Pecan orchards treated with DDT will be safer for livestock grazing purposes than one treated with lead arsenate, Gunter says.

Pecan trees sprayed later than the next few days will have an ineffective control of the pecan nut casebearer.

 Haskell was visited by an electrical and windstorm Thursday night which lasted from about 8:30 o'clock until 1 a.m. Friday. Houses were demolished and electric wires blown down in all parts of town, and the South Ward school buildings were partly unroofed. R. S. Middleton, who lives 3 1/4 miles northeast of town, together with members of his family went to his cellar, and during the storm it caved in, killing his wife and four children and Miss Maggie Bishop, a school teacher, who was visiting the family. Mr. Middleton and his two little boys and a little girl escaped with slight injuries. Their home was blown away and they lost everything they possessed. Later, on Friday

evening, Haskell county was again visited by rain, hail and wind, which caused immense damage and at least one death by drowning. Haskell was flooded, and water 3 feet deep was reported in the northeast part of town where an aged woman drowned when she left her home to escape the flood. It is reported here by telephone that the passenger train of the Orient was lifted off the railway tracks by high winds Thursday, nothing but the engine being left on the tracks. It was reported that five persons were killed and several injured in the wreck.

Mesquite Causes Income Loss to Texas Ranchers

The mesquite tree cost Texas ranchmen over 100 million dollars last year in lost income. According to a recent publication of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Brush Problems on Texas Ranges, in the present mesquite area of Texas, beef production is now about 626.5 million pounds per year. After clearing and improving the range it would be possible to produce an estimated 993 million pounds per year—a gain of 366.5 million pounds." In 1948 top quality beef sold on the Fort Worth market at approximately 28 cents per pound which would have made the possible gain of 366.5 million pounds worth 102,620,000 dollars.

The mesquite, ranchman's enemy number one, greatly reduces

the pounds of forage that our grassland is capable of producing. A study by the Southwestern Range Experiment Station at Tucson, Arizona, established that "forage production from perennial grasses alone on plots free of mesquite averaged two and one-half times as much as the total forage production from both mesquite and grasses on areas containing mesquite."

The mesquite tree is also a

heavy user of soil moisture. From the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station publication, Studies indicate that it requires 1-1 1/2 to 2 1/2 times as much water to produce one pound of wry mesquite matter, three times as much water as is needed to produce a pound of little bluestem grass.

Take These Safety Precautions Around Home Before Starting On Vacation

Peace of mind is the key to a real vacation. And one way to make sure that you have it along with you is to close up your house properly and securely so you won't come home to trouble.

Protect your house against fire, burglary and damage from water and vermin while you are away. If you plan to be gone for a month or more, you will want to take more precautions than for a two-weeks trip.

Arrange with a neighbor to keep an eye on your home and remove all circulars that may be left on the doorstep. A house that advertises your absence invites intruders, whether professional burglars or inquisitive children.

For this reason it is wise not to pull blinds or shades, giving the house a closed-up appearance. Make certain that deliveries, such as milk and newspapers, are stopped to avoid doorstep accumulations. Have your mail forwarded or held at the post office. Close your garage doors. And don't leave a note on the door to let callers know you are not at home.

In fact, J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI, believes many burglaries could be avoided if people would not let strangers know they plan to go away. He also advises strongly against giving anyone the impression that you keep money, jewelry or other valuables in your home.

All windows and doors should be locked securely. Don't overlook basement windows. Never leave a key in the usual hiding place.

If your house is to remain closed for any length of time, it is prudent to open the main electric power switch at the meter and close the main gas valve.

Cutting the main electric power supply, however, turns off an electric refrigerator, and for a short summer absence this is not necessary. Engineers for the National Board of Fire Underwriters advise against turning off refrigerators that are more than a few years old, because the power load required to start them up again can cause undue heating.

The gas supply for a gas refrigerator, or pilot light on a gas stove should be turned off if there is any danger of a pressure slump extinguishing the flame. Such a danger is more unlikely in summer than in winter, when more gas is being used.

Highly important, however, is the removal of all vases, milk bottles and glasses from window sills, or other places where they may act as magnifiers of the sun's rays and start fires. Also

The girls are aware of the importance of fruits and vegetables in the inter diet, and see to it that there's a plentiful variety served at the family table. To exhibit prize jars of sparkling jellies, cool green pickles and bright colored vegetables is the ambition of every girl. Records are kept of amount.

Tooth of Early-Day Man Helpful In Dental Research

The tooth of a man who died thousands of years ago helps today's dentist assess modern dental conditions, a University of Texas archaeologist says.

Teeth information gleaned from archaeologically-recovered skeletal material assists dentists in studying theoretical aspects of dentistry—relationship of tooth wear to tooth decay. Archaeologist Alex D. Krieger says. The information is part of a large body of valuable material being yielded by current archaeological studies of future damsites.

Investigations in areas to be flooded following new power development similar to that along the Colorado River are being directed by the National Park Service, utilizing the services of University of Texas archaeologists in the Texas area.

Recently Krieger has been examining the vicinity of the proposed Falcon dam, on the Rio Grande in Starr County, for the campsites of ancient man and early historic buildings.

Farm Facts



1. Breeding stock should be marked for purposes of identification and record-keeping by tattooing the ears. Numbers and letters are tattooed on the inner surface of the ears by means of a hand or an electric tattooing needle. Does may be marked in the right ear and bucks in the left.

2. Yes. The farrowing pen should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected and the floor lightly covered with a bedding of clean, dry straw. The sow should be moved into the farrowing quarters about five days before she is due to farrow. This can be done easily if the proper breeding records are kept. Before putting the sow in the farrowing pen, wash her thoroughly with soap and water and then spray or sprinkle her with a good disinfectant, such as Purina Chek-R-Pect. This is an important

practice in a sanitation program for the control of disease and parasites.

3. No. According to the Virginia Station Technical Bulletin No. 96, measurements of 294 White Leghorn pullets indicated that neither body weight within the normal range nor body type was shown to be a reliable index of egg-production ability of the hen, nor could either be used as a guide in predicting future egg production or in estimating the post production of a hen. However, birds that are definitely under weight or over weight should not be kept in a laying flock.

Super-Highways Solution to Safety Says ARBA Official

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Fool-proof highways are an "important part of the answer" to the 32,000 automobile deaths of 1948 which President Truman deplored in his address to the recent President's Highway Safety Conference. It was asserted by Charles M. Upham, engineer-director of the American Road Builders' Association, here today.

Pointing out that such an alarming number of fatalities amounts to more than half the annual death rate of World War II, Mr. Upham called the 253 Memorial Day Holiday week-end highway deaths "the latest evidence of need for better highways" and said:

"The struggle to educate the average driver that his life is too valuable to risk is a losing battle and the best solution is to give him an almost fool-proof road to drive on."

"In the years since V-J Day, surveys have been made on the accident rates on super-highways as compared with the out-moded

highways the motorist is forced to use, and the death rate has been found to drop as much as one-fourth to zero.

"In Sacramento, California, the North Sacramento Freeway built to supersede the old route, has had no fatalities during its first year of operation, and accidents were reduced 73 per cent compared with the old road statistics. "New Jersey produced a drop in fatalities amounting to three-fifths when a number of three and four-lane highways were rebuilt into divided highways."

"An example of the need for access control is the Detroit Industrial Expressway which parallels U. S. 112 for about 15 miles westward from Detroit. U. S. 112 is a divided highway for much of its length, but is without control of excess as on the Expressway. Per 100 million vehicle miles in 1946, U. S. 112 had a total of injuries and fatalities of 625.5 while the Expressway with access control had only 91.7."

"Westchester County in New York State presents a perfect example between the "old Post Road" and the Merritt Parkway. The Post Road travels through several small towns, while the Merritt Parkway skips them all, has access control and overpasses. The fatality rate from collisions between vehicles was almost four times greater on the Post Road than on the Parkway."

Plow Tilling

their fields from washing. Consequently, most of the farming in this country was and still is being done under a system of clean tillage.

But there is another method of tillage that many farmers are now using. Because all the tillage is done beneath the surface it is known as subsurface tillage. Instead of burying the dead residue of the previous crop, subsurface tillage leaves it on top of the soil. The crop residue, make up of stubble plus other parts of the previous crops, forms a mulch—a "stubble mulch"—that protect the land. Thus this system of farming has come to be called stubble-mulch farming.

This system enriches the soil with plant food, conserves moisture, and reduces soil losses. Grain stubble is best utilized when left on or in the surface layer of the soil because the organic content furnishes nitrogen and food for essential bacterial action. It also absorbs moisture which it later releases to the soil, while at the same time provides a cover to prevent evaporation.

The tilling of the soil, is greatly improved through the use of stubble mulching and will be appreciated when plowing the following crop. To burn the stubble is to destroy the benefits described above, while at the same time it encourages soil erosion and lower productivity.

Some of the cooperators of the California Creek Soil Conservation District use a one-way plow or a chisel-type plow to accomplish stubble mulching. The chisel-type plow leaves the crop residue near or on the surface. Where a "plow-sole" or a tight layer of soil develops it is advisable to list the ground deeper than normal one year out of three or four.

Now that wheat harvest is about over, it is time for all farmers to think about stubble mulching. Research studies have shown that a field of wheat land on which the residue had been left after harvest, lost less than 1-5 inch of water through runoff and 1-5 of a ton of soil per acre as compared to a loss of three inches and 27 tons per acre on a field followed and clean-cultivated through the year. There were 3 1/2 inches more water in the upper 6 foot layer of soil of the stubble mulched field than where straw had been turned under and clean-followed.

Pioneering Type of Vacation Is Offered At Big Bend National Park

Texans looking for a hardy, pioneering sort of vacation to a spot still of the beaten path, with scenery, romantic atmosphere and glimpses of rare wild life to reward them, can find such a place this summer in Big Bend National Park.

Facilities in the park still are limited and it is necessary to write in advance for reservations, addressing either National Park Concessions, Big Bend National Park, Marathon, Texas or Dr. Ross Maxwell, park superintendent, at the Marathon office.

In the "big bend" of the Rio Grande where the river gashes southward in deep gorges through the mountains to form the boundary between Texas and Mexico, Big Bend National Park still relatively is undeveloped, remote from the usual conveniences of civilization and has a wild, desert grandeur unlike that of any other national park.

Tourists going there certainly need have no fear of being disturbed by the noise and rush of urban traffic, because park headquarters in the Basin of the Chisos Mountains are 82 miles from the nearest railroad and telephone lines at Marathon.

Santa Elena Canyon, at the southwestern extremity of the park is one of the scenic wonders of America, with walls towering 2,000 feet perpendicularly in height. Its treacherous rapids have been navigated by few men, and numerous persons have lost their lives attempting the passage. Downstream from it are the successive canyons of Mariscal, San Vicente, Hot Springs and Boquillas, below which is the historic Stillwell's Crossing, where Pershing's expedition went into Mexico in 1916 in search of Pancho Villa.

A paved highway leads 46 miles southward from Marathon to the park entrance at Persimmon Gap, thence a graded road surfaced with crushed rock winds 42 miles across Tornillo Flats and up Green Gulch into the fantastically shaped volcanic peaks of the Chisos Mountains.

Deer, antelope, desert foxes and small wild pigs or javelinas scamper across the roadway. Cacti bloom in profusion and summer rains make the nights cool. Surplus Army hutsments have been set up in the Basin near

park headquarters, with 72 double beds for maximum accommodation of only 114 persons. National Park Concessions operates a modern restaurant, "The Chuck Wagon," in this cabin area, and a filling station to provide gasoline, oil, tires and minor repairs. Tents are available for emergency shelter when cabin accommodations overflow.

Dr. Maxwell is hopeful that a string of saddle horses will be available this summer for the first time and arrangements to that end are in negotiation.

The park already has had more than 21,000 visitors in 1949, before the tourist travel season really is started, and Maxwell is confident that last year's total of 40,900 will be more than doubled.

Tourists who go to the park should provide themselves with light clothing for trips during the day to warm areas along the Rio Grande, and with wraps for the chill nights and summer rains in the 5,500-foot mountain valley of the Chisos in the cabin area. They need to carry, too, thermos jugs to have handy at all times for side trips around the park where drinking water is scarce or absent. Sun glasses and sunburn lotion also are essentials of travel gear.

Square dances, campfire storytelling dealing with the colorful history of the Big Bend country, and conducted group trips also are arranged by the park service.

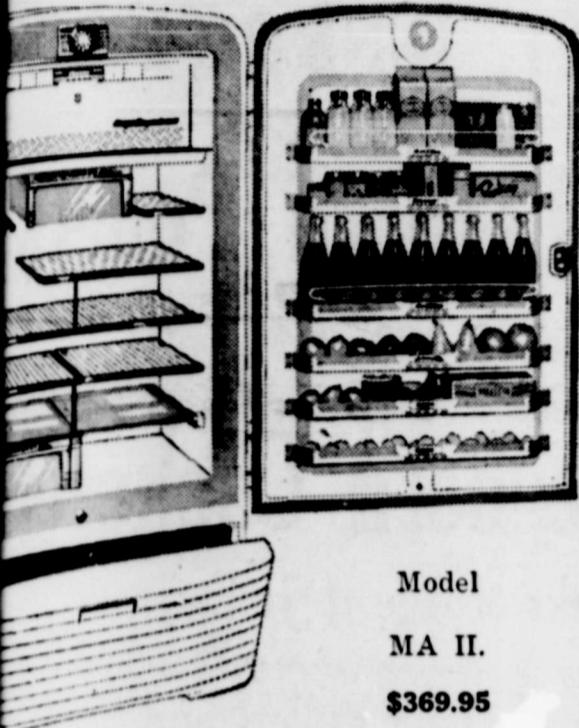

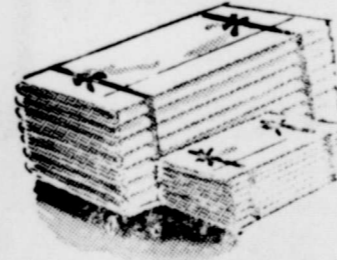

Price of Texas Farm Land Declines 6 Per Cent From 1948 Levels

Farm and ranch land prices have dropped six per cent since last year. But that's only a drop in the bucket when you compare it with land prices during the period between 1935-39. C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A&M College, says that today's land prices in Texas are still 96 per cent above those of 10 to 14 years ago. After ten years of steady climbing, farm and ranch land prices in the entire nation appear to have passed a postwar peak.

Declines in prices of farm products in recent months was probably the major factor affecting the level of land prices. This downward drift began little less than a year ago in August, and has had quite an influence on prospective land buyers. Since the land values have risen slower than the net farm income since 1940, there's a good

chance that land price declines will lag behind commodity price drops. If farm costs remain extremely high and limits the net return to operators, the land value drop may increase in rate, Bates says.

Even though government price supports are active on many farm products and livestock, the net farm income is expected to continue downward. High fixed costs become more of a burden as the net profits are trimmed.

Therefore, buyers should attempt to keep land payments down to a manageable size to prevent hardship or possible loss of equity in lands recently acquired, Bates concludes.

New Poisons Developed To Bring Quick Death To Grasshoppers

There is an easier and better way to protect your crops against grasshoppers than the use of poison baits.

Any of three newly-developed insecticides—chloridane, toxaphene or benzene hexachloride—are recommended by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for general use against hoppers on a large number of crops, according to Successful Farming Magazine.

Another well-known insecticide, DDT, doesn't work against grasshoppers.

Experimental work with the three insecticides has been carried on by the federal and state agencies long enough to be sure of the results. Each has advantages and your choice should depend upon your special needs. The type of sprayer or duster you use makes little difference so

long as the insecticide goes on evenly and in the right amounts.

All three insecticides are both stomach and contact poisons. Under field conditions, chloridane and toxaphene are best as stomach poisons. Because the insecticides are sold in many different forms, you'll need to read and follow manufacturers' directions carefully. Here are a few guideposts, especially for corn-belt farmers:

Chloridane is best as a spray made from an emulsion. For half-grown and most full-grown hoppers, use one-half pound of actual chloridane per acre. Double the dose for full-grown or big, yellow grasshoppers. Chloridane is a slow killer and results are not apparent at once. But hoppers stop feeding as soon as they swallow a good dose. The killing effect of chloridane lasts about 10 days.

Benzene hexachloride is best as a dust, although it may be used as a spray made from wettable powder. Use at the rate of three-tenths of a pound of actual gamma isomer benzene hexachloride per acre or 30 pounds of 1 per cent gamma isomer dust per acre. (Directions on the package will tell you how to get this concentration.) The effect of this insecticide lasts about two days.

Toxaphene or chlorinated camphene can be used as a dust, as a wettable powder or as an emulsion. The emulsion usually lasts longer. Toxaphene is available in 10 or 20 per cent dusts. It gives good results at the rate of 30 pounds of 10 per cent dust per acre. As an emulsion, it should be used at the rate of one and a half pounds of actual toxaphene against small hoppers or two and a half or three pounds against large hoppers. Toxaphene is effective for about 10 days.

If the hoppers are confined to the field you want to treat, you can do a good job with benzene hexachloride. But if the pests are moving into your field from the outside, you'll be wise to use the longer-lasting chloridane or toxaphene.

Cost of applying these new insecticides varies with the type of equipment and the material used. Material costs will vary from about \$1.25 to \$2.25 per acre.

None of the insecticides should be used on forage crops or fruit just before harvest as they may be harmful to domestic animals or human beings. Toxic residues of chloridane and toxaphene will disappear in about three weeks. Benzene hexachloride residues will be gone in about one week.

It's Your Hide Those Chiggers Want!

Ants may come to your picnic, but chiggers will go home with you—unless you take the advice of Duke University scientists.

Dr. G. W. Wharton, Duke zoologist, has completed a study of the little red monster's life and habits. For all his efforts, he found no thoroughly satisfactory treatment for chigger bites.

But Dr. Wharton did nip some false ideas about chiggers, alias red bugs. They don't get under your skin for a good meal. Instead they bite you and drop off. You itch worse after he's gone than while he's still grazing.

Scratching only prolongs the itching, and may cause infection. The best treatment for chiggers is to go where they aren't. They avoid hardwood groves, so a growth of elms is a good campsite.

Chiggers' favorite hangouts are low in the ground near rotten logs, tree stumps or blackberry brambles. And through some sort of insect radar, they can tell when you're coming.

And if you believe the old theory that you can't get chiggers at night, an evening in the woods will yield a fine set of red bumps to show you they work right around the clock.

There's one thing to your favor. Chiggers are attracted only to stationary objects. Keep walking and you're itchless.

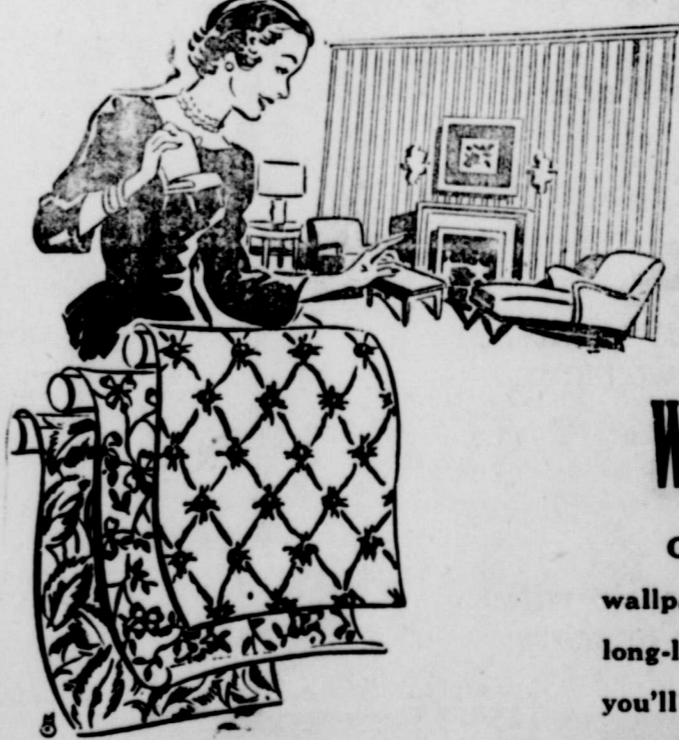

Suits In the Bag Often A Problem For Vacationer

Packing a man's suit in a traveling bag often presents a problem . . . especially to men. It's a pretty hard job trying to pack a man's suit without wrinkling it at the end of the journey with more creases than there should be.

Mary Routh, extension clothing specialist of Texas A&M College, has a few tips on how to get where you're going with the least number of wrinkles. Such practice lengthens the life of the suit and saves pressing bills as well.

Don't spare the tissue paper in suit packing, Miss Routh advises. Use it generously. It helps keep the wrinkles out of suits. Now, for the average suitcase—wider than the gladstone—lay the coat flat on a table or bed, with the collar and lapels turned up. Lap the right front over the left front, bringing both sides over as far as possible without wrinkling the suit.

Sleeves should lie smoothly along the coat. Turn them a little above the elbow and fold up. Then pick up the lower edge of the suit and fold toward suit's top.

With a gladstone bag, the only difference is making one more fold in the body of the coat . . . up and back. The coat sleeves are not folded separately as for the suitcase.

Trousers are no problem, Miss Routh says. Just make sure the creases are straight and the pocket once or twice, depending on the size of the bag.

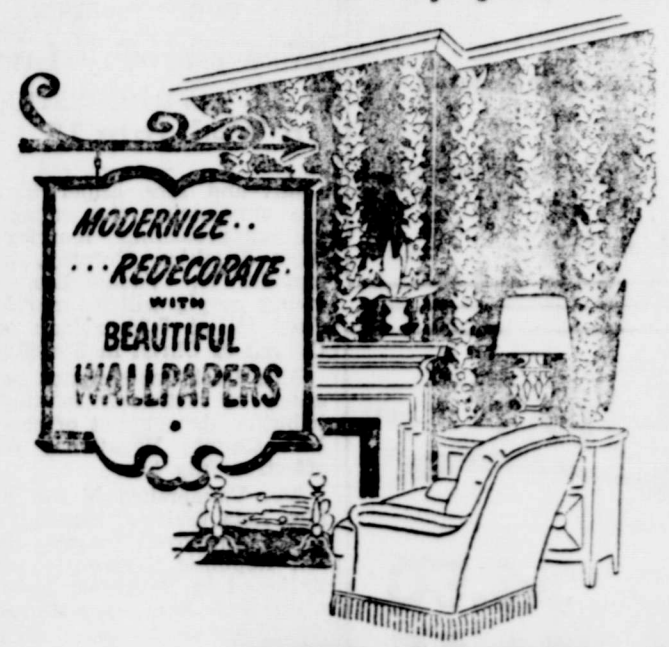

Canned Bean Sprouts Go with Steak



BEAN sprouts used so extensively in chop suey and chow mein dishes take on a thoroughly American air when French fried and served with steak. Fried, these thin white sprouts, have the texture of onions but offer a new and delicate flavor. This side dish with steak may be made in 5 minutes because the bean sprouts need only be dredged in flour and fried.

Bean sprouts are the offshoots of the mung bean. Until 1949, the average of mung beans reached a total of over 14 million pounds in 1949. When sprouted, each pound of mung beans will produce from 10 to 15 pounds of bean sprouts. Today, almost all the bean sprouts produced in this country are canned. Evidence of the growing demand for this food is the fact that in 1948, 1,500 pounds a day were produced a very large production. Now the same canner may put up 15,000 to 20,000 pounds a day.

Bean sprouts are still largely used in Chinese dishes but they take to Yankee cookery, being delicious in soups, as an ingredient in stuffed peppers, as a vegetable dish in mixed green and fruit salads. Besides their novel flavor they offer important food values. They are a very good source of Vitamin C and B and offer fair amounts of Vitamin A. They are fiber-free, easily digested and low in calories. Win prizes from your family at dinner by serving French fried bean sprouts with steak or grilled hamburgers. Here is the recipe for:

French Fried Bean Sprouts

1/2 cup flour 1 No. 2 can bean sprouts, drained
2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 teaspoon pepper

Mix flour, salt and pepper together. Dip bean sprouts in milk and then dredge in seasoned flour a few at a time so that more flour will adhere to each one. Fry in deep, hot fat (350°F.) 2 to 4 minutes, until light brown. Drain on soft paper. YIELD: 6 servings.

Too Much Sunshine Harmful to Potatoes

Potatoes are like people — at least in one way. They don't like to get sunburned. It's not good for them.

After 30 minutes in the sun, potatoes become blistered, and from there on out, you've got a job trying to keep them in good quality. J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A&M College, says home gardeners will find that the best time for harvesting potatoes is early in the morning or late in the evening. And right after pulling them up, move them over into the shade.

A look at the plants will tell the potato grower when it's time to harvest — when 50 per cent of the leaves have turned brown. And that means along about now for most of the Texas home gardeners.

Select a cool, shady spot for storing potatoes, and spread them out so they don't touch each other. Boxes and baskets full of potatoes—especially when stored in unventilated rooms — is a fast way to promote decay. If you

plan to store your spuds in bins or rooms with concrete or wooden floors, it's a good idea to spread hay or sand over the floor first, Rosborough says.

The potatoes damaged in the harvesting process should be consumed first, and not allowed to keep with the other potatoes.

So don't allow potatoes to be stored with the other potatoes. He concludes.

KITCHEN MEMO

There's something extra special about strawberry pie that puts a gleam in a man's eye. Strawberry Chiffon Pie mixture is cooked on the top burner, then turned into a pastry shell. Soften 2 envelope unflavored gelatine in 1/2 cup cold water in saucepan. Blend together 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tbsp. flour, 1/4 tsp. salt. Add to softened gelatine. Mix thoroughly. Place over medium flame stirring constantly until thickened, then remove from flame. Add 1 cup crushed strawberries, 2 tbsps. lemon juice. Chill until mixture is slightly thicker than consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Fold in 1 cup whipped cream or 1/2 cup dry cold whipped evaporated milk. Turn into 8-inch baked pastry shell and chill until firm. Garnish with additional whipped cream and whole strawberries.

If you like to scent your linens or underwear, put sachet powder in cheesecloth bag and toss in with the drying laundry in your automatic gas dryer. The tumbling action helps the aroma to penetrate evenly through the clothes.

At least 15 gals. of hot water of 140°-160° (F.) are needed to wash and rinse 8 to 9 lbs. of soiled cottons. Using less than this won't get clothes clean. An adequate supply of hot water will always be available where there is a quick recovery automatic gas water heater in the house because the supply more than keeps up with the demand.

To freshen dried lemons, cover with cold water and allow to stand for several hours.

Modern Sewage Plant, But Now Taxed to Capacity

Haskell residents and city officials are protesting the fact that the modern sewage disposal plant is taxed to capacity. The plant, located on the east side of town, is a 20 ft. long and 20 ft. deep. It can dispose of about 800,000 gallons daily. When the tank proper has filled with digested sewage, there are two 10-inch gate valves to draw sludge from. This sludge is drawn to a pit 40 ft. square. The pit has a network of perforated clay tile, covered with a 6 inch layer of sand, then a 6 inch layer of gravel, and then an 8 inch layer of

rock. This allows what water there is in the sludge to penetrate through the filter bed and return to the creek.

All sewage effluence is run from the Imhoff tank to the creek or is spread out over 7 1/4 acres of ground through ditches. As a rule this effluence is allowed to run into the creek for a two weeks period, then over the 7 1/4 acres for two weeks. This is done to prevent overtaxing the creek or the field.

The sewage plant is located 1 1/4 mile southeast of town proper. The effluent is treated regularly to keep down flies, etc., and there is no odor. This may seem hard to believe, but plant workers invite anyone to check this statement by a personal investigation.

The plant was built to accommodate a town of 3,000 people. With Haskell's population now estimated at 5,000, it can readily be seen the plant is over-loaded. The situation is not so bad in the winter months, but in summer and fall, those in charge of the plant and Imhoff tank are faced with a major problem.

The sewer department does not make any money, because all money from sewer rentals is required to pay current bond issues, plus a 1927 bond issue of which a portion is yet to be retired. The system has about 800 sewer customers now and a few are added each month.

Other than a few minor stoppages, and maintaining the Imhoff tank, there is no expense to the sewer department as far as operation of the disposal plant is concerned.

Termite Kills Plants And Trees With No Outward Showing

Your plants may have termite trouble and you not know it. A plant may be killed by them with-

out showing outward sign of injury. Yet, the inside of the plant may be hollowed out by these wood pests. Termites often kill trees or shrubs by starting underground in the dead or dying roots of the plant, and working upward, says Sadie Hatfield, extension

landscape gardening specialist of Texas A&M College. Or they may enter the plant at the ground level, boring into dead or diseased wood that attracts them. When you know your plant has been infected with termites, the best idea is to dig it up and burn it. If the plant dies without showing any signs of disease, take a look at it and see what the symptoms are. Cut the stems and roots in several places and examine the centers. If they are hollowed out, there's a good chance termites did it, says Miss Hatfield.

And they may attack other garden plants unless you destroy them. All dead wood and other decayed vegetable matter should be removed. Treat the soil with DDT, using 10 pounds of 100 per cent DDT or 100 pounds of 10 per cent DDT for every thousand square feet. Distribute evenly, work it into the soil, and soak the ground thoroughly with water.

The white termites don't come out into the light. The dark ones are the only ones that come to the surface. Grass lawns are often tunneled by termites, and this year they have been especially active.

This DDT treatment will rid your lawn of termites, but won't bother the grass, Miss Hatfield says. It isn't necessary to spade the lawn, she reminds, because the water will carry the DDT into the soil.

This is the reason for soaking the soil to a depth of 8 or 10 inches.

Pasture Mowing Gives Grass Chance Against Weeds

Pasture grasses have a pretty tough time of it fighting their way through weeds. And, many times, weeds win out in the plant war.

Mowing is generally considered a good practice for getting rid of the weeds in pastures, says Robert B. Lancaster, extension pasture specialist of Texas A&M College. Mowing the brush, brambles, vines and the husky weeds that spring up on newly-cleared, fertile land puts them on the way out and gives the desirable pasture grasses a good chance to take over.

At the same time, mowing pastures freshens the over-grown, stemmy grasses. But, often, too much is expected of weed eradication by mowing, especially on poor-laid pastures, he says.

Pasture weed control in the humid regions of Texas usually calls for fertilizing, and in some cases reseeding. Until the pasture grasses are thrifty enough to replace mowed weeds, mowing is hardly worthwhile.

If you're going to mow to control weeds, mowing must start when the first of the worst weeds begin to bloom, or soon enough to mow all of them before the seed can form. Bitterweed, a common pest in bermuda-grass pastures, may hold enough vitality to mature seed from the blooms even after it has been mowed. So, the way to stop this, Lancaster says, is to mow early and often. Cut high enough the first time so the sprouting stubble can be mowed again and again as it blooms repeatedly.

Clovers volunteer best in short grass. The fall clover stand and spring lespedeza stand in permanent pastures depend largely on enough sunlight for germination and growth of the seedlings. This indicates close razing or mowing in both seasons to favor these crops.

Grazing too close in both fall and spring might injure the pasture, Lancaster concludes. So, to avoid this, two pastures might be grazed alternately.

Field Training For WAC Reservists Due In Summer

Members of the WAC section of the Organized Reserve Corps will receive summer field training this year on a national scale for the first time since establishment of the Corps, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced here today.

Provision has been made to hold two fifteen-day orientation training courses at the Women's Army Corps Training Center, Camp Lee, Virginia. These are for WAC Reservists assigned to units which will train at camps not having suitable facilities for women personnel, and for WAC personnel not assigned to units. The first course will run from July 5 to July 29, the second from July 30 to August 13.

"The women members of the Army's Organized Reserve Corps comprise an important ingredient in our National Security program," Colonel Abbott said. "They deserve continuing adequate training. These and succeeding WAC Reserve camps are designed for that purpose."

It is planned to delegate WAC summer training in the future to the various Army Areas.

The summer camp will indoctrinate members of the WAC Reserve in their duties in the peacetime army and orient them on the overall function of the Organized Reserve Corps. Participation of WAC Reservists will be on a voluntary basis.
