Immediate survivors include his wife, Mrs. Nanny Viola Hattox; three sons, Gaston, Clay and Payne Hattox, Haskell business men; and two daughters, Mrs. C. S. Steigler of San Antonio, and Mrs. Henry Shipp of Lubbock; three sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Jenkins of De Leon, and Mrs. Jennie Hodges of Littlefield. Eight grandchildren also survive.

Tracy Grimes, HHS graduate and former outstanding player on the Indian football squad, who was seriously injured in an automobile accident near Van Horn two weeks ago, was brought from an El Paso hospital Monday to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Welton Howard in this city.

First bale of cotton from the 1949 crop to be ginned in Haskell was brought in Thursday afternoon, August 18, and processed at the Haskell Co-Op Gin for Herbert Rueffer, farmer of the Mattson community northeast of Haskell.

This year's first bale was received one day ahead of 1948's initial bale, which was brought in Aug. 18 last year by W. H. Harrell from his farm in the old Foster community. Last year's bale was also processed at the same gin.

The bale ginned for Mr. Rueffer weighed 540 pounds, a turn-out from 2300 pounds of pulled seed cotton. The sample was classed by USDA standards as light spotted Strict Middling, 1-inch staple, with a Government loan value of 28.44c per pound, according to R. W. Turnbow, manager of the Co-Op Gin. The bale was not marketed.

Mr. Rueffer was given the annual "first bale" premium offered by Haskell merchants through the agricultural committee of the Chamber of Commerce. The premium will amount to approximately \$125.00.

This year's first bale was from a field of about 30 acres of early cotton, planted in April by Mr. Rueffer. He estimated that he pulled over about 20 acres in gathering the bale, and now has considerable more open cotton ready to gather.

Mrs. Palmer reported the mobile unit and the interest the books brought to the children of the county. In reading the report Mrs. Rainwater thought the Haskell County Library would be the best place to place her collection because they would be available throughout the county. The collection includes the following: complete sets; Shakespeare, O. Henry, Dickens, Muhlbach's Histories, Romanesque, George Eliott, Mark Twain, Victor Hugo, Balzac, Science Histories of the Universe, Rudyard Kipling, many books of poems and other volumes.

According to Mrs. Palmer, it is planned to place an appropriate marker in the mobile unit and in addition each book will be marked to show its donor.

## Two Completions, New Offset Mark Oil Activity This Week

## WEINERT SCHOOL WILL BEGIN TERM ON SEPT. 5

According to Supt. Connor Horton, the Weinert School will open Monday morning, Sept. 5th. All buses will leave at 7:45 and will return to the school at 8:45. There will be a general assembly at 9:00 and all parents are invited.

The school has made many improvements since last year. The library has been enlarged and remodeled and new books have been added. The Study Hall teacher will supervise the use of the library and students will have access to books and magazines at all times.

Work is now underway to improve the water situation at the Weinert school. A huge underground storage tank is being constructed at the school and will furnish plenty of water for the school's use. Many more improvements are underway such as the gymnasium, which has been re-sanded, courts re-marked, ventilation improved, three coats of gym finish put on, and two storage rooms added to the building.

The school will add two new courses to its curriculum this year. Health Education, which was affiliated last year, will be taught by Coach Jones who is the most qualified instructor in that particular field. Driver Training and General Safety will be taught by J. Julian. A new 1949 model Ford with dual control will be furnished by Bill Wilson Motor Co., Haskell dealer for Ford and Mercury. This new automobile will be used for training purposes in the Weinert High School.

Since one out of every three people in the United States own an automobile, the people of Weinert community have decided it is about time that schools start teaching boys and girls how to drive. Since most of the accidents in the U. S. are caused by the teen age youngsters, the school feels obligated and is ready to assume the responsibility of teaching this type of course in the High School where it should be taught. It isn't necessary to know how to build or operate an automobile in order to operate it properly. It isn't necessary to know how to direct traffic in order to abide by the rules of safe driving. But there are certain fundamentals of car construction and operation, which, if understood by the driver, will enable him to handle his car more capably in any driving situation. These are a few of the most important things that will be taught in the Driver Training Course, a member of the Weinert faculty said.

Under the Gilmer-Aiken plan, Weinert will qualify for fifteen teachers. The teaching staff has been completed and should be one of the best in the history of the school. All of the teachers have degrees and are teaching in his or her minor or major fields. The prospects for a good school year are bright, and both faculty members and patrons of the Weinert school are looking forward to one of the best terms in the school's history.

### CURRY CHAPEL PASTOR ACCEPTS PLACE ON COLLEGE FACULTY

Rev. William L. Stegall, former pastor of Curry Chapel Baptist Church, is resigning his position with the Abilene city police force to accept the professorship of sociology at the University of Corpus Christi.

Completion of one producer, with early verdict due on another potential discovery, staking of an extension offset in the Burson field, and rapid drilling progress on a wide extension try for Canyon reef production in the South Haskell pool, highlighted oil activity this week in the immediate vicinity of Haskell.

In the South Haskell field, Stanolind Oil Gas Co. has completed their No. 1 Pleasant with a potential of 137.37 barrels of 38 gravity oil in 24 hours. The well, a southeast offset to the same company's Canyon reef discovery for this area, No. 1 Pace, flowed through quarter inch choke from open hole at 3,614-24 feet. Tubing pressure was 50 pounds.

North of Haskell, in the Burson field, Humble Oil & Refining Co. were preparing to drill plug with cable tools in the No. 1 J. D. Brown, north offset to the discovery well, 467 feet from the south and west lines of Block 7, J. Wilson Survey. Total depth is 4,763 feet in sand. Coring operations from 4,737-63 feet recovered 15 feet of sand showing oil. Casing was set at 4,678 feet.

Humble was moving in machinery and rigging up Thursday for second offset, their No. 1 C. G. Burson Sr., located 467 feet out of the southeast corner of Block 1, J. Wilson Survey. This tract joins the discovery tract on which Humble's No. 1 C. G. Burson Jr. was developed.

Southeast of Haskell, operators were drilling ahead Thursday on Thos. D. Humphrey No. 1 T. L. Ballard, southwest extension try for Canyon reef production operated by Stanolind in the No. 1 Pace discovery.

Humphrey, Dallas independent oil operator, also has started drilling operations on a deep wildcat test 5 miles northwest of Rule, his No. 1 John Behringer, located in the southeast part of the 2,348 acre Behringer tract in Green B. Cook Survey, Abst. 39.

Seven miles northeast of Haskell, Roark, Hooker & Roark have plugged and abandoned the No. 1 R. C. Couch, at a total depth of 4,476 feet. Location of the wildcat was 467 feet from the south and east line of J. Williams Survey 79.

Six miles northeast of Weinert, R-H-K Drilling Company No. 1 S. L. Griffith, was reported drilling below 1,410 feet Thursday. On permit to 6,000 feet with rotary, the wildcat is 330 feet from south and east lines of Section 214, M. W. Crittenden Survey.

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**Correct Posture Important For School Child**

Correct posture in school children, and adults as well, is necessary to proper physical and mental development, says a warning from the Texas State Department of Health. "Good posture is a sign of self respect and plays an important part in winning the respect of others," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childhood," he said. "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are born in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a high percentage to be suffering from poor posture. Malnutrition and fatigue are productive of poor posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decrease the lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards."

"School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands to rest upon the tops without the shoulders being hunched up.

"Begin early in life to teach your children to stand straight and sit straight for health and self-confidence, and they should grow into strong, well built men and women."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 36**

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas. Classified Ad.

1 1/2 cups dried corn meal  
1 1/2 cups water  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup oil  
2 1/2 cups diced celery  
1 cup liquid off green beans  
1/2 cup fat milk

2 1/2 cups dried corn meal  
2 cups water  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup oil  
1 1/2 cups diced celery  
1/2 cup liquid, cut green beans, cooked or canned  
1/2 cup fat milk

Put meat into skillet with hot shortening. Cover and cook slowly about 30 minutes, or until tender and brown. Add onions, celery, bean liquid, chop sney sauce and corn syrup. Cover; cook slowly 10 minutes longer. Stir in mixture of flour and water. Boil and stir 2 minutes. Add green beans and milk. Heat thoroughly, but do not boil. Serve with boiled rice, spaghetti or macaroni. Makes 4 servings. \*Beef, veal or lean pork can be used.

**Correct Posture Important For School Child**

Correct posture in school children, and adults as well, is necessary to proper physical and mental development, says a warning from the Texas State Department of Health. "Good posture is a sign of self respect and plays an important part in winning the respect of others," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childhood," he said, "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are born in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a high percentage to be suffering from poor posture. Malnutrition and fatigue are productive of poor posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decrease the lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards. "School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands to rest upon the tops without the shoulders being hunched up. "Begin early in life to teach your children to stand straight and sit straight for health and self-confidence, and they should grow into strong, well built men and women."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 36**

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation and have it published as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

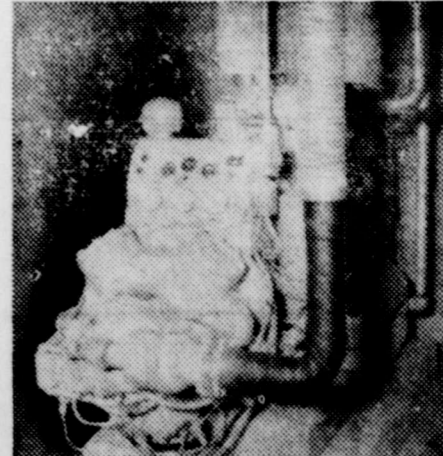

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Tex-

as be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballot shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. 25-4tc

### LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for the retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election. 25-4tc.

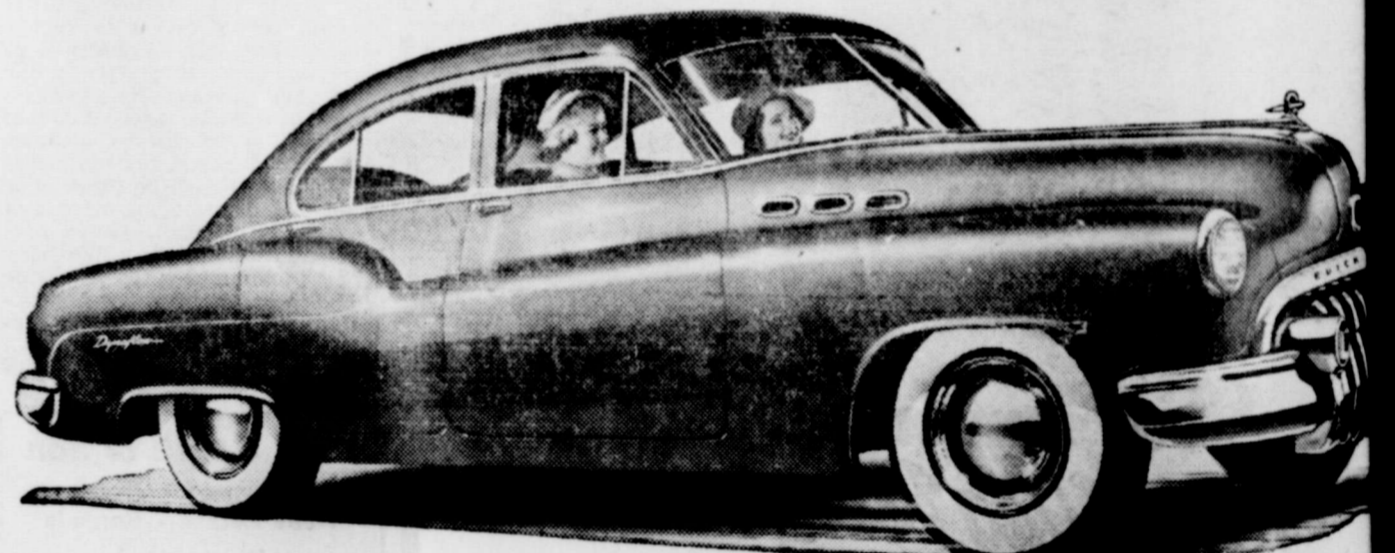
