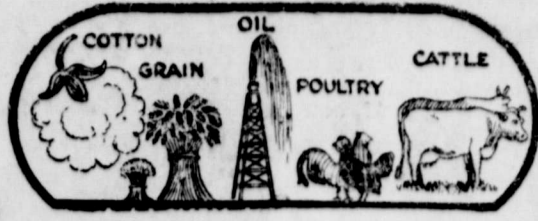

## Plan on California Creek Is Proposed By U. S. Bureau

Meeting of representatives of twelve towns and communities in the Baskin Dam area, Knox City Monday, the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation offered to set a \$11,500,000 domestic project that would supply the member communities of the Baskin Dam Association 50 years.

Association executive committee, or other representatives of most of the towns in the area met with Harry Burson, U. S. Bureau area planning engineer and Henry Seipt, his assistant to hear the proposal.

High said the facility would be located on California Creek, approximately 13 miles southeast of Haskell, if any of the member communities favored the project. All or any number of the communities could be served by water from the reservoir.

Water in California Creek is in quantity to make the project feasible, Seipt said. He estimated that 58,200 residents of the area would be served by at least 11,250 acre-feet of water. About 100 acre-feet could be imported from California Creek, he said.

Representatives were asked to submit a decision to the U. S. Bureau within two weeks. Burson said he would return to Haskell on Tuesday.

## Ground Breaking For New Church Planned Sunday

Ground breaking ceremony for the new Trinity Lutheran Church to be erected in East Haskell will be held Sunday afternoon at 3:45 p. m. Pastor M. C. Hoermann has announced.

An appropriate program is being planned for the occasion, and all members of the church are urged to attend and the public is invited. Rev. Hoermann, who has been pastor of the church since January, 1949, will be in charge of the program.

For a number of years following its organization, Trinity Lutheran church services were held in the Irby school building east of Haskell until the building was sold and dismantled last summer. Since that time the congregation has been meeting in the First Presbyterian Church here.

A one acre tract for the new church building has been donated by Martin Rueffer of this city, located on the north side of the Throckmorton highway just outside the east city limits.

The building to be erected will be of brick veneer, 26x60 feet, with an overflow room 30x40 feet. The modern structure will be adequate for the congregation's needs for many years, planners believe.

Herbert Fischer will superintend construction of the building and a considerable amount of labor will be furnished by members.

In addition to the school post he had held since 1920, Arnold was secretary of the chamber of commerce, secretary of the Goree Masonic lodge and past district deputy of the organization.

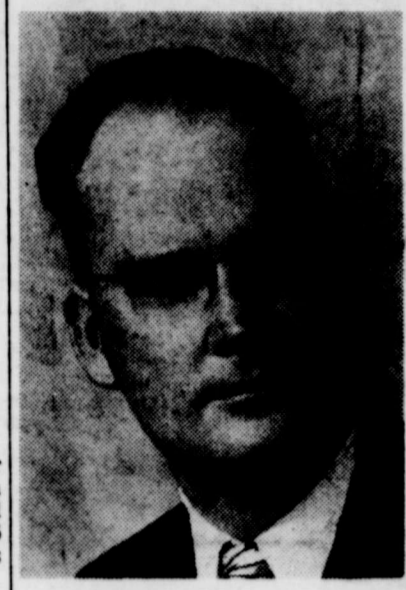
He is survived by his widow, two sons, three daughters, a brother and three sisters.

### Directors of Phone Co-Op Apply For State Charter

Meeting here Monday, March 13, temporary directors of the Haskell County Rural Telephone Cooperative made application for a state charter to officially set up a phone cooperative serving the rural areas of Haskell county. Articles of incorporation were set up by the directors and By-Laws of the organization were adopted.

Previously, an application had been filed for a \$400,000 REA loan to finance the project.

Directors, who are serving in a temporary capacity until the charter is issued, are C. G. Burson, president; R. O. Henry of Rule vice president; Earl Atchison, secretary; treasurer, J. C. Dunnam; Weinert; J. A. Clark, Sagerton; W. A. Montgomery, Pant Creek; D. R. Brown, Rochester.

As soon as the charter is obtained from the Secretary of State directors said that a meeting of prospective subscribers will be called and the organization set in motion. It is the plan of the board to hold several meetings over the area to discuss rural telephone problems and to secure signed applications.

Phillip D. Treadwell, 64, former resident of Haskell and Throckmorton counties and a brother of City Marshal Eal Treadwell of this city, died in Lubbock Thursday, March 10, at 11:45 p. m., following a heart attack. Mr. Treadwell, a resident of Junction, Texas, had gone to Lubbock for medical treatment.

Born Feb. 11, 1886 in Hamilton County, Texas, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Treadwell, who were early settlers in Throckmorton county. He married Miss Virgie Smith of Haskell in 1918. She preceded him in death several years ago. Mr. Treadwell had been a member of the Church of Christ at Throckmorton since early marriage.

**Gages Installed To Register Flow Of Paint Creek**

Staff gauges to register the quantity and quality of water flowing in Paint Creek have been installed at Scott's Crossing, about 12 miles southeast of Haskell. This is in the vicinity of the site recommended for a proposed dam that would supply water for domestic use to Stamford and possibly other towns in this area, including Haskell.

Installation of the gauges was made by engineers of the U. S. Geological Survey, and they also assembled data concerning the highest known flood stage reached by the stream at this point.

Members of the engineering party making the installation, which was completed last week, included George P. Terfield of Austin, Wiley Haydon of Stamford, Onie Cross and Louis Hodges.

According to information assembled by the engineers, highest flood stage on Paint Creek in the vicinity of Scott's Crossing has been fixed at approximately 17 feet. This level, according to all information available, has been reached three times—in 1876, 1900 and in 1930.

Daily readings of the gauger placed at the Crossing will be taken by J. M. Diggs, rural route carrier out of the Haskell post-office. Water samples from the stream will be taken at intervals and during periods of heavy runoff by a Stamford engineer.

HUSBAND-TESTED RECIPE

**Chili Tamale Ring**  
Broadcast: March 18, 1950

2 slightly beaten eggs 3 tablespoons finely cut onion  
No. 2 can cream 1/4 cup finely cut green pepper  
1/2 cup corn meal 1 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons melted shortening 2 cups canned chili con carne

Turn on oven; set at moderate (375° F.). Grease well, then dust with flour a quart ring mold or baking dish. Mix beaten eggs, corn, milk, corn meal, shortening, onion, green pepper and salt. Put into prepared ring or dish. Bake on center shelf of oven about 45 minutes or until firm and light brown. Loosen edges with knife. Turn out and fill center with heated chili con carne. Makes 4 servings.

NOTE: If baking dish is used, serve from dish with the chili poured over the servings.

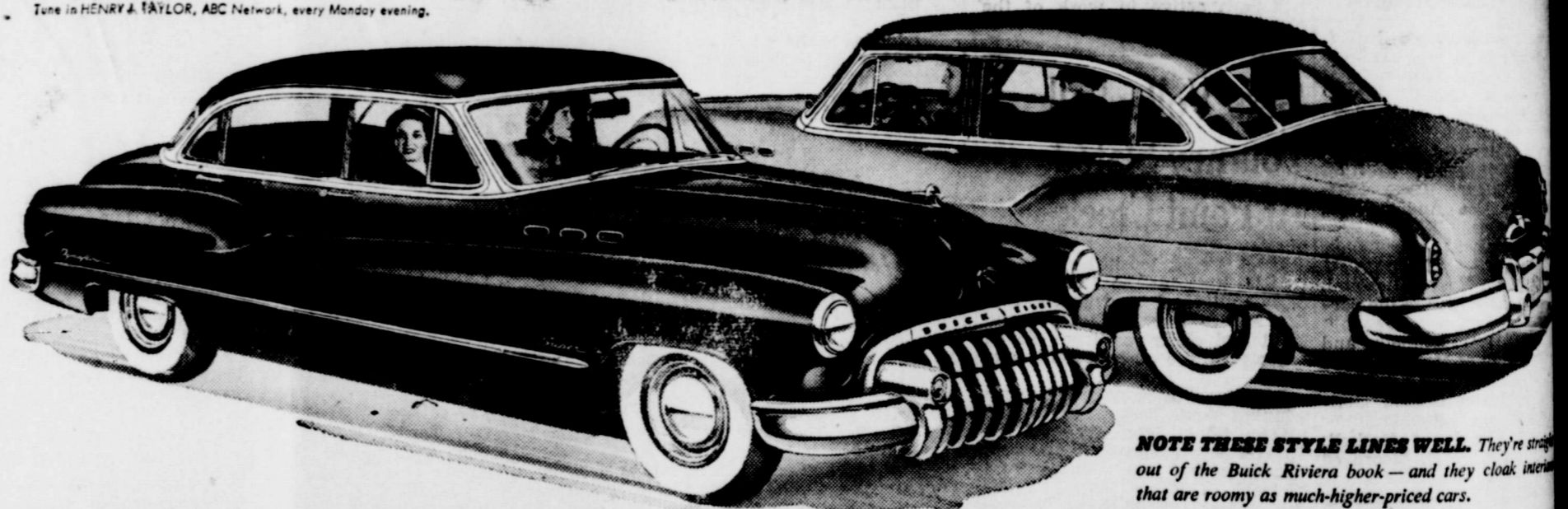

Burleigh explained that if only one community favors the project it will be launched, but only on a scale to service that community.

Burleigh said the bureau has spent approximately \$100,000 in searching for an ample domestic water source in the upper reaches of the Brazos River. He added that the Bureau of Reclamation

is ready to spend from \$23,000,000 to \$25,000,000 to supply community needs in this area.

In conjunction with the domestic water discussion, Burleigh and Seipt announced that the bureau was prepared to continue development of the original Baskin site on Double Mountain Creek as an irrigation project if the association would eliminate existing difficulties.

He pointed out that the Brazos River Reclamation and Conservation District is also studying the construction of an irrigation dam on Double Mountain.

R. D. Collins, general manager of the Brazos group said his organization would be ready within three weeks to present construction and irrigation water cost figures to the Baskin Association for a comparative study with the bureau's proposal.

Burleigh requested that the Baskin group poll farmer interest in the proposed irrigation district before his organization would make further study, thus eliminating double effort without any assurance of acceptance.

The meeting ended without a definite decision on whether the Brazos group or the bureau would construct the irrigation dam, but a long-sought solution to the domestic water problem seemed certain with only formal acceptance by the communities needed before the bureau's project is launched.

John Couch, president of the Baskin group said he will name a committee of five to conduct the farmer poll and to present the findings to Burleigh at which time further discussions will be held.

Couch presided at the meeting. Acting as moderator was D. A. Bandoen, general manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Abilene. Mayor C. C. Hodge of Knox City was host.

Attending the meeting from Haskell were Mayor Courtney Hunt, John A. Couch, Ralph E. Duncan, Tom Davis.

**Cotton Classing  
Program Popular  
With Farmers**

Almost two out of three bales of cotton ginned in Texas the past season ended up receiving a green tag. This tag signified that the bale had been classed by the USDA's Production and Marketing Administration and on the tag were figures showing the grade and staple length of the bale.

A total of 109,763 Texas cotton producers participated in the program. In addition to the classing service, they also received the market news service without charge. The information that each cooperating farmer received enabled him to know what his cotton was worth on the market and put him in a better position to bargain for the highest prices offered.

According to John L. McCollum, manager, PMA's southwest area cotton branch, USDA, Dallas, the Smith-Doxey Act was passed in 1938 to encourage farmers to grow improved varieties of cotton adapted to their soils and local conditions. The program provides free classing and market news service for all farmers who belong to organized Smith-Doxey groups.

Cotton classing offices at Dallas, Abilene, Austin, Corpus Christi, Galveston, Houston and Lubbock graded 3,696,511 bales the past season. The offices operated under the supervision of McCollum.

He reports that 1,148 cotton improvement groups were organized in Texas and their members planted all but about 11 percent of the state's 1949 cotton acreage. County agricultural agents had a great deal to do with the organization of the cotton improvement groups in the counties and Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist and F. E. Lichte, extension cotton gin specialist both of Texas A. & M. College, worked with the cooperating groups on the state level.

In conclusion, McCollum reports that 13 percent more farmers were members of cotton improvement groups in 1949 than in 1948 and that only about one half of the 1948 season's crop was graded as compared to the two-thirds for the 1949 season.

The general class will organize Monday night. This will consist of women who want to learn more about sewing, how to stencil, how to do lineoam block printing, or anything special that the women want to learn.

The classes meet every Monday night at 7:15 at the homemaking cottage. Coffee and cookies have been served by the various women attending.
