Yendo, a non resident delinquent tax payer, from information derived from the map of the county. That the land was marked on the map as belonging to M. Yendo; was marked on the map as belonging to M. He further testified, at the instance of the plaintiffs, that he levied on the land, by virtue of his tax list, of which he had three copies, that he had a rough draft of the non-resident delinquent tax payer not on his alphabetical list, but on a separate piece of paper; that this three rolls were not exact copies of this list; that he had forwarded to the proper office at Austin one of the copies, and had deposited one in the one of the copies, and had deposited one in the county clerk's office, retaining one himself, he did not recollect, whether he had kept or destroyed the rough draft. The plaintiffs objected to the introduction in evidence of the assessor's deed, but their objection was overruled. After the assessor had given his testimony, they moved the court to exclude the deed, which the court refused. It is first proposed to remove all the trees and wood upon this tract by contract, it being presumed that the expense of the work may be considerably reduced by giving the wood which is folled, reserving to the city all valuable timber, in part payment of the contract The draining machines, are then to be remove and erected on the shores of the Lake Pontcha train, into which, as the natural reservoir for that pupose, the entire drainage of the city is to be effected. A grand levee is to be construct along the margin of the Lake of sufficient high and strength securely to protect the city from al and strength securety to protect the city from all danger of inundation from that quarter. The Mayor has already been notified from responsible and experienced parties of their readines to con-tract with the city for the proposed work, the complete execution of which, it is supposed, will occupy some three or four years. Every inch of land in the rear of the city, the Mayor very cor-rectly thinks, is susceptible of being reclaimed.— The proposed reclamation, when effected, will increase the area of the available surface of the city by at least tenfold its present extent -N. O. Pic.
