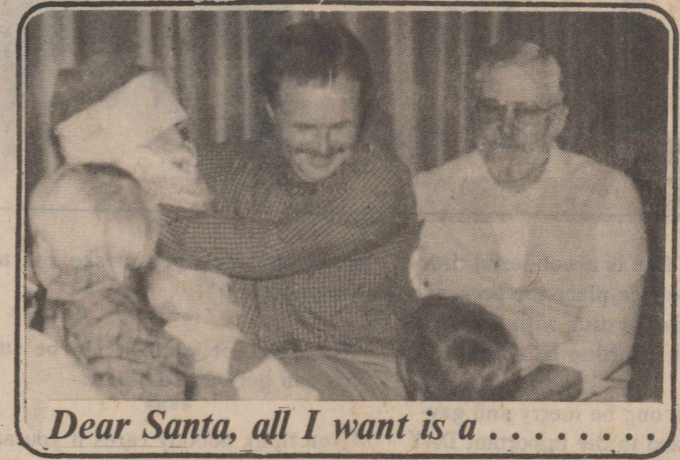
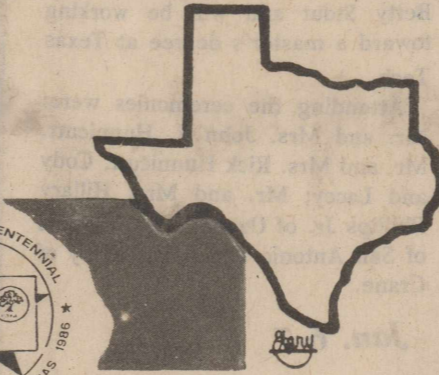

Lara, Payne make honorable mention Flores named All-District

When the West Texas All-District Teams rosters were released Wednesday, Dec. 17, only one Lion made the All-District Team, but none more deserving than Roger Flores.

Flores made the team as wide receiver, a position he excites the crowd with time and time again. Whether in the pre-district 94-yard reception that clinched the 18-15 win over Iraan, or a short pass turned

into spark for the Ozona offense in the game against Rankin, Flores served his spot well.

"I was surprised but pleased anyway," Flores said. "I thought that since Reagan County went so far in the playoffs, they would look more toward their receiver."

Abel "Bull" Lara made the Honorable Mention Defense in his position as linebacker. For the Lions, the senior Lara led in tackles and often provided the edge in swaying the opposing offense.

Sophomore Oscar Payne earned his spot as Honorable Mention Kicker with great kicking all year long.

"I felt that I may have been able to make All-District over Wayne 'Wright,' Payne said. "But I'm satisfied."

Reagan County, who made it to the semi-finals in state playoff action, and Forsan, who shared the district championship with Reagan County, accounted for 19 of the All-District positions.

Producer finaled in Farmer's Field

The San Andres oil area of the Farmer multipay field of Crockett County gained another producer with completion of Marathon Oil Co., Midland, No. 5 University "X" 33 miles northwest of Ozona, to pump

12 barrels of 30.4 gravity oil, plus 15 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio at 1,500-1.

Production was through perforations at 2,480-500 feet, which had been acidized with 4,844 gallons and fractured with 27,600 gallons and

52,500 pounds of sand.

Drilled to 2,715 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 2,705 feet, it is plugged back to 2,651 feet.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west lines of 8-50-University Lands Survey.

Four file for three water board places

Four persons have filed for the three positions open on the board of directors of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1.

Incumbents Dan Davidson, Harold

Shaw and Gene Perry are asking to be re-elected to the board. Joe Moran is the fourth candidate.

Absentee voting by personal appearance begins Dec. 29 and ends Jan 13 for the Jan. 17 election.

Crockett County Public Library is part of the Big Country Library System. Books not on the shelves here may be obtained through an inter-library loan to bring a wider variety to local people. A wide selection of films is also available through the library.

West Texas Utilities will also have a two day holiday.

Commerce indicates that Watson's, Small Fashions, Baker Jewelers and Brown Furniture will be closed Dec. 25, 26, and 27.

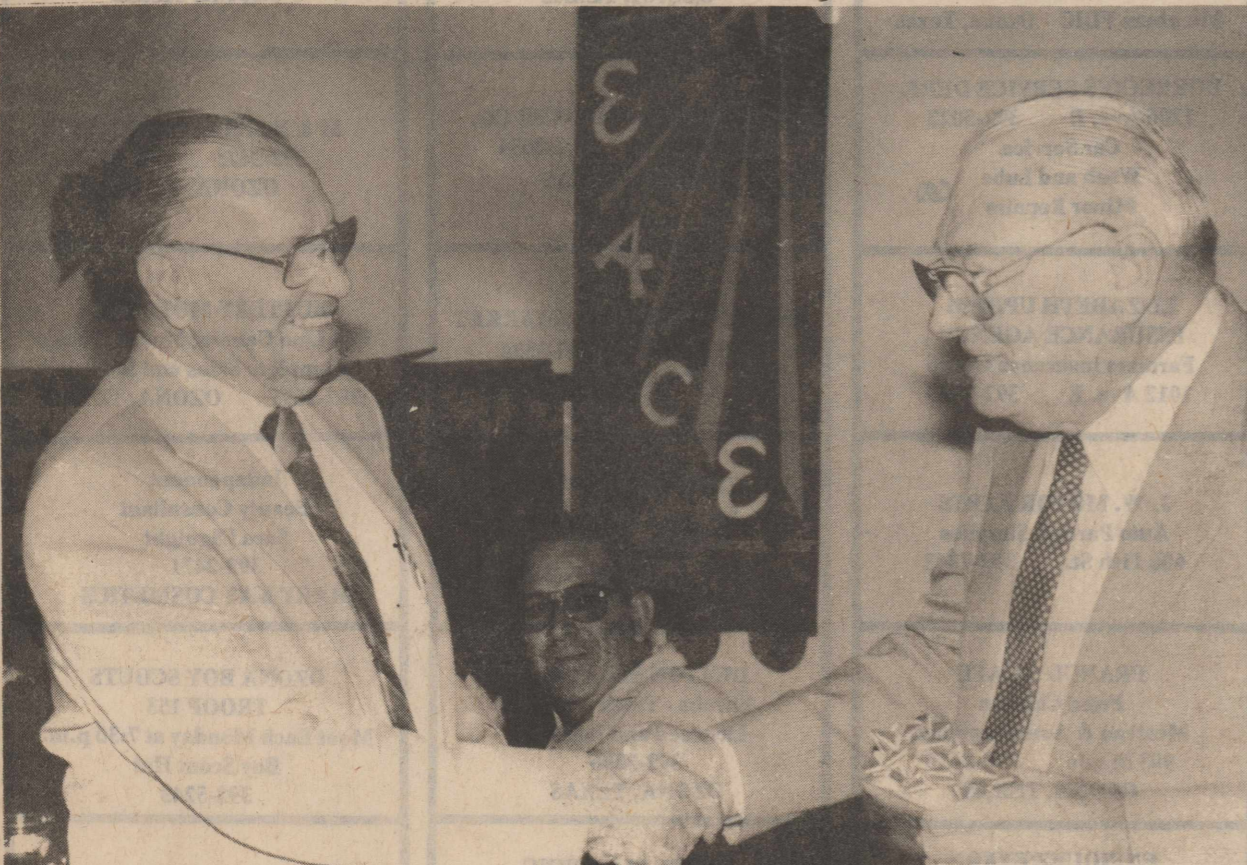
Ozona Boot and Saddlery, The Teacher Store and The Crockett County News will be closed Dec. 25 and 26. The Teacher Store and the

J. W. Johnigan married Zelma Ward in Vernon in 1942. They moved to Ozona in 1944 and raised three daughters here.

He owned and operated J. W. Motor Parts and was a member of the Ozona Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. J. W. (Zelma) Johnigan of Ozona; three daughters, Charlotte Kay of Burke,

VA, Donna Horsbergh of Midland and Johnnye Raye Chapman of Ozona; two sisters, Mrs. Frank James and Mrs. Welton Bunger, both of Ozona; and five grandchildren.

CROCKETT COUNTY OUTDOORS

This week's article will be a little short, because the Warden's busy trying to get off for a, believe it or not, deer hunting trip. Me and my life-long hunting partner, Dad, are loading up for our Twenty-ninth Annual Don't Care If We Kill Anything Hunting Trip, the first of which took place when I was about 10 or 11 years old. Oh, I went deer hunting in 1952 with Dad down in Webb County, but you can't really count just stomping along behind a Real Hunter, ruining any chance he had of seeing so much as a cottontail or bluebird. Besides, those ole' Grandes of the brush country weren't in much danger of falling to my trusty Red Ryder BB carbine.

No, I start counting my seasons with the one where I packed my own first deer rifle, a venerable but new and shiny 30/30 Winchester (which, of course, I still have). And we've been teaming-up against the wily whitetail ever since, except for the two seasons I was a guide in Colorado.

On our "hunts" we seem to put more importance on table fare (which is usually venison stew from last year's doe) and less emphasis on making a kill. Point is, it's the outing and the fellowship that makes the trip. That way, every trip is successful. If everybody felt this way, there'd be no such thing as a disappointing deer hunt. Makes me kinda wish all kids were raised the way I was.

To change the tone a bit, I feel a need to call attention to a couple of violations I encountered last week, just to make a point. On the first case, a subject was cited to court for exceeding the legal season limit of whitetailed buck deer. He had already killed his two bucks, then killed a third and put his friend's tag on it. And it cost him and his friend \$100 each. That's right, each. Friend was charged with allowing another to hunt under his license. Whadaya-mean, ya' didn't know that was against the law?

Then there was the guy that had only one doe permit but killed two does. So he cut the head off the second doe and tagged it as a buck. But it didn't work, and the Justice of the Peace in Sonora charged him \$113 for his little trick.

The point that needs to be made here is this: tag and permit regulations are there to keep people from being game hogs - and to protect the resource by preventing overkill.

And if it still doesn't make sense to you, look at it this way: How would you like to share a deer lease with a person who fills out his license early in the season, then kills ten more bucks using tags from his non-hunting friends' licenses? What would this do to your chances of getting a buck after Christmas?

You think about it....I'm going deer hunting!

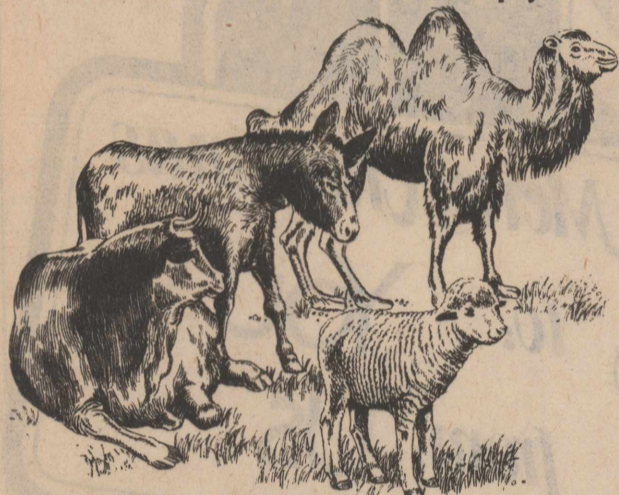

Turkey long American fare

The turkey, a native American game bird related to the pheasant, was once extremely numerous throughout the United States and Central America.

The Indians domesticated turkeys long before the arrival of the earliest settlers.

The Spanish conquistadores took some of the turkeys domesticated by the Aztec Indians of Central Mexico back with them to Spain as early as 1519.

Wild turkeys are fast on their feet. When pursued, they often run rather than fly. But, when they do fly, they are very fast, traveling at speeds of 50 miles an hour or more. Benjamin Franklin advocated the turkey as the representative of the United States instead of the Bald Eagle.

He said the turkey is a more respectable bird and a true native of America whereas the Bald Eagle is a bird of bad moral character like some men who live by robbing and sharpening.

However wonderful Christmas dinner may be with the traditional roast turkey, giblet gravy, mashed potatoes, candied yams, fruit salad, cranberry sauce, and a myriad assortment of pies and cakes, the appeal of these goodies may wane the day after Christmas (or Thanksgiving) or the day after that.

What is one to do? The initial cost of the Christmas feast and our own inclinations to be frugal may prevent us from following our desire to throw it all out.

Instead, new ways of dressing up or changing the basic turkey leftover may result in new family favorites.

TURKEY SALAD

- 2 cups diced leftover turkey
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1/4 cup French dressing
- 2 cups halved seeded Malaga or Tokay grapes
- Salt and pepper
- Salad greens
- 1/2 cup cooked salad dressing
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 1/4 cup toasted slivered almonds

Marinate turkey and celery in French dressing for one hour. Add grapes, and season to taste with salt and pepper. Arrange on salad greens. Combine salad dressing and sour cream. Top salad with this mixture, and garnish with slivered almonds.

TURKEY SOUP

- 1 roast-turkey carcass
- 2 quarts water
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 celery stalks, including leaves, diced
- 1 medium onion, peeled and sliced
- Few parsley sprigs
- 1 bay leaf

Scrape any stuffing from turkey bones. Put carcass in kettle and add remaining ingredients. Bring to boil, cover, and simmer for two hours. Strain. Pick off any meat from bones and add to soup. Makes about 1 1/2 quarts.

Note: If desired, add 1/4 cup rice or 1/2 cup elbow macaroni or noodles to strained soup. Simmer, covered, for about 15 minutes.

PINWHEEL TURKEY PIE

- 4 carrots, cut up
- 2 potatoes, cut up
- 1/2 cup chopped parsley
- 3 cups cut-up leftover turkey
- 2 cups turkey gravy or chicken bouillon, thickened
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Parsley Pinwheels

Partially cook carrots and potatoes in boiling salted water. Drain; add remaining ingredients except Parsley Pinwheels and simmer until vegetables are tender, adding more water if necessary. Serve topped with Parsley Pinwheels. Makes 6 servings.

PARSLEY PINWHEELS

Cut 1/2 cut butter or margarine and

1/2 pound cream cheese into 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Roll out 1/4 inch thick on floured board to form a rectangle about 12x8 inches. Sprinkle with parsley. Beginning at end, roll up jelly-roll fashion. Cut into 1/2-inch slices and bake on cookie sheet in preheated hot oven (400 degrees F.) for about 20 minutes.

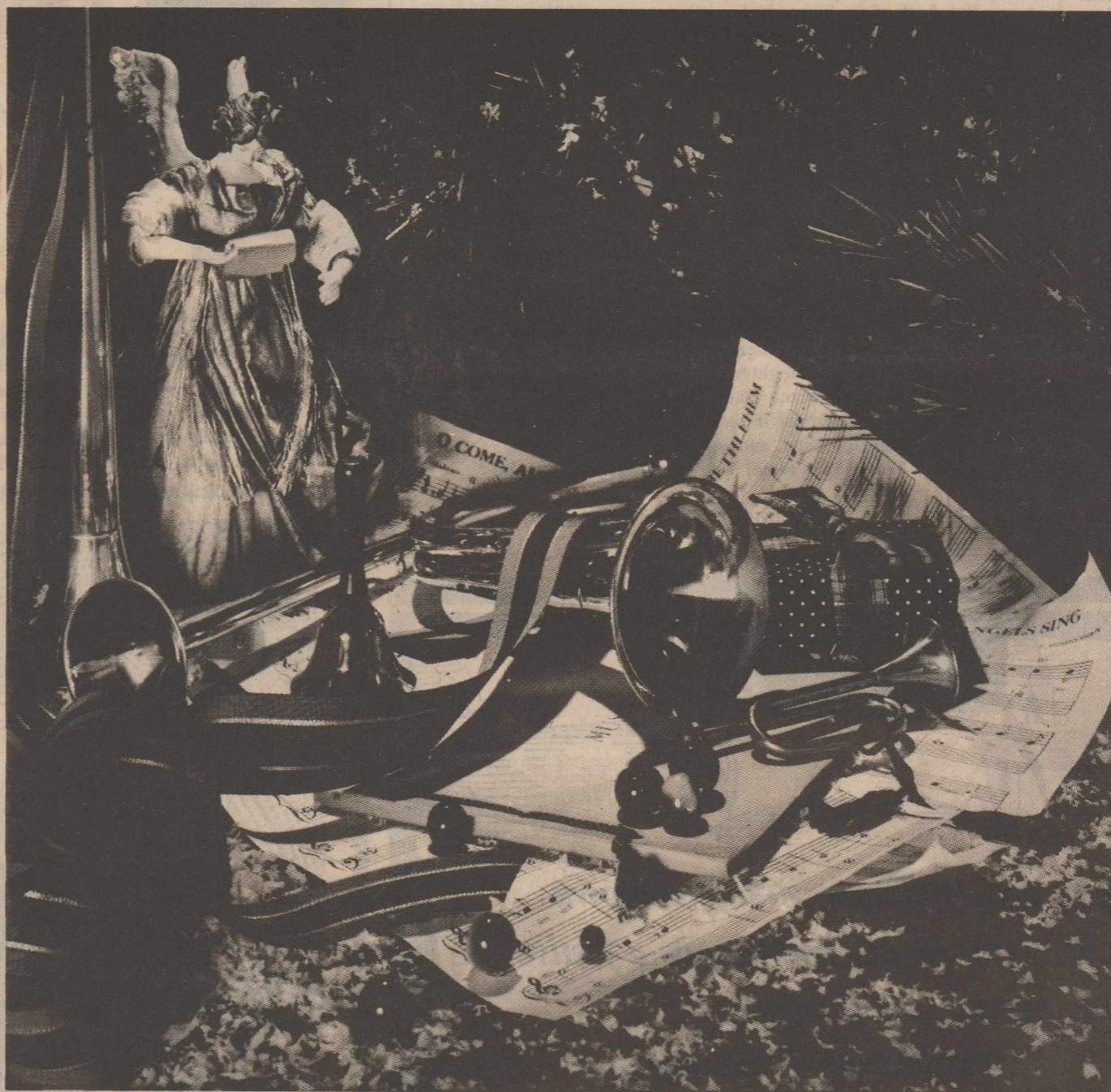



Burning prescribed for management

The use of prescribed burning as a lost cost management tool is now being incorporated by many ranchers into their overall management plans. Most people have been exposed to only wildfires that occur during the growing season under dry, hot, and windy conditions. These disastrous fires are untimely and have undesirable effects. In contrast, prescribed or controlled burns are conducted under milder conditions just prior to the growing season. Where prescribed burning is an applicable tool, many objectives can be accomplished with one burn: 1. an increase in forage yield and utilization of coarse grasses, such as tobosa; 2. an increase in forage availability; 3. removal of dead woody material; 4. a kill of most cactus species; and 5. improvement of wildlife habitat.

Prickly pear, one of the many noxious plant species within the county, can be controlled with a prescribed burn during the winter months if enough dry fuel exists to maintain a good hot fire. Control as high as 60-86% has been achieved. By following the burn with 1/8 lb./ac of picloram along in April, control of better than 80% has been achieved.

There are several factors to consider before starting a burning program. A fuel load of at least 2000 lb./ac of grass that is fairly continuous with as few breaks as possible is necessary to carry the fire and achieve good results. Fireguards and firebreaks need to be installed before the burn is conducted. After the burn, a rest period is needed to allow the grasses to recover. The length of rest period varies depending upon the plant species present in the pastures.

A prescribed burn is most effective when done under proper weather conditions. Most burns should be conducted immediately prior to green up of grasses, usually during January or February. The air temperature should be 50-70 degrees F., relative humidity 30-50%, and wind speed at 8-15 mph. Prescribed burns should not be conducted when temperature is above 80 degrees F., wind speed is greater than 20 mph, or relative humidity is less than 20%.

With the increased cost of conventional management practices and concern about environmental quality the use of prescribed burning has increased. Along with the many advantages of prescribed burning there are also many dangers. The most important factor in conducting a prescribed burn is planning. Experienced personnel should always be present. A thorough knowledge of range plants and their physiology, weather and fire behavior is needed.

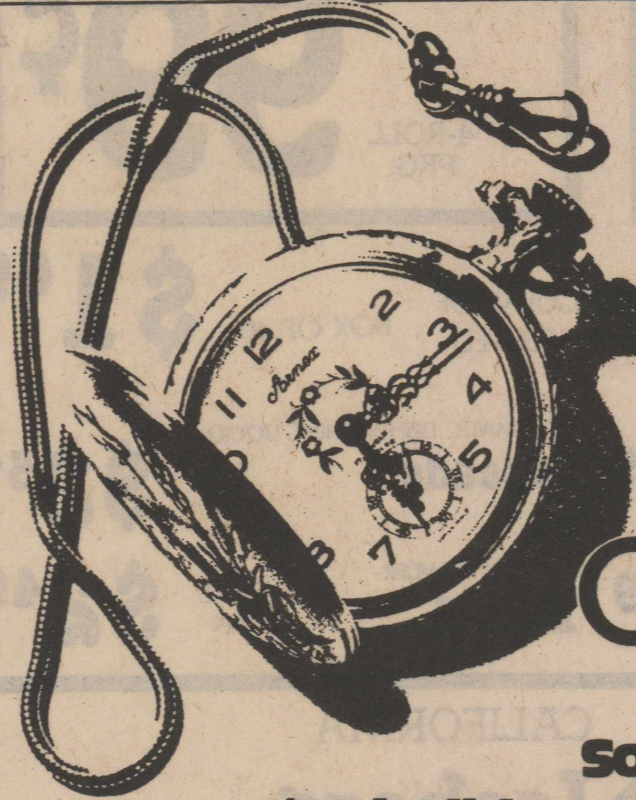
