Terroristic threats result in search for bodies

Terroristic threats received at a San Antonio television station last week resulted in a search of a 32-mile stretch of Crockett County for the bodies of two illegal aliens. A letter from an organization calling itself The New South Freedom Fighters claimed that two aliens had been killed and their bodies dumped in a pasture "several thousand yards away from the road on Texas Highway 163 between Ozona and Juno".

Local officials first learned of the threat Thursday morning when a KENS-TV reporter called the office of Sheriff Billy Mills and told Deputy Aldo Gonzales that a letter reporting the killings had been received at the station.

An aerial search by a Department of Public Safety helicopter was made Thursday afternoon, and a Border Patrol plane was in the air much of Friday, but no bodies were sighted. The letter had indicated that the two were covered with light brush. Law enforcement officers ended the search Friday afternoon after winds caused the plane to have to land.

An area along the 45-miles of highway between Ozona and Juno was searched by law enforcement officers from Crockett and Val Verde Counties, Texas Rangers, DPS and Border Patrol personnel.

"We are very angry and can not take it anymore" begins the two page threat letter. Four demands are made which must be "completely" met or two illegals will be sacrificed each month.

First of the demands requires the

U. S. Congress to repeal the amnesty portion of the Immigration Reform Act of 1986. The rest of the act is to remain as it is.

Item two of the demands requires Congress to pass a law to provide aid for all groups who oppose the Soviet-controlled Sandanistas in Nicaragua. U. S. weapons, advisors and aid to the Contras should equal that of the Soviets to the Sandanistas.

Congressman Henry Gonzales must withdraw his impeachment activities against the president and publicly apologize by April 1. The demands also require that if Gonzales continues to oppose the Contras, he must publicly state that the Soviets have rights in Central America which the U. S. does not have.

Action by Mayor Henry Cisneros of San Antonio is also required in the demands. Cisneros must publicly apologize for his pre-election statements last year that "illegals are beneficial and good for the Texas economy and society".

Until these demands are met exactly, two illegals will be killed each month with no mention of their location according to the letter. Millions which would be spent to aid illegals who receive amnesty should instead be spent in Mexico to aid them there according to the organization.

The name of the group, The New South Freedom Fighters, did not show up in either the Immigration and Naturalization Service or D.P.S. computer records according to

Sheriff Mills.

Although no bodies were found, "I'm hesitant to say that this is a hoax," said Deputy Wilson. "We've got to take anything like this seriously."

Ranchers have been asked to keep an eye out for bodies or anything unusual as they work their pastures and check livestock, Wilson said.

Although the group responsible for the letter claims to be based elsewhere than Texas, six of the 16 copies were sent to Texas locations. A distribution list attached to the letter indicates that copies were sent to: President and Mrs. Ronald Reagan, Speaker of the House, Rep. James Wright (for the entire House), President of the Senate, V.Pres. George Bush (for the entire Senate), New York Times, Editor; Washington Post, Editor; San Antonio Light, Editor; Houston Post, Editor; USA Today, Editor; CBS News, ABC News, NBC News, KSAT TV News, San Antonio; KMOL TV News, San Antonio; KENS TV News, San Antonio; Mayor Henry Cisneros of San Antonio and TIME Magazine.

Concentration on San Antonio media and politicians has led the search for the writer or writers to that area. At least one of the letters had a San Antonio post mark. Federal Bureau of Investigation Special Agent Homero Rivera of San Antonio said that the F.B.I. has no record of the organization, but that the bureau is checking to see if any federal laws have been broken. If it is determined that federal laws have been broken, there will be an investigation, Rivera said.

Waste water plant funds received

Funds for Crockett County's wastewater treatment plant arrived in Ozona this week after the state's Water Development Fund purchased water district bonds amounting to \$785,000.

Dee Keilers, Crockett County Water District manager, district officers Dan Davidson and Harold Shaw, and Tom Cameron were in Austin Monday for the closing of the loan agreement.

Cost of the project will run \$715,000 according to Keilers, and the difference will be refunded to the Water Development Fund from the last maturing bonds. Originally expected to cost \$750,000, the project will be built for \$715,000 through "good bids", Keilers said.

Contractors will be given notice this week to start immediately. Work should begin in 10 to 14 days with 150 days required for completion. Fencing has already been done by Eddie Moore Welding of Ozona, and brush clearing is being done by Lilly Construction Company.

The plant is designed to serve 5,040 people, which should take the community through the year 2020 according to engineering estimates.

Proposed plant construction for the new facility was first outlined in May of 1983 by the Texas Department of Water Resources. A \$950,000 bond election for the plant was called in August of 1985.

The total facility, which will be located on the Sarah Seay property, will include the treatment plant, a wastewater main from town to the plant and a lift station to pump the wastewater across Johnson Draw. A sunlight, natural algae process will be used at the plant which will be located two miles south of the present plant.

Crockett County's wastewater treatment plant was named to

the state's list of worst polluters in 1986.

Contractors for the project are: Reese-Albert of San Angelo, pipeline and pumping system; Able Irrigation Company of Eagle Pass, con-

struction of stabilization ponds; PMI of San Antonio, pumping equipment; Holt Power Systems of San Antonio, generator. Pumping equipment and generator will be installed by water district employees.

Ravioli bandits elude officers

A salad bowl which had been used to microwave ravioli in the kitchen at Ozona United Methodist Church was "still warm" at 8 a.m. Thursday morning when officers arrived at the scene. The church was one of three burglarized during the night Wednesday. The break-in at the Methodist Church was discovered by church janitor Ines Ybarra.

Calvary Baptist and Ozona Church of Christ were also entered by a persons or persons believed to be searching for money. Contents of drawers and filing cabinets were scattered about offices at the three churches. The only vandalism reported was at the Church of Christ where the door to the preacher's study was kicked in.

A video recorder, twin speaker radio/cassette player and money were stolen at the Church of Christ. Entry was gained through a classroom window.

"We were pretty fortunate," said Ken Eppler, pastor at Calvary Baptist. "They came through the locked front door. It looked like they were looking for money, that's about all I could tell."

Nothing was found to be missing

at Calvary Baptist.

"They took the door off the hinges," to get into the office at the Methodist Church, said Susie Harrison, wife of Rev. Ken Harrison. A small amount of money was taken at the church and the office of Day Care head Patti Coates was also searched. Method of entry was not known.

Canned ravioli eaten at the church was from the Day Care supplies. The food had been donated by Boy Scouts

following their Scouting for Food project in February.

A crime search was made by sheriff's deputies at each location, and a description was broadcast for a blue van which had stopped at the Church of Christ the day before, said Chief Deputy Jim Wilson.

Occupants of the van had asked for a handout at the Church of Christ Wednesday afternoon, reported Ralph Moore, preacher at the church.

Snow

Advance warning did little to lessen the blow of a cold front which arrived in Crockett County Sunday.

Brief snow flurries during the afternoon limited visibility locally and caused problems for motorists west and north of Ozona.

Saturday's balmy temperatures dropped from a high of 60 to 22 degrees Monday morning. Thick ice resulted in spots where moisture from melted snow had collected.

The hardy mesquite, one of the country's harbingers of spring, had not put on new leaves before the freeze, lending credence to the old

tale that mesquites are seldom wrong.

Daylight Savings Time has been changed from the last Sunday in April to the first Sunday. The change was made after Congress passed and President Reagan signed into law, a bill affecting the spring change only. The October change will remain on the last Sunday.

No federal money for airport repair

Texas Aeronautics Commission representatives met at the Ozona Civic Center March 26 with officials and other individuals interested in aviation from a four-county area to update the state's information regarding area airport facilities.

Crockett County Airport is regarded as the major airport of the area as it has the longest runway with the fewest obstructions. Other airports under discussion were those of Sutton, Schleicher and Reagan Counties.

The Ozona Airport has the best location of the four under discussion as it serves an area southwest and westward to Fort Stockton. Business jets destined for Sonora must use the Ozona airport because the Sonora facility is too short.

The one major obstruction to aviation at the Crockett County Airport, the T.V. tower belonging to Circle Bar Cable T.V., was discussed. It is scheduled to come down in November. Government funds for this purpose are available if applica-

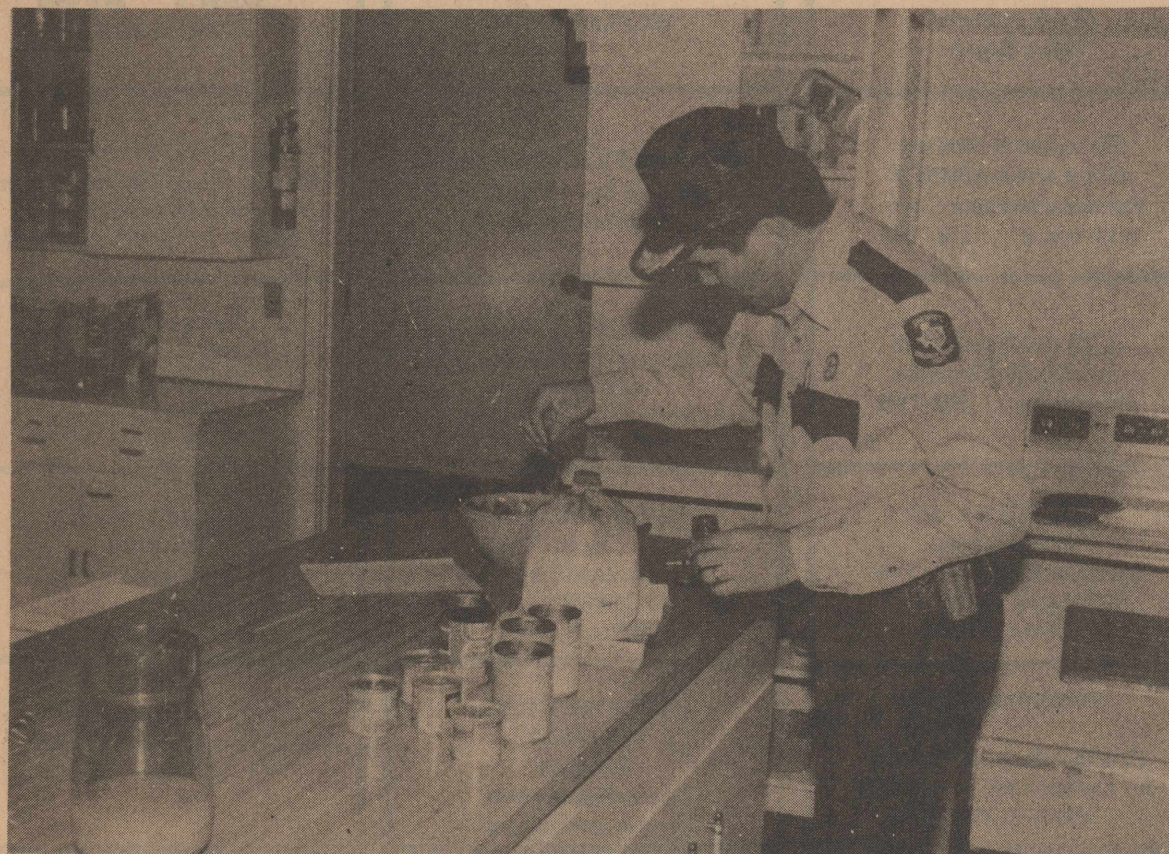

In other business, the Lions heard a report on the mop and broom sale. Sales were down this year somewhat. Club members were generally pleased with the effort.

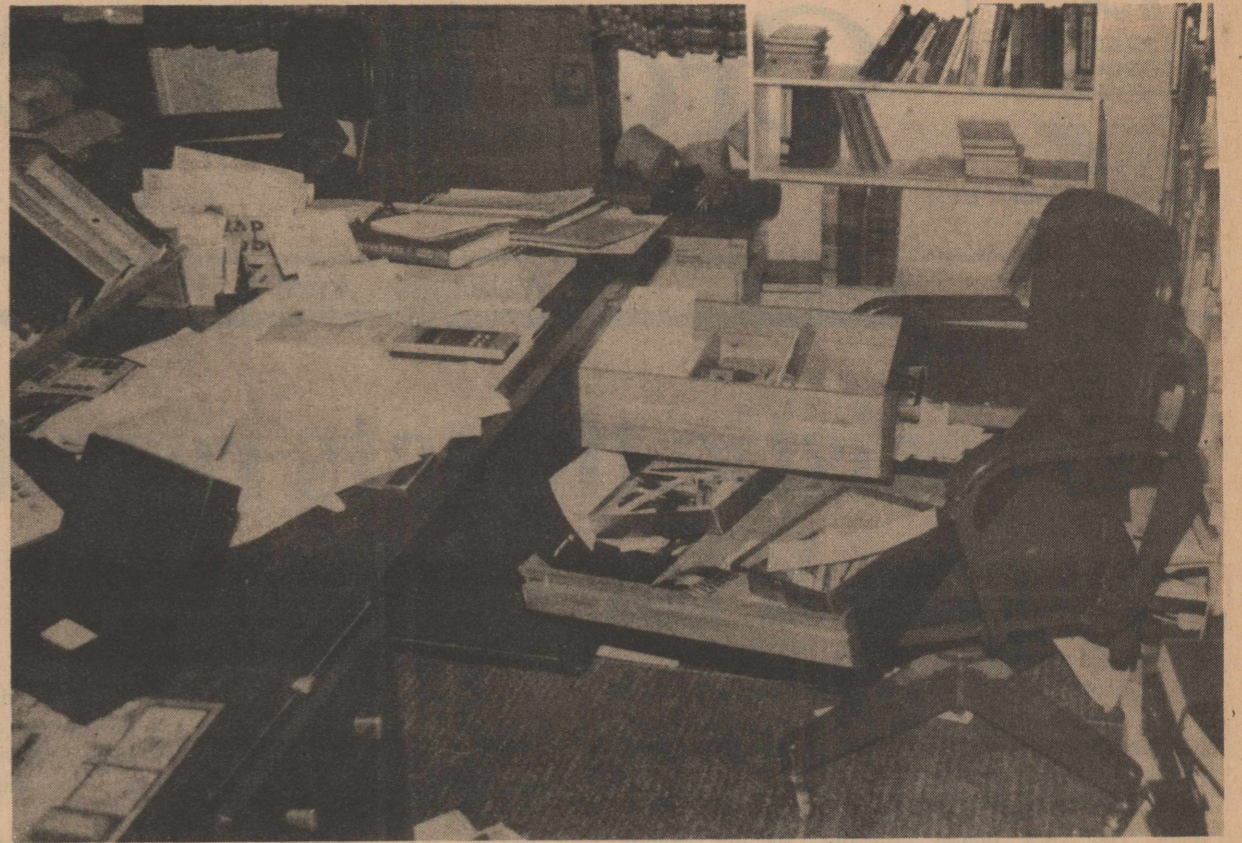

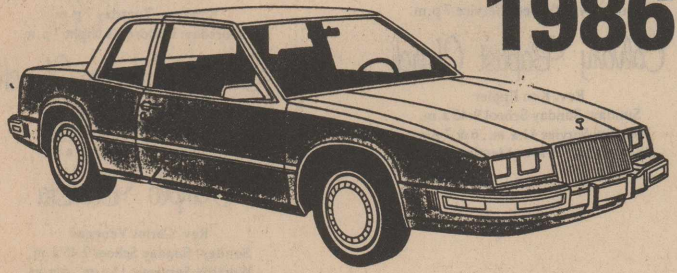
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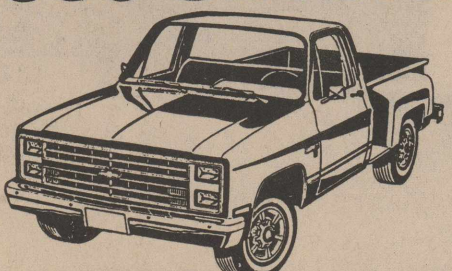
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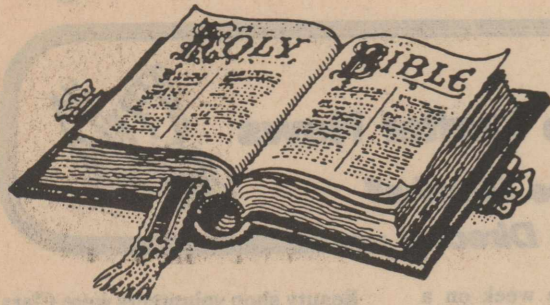
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Etched in Granite

In the summer of 1927, a sculptor by the name of Gutzon Borglum was ready to undertake the masterpiece of his career and the largest outdoor sculpture in the world. The monument he carved in the Black Hills of South Dakota, the faces of Presidents Washington, Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt and Lincoln, has made Mount Rushmore one of the most famous tourist attractions in the country.

Borglum had proved that he could carve on a large scale in granite by the work he had done at Stone Mountain, Georgia. It was there that he had begun a scene with Robert E. Lee and other Confederate leaders high on the side of a mountain. A man in South Dakota who envisioned a national monument in his home state wrote to Borglum and asked him to consider the prospects for a massive sculpture.

Borglum visited South Dakota and was taken to Harney National Forest to look for a suitable site. Mount Rushmore was finally chosen. For 14 years, the sculptor and his assistants labored on the granite. New techniques had to be developed in order to carve the huge figures. The rough shaping was done with dynamite, and special drills had to be created to be used for the detail work.

The massive monument was not finished until a few months before the beginning of World War II. Each of the faces measures sixty feet from hairline to chin. The mouths are 18

feet wide and the eyes, 11 feet. If bodies were to be added to the sculptured faces, each man would be almost as tall as a 55-story building.

Only a few months after the work was completed in 1941, Borglum died suddenly. In an interview shortly before his death, Borglum commented that his only regret in having undertaken the project was some criticism he had received for taking so long to complete it. His explanation to his critics was this: "Everything had to be exact in my calculations, for that monument will be there a long time." (Geologists have guessed that the granite will erode less than one inch in 100,000 years.) Then Borglum added, "You see, my name is on that monument just as surely as the faces of the four Presidents."

When I learned of this story I thought immediately about the living monuments we call our children. How careful we must be as we help them to discover and design the lives that lie before them. We have but a few years to spend in trying to help with the building of body, spirit, intellect and character, and what we do in helping our children to develop into what they are to become is a far more important responsibility than the building of any national monument, no matter how splendorous. We are the sculptors of the future, and we, too, must be as exact as possible in our calculations in child-rearing, for our names, like that of sculptor Borglum, will be etched indelibly upon the work we are helping to create.

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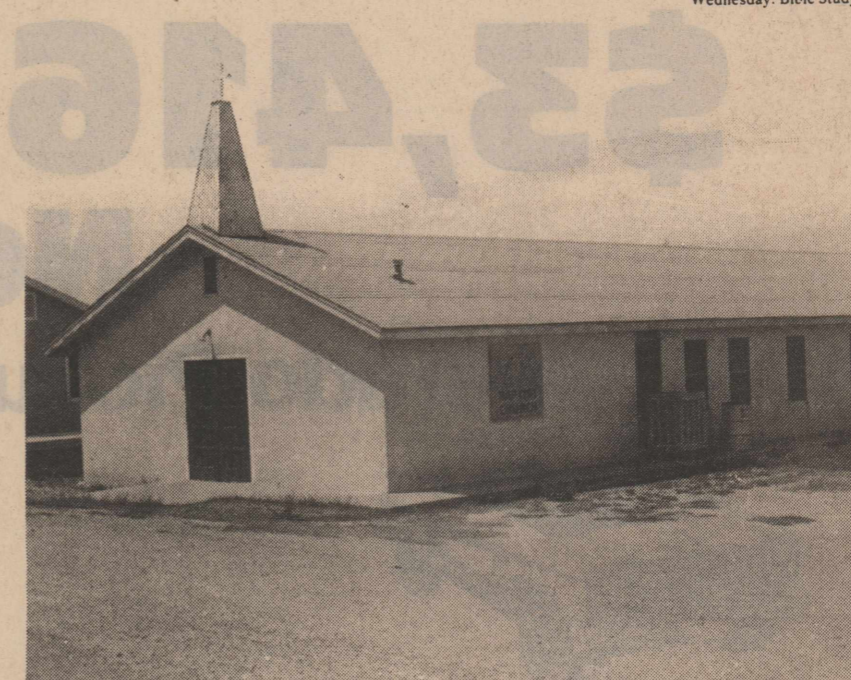

Responding to report cards

Bringing home a report card can be one of the trials of childhood - especially if the grades are less than perfect.

Children are anxious for their parents' reaction to a report card. And how parents react can be encouraging or discouraging to the child.

Parents who praise children for doing their best given them a sense of accomplishment and self-worth. But when praise is coupled with statements like "you can do better than that", the encouragement can be erased by the implication that what has been done is not good enough.

The child begins to feel that he or she is being compared either with someone else or to someone else's standards. Comparisons are harmful. Children may react by not improving their school work. Or they

may think that unless they're perfect, they're a failure.

Comparisons tend to divide children into successes and failures. When a child fails to accomplish a certain goal, parents need to express concern but avoid labeling the child as a failure.

Separate the low grade from the child. Failure indicates a lack of preparation of skill, not a lack of value in the person.

Obviously, comparisons do occur in the "real world." But the loss comparison inside the home, the better the child can face comparison outside the home.

A report card is simply a statement of educational attainment -- or lack of it -- over a short period of 6-9 weeks. It gives children and parents the opportunity to determine goals and work toward improvement during the next grading period.

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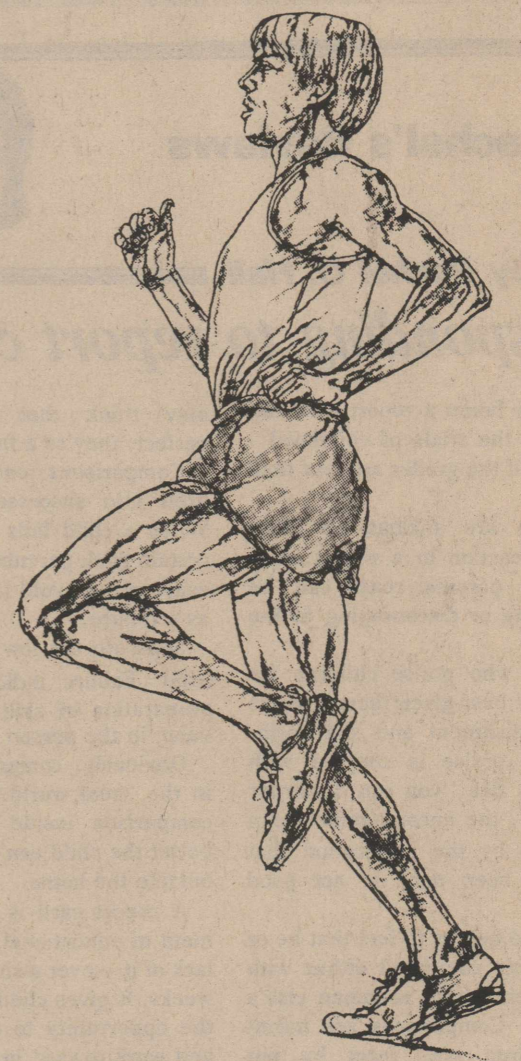
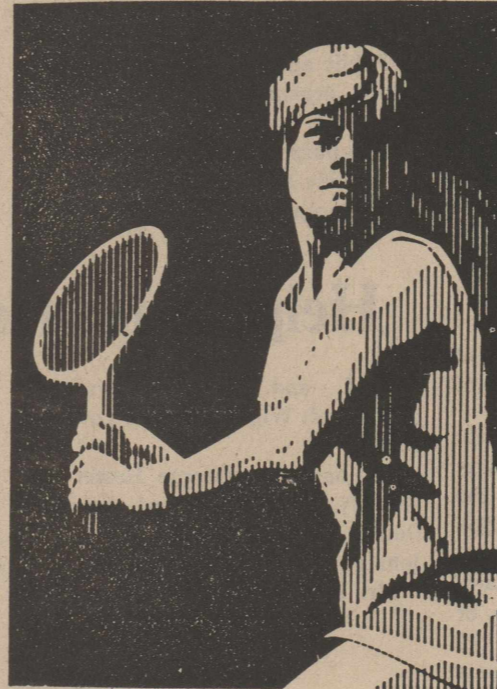

The mile relay team was edged out of its usual number one spot by Haskell, although the Lions finished only a second behind.

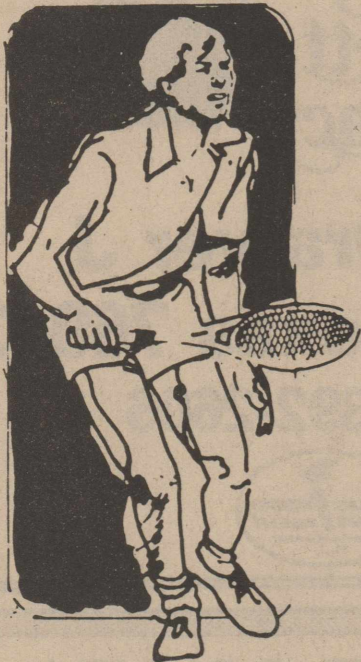
Valdo Galindo received more stiff competition that he regularly faces. However, he used his expertise in the 100 and 200m dashes to place second and third in these events.

Lion golfers collapse at district

The Ozona Lion golf team has hit rock bottom. With two rounds to go in the 1987 District 6-2A championship, Ozona is exactly 50 strokes out of first place and is beginning to look toward next year.

In the first round of district play, the Lions traveled to McCamey and hacked their way to a dismal total of 355. This put the Lions in fifth place, trailing the leader, Reagan County (327) by 28 shots and second place Stanton (336) by 19 shots. Also ahead of Ozona were McCamey at 340 and Rankin at 342.

Individually, the Lions' top three players held their own against the field of 70 with all three scores in the top ten. Junior Bret Hood fired a plus 7, 78 which was good enough to tie for the lead. Sophomore Copie Davis carded an 81 and found himself tied with McCamey's Carl Wilson for fourth. Ozona's second player, Will Seahorn, had a rough day but still turned in a solid 84.

Last weekend the Lions traveled to Big Lade for the tournament's second round. Although Hood and Seahorn weathered the windy and cold conditions with impressive scores of 78 and 79 respectively,

Mendoza returned later to win the 100m dash and place second in the 200m as well.

Alba, Wilson, Talamantez and Mendoza teamed together to win second place in the 1200m relay and add another 16 points to their total.

Davis and Bryan Harms stumbled and collapsed with scores of 89 and 103.

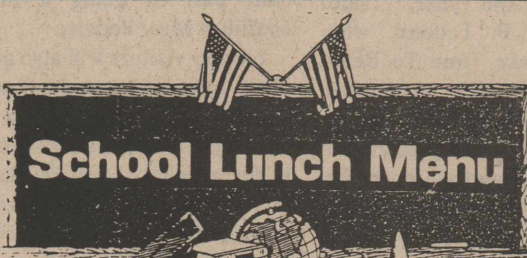
The total of 349 did little to improve Ozona's standing. Now the team is facing the reality of not going to regionals for the first time in five years.

"It's so disappointing," said Seahorn of the team's decline. "We had some guys mess up early on and it left us with just three good golfers. We have some guys that are coming up, but they're just learning. It's real hard to take because our first three scores stack up better than anybody's."

Incidentally, Ozona's top three scores are as good as anybody's. "We just don't have any experience in those last two slots," said Davis. "They're going to improve, but for this year, it's too little too late."

Hood is leading the district with a two round total of 156. Seahorn is at 163 which puts him in the ninth medalist slot. Davis, recovering from last weekend's debacle, is at 170 and tied for twelfth.

District play moves to Stanton next Friday, a course that the Lions played in 337 strokes the first week of the season.

tion is made for it.
Funding for possible improvements was discussed with locals learning that up to 90 percent may be available from the FAA if certain criteria are met.
An airport must own the land on which it is located to be eligible for the funds. It was suggested that an airport be given the land, buy it, or should be moved to a different site where it can own its land.
Crockett County Airport cannot meet this requirement as it is located on land obtained through long-term lease.

The state has no money available for airport improvements at the present time.
TAC representatives emphasized the need for an overall plan for the future needs of the Ozona airport. Discussion followed regarding the hiring of a consulting engineer to help formulate objectives for the airport facility and to bring it into FAA compliance.
The present condition of the airport runway was discussed. The surface deterioration is due in part to the unusual amount of rainfall during the past year. The present caliche base has proven inadequate for the necessary drainage.

Commissioner Jack Williams expressed the idea that the amount of rainfall was extraordinary and therefore no provisions need to be made for better drainage.
Reports from Schleicher and Sutton Counties indicate that recent improvements are virtually complete on their airports. No additional improvements are being planned for these as county populations and business have dropped.
Crockett County Judge A. O. Fields reported Ozona's recent drop in population to be about the same as Sonora's a decrease of 30 percent.
The Sutton County Airport is considered a good general aviation airport but is limited in length because of its location between Interstate 10 on the south and hills at the north end.

Schleicher County Airport at Eldorado cannot expand because of a golf course to one side. They have been unable to buy the adjacent land.
About 35 persons attended the meeting.

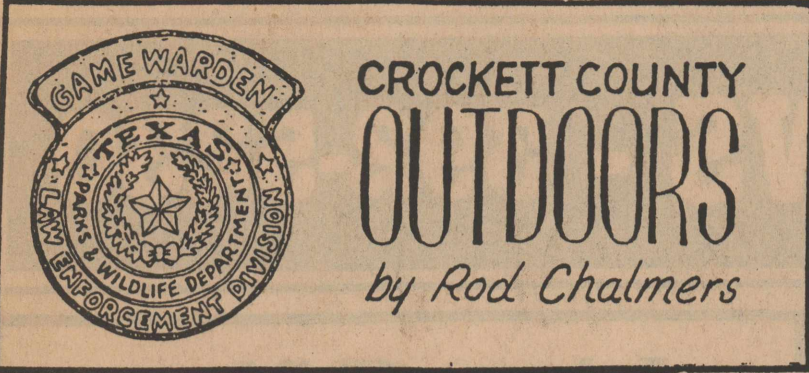

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Saturday, April 4, is The Big Day for a small group of dedicated sportsmen over most counties in this part of the state - spring turkey season. This is the season when folks go turkey hunting, not just killing turkeys incidental to deer hunting. It's a sport for the real hunter... calls, camouflage, being quiet and sneaky in new green foliage and red dawn. Calling wildlife into gun range, in my opinion, is the ultimate in hunting. Beats the socks off the ambush and accidental happen-to-cross-paths type of hunting routine we have fallen into. It's a science, an art, a technique that must be studied, practiced and developed.

All this hooplah is centered around the mating season of our Rio Grande strain of wild turkey. This is the time of year that gobblers put together their harems with matrimony on their minds. The ideal time to call up a love-sick gobbler is at the beginning of the mating season, but we've already missed that by several weeks. However, gobblers are always a sucker for a pretty face (or a new, sweet voice, in this case), so calling can still be productive. Our

season this year is about a week earlier than last year's, so we're getting closer, anyway.

With a few exceptions, laws pertaining to spring turkey hunting are about the same as deer season. A general hunting license is required, and spring turkeys must be tagged the same as in the fall. Be sure to use either the "Spring Only" or the "fall and Spring" tag from your license, and don't get over anxious and kill a hen by mistake. Turkey may be hunted in Crockett and surrounding counties with a rifle, shotgun, or other legal firearm, and bows with a minimum draw weight of 40 pounds and arrows with broadheads. Be careful not to mess with turkeys on a roost, day or night, as this is not only illegal, but a doggone good way to run turkeys out of the area. Legal shooting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset, and the season will run through April 19.

Spring turkey hunting is an enjoyable, rewarding experience. Most of those who've tried it have been hooked and put it above all other types of hunting. Try it...I think you'll like it.

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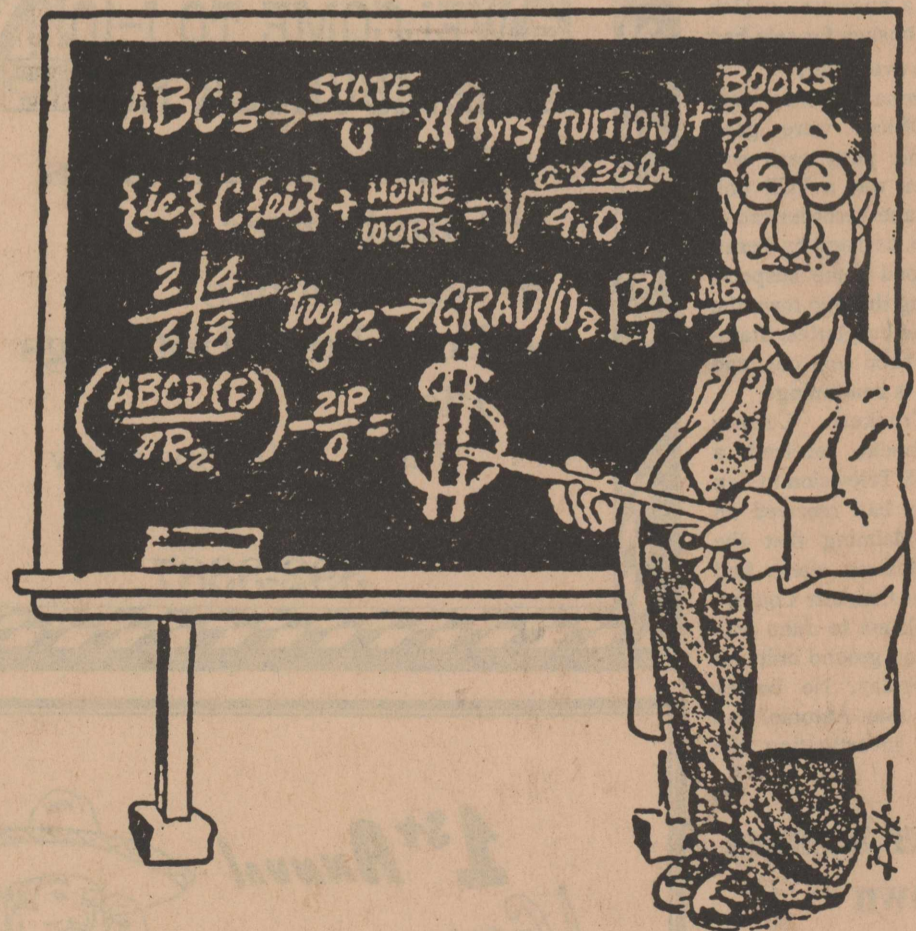
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
