## Fire causes extensive damage

At 8:39 p.m. Monday evening the Sonora Volunteer Fire Department and the Sutton County EMS were dispatched to the Pool Well Service yard to the scene of an explosion. Upon arrival, Fire Chief Carl Teaff quickly had DPS, EMS, Sheriffs office and Police Department personnel block off Highway 277 to all traffic. The Fire Department did not know at first what they were facing and another explosion could have been disastrous to onlookers.

Fire fighters found one tank completely engulfed in flames and three other tanks in danger of catching on fire. A series of explosions could be heard and the flames seen in the distance from as far as 2 miles away. The cause of the fire was determined to be a unit that rolled approximately 60 yards into a fuel island knocking over 2 gas pumps and sending a stream of fuel into the air. An electrical short then ignited the blaze. A fiberglass oil storage unit was engulfed and 3 tanks of fuel also caught fire. The largest tank, a 300 barrel tank, was filled with gasoline while the other 2 tanks, both 200 barrel tanks, were filled with diesel.

Units from the Eldorado Fire Department were also dispatched to come help at 9:30 p.m. While the Highway Department was asked to dam up the draw in case of a spill. Water trucks from Pool Co., Niblett's Oilfield Service, W.T.

Construction, and Jimco all came to the scene to help provide water to extinguish the blaze. As one truck began to hose down the pulling unit, the others positioned themselves to help cool the tanks down. "We were real lucky the wind was blowing from the south," said Teaff. "If it had been from the north, the whole yard would have been a mess." It was believed at first that the fire was shooting out of safety valves, however, it was actually burning out of fuel hoses on top of the tank."

Six units from Sonora, 4 units from Eldorado, and 29 fire fighters


managed to tame the flames and at 10:45 p.m. the fire was called officially out. However, the firemen stayed on the scene hosing down the tanks to cool them off until 12:45 a.m. This helped to prevent the tanks from reigniting due to the tremendous heat from the

The SVFD was dispatched again to the Pool yard Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. to oversee the removing of the pulling unit from the scene. According to Teaff the unit was still full of fuel and there was still quite a bit of fuel on the ground. One spark could have caused another incident. Fortunately this did not happen.

Note: The cooperation of all personnel involved should be commended. The spirit of working together between the Highway

Department, Sutton Sheriff's department, Sonora Police Department, Sutton County Sheriff's department, EMS, the State Troopers, the Sonora and Eldorado fire departments and all of the oilfield companies was truly a sight to behold. Not one injury occurred during the ordeal. As I patiently waited about a mile down the road at a road block I couldn't help but become angry as I watched people try to get by. Then as to add insult to injury, I watched as a Fire Truck attempted to go to the scene and the curious sightseer's didn't move. Lights and sirens mean nothing to some people but I wonder how they would have felt if they were on the receiving end waiting for help and seeing it delayed like this. One person even got angry when asked to move, stating that he knew his rights. Do they? A fuel explosion of any kind is the most dangerous of all because the fuel moves not only upward but outward also. What if the only injury was a curious onlooker that got too close? Then what would we see? Possibly a law suit because they weren't warned of the danger? I once watched an ambulance in a large city ram a car in the rear end and move the vehicle

to get to a heart attack victim. Is this what we want? Yes, there were no injuries this time, but what if there had been or better yet what about next time. Let's hope not!

I just got back to the I.O. Everybody Ranch after spendin' most of a week in San Antonio at the 20th Texas Folklife Festival where, in spite of 100+ degree temperatures, I had a rousin' good time. There's lots of things about the doin' that I like, but the best part of bein' a part of it is gettin' reacquainted with ol' friends and gettin' to know new ones. That's what I meant by my title of this week's column, 'cause you don't have to be blood kin to somebody to be part of his or her family. In lots of ways, the reason folks go back to the heart of downtown San Antonio ever summer to endure noise, heat and commotion is because the Texas Folklife Festival is a big family reunion for those who take part year after year. Long time acquaintances were renewed and the latest family news was exchanged with folks like Rowdy Pate and John Campbell and their families, who work the chuckwagon at the festival. It felt real good to be around so many folks who took their cookin' serious while havin' a whale of a good time doin' it. The bean pot was always goin', while they fixed everthing from stew to waffles to show folks how ranch cookin' has been done for way over a hundred years. Bill Brett was there demonstratin' the fine art of horse hair rope makin'. It's really fun to watch Bill showin' kids how he goes through the whole process. He really has a knack for keepin' their attention, and he always gives 'em a little strand of rope to keep. He's the one who give me my horse hair hat band, and it's somethin' I'll always treasure, 'cause it come from a friend. It was 'specially good to see little one year old Jake, Rowdy's grandbaby, doin' so fine, 'cause durin' last year's festival, he was really strugglin' in a San Antonio hospital. He looks like he's goin' to take after his Grandpa, which is makin' his Mama real nervous.

Another bunch of friends hang out around the storytellin' stage. The senior storyteller is Texas has got to be Mr. Paul Patterson from Paul told me he's considerin' retirin' from so many events, but I wouldn't be surprised to see him back in San Antonio My compadre next summer.

Dennis Gaines was there, givin' me a hard time, like all cowboys do with the cook, but Dennis does it in a fun way, and I reckon I give back ever bit as good as I get, so we have lots of fun. cowboys on the Matador Ranch up in the top part of Texas. My newest friends are Guich Kooch, Hondo Crouch's daughter Becky, and a guitar playin' character named Rusty. Guich is quite a tale-teller, and when them three get together and sing, it's plumb wonderful. I'm still tryin' to figger out whether Guich talks and sings better in English or Spanish, but either way, he's sure a fine feller.

Then there's the folks from Colorado City at the Cactus Cafe. That's a booth I started back in 1979. we got the name from a song by Jay Boy Adams, and when we first started, I spent all my time standin' over a deep fryer cookin' chicken fried steak. Since I've go to be a storyteller, they let me come over and serve beer, and I can tell you sure, that's a whole lot cooler than fryin' steak. Besides, I get the chance to visit with folks, and that's really what I like to do. Saturday night, I worked there for almost 3 hours, and I hardly got to look up we was so busy, so I hope they took lots of money back to the church in C. City.

But the most fun I had on this trip to San Antonio was Sunday mornin' when Claudia Ball, Mrs. Pate, Mrs. Campbell and I went over to St. David's Episcopal Church for Ralph Shuffler's Cowboy Folk Mass. Everbody was dressed western. They had a band with guitars, piano, trumpet, mandolin, and bass, and they incorporated cowboy music into the service. The two priests had vestments made of denim and bandanas and they wore straw cowboy hats. For Communion, they used blue enamel ware: a coffee cup for the chalice, a coffee pot to hold the wine and water, and biscuits for Communion bread. It was a hoot, and Fr. Ralph preached comparisons of the Israelites and Texans. We snuck out before the barbecue, 'cause we all had things to do back at the Festival, but we sure had a good time goin'.

It was real hot and got real humid, but it never rained. I had to change my long johns before I could drive back to the ranch, they'd got so sweaty. I ate enough different kinds of food to choke a buzzard, and I finished up Sunday night plumb tuckered, but I left the

Texas Folklife Festival lookin' forward to next year. If you're missin' the biggest and best party in the world, so why not make plans to be in San Antonio on the first weekend in August. And you don't even need to wear your long johns to fit in. In fact, I never seen so many people with so few clothes in all my life, which was kinda hard on a ol' cook's heart, but somehow I survived in fine fettle. And remember, family can be found most anywhere in the world if you realize that folks are folks. Y'all keep on cookin'.

The Texas State Board of Insurance has issued a letter in which a Fire Extinguisher recall was included. These include brand names America La France, model numbers P250MA and P275RA. Also BECO, model number P250. These extinguishers have been manufactured since 1985. 100 of these have reportedly exploded under normal conditions. If you have one of the extinguishers please call toll free 1-800-922-3499 for information on what to do with it.

The SVFD would like to stress the importance of a fire extinguisher in the home. For a small amount of money a fire extinguisher can keep a small, isolated fire from taking your entire home away from you. Buy one or two, install them and be sure that everyone in the home knows how to use it. It may be an old saying but, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" still holds true when talking about fire prevention and safety.





## Health News-

The shoulder is a very complex structure which is very easily injured; only the low back causes more problems then the shoulder. Shoulder pain often affects arms and hands because the shoulder is so closely related to the spinal nerves that originate in the neck.
