Governor expands Phase II

Governor Greg Abbott issued a proclamation this week expanding additional services and activities that can open under Phase II of the state's plan to safely and strategically open. With this proclamation, water parks, recreational sport programs for adults, driver education programs, and food-court dining areas within shopping malls can begin opera-

tions with limited occupancy or regulations to protect the health and safety of Texans.

Beginning Friday, May 29th, water parks can open but must limit their occupancy to 25% of normal operating limits. Components of these water parks that have video arcades must remain closed. Starting Sunday, May 31st, recreational

sports programs for adults can resume, but games and similar competitions may not begin until June 15th. Driver education programs can resume operations immediately.

Food-court dining areas within shopping malls can also immediately resume operations, but malls are encouraged to designate one or more individuals

who are responsible for ensuring health and safety practices are followed, including: limiting tables to six individuals; maintaining a six-foot distance between individuals sitting at different tables; cleaning and disinfecting tables between uses; and ensuring no condiments or other items are left on tables between customer uses.

Courthouse scheduled to open June 1st

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Tuesday, May 26th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

There were no public comments. Minutes from the May 11th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Report was also approved.

Judge Trey Ellis announced that the Parmer County Courthouse will reopen to the public on Monday, June 1st. All visitors must use the South Entrance and everyone will be screened and have their temperature taken. The reopening plan was approved



Visitors will be able to use the south entrance only and will be screened.

by the Health Department but will need approval from the Administrative Judge before it can be implemented. Plexiglass barriers have been installed to protect county employees and visitors.

Commissioners approved a bond for Lucy Martinez

who is the County Treasurer's Deputy. A postage lease agreement was also approved. The agreement is with a new company that has purchased the company used last year. There will be equipment and software upgrades.

The Court also approved

a resolution to apply for CARES ACT and HAVA grants. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act is a law meant to address the economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Crisis and Purposeful People

Excellent staff are important at any time in the life of any enterprise. In a crisis, purposeful people, excellent people, allow organizations to thrive. I didn't say survive because many organizations will whimper out of the COVID-19 doghouse and simply survive, just as they did when the housing bubble burst or as the 2008 recession receded. Strong organizations will storm out of current circumstances. The faculty and staff of West Texas A&M University and the leadership of The Texas A&M University System have performed in a way that exemplifies enterprise excellence—not perfection, but persistence, a sharpened edge in an unsympathetically shifting situation.

A few observations from WT follow.

At every level of a crisis, responsive organization curiosity is alive in people. During a crisis nobody has all the answers, and curiosity provides direction. Three months ago 35% of WT students were enrolled online. Two months ago that number increased to 100% overnight. Universities, even the most agile ones, are slow to change. The University of Bologna, the oldest university in the world, operates the way it did over a millennium ago when it was founded. Most other universities still do, save the impact of the internet. Faculty work, student behavior, family, as well as appointed and elected leadership expectations are all remarkably constant for 1,000 years. However, in two months curious people asked themselves, "How can we address current challenges?" WT is a learning organization. Panhandle pragmatics drive it. Crisis and curiosity have, in unison, spawned a learning organization on steroids. No changes of constitution, operating papers, policies or pro-

cedures, but a powerful and pervasive commitment to getting the job done. It required an overdose of curiosity.

The circumstances of COVID-19 potentially result in top-down management and leadership inefficacy. Instead bottom-up leaders address the trials of the day. In fact, informed management and leadership delegates and trusts the workers—faculty and staff—to do their jobs.

People from, or appreciative of, our region and its values are practically minded problem solvers. Further, this organizational acumen exists nearly across the board. The people of WT value the idea of getting the job done without excuse.

In order for these outcomes to be realized, employees must be engaged. A recent Forbes commentary pointed out the foundations of engagement: Leadership's willingness to define and communicate a strong vision and an ability for the organization to enhance and develop talent. Engagement improves when people are in the right role and afforded learning opportunities, even on the fly; work is meaningful, progress is checked and commitment is openly discussed. These are textbook-caliber suggestions that everyone in Management 101 is confronted with. However, the strong organization runs towards these foundational precepts full speed during a crisis. Organizations that merely survive throw too much up in the air, looking for miracles rather than hard work, determination and focus.

According to a reflection on organizational excellence by Anton Vdovin, strong communication that is simultaneously top-down and bottom-up is essential. Insights grow through communication. At WT we asked 240 leaders,

managers, faculty and staff to call over 6,000 students early on in the shift from on-campus to online learning to assess how they were doing. Seeds of communication caused ideas to sprout.

Smart Insights identifies multiple levels of organizational excellence. Strategic direction and communication top the list. Crisis amplifies the importance of both. In addition, a purposeful culture, relational trust and colleague empowerment are all identified as part of well-functioning organizations. I saw these exemplified repeatedly as diligent staff labored to meet the most pressing organizational demands of our most important people, our students.

Great workplaces come from the relationship between authenticity and effective leadership. There are no substitutes, no tricks and no management gurus with cookie-cutter rubrics. Rather, organizations soar when people are allowed to flourish by being informed and responsible. Such organizations shine a bright light on the abilities of individuals to do their work. Rules recede, people prosper and purpose permeates everything.

Times of testing reveal the nature of a purpose-driven organization according to Harvard Business review. Strong change agents are required, and leadership is important, but the real change is guided and fueled by empowered people—faculty and staff. Vision and inspiration are essential so that primary purpose, student aspiration, is sustained and strengthened. Embellishments are eliminated; essentials are elevated. Crisis clears the clouds and cleanses the air.

That's WT's story, and we're stickin' to it.

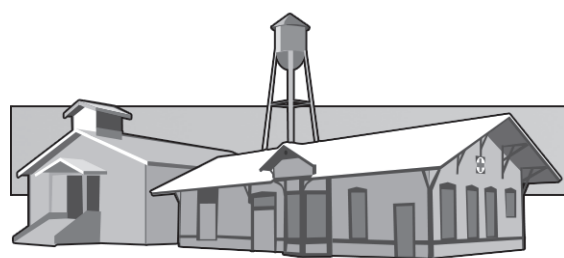

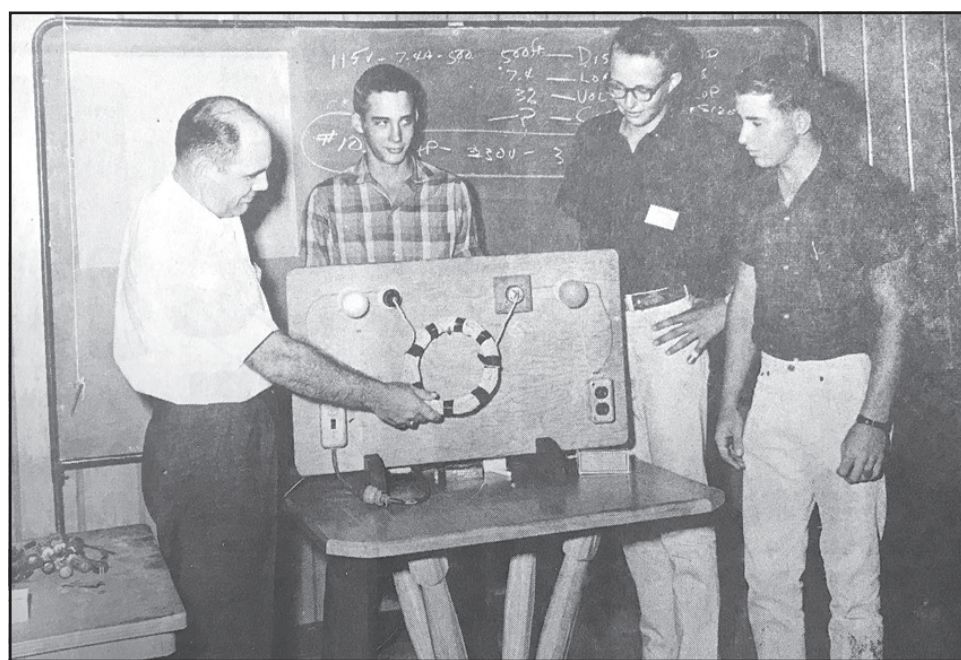

HAVA grants from the Federal government are for counties to purchase compliant voting systems and for the state to purchase and maintain a compliant electronic voter registration database as well as create a voter education program, VoteTexas. There were three items concerning the Law Enforcement Center. A software agreement was tabled until a later date. Commissioners approved the purchase of a generator for \$36,450.00 from Phillips Generator of Amarillo. A grant from PRPC for \$25,000 will be used for the purchase. The current generator is 20 years old. The generator is backup power for the 911 call center and

must meet jail standards. Approval was given for a \$5,078.00 contract agreement with Johnson Controls for the fire suppression system. 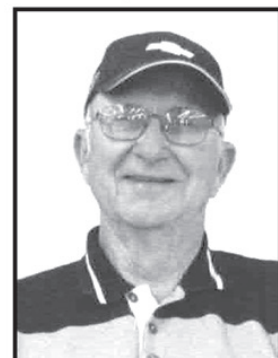

National Egg Month

May is National Egg month, and just as a reminder, eggs are especially nutritious despite information to the contrary in the recent past. They are full of protein, and low in carbohydrates and fat. They also contain vitamin D, phosphorus, vitamin A, and two B-complex vitamins as well

as riboflavin, selenium, and choline. Although eggs have dietary cholesterol, this is different than the blood cholesterol that we measure to watch for heart disease.

If you are keeping count, you are correct that this is my fourth article with egg recipes. You really can't beat eggs. (Ha, did you see

what I did there?) Actually, you can beat them, and scrambled eggs are always a quick meal for my family when it is late, and I haven't started dinner yet. The best thing about eggs is you can use whatever add ins you have in the fridge. And if you want to get fancy, you can stir in your ingredients

and make an omelet, which is really just scrambled eggs, but your kids don't notice.

The recipes this week are a step up from scrambled eggs. I found a couple of unique recipes. They don't look too hard and shouldn't make a huge mess, but still feature the egg as their main ingredient.

Cloud Eggs

Ingredients

8 large eggs
1 c. freshly grated Parmesan
1/2 lb. deli ham, chopped
Kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper
Freshly chopped chives, for garnish

Directions

Preheat oven to 450° and grease a large baking sheet with cooking spray. Separate egg whites and yolks, placing egg whites in a large bowl and yolks in a small bowl. Using a whisk or hand mixer, beat egg whites until stiff peaks form, 3 minutes. Gently fold in Parmesan and ham and season with salt and pepper. Spoon 8 mounds of egg whites onto prepared baking sheet and indent centers to form nests. Bake until lightly golden, about 3 minutes. Carefully spoon an egg yolk into center of each nest and season with salt and pepper. Bake until yolks are just set, about 3 minutes more. Garnish with chives before serving.

Egg Drop Noodle Soup

Ingredients

1/2 tsp. salt
3 package ramen noodles
10 1/2 c. chicken broth
1-piece ginger
3 cloves garlic, lightly smashed
1 tbsp. soy sauce
3 medium carrots, peeled and sliced
1 tbsp. sesame oil
3 large eggs
6 small scallions

Directions

In a large pot over high heat, bring 6 cups salted water to a boil. Add noodles and cook for 3 minutes. Drain noodles and set aside. Rinse pot. In the same pot over medium-high heat, bring chicken broth, ginger, garlic, and soy sauce to a simmer. Add carrots and all but 2 tablespoons scallions, and cook until vegetables are tender, about 3 minutes. Use a slotted spoon to remove ginger and garlic. In a medium bowl, lightly beat together eggs, sesame oil, and salt. Gently stir broth, then pour seasoned eggs into pot. Let sit undisturbed until eggs are cooked, 40 to 60 seconds. Stir with a wooden spoon to break up eggs. Return noodles to pot and cook for 1 minute. Divide soup among 6 bowls and garnish with remaining scallions. Serve immediately.

State Capital Highlights

State of Texas enters second phase of re-opening plan

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on May 18 allowed restaurants to increase occupancy to 50% and relaxed his earlier executive orders that limited certain other public activities over the last two months to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

Reopenings, Abbott said, must adhere to restricted occupancy levels and minimum standard health protocols laid out by the Texas Department of State Health Services.

Notably, public schools have the option to provide in-person summer school so long as they follow social distancing practices and health protocols laid out by the state health department. Classes may begin as soon as June 1.

"I ask all Texans to continue heeding the guidance of our state and federal medical experts and do their part to protect public health. If we all unite in our resolve, we will overcome this challenge," Abbott said.

The full list of guidelines, openings and relevant dates is available at gov.texas.gov/opentexas.

Certain counties where there are surges in COVID-19 cases will have their beginning date of Phase II delayed until May 29. Those Amarillo-area counties where a spike in cases has been confirmed include El Paso, Randall, Potter, Moore and Deaf Smith. Governor's Surge Response Teams are at work in those Panhandle counties to increase testing, maintain hospital capacity and ensure that COVID-19 is contained and mitigated.

Cumulative figures posted on May 21 by the Texas Department of State Health Services showed that some 52,268 people in Texas had been diagnosed with COVID-19 and 1,440 deaths resulting from the virus pandemic had been confirmed.

Budget cuts ordered

Gov. Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Dennis Bonnen on May 20 sent a letter to state agencies and institutions of higher education directing each of them to submit a plan identifying savings to reduce general revenue-related appropriations by 5% for the 2020-2021 two-year budget cycle.

The three highest-ranking state officials urge agencies and institutions of higher education to pursue cost-saving strategies that will not affect the state's response to COVID-19, such as forgoing capital ex-

penditures that can be deferred, avoidable travel expenditures and administrative expenses that are not mission critical, and keeping unfilled any open positions that are not essential to Texas' COVID-19 response.

According to the letter, certain agencies and activities are exempted from the directive "given the importance of the state's response to COVID-19 and the continuity of critical government functions."

TSTA: It's too early

The Texas State Teachers Association, in a May 20 news release, said June 1 is too early to reopen school buildings for summer school classes and demanded that the state and local school districts agree to enforce a detailed list of safety requirements for school campuses before reopening buildings to students and school employees.

"With the COVID-19 pandemic continuing to rage across Texas, the health and safety of students, educators and our communities need to remain our first priority," said TSTA President Noel Candelaria. "The pandemic has struck in the vast majority of Texas' 254 counties and more than 1,200 new cases were reported yesterday. Fourteen people died of COVID-19 in Dallas County alone, a daily high for Dallas."

Candelaria said TSTA is demanding adequate supplies of protective gear for everyone in every school workplace, steps that must be taken to enforce social distancing and sanitation practices and strong enforcement. "Half-hearted enforcement will endanger students and educators, and our members will not stand for it on their campuses," said Candelaria.

Child care funding is cut

The Texas Workforce Commission on May 19 announced the phase-out of a \$200 million emergency program to subsidize child care for Texas' essential workers.

Subsidies were put in place to assist both essential workers and child care centers during limited enrollment. With Texas reopening, essential workers who are already on the subsidized plan will continue to receive child care for the three-month period they were initially approved for under the program.

Effective June 1, the Texas Workforce Commission will reinstate the requirement for parents receiving financial assistance to pay for a portion of their costs.

These recommendations are not a limit on the health protocols that individuals may adopt, and individuals are encouraged to adopt additional protocols consistent with their specific needs and circumstances to help protect the health and safety of all Texans.

Frona High School Graduation Ceremony Guidelines

stadium seats. Each guest must sit as close as possible to the marking. If a small child is one of your guests, make sure that they are not running around.

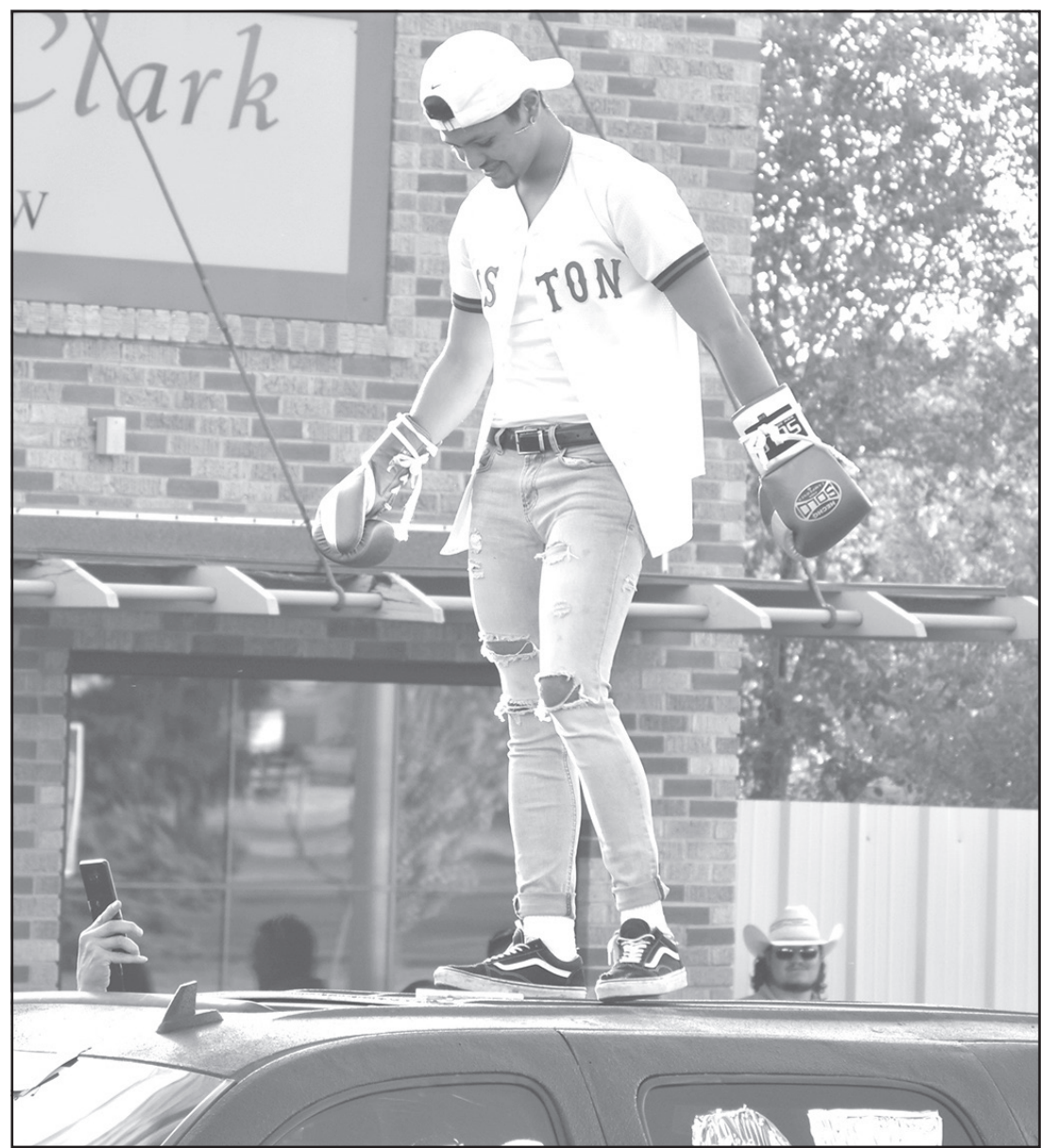
- After the graduation ceremony, please exit the stadium while maintaining social distancing.
