## County sees rise in foreign residents

Like most of the United States, Donley County saw an increase in the number of foreign-born residents over the last decade.

From 2000 to 2012, the number of Donley County residents who were born in a foreign country grew by 28 people to an estimated 91, according to U.S. Census data.

The percentage of county residents who are foreign born also increased during the period, from 1.6 percent to an estimated 2.5 percent.

The findings could be important locally because a new study by the Daily Yonder indicates rural counties with a higher percentage of immigrants are doing better economically.

The study looked at the nation's 1,966 nonmetropolitan counties, including Donley County. Nonmetropolitan, or rural, counties have no cities of 50,000 or more residents and don't have strong economic ties to a county that does.

The research showed that counties with a higher percentage of their population born in foreign countries generally had a higher per capita market income and more jobs. These same counties also tended to have lower rates of unemployment and better poverty than counties with a smaller proportion of immigrants.

In Donley County, the economic results were mixed throughout the period of the study.



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# Obama's Cuba critics have it dead wrong

At the Summit of the Americas, President Obama took the next crucial steps in his quest to normalize relations with Cuba. Not only did he have a cordial meeting with Cuban leader Raul Castro, he announced that Cuba would be removed from the U.S. list of states that sponsor terrorism. Both actions have been long overdue.

Predictably, Obama's rapprochement with Cuba has drawn fire from hard-line hawkish elements in the United States. When the initial reports surfaced in December 2014 that the administration intended to seek diplomatic ties with Havana, outspoken conservatives blasted the move as appeasement of a brutal dictatorship and a betrayal of the oppressed Cuban people. Senator Marco Rubio (R-FL), the son of Cuban exiles, was especially caustic in his assessment. Critics renewed and intensified such allegations following Obama's latest initiatives.

But even conservatives do not constitute a solid bloc opposed to a new relationship with Cuba. Several GOP senators, including Jeff Flake of Arizona and Rand Paul of Kentucky, promptly signed an open letter expressing support for Obama's action.

Flake and other conservative legislators also co-sponsored a bill that would lift most components of the economic embargo that has been in place since the beginning of the 1960s. Moreover, officials of both the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the agricultural lobby seem receptive to ending Washington's economic cold war against the island nation. They realize that Cuba could become again what it was in the pre-Castro era: a significant market for American agricultural exports (both Kansas Republican senators signed the Flake-Paul letter), an attractive tourist destination and a potential arena for a wide range of U.S. investments. Economic incentives are working against the agenda of those factions that want to maintain the embargo.

Obama's rapprochement policy also is receiving widespread praise from governments and opinion leaders throughout Latin America. The sense of relief in those societies is almost palpable.

The U.S. policy of trying to isolate Cuba received some support in Latin America during the Cold War (especially from right-wing authoritarian governments), but there were always dissenters, even during that era. Mexico, for example, ostentatiously maintained diplomatic and economic links with Havana. And once the Cold War ended, few Latin American governments saw any wisdom in Washington's stubborn persistence. Obama's drive to end the isolation policy is welcomed by hemispheric leaders weary of being caught in the middle of the feud between the United States and Cuba.

The adoption of a new approach is long overdue. Washington's current strategy has been in place for some fifty-five years, yet it has spectacularly failed to achieve its objective of bringing down Cuba's communist government. One wonders what the proponents of staying the course hope to accomplish. Do they believe that the fifty-sixth year – or the maybe the sixtieth or eightieth year – will be the charm? At some point, persisting in a policy that is clearly not working constitutes nothing more than being obstinate. We reached that point in our Cuba policy several decades ago.

Critics are especially upset that the Obama administration is willing to remove Cuba from the list of state sponsors of terrorism. But there is little credible evidence that Havana has been involved in promoting terrorist activity at any time during the past two decades – something that even U.S. officials concede. If a government is on the terrorist sponsor list, it ought to be guilty of, well, sponsoring terrorism. Otherwise, the list simply becomes a cynical diplomatic device for bashing regimes we don't like.

The argument that Washington should not have normal relations with the Castro regime because it represses the Cuban people has scarcely more merit. No one denies that the Cuban government is brutal and autocratic. But the United States does not have the luxury of maintaining ties only with enlightened, democratic countries. If we insist on that standard, the number of embassies on Washington's famed embassy row would be much diminished. And many conservative critics of Obama's Cuba initiative are strangely selective in their sense of outrage. Few of them condemn ties with such brutal autocracies as Egypt and Saudi Arabia. Moreover, many of the older critics were cheerleaders for Washington's alliances with Cold War-era tyrants like the Shah of Iran, Anastasio Somoza, Mobutu Sese Seko, and Ferdinand Marcos.

President Obama deserves criticism for his handling of some foreign-policy issues. His decision to escalate the war in Afghanistan, his administration's clumsy actions that provoked a needless confrontation with Russia, and his continuing flirtation with deepening U.S. military involvement in Syria and Iraq should be at the top of the list. But he deserves praise for his willingness to abandon hoary policies elsewhere that have clearly failed. His courageous move to seek a more constructive relationship with Iran is one example. So, too, is his decision to defy the powerful Cuban-American lobby and myopic conservatives and establish normal ties with Cuba.

Deeply analytical and as hardworking as they come, he has a track record of excellence that sets him apart in a field dominated by younger broadcasters. At age 70, Norm is the dean of Metroplex sports broadcasters with a big following during his two-hour talk show each weekday at 10 a.m. on KTCK, 1310, The Ticket.

To reach the lofty pinnacle where he's perched for so long, Norm has plumbed the depths of sports in a compassionate manner, known for dealing with current, significant sports issues in a civil manner – even if callers on the other end of the line refuse to meet him half way....

It's a wonder he ever "caught on" in a major market. Called a "melon-headed Yankee" by a smattering of critics who maintain he has "a face for radio," they also say his voice quality languishes right alongside basketball personality Dick Vitale – high pitched, with a nasal twang diluted by gravel.

One wag remarked that "Norm doesn't say it, he whines it, and his thunderous laugh sounds like a farmer's hay-baling machine that needs a good greasing."

Such descriptions aside, most listeners know he has an "outdoor-sized heart" rarely matched in compassion. Masses care what he thinks, taking his predictions to heart, and some to the race track....

At the turn of the century, Norm's focus sharpened on the mission of the Austin Street Center, where food and

lodging are provided for some 350 men and women nightly. He buttonholes numerous sports personalities to participate by don newbury

in "NormA-Thon," an
18-hour radio
marathon whose proceeds benefit the
center.

He's now been the backbone for this annual event for 14 years. More than \$2.5 million has been raised, with the 2014 mark an all-time high of \$400,000. Norm's at Dallas' Star-Power Home Theater Store to interview sports celebrities, urging call-in bids, pushing raffles, and, in general, beating the drums for Austin Street Center.

He'll do so for the 15th time come December 26....

Jordan Spieth – Masters champion and darling of the golf world – was a 2014 participant. Maybe it brought him good luck – and who is to say it didn't. If there's any superstition, Jordan may be a "lock" for future "Norm-A-Thons."

Norm made an on-the-air mention that since the 2014 "Norm-A-Thon," Jordan has played in four PGA events, finishing under par for all 16 rounds.

When other pro golfers hear this, they may well flock to Dallas to see if such good fortune "rubs off" with association to programs that help the poor and hungry....

We've needed a sports hero like Spieth for a while. His head is on straight. He handles all matters so far in a pleasant manner, without a hint of cockiness. Asked about his humility, he answered that if he talked about it, he wouldn't be humble!

Few people can handle fame where pressures never ease and spotlights never darken. He credits his 14-year-old special needs sister for inspiration each day, and foul words – uttered so casually by many athletes – seem foreign to his upbringing. In short, many are banking on him to continue being who he is.

It is clear he's from a family of values. He wears the "apples don't fall far from the tree" mantle well. He's "been raised right," with a good chance to warrant admiration for decades – a bona fide national sports hero....

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
My guess? His britches will always be big enough. "Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown," Shakespeare warned. And already, this young man has taken heed.

And so has Hitzges. He has humbly accepted tons of accolades. And his love of broadcasting is exceeded only by his passion to help the hungry and homeless.

My wife and I have followed
Norm's career with interest and hurrahs.
He was my successor as Director of
College Information at Sul Ross State
University for the 1967-68 school
year. He was a guest in our home for
about a month until he found housing.
He is remembered fondly in Alpine,
particularly that he "talks funny." (I
recall that he covered the first rodeo he'd
ever seen.)

Both Norm and Jordan have life figured out to a significant degree.
They've learned that happiest folks give back....

## One Texan has a recipe for luck

Jeffrey Fuquay has a simple outlook been replaced on business. by a full-

"The harder you work, the luckier you get," Jeffrey says. And he should know – as the owner of TJ Blackburn Syrup Works, Jeffrey has seen how nearly nine decades of hard work can turn a scrap of paper into a Texas icon.

Fuquay's grandparents, Thomas
Jefferson "TJ" Blackburn and his wife
Lurline, started TJ Blackburn Syrup
Works in Cass County, Texas in the
1920s. The Blackburns were struggling
to get by and had turned to renting a
spare bedroom in their already modest
home to drifters in return for chores and
other meager payments. One couple
came through in 1927 and could offer
only a scrap of paper with a misspelled
"Receipt for Huney" scribbled on it.

The Blackburns mixed the recipe back in their tool shed, and with a few tweaks, came up with a signature syrup. Word got out among their neighbors, and soon enough people started wanting a batch for themselves. TJ took to the streets in his Model-T Ford delivering freshly-jarred syrup door-to-door.

Eighty-eight years later, the Blackburns have upgraded from four wheels to 18, and a single Model-T has been replaced
by a fullscale trucking
operation.

Blackburn ancestry.

Their secret to success?

Blackburn's syrup is made from ribbon cane, a Southern favorite over more common maple and honey-based varieties. Fuquay told the Marshall News Messenger, "it has more of a bite, a real strong flavor...I can think of maybe only two other companies that still use sugar cane."

Of course, to cater to growing demand beyond East Texas, Blackburn Syrup Works has expanded its catalogue of sweet spreads to include honey and maple-based syrups, as well as a variety of jams and preserves. And with that, the local family-owned company went national; Blackburn's syrups and jams – once carried only as far as TJ's Model-T

could take him – are now sold in all 50 states.

Despite national fame, Fuquay has kept Blackburn Syrup Works true to its Texas roots, picking most ingredients from Texas farms. Even the fruit that isn't grown in Texas still is Americangrown.

Another Blackburn trademark that's stood the test of time is the iconic glass mug. And for good reason – sales have fallen when different types of containers have been used. Fuquay explained, "Your eyes gravitate toward the mug," and then the quality keeps you coming back to their sweet spreads.

Of course, over 88 years, some things have changed: there are now sugar-free and fructose-free options to cater to those watching their waistlines. And not surprisingly, they've upgraded their plant in Jefferson quite a few times to keep up with growing demand and technology.

What will always remain is the ageold Texas-made quality, and the message behind the success of the Blackburn family's syrup enterprise: as Fuquay reminds us, luck doesn't come without a lot of hard work.


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



The filing was made in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) § 36.209 and Commission Substantive Rule 25.239. The TCRF will recover SWEPCO's reasonable and necessary costs for transmission infrastructure improvements, as well as changes in wholesale transmission charges under a tariff approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). In this application, SWEPCO seeks to recover its transmission capital investments through December 31, 2014. SWEPCO also seeks to recover through the TCRF approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.

This notice is being published in accordance with PURA § 36.103 and Commission Procedural Rule 22.51(a)

STATEMENT OF INTENT

TO CHANGE RATES SWEPCO requests that the Commission approve a TCRF that would result in an increase in SWEPCO's Texas retail revenue requirement of \$9,267,375 per annum above the amount approved in SWEPCO's previous TCRF case (PUC Docket No. 42448). This amounts to a 3.01 percent increase in SWEPCO's overall annualized current Texas retail revenue requirement. SWEPCO has proposed that its requested rate change become effective 35 days after the filing of the Statement of Intent and Application. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission.

All customers in SWEPCO's Texas retail rate classes will be affected by

this change. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.

> **REQUEST FOR TEMPORARY RATES**

SWEPCO requests that the Commission or assigned administrative law judge issue an order establishing SWEPCO's existing TCRF as a temporary rate effective 120 days after the filing of the Statement of Intent and Application subject to refund or surcharge to the extent the TCRF established pursuant to the Statement of Intent and Application differs from the existing TCRF.







## Drugs in the News

### FDA Expands Use of Eye Medication

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a medication that is injected into the eye in persons with a conditional called diabetic retinopathy who already have another eye condition called macular edema. Diabetic macular edema is inflammation of a part of the eye that helps with vision. Diabetic retinopathy is a common eye problem in diabetics and may cause vision loss due to damage in the blood vessels in the eye. In a small percentage of such individuals who will also have diabetic macular edema, an abnormal growth of vessels along the retina in the eye is often experienced. If these vessels burst, it could lead to severe vision loss or even blindness.

Over six hundred people participated in a clinical trial that led to the new approval of Aflibercept (Eylea) for macular edema and diabetic retinopathy. The results indicated that those who got Eylea showed better improvement after two years than those who did not receive Eylea. The most common side effects that were reported included bleeding in the outer eye tissue; pain the eye, increased eye pressure, cloudiness of the lens, and floaters. Eylea has been approved since 2012 to treat other conditions of the eye.
