Slow start in early voting for aldermen

Clarendon citizens began casting early ballots Monday, April 27, in the election for two aldermen's positions; and as of Tuesday afternoon, only 14 citizens had voted in the city election.

With two seats available on the city council, incumbent Aldermen Sandy Skelton and Doug Kidd are joined on the ballot by challenger Britton Hall.

Mayor Larry Hicks is also on the city ballot but has no opponent this year.

The mayor and aldermen all serve two-year terms. Early voting by personal appearance will be done at the Donley County Courthouse Annex.

While no other local taxing entity is having a competitive election this year to choose local officials, the City of Howardwick is holding an election to renew a

local sales tax option in that city. Early voting for Howardwick is held at the City Hall there, and Mayor Mike Rowland and Alderman Gail Leathers along with alderman candidate Brenda Hampton also are on the ballot with no opposition.

Early voting will continue through next Tuesday, May 5, and this year's elections will be held on May 9.

CEDC seeks input on farmers market

Input from local producers and gardeners is being sought regarding a potential farmers' market in Clarendon.

The Clarendon Economic Development Corp. successfully applied for a USDA grant to help fund a covered pavilion on city property for use as a farmers' market, but the grant only covers about 30 percent of the cost of such a project.

While the farmers' market idea is very popular, it remains unclear how many local producers would actually be willing to sell their goods at such a market at a date and time that would best meet the needs of local consum-

CEDC Interim Director Jack King is asking all local farmers, gardeners, and other producers interested in having booths at a farmers' market to please call him in the next few days at 806-874-2421.

If the interest is there, a test market would be held this summer before large outlays of cash and time are expended on facilities.

Bees slow work on old house

The old house at Sixth and Bugbee was again on the agenda when the Clarendon City Council held its regular meeting last Thursday, April 23.

The structure narrowly avoided condemnation by the city a little more than five months ago when the owner of the house, Linda Lewis, was given six months to address specific code concerns.

Lewis did not attend last week's meeting, but sent Julie Russell to speak on her behalf. Russell said removal of one old balcony on the house had gone smoothly but attempted removal of a second balcony had revealed an infestation of bees. Work on the house has since been hindered because of the risk of agitating the bees.

The aldermen took no action on the house last week. Mrs. Lewis has until May 18 to satisfy the city's code department and its safety concerns.

In other business, aldermen approved amending the city's employee handbook regarding when a new employee receives medical insurance and life insurance.

Aldermen considered proposals for a new heating and air-conditioning system at City Hall, but they took no action because the three proposals differed in the efficiencies of the units that would be installed. The city will look at this issue again but will ask contractors to give proposals based on the same efficiencies.

The council approved paying for a plumbing bill incurred at the residence of Dennis and Ruth Petty. The couple had a muddy spot appear in their yard and employed a plumber thinking they had a leak on their side of the water meter. The leak turned out to be coming from an abandoned meter not theirs.

The Climate Courage of **Pope Francis**

Kudos to Pope Francis for calling a conference, scheduled for tomorrow, emphasizing the moral dimensions of climate change. It's about time we took a clear and sober look at an issue that can cause so much harm to so many, especially the poor and downtrodden.

The core problem for the conference is to balance the costs and benefits imposed by climate change against the costs and benefits of a major reduction in the use of fossil fuels, with the understanding that there are only two other sources of dense energy that can effectively replace them, nuclear power and large hydroelectric dams.

Abundant and dependable energy frees mankind from a menial existence, allowing us to use our given talents for the greater good. The mental capital of the poor in the underdeveloped world is untapped without dense energy. The burning of dung for cooking is a major cause of early death from pulmonary disease. The massive deforestation that must occur without dense energy amplifies floods from ubiquitous tropical downpours. Solar power simply cannot run a city from late afternoon through early morning. Wind is far too intermittent, especially over tropical lands, and would require backup from either coal or natural gas to keep the electrical grid stable.

The conference has a moral duty to the poor, namely to help them find ways to not be poor. There is no debate that depriving them of the technological means that are required to lift their societies is immoral.

The conference also has a moral duty to examine the issue of climate change itself. Is it moral for scientists and policymakers to use computer models for climate change that are clearly predicting far too much warming? What kind of climate would God want for us - the one we have today, the cooler one at the beginning of the Industrial Revolution, the much warmer one that accompanied the rise of agriculture and civilization, or thousands of feet of ice over what is now Chicago? Homo sapiens has lived through all of these.


The conference has a moral duty to seek and follow the truth, wherever it may lead, even through the thorniest of dilemmas. If crop-based biofuels reduce carbon-dioxide emissions, is it moral for the United States - the world's largest producer - to burn up half of its corn crop every year? If these fuels indeed result in more carbon dioxide emissions than simply powering automobiles with gasoline would, is it moral to put thousands and thousands of people out of work - and gravely harm the state of Iowa - by shutting down the massive infrastructure that now serves the corn-ethanol industry?

The conference also has a moral duty to examine the corruption of science that can be caused by massive amounts of money. The United States has disbursed tens of billions of dollars to climate scientists who would not have received those funds had their research shown climate change to be beneficial or even modest in its effects. Are these scientists being tempted by money? And are the very, very few climate scientists whose research is supported by industry somehow less virtuous?

Then there is the all-important question of what our authority should be. Should it be the constructs of the human mind as expressed by interacting differential equations in a computerized simulation of climate change? Or should it be how God and nature express that climate, having placed us in what is now the 21st consecutive year without a statistically significant lower-atmospheric warming trend? I would think that Christians should be humble before God. "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork" (Psalm 19:1).

Pope Francis has done the world a wonderful favor. It is now time to examine all the moral aspects of climate change, the way we power our society, and the need to protect and help the least among us. Anything less would be a waste of the pontiff's calling.



All agree: End human trafficking

Last week, Senate Republicans made headlines as the new Republicancontrolled chamber passed 100 days in the 114th Congress. By many measures, the Senate seems to be back in business.

In just the past few weeks, Congress passed a bill reforming the flawed Medicare payments system with the "Doc Fix" bill. The same day, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee unanimously sent a bill to the floor that would give Congress a vote on the potential deal with Iran. And last week, Trade Promotion Authority legislation was introduced, which will ensure the United States gets the best possible deal in ongoing trade negotiations.

But for all our accomplishments, I am happiest to report that the Senate is doing what it should to help the most vulnerable among us.

The evil of human trafficking is not something that everyone wants to talk about. It is an embarrassment that today in the United States, we still deal with such disgusting practices as human slavery across all 50 states.

Thousands of young girls, many of middle school age, are trapped in a life of bondage where they are abused and sold for sex every day. This is unconscionable, and as the father of two daughters, it is utterly heartbreaking to hear the stories of these survivors who are trapped in modern-day slavery.

In recent years, Texas has become all too familiar with the issue. According to the Texas Attorney General's office, almost 20 percent of all U.S. trafficking

victims travel through our state. Sadly, a study conducted by Free the Captives, a nonprofit organization focused on stamping out



ing, indicated that Houston stands out as a major hub for sex trafficking.

When I was home earlier this month, I was encouraged by the work of many groups in the state bravely and diligently fighting the scourge of human trafficking, and providing support for victims who are trying to recover from a life of slavery. I visited with organizations and individuals who are leading the charge to defend these victims, including people. Houston-based Children at Risk, and held events with technology groups like Google, who are harnessing the power of innovative technologies to save those trapped in the shadows.

I am thankful that Texas boasts many advocacy groups that champion the rights of these victims. But more is needed to take that fighting spirit to the rest of the country.

And this week, we made progress. After months of lively negotiations with my Democratic colleagues, we passed the Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act. In the end, both sides came together to pass bipartisan legislation


vital to the health and recovery of victims, and necessary to bring justice to their captors.

This bill is designed to provide the thousands of victims of sexual exploitation, slavery and human trafficking crucial resources to place them on a path of healing and restoration. Importantly, it allows those who have been sold into slavery to be treated as victims instead of criminals. Under the measure, a special fund will be created to ensure these victims get the shelter and services they need, to ensure a fresh start to a new life of freedom.

The legislation will strengthen law enforcement tools to help authorities rescue victims and take down human traffickers and the organized criminal networks who support them. It will also target the demand side of the equation by punishing those who seek to purchase As a lawmaker, but more important

as a father, husband and citizen of this great country, I feel I have a responsibility to protect our nation's most vulnerable. I am pleased that once again we have come together to solve a major problem facing our country: human trafficking.

We can always do more to advocate and serve those who have been affected by abuse and exploitation. Our work is not finished. We must continue to fight until all children are free from the threat posed by this heinous crime.

Texas House GOP Caucus endorses sales tax cuts

Almost all of the Republicans in the Texas House - 90 of 98 - endorsed cuts in state sales taxes over cuts in local property taxes in a letter unveiled Saturday, days before the House is set to vote on tax cut legislation.

Their stance is based on experience, they wrote: Lawmakers tried to lower local property taxes nearly a decade ago, but their efforts were blunted by inflation, rising appraisals and local decisions on tax rates.

State Rep. Dennis Bonnen, R-Angleton, the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, has proposed a three-tenths-of-a-cent cut in state sales taxes along with cuts in the business franchise tax. The Senate has also proposed cutting the business tax but would roughly double the size of homestead exemptions from property taxes instead of lowering sales taxes.

The House plan is the largest tax cut on the table, providing nearly \$4.9 billion in tax relief for Texas, including the first-ever reduction in state sales tax, with a reduction in rate from 6.25 percent to 5.95 per-







FDA Expands Use of Eye Medication

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a medication that is injected into the eye in persons with a conditional called diabetic retinopathy who already have another eye condition called macular edema. Diabetic macular edema is inflammation of a part of the eye that helps with vision. Diabetic retinopathy is a common eye problem in diabetics and may cause vision loss due to damage in the blood vessels in the eye. In a small percentage of such individuals who will also have diabetic macular edema, an abnormal growth of vessels along the retina in the eye is often experienced. If these vessels burst, it could lead to severe vision loss or even blindness.

Over six hundred people participated in a clinical trial that led to the new approval of Aflibercept (Eylea) for macular edema and diabetic retinopathy. The results indicated that those who got Eylea showed better improvement after two years than those who did not receive Eylea. The most common side effects that were reported included bleeding in the outer eye tissue; pain the eye, increased eye pressure, cloudiness of the lens, and floaters. Eylea has been approved since 2012 to treat other conditions of the eye.











The filing was made in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) § 36.209 and Commission Substantive Rule 25.239. The TCRF will recover SWEPCO's reasonable and necessary costs for transmission infrastructure improvements, as well as changes in wholesale transmission charges under a tariff approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). In this application, SWEPCO seeks to recover its transmission capital investments through December 31, 2014. SWEPCO also seeks to recover through the TCRF approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.
