### Citywide clean-up begins on Monday

A weeklong citywide cleanup will begin next Monday, May 11, and continue through Saturday, May 16.

During the clean-up, city residents will be charged half the usual price of disposal fees at the convenience center on Front Street, and city workers will be available to pick up large items curbside for senior citizens and disabled residents.

The city is also requesting volunteers from the community to help residents who do not have the means to haul off debris.

The convenience center will be open during the clean-up from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Monday, May 11, through Friday, May 15, and from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 16.

Items not accepted are shingles, construction waste, electronics, paint, and batteries.

Dumping charges will be half their normal rate for Clarendon citizens during the clean-up. A copy of citizens' water bills will be requested at the time of dumping to show residency.

# JRCA says 200+ will rodeo this weekend

More than 200 kids will put their cowboy skills to the test this weekend when the Junior Rodeo Cowboys Association hosts a spring competition at the Clarendon College Livestock & Equine Center on Saturday and Sunday, May 9 and 10.

JRCA officials say kids ranging in ages from three to 19 are registered for more than 1,100 runs over the two-day period. Events will run from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. each day, and admission is \$5.

Scheduled events including barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying, tie down roping, team roping, ribbon roping, bull riding, bronc riding, and mutton busting.

JRCA is a non-profit organization serving the rodeo interests of youth from across the Texas Panhandle, Northwest Texas, and Western Oklahoma. Organized in 1998, the JRCA has enjoyed steady growth and now boasts about 300 members.

Members compete in traditional rodeo events in six different age groups for both girls and boys with regular season rodeos plus the two performance finals.

Members of the JRCA come from Lubbock on the southwest to Oklahoma City on the northeast and from Vernon on the southeast to the Oklahoma Panhandle on the northwest.

This weekend's event is sponsored by the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation with Hotel Occupancy Tax Funds, and Clarendon Chamber of Commerce officials are preparing welcome bags encouraging rodeo attendees to support Chamber members.

# Clarendon, Howardwick vote May 9

Voters in Clarendon and Howardwick will go to the polls Saturday for city elections.

Early voting ended Tuesday and turnout was light in both cities. Approximately 80 citizens had voted in Clarendon by late afternoon May 5, and only eight early ballots had been cast in Howardwick shortly after noon that same day.

The only competitive race this spring is in Clarendon where three candidates are vying for two seats on the city council. Incumbent Aldermen Sandy Skelton and Doug Kidd are joined on the ballot by challenger Britton Hall.

Mayor Larry Hicks is also on the city ballot but has no opponent.

The mayor and aldermen all serve two-year terms. City voting this Saturday, May 9, will take place at the Donley County Courthouse Annex from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

While no other local taxing entity is having a competitive election this year to choose local officials, the City of Howardwick is holding an election to renew a local sales tax option in that city. The measure would renew a


one-quarter percent sales tax for street improvements. Howardwick City Hall says the tax doesn't raise much money but is needed for street repairs.

Voting in Howardwick will also be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday at the Howardwick City Hall there, and Mayor Mike Rowland and Alderman Gail Leathers along with alderman candidate Brenda Hampton also are unopposed on the ballot.

Extension Agent Leonard Haynes was there along with Clarendon Interim Director of Tourism & Economic Development Jack King, city clerk and Chamber of Commerce board member Sharon Braddock, and myself (newspaper guy, CEDC secretary and Chamber president).

Mr. Haynes sent out about 80 personal invitations to the event, and it made the front page of the Enterprise twice. And then there were four of us.

Granted, it was a busy night. Clarendon ISD's Gifted & Talented Showcase was the same night and started at the same time. (There we go with the editor being 30 minutes late.) But surely not everyone on the invitation list was at the GT program.

Maybe it was just a bad day or time, but when is a better day or time? That's always an issue planning any community event. It always comes down to just picking a day, pulling the trigger, and hoping for the best. Mr. Haynes did due diligence to avoid any possible conflicts, and considering the GT program was going on, he thought he had a good date. And yet, there were four of us.

It's been suggested that perhaps food would draw more people. Shoot a mile, free beer would probably help, too. But surely there are more than four people interested in the future of our community.

Perhaps thing have changed from a decade ago when Mr. Haynes held his first such workshop and more than 40 people attended. Perhaps were busier now. Or perhaps - and this is the scary part - we're a society that is now largely disengaged.

What do you think will make Clarendon and Donley County grow? And more importantly, how can we pay for the improvements you would like to see?


Women may take to the holiday more than men. Men may limit expression of warm thoughts to brothers only, often just for birthdays. Exceptions may be guys who cave in, giving posies to little sisters to salve guilt feelings for pain they inflicted during growing up years.

In fact, the holiday is observed in only four-fifths of these United States.

This figure is identical to the percentage of Americans who have siblings....

With all the surveillance going on, I'm not sure what would happen if there were photographic proof of "happy Sibling Day" cards mailed across boundaries of non-participating states. This might violate some postal rule, or at least the spirit of the so-called holiday.

Seems to me the holiday, now just 13 years into play, is more of a "permission slip" than an official observance. Perhaps the 39 governors who signed on figured it to be easier to go along than to oppose the measure. Since it also is acknowledged in India and Australia, look for proponents to call it an "international holiday."

In the meantime, I hope to stay in touch with my brother with occasional phone calls.

And if I think of it, I'll send him a birthday card....

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
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# Join the Chamber to help Clarendon

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
# Drugs in the News

These Pain Medicines Help COPD Symptom Managment The results of a recent study published in the Annals of the American

Thoracic Society showed that opioid type medications can help improve the sensation of breathlessness in people who suffer from a breathing condition called chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). Researchers wanted to examine if opioids helped improve feelings of breathlessness, exercise capacity, and quality of life. Data from sixteen clinical trials and over two hundred and fifty participants who had COPD showed that opioids reduced breathlessness overall and opioids that are injected into the veins had a better outcome than the inhaled version. There were no reports of severe adverse events. Opioid medications are a group of prescription medications that help control mild or severe pain. They do so by binding to receptors in the brain, spinal cord, and certain areas in the body. Opioids can cause sleepiness, nausea, confusion, and reduce breathing. This group includes codeine, morphine (Kadian, Avinza), or oxycodone (OxyContin, Percocet). These medications should be taken as prescribed.



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# **Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures**

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

\*the market or special appraised value placed on your property;

\*the unequal appraisal of your property;

\*the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll;

\*exemptions that may apply to you;

\*qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal; \*the taxable status of your property;

\*which local governments should be taxing your property;

\*the ownership of property;

\*the change of use of land receiving special appraisal;

\*any action taken by the appraisal district that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review: For information about informal review and obtaining property tax records, call your appraisal district at the number listed on the Notice of Appraised Value.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board. The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters. A protest form has been included with your appraisal notice.

Note: You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the Chief Appraiser of the appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to District Court, Binding Arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or

Tax Payment: You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

### DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB\*

Usual Deadline: 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you. Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you. For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you. If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

\*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.



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
