## Kidd, Skelton win re-election for city

A thirteen percent voter turnout returned two incumbents to the Clarendon City Council Saturday, May 9.

Aldermen Sandy Skelton and Doug Kidd were the heavy favorites among those balloting, winning out over challenger Britton Hall.

With 146 votes cast, Skelton received 124 votes, Kidd received 114, and Hall garnered 34.

Skelton and Kidd will remain on the council for two more years. Mayor Larry Hicks will also begin a new two-year term since he did not attract a challenger in this election.

In Howardwick, a handful of voters renewed that city's optional one-quarter of one percent sales tax for street improvements. City Hall said Monday that 34 people voted in favor of the tax and one person voted against it. City officials there say the measure doesn't raise much money but that the city does need it.

## Citywide clean-up underway this week

Clarendon's weeklong city-wide clean-up is underway and continues through Saturday, May 16, 2015.

During the clean-up, city residents are being charged half the usual price of disposal fees at the convenience center on Front Street, and city workers are available to pick up large items curbside for senior citizens and disabled residents.

The convenience center will be open during the clean-up from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Monday, May 11, through Friday, May 15, and from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 16.

Items not accepted are shingles, construction waste, electronics, paint, and batteries.

A copy of citizens' water bills will be requested at the time of dumping to show residency.

## Citywide garage sale to be June 6

Spring cleaning is in the air, and area residents are asked to mark their calendars for the ninth annual Trash to Treasures Garage Sale Event on Saturday, June 6, 2014.

The countywide garage sale is supported by local and regional advertising, and local sales pay a small fee to be part of the promotion and to be on the official Trash to Treasures map.

Sign-ups are underway until Friday, May 29, at the ENTERPRISE. Call 874-2259 or come by for more information.

## City sales tax figure falls again

Clarendon's sales tax revenue dropped for the third straight month when Texas Comptroller Glen Hegar released April allocations last week.

City sales tax figures slid 7.24 percent compared to one year ago, coming in at \$36,571.80 compared to \$39,429.81 for the same period one year ago.

The calendar year-to-date total has now slipped 1.20 percent to \$159,219.56.

Howardwick's sales tax revenue also continued sliding, falling 13.53 percent for the month to \$1,118.01 and down 6.78 percent for the year at \$5,480.43.

Hedley was up 20.56 percent this month with an allocation of \$1,011.22 compared to \$838.71 last year, but that city is still behind 15.64 percent for the year at \$3,016.81.

A look at surrounding communities show a mixed bag of sales tax income figures for this month with Wellington down 13.13 percent, Childress up 12.56 percent, Memphis up 8.33 percent, Claude down 5.75 percent, and Shamrock down 10.21 percent. Amarillo was up 5.51 percent, and Pampa was down 13.63 percent.

Statewide, Hegar said sales tax revenue was \$2.3 billion, up 1.1 percent compared to April 2014.

"As we predicted in January, state revenues have grown at a moderate pace. April is the second consecutive month of relatively slow growth in sales tax revenue, and I remain cautiously optimistic about our economic progress," Hegar said. "Growth in total sales tax revenues collected this month was muted by the significant slowdown in the oil and gas mining sector; however, collections from other major economic sectors - including retail and wholesale trade, restaurants, construction, and manufacturing - continued to grow. This marks the 61st consecutive month of growth in sales tax collections."

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in March as well as January, February and March sales by businesses that report tax quarterly.

## Flowing Blessings



Precious rain fell on Donley County and the surrounding area last week with more in the forecast this week. ## County receives lighting donation from Clarendon EDC

Donley County Commissioners discussed upcoming improvements and activities on the Courthouse Square when they met in regular session Monday, May 11.

The Courthouse Lighting Committee reported that the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation had approved a request to provide \$5,000 for electrical improvements

and additional lighting for the holiday season. Most of that money will go towards adding new outlets to the backs of floodlights on the courthouse lawn that can be used for Christmas lights, July Fourth booths, and other activities.

Judge John Howard said the county will also be purchasing banners promoting the 125th anniversary

of the Courthouse and patriotic bunting for the Courthouse arches. New brochures have also been printed for the Courthouse anniversary.

Howard also said the county is pursuing getting a historical marker for the old horse trough on the south side of the square near the Courthouse Annex. The exact age of the trough isn't known at this time, but

it is believed to be one of the only - if not the only - horse troughs on a courthouse square in the state.

In other county business Monday, commissioners approved Deputy County Clerk LaVerne Pinion's attendance at a state conference, discussed using GovDeals for online auction services for surplus equipment, and approved upgrading

the Microsoft Office software on county computers.

The court also renewed the county's property insurance through the Texas Association of Counties and considered but took no action on adding a paid LifeStar membership as a county employee benefit.

Dr. Matt Halsey was named as the county Rabies Control Authority.

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# Tax reform everyone can support

Tax reform will be a key Republican theme going into the 2016 elections, but Republicans divide over the needed changes. Pro-growth conservatives and libertarians favor broad-based tax rate cuts, while conservative and moderate “reformicons” favor expanded social policy breaks, such as child tax credits.

The tax divide is important because the next president will likely be a Republican, and he or she will probably push for a first-year tax cut, as Ronald Reagan and George W. Bush did. Reagan’s 1981 tax cuts were all pro-growth. Bush’s 2001 tax cuts were partly pro-growth and partly social policy, as were the 1997 tax cuts under Bill Clinton.

Looking ahead to 2016, one reform idea that should appeal to all types of Republicans – and even some Democrats – is universal savings accounts (USAs). Such accounts would be like Roth Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs), but for all types of savings, not just retirement savings. People would contribute after-tax income to USAs, and then all earnings and withdrawals would be completely tax-free.

USAs would be great social policy, as they would help families build larger nest eggs, and they would be great economic policy, since savings fuels investment and growth. The accounts would be good politics, as well, as we have seen with the success of USA-style accounts in Canada and Britain.

Let’s look at Canada first. Prime Minister Stephen Harper’s government implemented Tax-Free Savings Accounts (TFSA) in 2009, and they are creating a broad-based savings revolution north or the border. Here are the key features of the accounts:

- Annual contribution limit of \$10,000. Portions of the contribution limit not used in a year can be carried forward to future years.
- Tax-free earnings. All earnings are tax-free and withdrawals can be made at any time for any reason, with no taxes or penalties. This feature greatly simplifies the accounts and increases liquidity, both of which encourage added savings.
- No income limits. All adults can contribute to the accounts and withdraw from them at any time during their lives.
- Ease of saving. Accounts can be opened at any bank branch or online, and they can hold bank deposits, stocks, bonds, mutual funds, and other types of assets.

TFSA’s are great for all types of saving – saving to buy a home or a car, or saving to cover health expenses, unemployment, or retirement. That is about as “pro-family” as you can get. The Canadian government has recognized that whether people sock away money for four months or four decades, all savings are beneficial and add to personal financial security.

Britain’s Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) are just as impressive as the Canadian accounts. All UK residents can put up to 15,240 pounds (about \$23,000) per year of after-tax money into ISAs. ISA earnings grow tax-free and can be withdrawn at any time for any reason with no taxes or penalties. Like TFSA’s, ISAs enshrine in the tax code the principle that saving for all reasons is important, not just for reasons favored by governments.

In the United States, the government chooses which savings to favor, with the result that we have a mess of separate accounts for retirement, health care, and education. Everyone agrees that Americans don’t save enough, and one reason is the complexity of the accounts. Between 40 and 50 percent of adults in Canada and Britain now own the all-purpose savings accounts. By contrast, just 38 percent of Americans hold any type of IRA, even though IRAs have been around a lot longer than TFSA’s and ISAs.

The Canadian accounts would be a good model for American USAs. One hurdle to enactment might be concerns that such accounts would favor the wealthy. But in Canada, the government’s recent budget reported that “individuals with annual incomes of less than \$80,000 accounted for more than 80 percent of all TFSA holders ... About half of TFSA holders had annual incomes of less than \$42,000.” And in Britain, a new report from HM Revenue and Customs found that 57 percent of ISA account holders had annual incomes of less than 20,000 pounds (about \$30,000), and slightly more women than men hold ISAs.

The economic and the political appeal of these accounts is that all individuals can use them for all types of savings. In Canada, TFSA’s have been so successful that Stephen Harper’s Conservative government recently expanded the contribution limit from \$5,500 to the current \$10,000. In Britain, the accounts were enacted by a Labour government in 1999, and expanded by the Conservatives under Prime Minister David Cameron.

In this country, there is too much emphasis on helping favored groups with narrow tax breaks. USAs would instead help all individuals help themselves through their own thrift. Candidates for 2016 should look to Canada and Britain for a popular, pro-growth, and pro-family reform: universal savings accounts.

# Adding up confounding numbers

The world of mathematics is as mystifying to me as a newly-discovered foreign language, or the dots, dashes and/or buzzes from outer space. I can handle dollars represented by three figures, but my understanding of numbers accompanied by a comma and three digits is limited.

You can safely assume, then, that figures with three commas – with a like number of 000’s tacked on – short-circuit all that is within me. Thus, I seek forgiveness for tiny distant voices saying, “All circuits are busy at this time – please try again later” – when I try to wrap my mind around a wisp of understanding concerning the Floyd Mayweather/Manny Pacquiao “fight of the century” financial fall-out.

Vignettes that span time and sports – with baseball in the mix – lie ahead in this piece. There’s a third account of a good deed by an ordinary “Joe” named Chuck Bonds. Hopefully, it will be the one worth remembering for us “ordinaries” who mostly plod along, but still want to get as much right as possible, no matter how long it takes....

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First things first: In third grade, here’s what I heard Mrs. Byrd ask: “Don, what’s ‘toot-em’ two, what’s ‘toot-em’ three, what’s ‘toot-em’ four?” I interrupted, hoping she’d stop right there. “I don’t even know what ‘toot-em’ is.”

This helps set the stage for the so-called “fight of the century,” even if it fell several levels short of that. Spun by social media, anti-social media and general media, fans fell in line to shell out hundreds of millions of dollars, including some \$300,000,000 in pay-per-view alone. It’s clear to me that thousands of fans are bamboozled when they shell out

significant cash just to watch the weigh-in.

Mayweather’s total take for winning is said to be in excess of \$200,000,000. And Pacquiao – the uh, “loser” – will net more than \$100,000,000 when all the ciphering is done....

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Roll the calendar back 85 years – when baseball was truly the “national pastime.” Fans – including President Herbert Hoover – depended on Babe Ruth and associates to take their minds off the Great Depression. Hoover attended games regularly, despite fans booing him roundly in disdain for the nation’s plight.

It was 1930, and for his season’s work, Ruth was paid \$80,000. Some critics “gruffed” that he made more than the President, whose salary was \$75,000.

Ruth, famous for numerous quotes – including ‘I heard the cheers when they roared and the jeers when they echoed’ – defended his salary thusly: “I had a better year than the President.”...

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Back to the present – with numbers even I can understand. I wrote in this space recently about Norm Hitzges, the Metroplex’s radio sports guru who was on the faculty at Sul Ross State University during the 1967-68 school year.

One of his students, Chuck Bonds, borrowed \$125 from Hitzges, shortly before entering military service. The now longtime New Mexico resident

attempted to repay the debt, but Hitzges – starting his new career in Dallas – no longer had the SRSU address. Bonds, unaware of Hitzges’ move, didn’t know how to reach him. Recently, he chanced to see the Hitzges’ column online. Now, their friendship is renewed and contact details re-established. Predictably, Bonds mailed a check in the amount of \$400 (covering the principal and a good percentage of interest). The 48-year-old debt was off his mind.

Also predictably, Hitzges endorsed the check to Dallas’ Austin Street Center. It will benefit his favorite charity that benefits the hungry and homeless. One might also guess that Hitzges will check on the grade he gave Bonds back in ‘68, followed by contact with the SRSU registrar to see if it’s permissible to elevate it by a letter grade....

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Hitzges fans – and they are legion – are amazed at his knowledge of sports in general and are in awe of his memorable, relaxed interviews with sports personalities.

They are likewise heartened by his 15-year commitment to the Austin Street Shelter. It is the beneficiary of more than \$2.5 million raised by his radio “Norm-a-thons,” 18-hour stretches each December 26. Last year, more than \$400,000 was raised.

Norm has taken Jesus’ “I was hungry and you fed me...I was a stranger and you took me in” to heart. This admonition – along with dollars in three digits – I understand....

# Texas could be the next Disneyland

The Disneyland measles outbreak didn’t make its way to Texas, yet. But it was only a plane ride away. And depending on where that plane landed, we could have been in for some big health problems.

It’s hard for Texans under a certain age to remember, but measles is a serious, highly contagious disease. It can cause serious complications in children. Some will die. This is not an exaggeration. This is reality.

Thanks to a very effective vaccine, we declared measles completely eliminated in the United States just 15 years ago. But we were wrong, in large part because not everyone gets vaccinated anymore.

The measles vaccine is safe and effective. It provides almost complete immunity to the disease. Let me repeat that. The measles vaccine is safe and effective, and it provides almost complete immunity to this terrible disease. That means children can be spared the effects of disease and do not need to die.

Until 2003, almost every school-child in Texas was required to be immunized against measles and nine other awful – but vaccine-preventable – diseases. Children whose physician certified they could not get a vaccination for health reasons were allowed into school without the shot. For 2004, that was about 3,000 students.

Then the law changed, allowing

parents to file a form stating they had a personal or religious objection to the immunizations. District-by-district data from the Texas Department of State Health Services, which is available on its website, shows that the number of students with an exemption reached nearly 38,000 last year.

What’s more concerning, though, is that those exemptions tend to be clustered in certain communities and school districts – in and around Austin, for example, and north of Dallas. That means if one unimmunized child in one of those schools contracts measles, it will spread rapidly through his or her unimmunized classmates.

They’ll be home sick for a week or more (and a parent will likely have to miss work to care for them). One in 20 will be so ill they’ll need to go to the hospital. One or two in 1,000 could die.

It’s not just those whose parents claimed an exemption who are at risk, though. It’s also the infants who are too young to get the vaccination. And those whose immune systems are damaged by necessary medical treatments or other diseases, such as leukemia.

Here are some simple facts about measles:

- We had no cases in Texas from 1990 through 2000. We had just 17 cases from 2004 to 2012. In 2013, 27 cases of measles were reported in Texas. Last year, we had 10.
- This is a highly contagious dis-

ease, and someone with measles can be infectious for four days before the spots appear on his or her skin. If someone with measles coughs or sneezes in a small room, the virus can live for up to two hours in the air. Nine out of 10 unimmunized people who walk into that room will catch the measles. Ebola was not airborne; measles is.

• The measles vaccine works. That’s why we are able to wipe the disease out in this country.

• The measles vaccine is safe. There is absolutely no scientific evidence that the measles vaccine causes autism.

As a pediatrician, a parent, and a grandparent, I cannot urge you strongly enough to make sure your children are vaccinated – against measles, mumps, pertussis, chicken pox, and all those other diseases we can stop with a simple shot. (Pertussis, or whooping cough, is another major threat in Texas right now. It killed five children in Texas in 2013 and at least two last year; all were less than 1 year old.)

Education – on the dangers of these diseases and the unquestionable benefits of vaccinations – is the key to protecting our children.

Talk to your doctor if you have questions or concerns. But, please, be wise – immunize.

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


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**Father and son**

There being no further business, we were adjourned.

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
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



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**Keep kids' identifies safe, guide to shredding**

Hi, gang! There's a new round of scam alerts this week, so let's look at one and then talk about record keeping.

There's a post going around asking mothers to post their kids names, birthplace and birthdates for Mother's Day. Do not do this! With that information, anyone can steal your kids' identities, obtain social security numbers, and destroy their credit. You'd never give that info to a telemarketer. Don't put it on Facebook.

What follows is "A pack rat's guide to shredding" by Lisa Weintraub Schifferle, who is an attorney for the Federal Trade Commission.

"Is your home a pack rat's paradise? You're not alone. As you start spring cleaning, are you wondering what to keep and what to shred? We've looked at experts' advice and compiled this summary of how long

they recommend keeping certain documents. Put our handy graphic near your shredder as a guide.

"Save forever: Keep documents related to major life events – birth, marriage, divorce, and death. Lock securely: Birth certificates or adoption papers; Social Security cards; Citizenship papers or passports; Marriage or divorce decrees; and Death certificates of family members. Also, keep auto titles and home deeds stored safely for as long as you own the property.

"Tax records: This time of year, the big question is: what tax records can you shred, and when can you shred them? Tax returns – Our conservative advice? It's best to keep these forever. Pay stubs – Shred 'em after checking them against your W-2. Home improvement receipts – Keep these receipts until you sell your home, since certain expenses

may reduce your capital gains tax.

"Other tax records – like tax-related receipts and cancelled checks – Wait seven years before shredding. Why? While the IRS usually has three years to audit you, it has up to seven years under certain circumstances. (If you file a fraudulent return, then the IRS can audit at any time – but for the average honest taxpayer, seven years works.)

"If you're unsure what tax records to keep, consult an accountant or call IRS Taxpayer Assistance at 800-829-1040.

"Other records: Most experts suggest that you can shred many

other documents sooner than seven years. After paying credit card or utility bills, shred them immediately. Also, shred sales receipts, unless related to warranties, taxes, or insurance. After one year, shred bank statements, pay stubs, and medical bills (unless you have an unresolved insurance dispute).

"For those who are thinking, maybe I should keep everything, just in case... remember that identity thieves can't find documents you have destroyed. Destroying documents with your personal information reduces the likelihood of becoming an identity theft victim.

"Shredding is just one way to reduce the risk of identity theft. For other tips on preventing identity theft, visit [ftc.gov/idtheft](http://ftc.gov/idtheft).

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

**Antibody May Treat Blood Vessel Condition**

A publication in Seminars in Arthritis and Rheumatism suggests that rituximab (Rituxan) may be a valuable treatment option in a rare blood vessel condition called eosinophilic granulomatosis with polyangiitis (EGPA). The results of a case study showed that a nerve and kidney damage in those with EGPA was resolved after taking two treatment cycles of Rituxan. These results were similar in an analysis of several studies showing that Rituxan is an effective therapy to help reduce additional problems in vital organs such as the heart and liver. EGPA is an autoimmune condition where the body mistakenly attacks healthy cells.

Rituxan is a monoclonal antibody that works by attacking B cells when they are still in the early stages of development. It is believed to help reduce inflammation. Rituxan is approved by the FDA to help manage non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, chronic lymphocytic leukemia, rheumatoid arthritis, and Wegener's Granulomatosis and microscopic polyangiitis. It is administered into the veins by a healthcare professional. Rituxan carries a warning about serious reactions that can happen immediately after the medication is administered and skin and mouth infections.

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### CHS students study wind energy

Students in physics classes at Clarendon High School are studying wind energy in the Texas Panhandle, which has a long tradition of studying and utilizing the wind's power.

The first college in America to officially study wind energy as a viable alternative to fossil fuels was none other than West Texas A&M University in Canyon, and the only major university where you can get a PhD in wind engineering is Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Hundreds of millions of dollars are currently being invested in Panhandle wind farms near many small towns in this region, and the infrastructure to make electricity from wind and transmit it just keeps on expanding.


Physics students were challenged to build a small working windmill that could do work to illustrate the possibilities of wind power.

Each group received a stand made of a tea carton, an axle made

from a dowel rod, and string attached to the axle that could wind up and pull weight against gravity. Box fans were used to simulate Panhandle wind. Teams were to build blades out of ordinary materials like paper, plastic, cardstock, wood, cardboard, etc. and try to lift as much weight as possible.

Rhonda Olivas and Marissa Jaramillo made the windmill that did the most work, lifting over three pounds of weight! Shelby Baxter and Kendra Davis came in second, lifting just under 2½ pounds of weight. Third place went to Zack Laroe and Skyler White.

There were a wide variety of blade designs and a lot of learning about overcoming frictional forces and designing blades that caught wind at proper angles. Students seemed to have lots of fun and engage in a friendly competition to see who could engineer the best windmill.



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
