Devins' killer dies in jail cell

BRAZOS COUNTY - The death of an inmate in solitary confinement at the Brazos County Jail was under investigation late Monday by the Sheriff's Department and a Texas Ranger, authorities said.

Dennis Wayne Brown III, 35, was found unconscious on his bunk about 11:40 a.m. Monday, Brazos County Sheriff Chris Kirk said. Brown was accused of killing two former Clarendon residents last year.

"There is nothing obvious in this situation. He was lying on his bunk in a position that didn't suggest any distress," the sheriff said.

According to Kirk, jailers tried to revive Brown with CPR before calling Bryan EMS crews, who also performed CPR. Brown was pronounced dead at 12:19 p.m.

Monday afternoon, authorities were reviewing evidence, conducting interviews and reviewing footage from a camera inside Brown's cell.

The convicted felon from Madisonville has been in custody since his arrest on April 7, 2014, when Bryan police said they located him at a


Food booths run the gamut of everything from baked goods to fajita-on-a-stick to homemade ice cream.

Put Harriet Tubman on the \$20 bill

Washington's latest symbolic battle is looming. America's money celebrates its early political leaders, white males all. There's now a campaign to provide for greater currency diversity. The group Women on 20s held a poll on what woman should be added: the victor was famed antislavery activist Harriet Tubman, who narrowly beat out First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt. Finishing further behind were Rosa Parks, the Civil Rights heroine, and Wilma Mankiller, the first female Cherokee chief.

Of course, it wouldn't be the first time that a woman appeared on America's money. Suffragette Susan B. Anthony graced the ill-fated dollar coin that was little used and quickly forgotten. The Native American Sacagawea later did the same and suffered a similar fate.

The Treasury Department is authorized to choose figures for America's money. The administration has almost total discretion, since all that matters is that the person be dead. President Barack Obama indicated his interest in showcasing more women, encouraging feminist groups to rev up their political engines.

Republican legislators should take up the challenge and introduce a resolution urging the Treasury to add Tubman. There's nothing sacred about the present currency line-up. After all, America was created by many more people than presidents and other politicians.

Indeed, replacing Andrew Jackson makes a certain sense since he resolutely opposed a federal central bank. He likely would be horrified if he returned and found his visage gracing paper money for a system far more malign than the Bank of the United States, which he battled ferociously and ultimately killed. Tough, cantankerous, and short-tempered, he would make today's denizens of Capitol Hill feel his pain.

Moreover, Tubman would be a great choice to replace him. She represents the best of America. She was born between 1820 and 1822 in Maryland to slave parents. She was christened Araminta Ross and her mother fought hard to hold the family together. Tubman was hired out and often beaten. She suffered permanent harm but her strong Christian faith helped sustain her. After her owner's death in 1849, which led his widow to begin selling their slaves, she escaped through the Underground Railroad to Philadelphia.

However, a year later she returned to Maryland to rescue her niece and the latter's two children, beginning a career of leading slaves to freedom. Frederick Douglass may have hosted one of her groups, sheltering it and raising money to send the fugitives on to Canada. She was daring and creative; her plans were sophisticated. Although she trusted God she also saw value in arming herself. Among the 70 or so slaves she saved were her three brothers. She also helped instruct scores of other escapees. Neither she nor any of those she guided were captured. She directed her last rescue in December 1860.

Tubman also was an active abolitionist and lecturer, friendly with New York Senator William Seward. She aided John Brown, though she played no direct role in his raid on Harpers Ferry. During the Civil War she pressed abolition on the Lincoln administration. With greater effect she aided slave refugees, served as a nurse, and acted as a scout for the federal army. Long after the war she aided the cause of women's suffrage, working with Susan Anthony, among others. Despite manifold health problems she lived past 90, dying in 1913.

It's an incredible legacy.

In short, she represented the common women and men across the country who contributed much to make America. Andrew Jackson was more influential in setting national policy, but Tubman represented the many that battled against the great injustice, slavery, which he accepted. Until that practice ended America could not be considered either truly good or free.

True, writer Feminista Jones made an uncommonly silly argument against adding Tubman or any woman to U.S. currency: "Her legacy is rooted in resisting the foundation of American capitalism. Tubman didn't respect America's economic system, so making her a symbol of it would be insulting."

In fact, capitalism rests on a foundation of economic liberty, which is violated by the institution of human slavery. The original industrial state, Great Britain, ended slavery decades before America. The northern states, where industrial capitalism was strongest in the U.S., also rejected slavery early. One suspects that Tubman did not see herself as spiriting away the enslaved to freedom to save them from "capitalism" but to allow them, like whites, to work, invest, create, own, and take advantage of the manifold opportunities of a free economy. Given her experience with government oppression, it is unlikely she would have advocated turning the economy over to the very same politicians who proved willing to institutionalize human bondage.

The usual PC bias infects much discussion about who should grace America's currency. However, critics of the usual arguments by the usual suspects shouldn't feel an obligation to defend today's currency line-up. Andrew Jackson has had a fine run on the \$20 bill. It's time to give someone else a chance. Why not Harriet Tubman?

Climate anger: Last refuge of alarmists

For purveyors of climate alarm, emotional displays of intolerance are increasingly crowding out reasoned argument. But remember the adage: "Hate hurts the hater more than the hated."

Consider President Obama. At the White House Correspondents Dinner last month, the president used the lighthearted occasion to shout at those who doubt his climate-change narrative. "It is crazy! What about our kids? What kind of stupid, short-sided irresponsible bull..." said the president before a comedian jokingly cut him off.

The current elephant-in-the-room for climate alarmists is the "pause" or "hiatus" in global warming.

Green activists have preached that the Earth's temperature would rise steadily into a global crisis. For the 1990s, their model predictions appeared plausible. But global temperatures have slowed considerably since 1998, despite steadily rising levels of carbon-dioxide emissions (the alleged cause of warming).

This was not supposed to happen. "Pauses as long as 15 years are rare in the simulations," wrote Science magazine scribe Richard Kerr. "Researchers ... agree that no sort of natural variability can hold off greenhouse warming much longer." That was six years ago.

The pause is now the ever greater

pause. And even if global temperature sets new record highs, it will be by hundredths of a degree, well below the model-predicted increase. The "pause" is even more the climate-model discrepancy. "95% of Climate Models Agree: The Observations Must be Wrong," one climatologist humorously wrote.

On the political side, Senators Edward Markey (D-MA), Barbara Boxer (D-CA), and Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI) began investigating 100 fossil fuel organizations suspected of "funding scientific studies designed to confuse the public and avoid taking action to cut carbon pollution."

By "confuse the public," they mean question the sacred view that climate change will soon compromise the planet. In their view, scientists who contradict the doom-and-gloom climate narrative are a threat to the public and must be discredited as shills of industry.

Another specie of climate desperation leading to anger is exaggerated scientific speculation. In a remarkable display of illogic, Rep. Barbara Lee (D-CA) has managed to link global warming to prostitution -- citing, of course, some study. She claims that global warming harms women in developing nations, forcing many into "situations such as sex work, transactional sex, and early marriage."

It's time for green activists et al., to

come back to Earth. Fossil fuels aren't going anywhere. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration's 2015 Annual Energy Outlook, the United States will depend on fossil fuels to supply 80 percent of its energy needs in 2040. That's not far off last year's 82 percent.

As for the world, a robust threefourths of primary energy consumption will come from fossil fuels in 2040, the International Energy Agency predicts.

The EIA's recent report noted specifically that oil and natural gas production would continue to grow. By 2017, the United States will be a net exporter of natural gas. Right now, U.S. production of 9.4 million barrels per day is close to record levels.

Americans are less worried about the environment than at any time since the 1980s, according to Gallup. Concern over global warming, the same poll found, has waned measurably since last year.

The devout parishioners of climate calamity may label the rest of us as moral degenerates. But there are real here-and-now problems that need their time and dollars. And to the angry: a new cause might bring peace of mind -- and spare the household budgets of the rest of us.
















Hotel renovation

Key to Taking this important Medication

Many older people have an irregular heartbeat a condition called atrial fibrillation. With this condition there is a high risk of developing a stroke. They are often prescribed a blood thinner type medicine that may help reduce the risk. Newer blood thinners must be taken exactly as prescribed or else the risk of a stroke is very high, however studies show that many older people do not take their medication properly. A study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) showed that older patients were taking a blood thinner called dabigatran (Pradaxa) appropriately when the pharmacist was directly involved in their care. Many Pharmacists at the Veteran's Affairs hospital system educate and closely monitor patients taking Pradaxa regarding the importance of taking the medication as prescribed every day. One study indicated that about eighty percent of these patients in VA facilities took the medication as instructed. Pradaxa is used to help prevent a stroke in people with atrial fibrillation. It works by blocking an enzyme necessary to help the blood clot. It comes with a warning about the increased risk of getting a stroke if the medication is stopped abruptly without an appropriate reason.



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
