Hearing will focus on downtown grant

A public hearing will focus on Clarendon's possible participation in a downtown revitalization program this Thursday, June 11, at 7 p.m. in City Hall.

Comments will be taken from the public regarding a grant application to the Texas Capital Fund for sidewalk and other improvements in the central business district. Citizens who are interested in this proposed project are encouraged to come and make their views known.

The grant would be for a maximum of \$150,000 and would require local matching funds.

Following the public hearing, the Clarendon City Council will hold its regular meeting with the following items on the agenda: Signing of a proclamation celebrating the life of former mayor Tex Selvidge; a request for support from the Christ Kids Outreach Ministry; and renewing the agreement with Donley County to provide law enforcement services for the city.

Reward offered for stolen motorcycles

A substantial reward is being offered in the case of two motorcycles that were stolen from a Clarendon storage unit last week.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said the thefts were reported last Wednesday, June 3, and that the two Harley-Davidson motorcycles are believed to have been taken early that morning or on the night of June 2.

The bikes - a 2007 Road King and a 2007 Heritage Softail Springer - were kept in a storage unit on US 287 across from Clarendon College. Blackburn said the lock on the unit was missing and that it was unknown if the thief used a key or cut the lock off.

The sheriff's office has followed every lead in the case so far without results and is asking for anyone who might have seen motorcycles being loaded at the storage facility or who has any information to please call 806-874-3533.

Blackburn said his office was also busy last week with a rash of juvenile crime ranging from vandalism to possession of methamphetamines. Six juveniles were dealt with in the time of a week, the sheriff said. He reminds everyone that a curfew is in place and says parents should keep up with their children's whereabouts.



Changes in store for July Fourth celebration

A few changes are in store for the 138th annual Saints' Roost Celebration scheduled for July 2, 3, and 4 this year.

The Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association will kick off the activities with a Junior Ranch Rodeo on Thursday night, July 2, at 7:30 at the COEA Arena followed by a dance at 9 p.m. featuring Chris Albracht as the deejay.

Clarendon merchants will have sales on Friday, and the Ten Commandments marker at the Courthouse will be dedicated that morning at 10 a.m. followed by the Depression Lunch from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Downtown Crossties Ministry building. COEA's Ranch Rodeo will start that night at 7:30 with No Dry County providing live music for the dance at 9:00.

Saturday, July 4, is when celebration goers will see the biggest changes. The Chamber of Commerce has moved the July Fourth Parade, sponsored by Herring Bank, from its traditional 2 p.m. timeslot to 10 a.m., which has compacted much of the morning schedule.

The Arts & Craft Fair on the square will start at 9 a.m. The Craft Fair is sponsored by the Donley County 4H, and booth space is \$25. Booth space needs to be reserved by June 27 by calling 874-2141.

The Old Settlers Reunion and the Kids' Bicycle & Tricycle Parade also begin at 9 a.m. The Kids' Parade will line up and register at 8:30 at Keith Floyd's shop at Third and

Line up for the Herring Bank Parade will also start at 9 a.m. on Sixth Street north of Prospect Park. At 10:00, the parade will then take its usual route - north on Kearney to Third Street, west on Third to Sully, south in front of the Courthouse, and then wind back to the ball parks.

The Herring Bank Parade features \$850 in cash prizes with \$200 available for the best float, \$100 for the best car or truck entry, \$100 for the best animal or riding unit, \$100 for the best tractor or farm equipment entry, and \$100 for the best "other" entry. From those first place winners, judges will select a Grand Prize winner who will receive an additional \$250. Parade winners will be announced at 1 p.m.

Entry forms for the Kids' Parade and the Herring Bank Parade are available in this week's Enterprise and at the Clarendon Visitor Center at Mulkey Theatre.

Ed Montana will be handling the parade and celebration announcing and will also be performing live music during the festivities on the square.

Following the parade, the Al Morrah Shrine Club will have its annual barbecue lunch at approximately 11 a.m. and will serve until the food is gone. Tickets will be \$10 per plate.

The Clarendon Lions Club has retired its cow patty bingo fundraiser and will instead have Bounce Houses and Water Slides at the Lions Hall from about 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. A five-dollar wrist band will let kids bounce and slide to their hearts' content all day.


The annual Henson's Turtle Race will be held on 3 p.m. on Saturday.

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees begins on Monday, June 15, 2015.

"Through the county committees, farmers are nominated. and ranchers have a voice. Their opinions and ideas get to be heard on federal farm programs," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack.

"It is important for county committees to reflect America's diversity, so I encourage all eligible farmers and ranchers, including beginning farmers, to get involved in this year's elections. We've seen an increase in the number of nominations for qualified candidates, especially among women and minorities, and I hope that trend continues."

Tex Selvidge led a life of community service, and this week his community is in mourning for the man who was one if its best known and best respected citizens.

influential than Tex Selvidge. If you went to any town in a four or five state area from Clarendon, you would be hardpressed to find someone who didn't know someone who had gone to Clarendon College and known or been influenced by Tex.

I remember getting my own acceptance letter to CC

and reading Tex's signature on the bottom of it. I already knew Tex by that time in my life. In addition to seeing him at numerous college alumni reunions that I attended with my father and grandfather, I had known him from the time he ran the clothing store which was next to the West Texas Utilities office where my Dad was the manager. Even as young boy, I knew Tex, and I knew he was a good and wellrespected man.

During my two-year stint at old CC, Tex offered me advice and friendship the same as any other student, and I always knew I could go to him if I ever needed anything.

My favorite memories of Tex are from his time as mayor of our little city. When he stepped down from that position in 1996, he told me, "I've always felt like if you're going to live somewhere, you ought to give something to it."

Tex gave and gave to this community. He told me he thought serving the community was something everyone should do. "It would thrill me if every election we had 10 or 12 people running for every spot on every board in the county," he said.

For his part, Tex always tried to put the community's interests first; and he said on the rare occasions he was called on to break a tie, he tried to vote for his convictions. He was proud to have been a part of several accomplishments during his time with the city, including the 2006 street project, numerous grants received to improve the city, updating and codification of the city ordinances, and the development of the city-county library downtown.

"I'm not saying I did a better job than anyone else would have, but I hope I contributed something to the community," he said. "I'm sure some would disagree, but everyone is entitled to their opinions."

Agreeing to disagree was another of his hallmarks as mayor. It never seemed to be personal with Tex. Occasionally, he and the newspaper editor would have different views on matters, but we always maintained a friendship and could joke about things.

I was standing next to him at reception one time while he was mayor when he was asked how he was doing. "I'm fine," he said "if I could just get the editor off my ass." Then he busted out laughing and threw his arm around my shoulder.


I'll miss that arm. I'll miss the smile and the

laugh and the words of wisdom.

Tex Selvidge led a life that we should all strive to emulate - a life devoted to community, dedicated to helping young people, and committed to friends and family.

How lucky the Selvidge and Jack families have been to have enjoyed the presence of so great a man! How deep their sense of loss must be now without him here on Earth. Consqueces of just trying to help out

The water of 38 years has flowed under the bridge since I "stole" a hearse. Surely the statute of limitations has kicked in by now, thus this confession.

I am NOT, however, admitting guilt. Instead, I was the "victim" of yet another Groner Pitts prank. Friends who knew this merriest of morticians - who reigned in Brownwood for a half-century - also were "victimized" from time to time.

Yet, I never had a better friend, and Brownwood (Tex.) never had a greater ambassador. And thousands who followed his antics for three decades through the late George Dolan's daily columns in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram never lacked for laughs. Many were often ensnared in his webb of tomfoolery. I'm probably the only "victim," however, to "steal" a hearse - one partially owned by Pitts himself....

The "pro's pro" among morticians, he had fitting first and last names (Groner? Pitts?). Even his initials (GAP) pointed to the grave. The Cleburne native conducted funerals with utmost dignity. To the Brownwood community, he was "Uncle Groner," the "go to" guy counted on by several hundred grieving families annually.

During slack time, however, he was helping college students...or assisting others who'd reached rope's end (maybe striking out in Austin or Washington, DC)...or co-signing bank notes...or maybe this should head the list - plotting his next shenanigan.

He befriended me from my first enrollment at Howard Payne University. Though 15 years my senior, he was a fellow "trooper" in the Texas National Guard, and best man when Brenda and I married in Alpine almost 49 years ago. I

was privileged to speak at his funeral in 2004. Upon his death, thousands of "Groner Pitts stories" were shared, locally and beyond

tedly, I was an accomplice during many of his escapades. Yet, many times when pies were thrown toward him, they coated my face instead.

That's the way I choose to remember the day I "stole" the hearse. Had it happened today, I might have gone down in a hail of bullets, or, short of that, endured the indignity of arrest, the messiness of finger printing, the ordeal of a trial, etc.

I might never have been a university president, but likely could have remained the "PR flack" at Tarrant County College, because my boss, Dr. Joe B. Rushing - a classmate of Groner's at Howard Payne - might have ruled in my favor. He KNEW Pitts well, and sometimes was a co-conspirator. It was indeed an era not unlike "Mayberry, RFD."...

Here's what happened. On that long ago day, Pitts was bored. He decided to charter a plane to fetch some press people to Brownwood, ostensibly to "cover" a reception for new Filipino nurses at Brownwood Regional Hospital.

As requested, I contacted a halfdozen press folks, promising them chicken and biscuits on the way down and a "surprise" on the flight back.

I was blissfully ignorant, NOT

On the returning flight over Granbury, Pitts feigned boredom, ordering the pilot to land. (He'd arranged a special act for the press at the Opera House.) One of the writers, Roger Summers, groaned, fearing he'd miss a deadline.

I spotted a hearse near the theater, presuming the late George Martin, Groner's Granbury partner, was "in" on the deal. The key was in the ignition, so, when lights darkened, Roger and I slipped out of the theater. We took the hearse - okay, I took the hearse - dropping Roger off 40 miles later in downtown Fort Worth at the Star-Telegram. Then, I was off to DFW where I'd leave the hearse and retrieve my car. (I didn't realize Martin was not privy to the goings on, and was merely stopping off for a cup of coffee near the Opera House.)...

When Martin discovered his hearse missing, things got tacky. Another hearse had been stolen a few days earlier, so the local mortician was somewhat edgy. He notified authorities. They gave chase.

We need agreements with US rules

Since mankind's earliest days, we have traded. Exchanging a goat for some wood or stone was an essential means of survival. Some groups or individuals have always been better at some tasks than others.

The same is true among nations today. Whether it is differences in climate, natural resources, or stage of economic development, some countries are better able to produce certain goods than others. Buying and selling goods among them helps raise the living standards of everyone.

In the U.S., we do a lot of things well. Americans are getting more efficient at producing everything from agricultural commodities to manufactured goods. Yet, over 90 percent of the world's consumers live outside our shores. To create jobs and improve our quality of life, we have to sell American products and services overseas.

Those sales are usually governed by trade agreements, and there has been a flurry of them in recent years. The problem is that the U.S. has largely been left out. In the first decade of this century, the countries of East Asia negotiated 48 trade agreements. The U.S. was only involved in two. Over that time, Amer-

ica's share of exports to that region fell by 42 percent, the worst record of any major exporting country.



have been left behind is that the authority to negotiate trade agreements within congressional rules has been allowed to lapse. A president can negotiate a trade deal at any time, but other countries, knowing how our system works, will not negotiate with us if Congress can go back in after the agreement is signed to change the individual provisions. Instead of letting a president negotiate alone in secret, it is more beneficial for Congress to insert itself in the beginning of the process with the final approval authority.

The House will soon vote to authorize and set the rules for presidents over the next five years to negotiate on trade, known as Trade Promotion Authority. That authorization will require any agreement to meet certain conditions,

and it will require that any agreement be made public for 60 days before being signed. Congress will then have the chance to vote to approve or disapprove

Two points to keep in mind: Trade is very important to our part of Texas. About 25 percent of the pork, 50 percent of the wheat, 90 percent of the cotton, and 90 percent of the harvested sorghum produced in our congressional district is sold overseas. Many other kinds of businesses depend heavily on overseas sales as well.

Secondly, China is busily working to be a dominant power - militarily and economically. They aim to write the rules for international affairs in a way that benefits them. And they may well be successful if the U.S. continues to sit on the sidelines. We need trade agreements with American rules to hold other countries accountable to our standards and to sell American products and services to the world on a level playing field. We have to get in the game.


New Medication for Surgical Bleeding

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved Raplixa to help control bleeding that occurs during surgery. This medication is reserved to be used in a surgical setting only after the standard surgical techniques for bleeding (i.e. sutures) are ruled impractical by surgeons performing the surgery. Raplixa is a human fibrin sealant that rapidly enters the bloodstream to help form blood clots to stop bleeding quickly. Raplixa contains two human plasma proteins- fibrinogen and thrombin. It will be supplied in a vial, but it can be sprayed with a unique device, if that is more convenient. This medication must be used together with an absorbable gelatin sponge.

Over seven hundred people participated in the clinical study for Raplixa that led to FDA approval. The study took eleven months to complete and the results showed that Raplixa was more effective in reducing the time for needed for bleeding to stop compared to an absorbable sponge alone. The most commonly reported adverse reactions were pain, hard stools, fever, nausea, and low blood

Eventually, biological control will play a role in keeping bagrada populations in check, Villanueva said. It's natural enemies are already here; they're just not yet accustomed to the newcomer.





The owner of a Houston area ambulance company receives a 97-month prison sentence for submitting \$2.4 million in claims to Medicare for services that weren't necessary and, in some cases, never even provided.

Two unlicensed medical school graduates each get 72 months behind bars for acting as physicians in a Dallas area house call practice and billing Medicare \$2.7 million for home visits and diagnostic tests never performed.

A Houston man receives an 87-month prison term for recruiting Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries, using their personal health information and billing the government for motorized wheelchairs never delivered.
