Chamber issues parade reminder

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce reminds folks that a few changes are in store for the 138th annual Saints' Roost Celebration scheduled for July 2, 3, and 4 this year.

Saturday, July 4, is when celebration goers will see the biggest difference with the Herring Bank July Fourth Parade moved from its traditional 2 p.m. timeslot to 10 a.m., which has compacted much of the morning schedule.

The Kids' Parade will line up and register at 8:30 at Keith Floyd's shop at Third and Sully and begin promptly at 9 a.m.

Meanwhile, line up for the Herring Bank Parade will also start at 9 a.m. on Sixth Street north of the Park. At 10:00, the parade will then take its usual route.

The Herring Bank Parade features \$850 in cash prizes with \$200 available for the best float, \$100 for the best car or truck entry, \$100 for the best animal or riding unit, \$100 for the best tractor or farm equipment entry, and \$100 for the best "other" entry. From those first place winners, judges will select a Grand Prize winner who will receive an additional \$250. Parade winners will be announced at 1 p.m.

Entry forms for the parades are available at the Clarendon Visitor Center at Mulkey Theatre.

Senate resolution honors Juneteenth

WASHINGTON - The United States Senate on Monday unanimously approved a resolution introduced by US Sens. John Cornyn (R-TX) and Barbara Boxer (D-CA) recognizing June 19, 2015, as "Juneteenth Independence Day."

Juneteenth Independence Day commemorates the June 19, 1865 announcement in Galveston, Texas, of the emancipation of slaves across the nation.

"Juneteenth holds a special place in the heart of many Texans and reminds us of our obligation to continue building a country that is freer, fairer, and provides opportunity to every American," Sen. Cornyn said.

This year artwork from Galveston artist Ted Ellis will be featured in the halls of the U.S. Senate as a part of Washington, D.C.'s Juneteenth celebration.

President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, but news of that that didn't reach Texas and other states in the Southwest until after the conclusion of the Civil War, more than 2½ years.

Hicks sets June 21 to honor Selvidge

Mayor Larry Hicks has proclaimed Sunday, June 21, as Tex Selvidge Celebration of Life Day in the City of Clarendon.

Hicks read his proclamation during last Thursday's city council meeting, honoring Selvidge, who passed away on June 2.

Selvidge had a record of service with Clarendon College that spanned five decades, served for a time a member of the Board of Aldermen, and was Clarendon's longest serving mayor.

In other city business, 18 inches is the legal height for weeds and grass in Clarendon, and City Hall is reminding residents this week that they need to get busy mowing.

During last Thursday's city council meeting, aldermen agreed to advertise a reminder (see page five of this week's Enterprise) and urge folks to attack the weed and grass matter before code compliance becomes an issue.

City officials said they understand the recent impact of heavy precipitation that has caused local flora to go wild, but they ask for the citizens' cooperation keeping the town attractive.

Also in keeping with the theme of cleaning up the city, Administrator David Dockery announced that he is investigating the possibility of opening a pit at the site of the old city landfill southeast of town to dispose materials from condemned structures in the city. The Type 4 Pit permit would only be used for materials from demolished structures meeting certain conditions.

Dockery said the City of Wellington has had great success in demolishing decapitated houses, and Clarendon could follow that city's lead.

Tammy Christopher presented aldermen with the annual Housing Authority Report, and Steve Carter's request for funding for the Clarendon Summer Lunch Program was granted in the amount of \$1,000.

Aldermen approved renewing for five years the contract for law enforcement services with the Donley County Sheriff's Department. The contract price starts at \$146,400 in the coming fiscal year and will step up two percent each year and auto renew at the end of five years without action from either the city or the county.

Dockery also reported that repairs to the city's roll-off sanitation truck were running higher than expected and said he anticipates the final cost to be about \$2,400 above what was estimated.

This year marks the 800th anniversary of the Magna Carta, on which the constitutional liberties and the Rule of Law of England were founded. It was signed by a beleaguered King John on 15 June 1215 with his disgruntled noblemen. Dan Jones' Magna Carta shows why it was granted, repudiated by the king, and subsequently reinstated, and became the founding document in the history of liberty of the English-speaking peoples, in particular the United States.

The Magna Carta is also the basis for the Rule of Law that was established in India by the British Raj and is the foundation of independent India's Constitution. But it also seems to have resonance in authoritarian states as President Xi claims to be establishing the Rule of Law in China, whilst the illiberal democracies of Russia, Egypt and increasingly Recep Erdogan's Turkey and Viktor Oban's Hungary, seem to regard the Rule of Law, "as nice rather than necessary". (D Gardner: "Putin and Sisi linked by common thread of illiberal leadership", FT 11 February 2015).

The importance and resonance of the Great Charter resides in it creating the institutional basis for reining in the predatory state. For every state's rulers have to be given the monopoly of the power of coercion - to avoid Hobbesian anarchy and to provide the essential public goods of law and order and defence - and must also be given the "power to take" - euphemistically called the "power to tax". But this provides the rulers with an incentive to be predatory by taking more than is required to provide the requisite public goods.

King John was a predatory monarch par excellence. Following the example of his Plantagenet predecessors, the power and wealth of the Crown had increased dramatically relatively to the barons. As Prof James summarises: "By 1212 John had achieved a cruel mastery over his kingdom. He was vastly, almost unimaginably wealthy, his castles groaning with silver. He oversaw a broadly efficient legal and financial administration with which he could crush any baron who was merely suspected of having slighted him. He had also terrorised his neighboring princes into submission." (p 56). A description uncannily resembling Vladimir Putin's Russia.

The Plantagenet kings also faced periodic fiscal crises in defending their empire extending from Scotland to the Pyrenees. It was John's attempt to recover the lands beyond the Channel he had lost to France in 1204 which was his undoing. To fight this new war he had to further increase the financial extortions on his barons. They rebelled and a civil war began. The Magna Carta was the treaty to end this civil war. It established the Englishman's right to Habeas Corpus - but most importantly it established the idea that the essential difference between a prince and tyrant was that "while both made and enforced laws, the prince also subjected himself to the law." This is the essence of the Rule of Law.


But how could this agreement between the citizen and sovereign be enforced? This became the central question in tethering a predatory sovereign. The charter itself had a "security clause", which "allowed for licensed civil war" (p 89). This happened within a few weeks after King John had signed the Charter. After his death there were periodic reissuances of the Charter with that of 1225 establishing the principle of "no taxation without representation", whereby "the king swapped a concession of liberties for tax revenue" (p 104). Thus was the predatory state's "power to take" restricted.

Magna Carta was invoked in the English Civil War between the Crown and Parliament in the 17th century, which ended with the Glorious Revolution of 1688-9 and the accession of William of Orange to the throne. With its Bill of Rights, the Common Law and the Rule of Law became cornerstones of the English constitution.

In the 18th century the US Constitution was based on the principles of the Magna Carta, as were those of the British dominions of Canada, Australia, and New Zealand - and also the legal reforms of Governors-General Cornwallis and William Bentinck in India in the 19th century. These separated the executive and judicial functions of government and made government executive decisions contestable in civil courts.

Like King John, Mr Putin's foreign adventures and the economic sanctions they have evoked have created a fiscal crisis for the state. The resulting economic hardships have reduced support for his nationalist card, with a recent poll showing that compared with 50 per cent last March only 19 per cent now believe Ukraine should be part of Russia. If the 110 Kremlinconnected oligarchs, who Ms Dawisha claims own 35 per cent of the country's assets decide to challenge Putin's adventurism, could Russia at last see its own Magna Carta? Only time will tell.

We are broken – or at least badly bent - by breaking news. It raises our blood pressure, confounds our minds and reduces us to hand-wringing, often at the beginning of TV newscasts. Brows since retired furrow, even though we know that much news content is a true reflection of the people we've become - and what we condone.

Confidence is shaken in governments and institutions, as well as in ourselves. We don't feel equal to whatever comes next - and "next" shows up fast. We are rightfully afraid - quivering, quaking and hunkering down. Eye-closing doesn't help; rage abounds - on the road and otherwise. The crowd maddens; life is cheapened.

So, when unscripted scenes suggest some good remains in the world, we want it shared - through broadcast and social media, newspapers and over back fences. Wake the town and tell the people. Sometimes the simplest and kindest gestures make us smile, make us pause and make us grateful....

They occur at unexpected times, often in unlikely places. A friend in San Angelo beheld one recently. She brought her car to a complete stop - as instructed. So did drivers from all four directions - when the crossing guard held up his stop sign near Fannin Elementary School.

Before escorting a kindergartener across the street, he lowered himself to one knee, and helped the lad re-tie his shoe. Here's what makes the vignette even more special. Not one driver honked, there were no threatening gestures, and no peeling of rubber occurred when traffic resumed. For that brief moment, motorists were transfixed by

the loving act of an elderly crossing guard, one long from fulltime employment.

Raul Morales, who has hovered over youngsters at "his" inter-

section for a total of two hours and 45 minutes twice daily for 14 years, is proud of his safety record. No one - not even one - has been injured during his watch. He loves children, understands his role and is doggedly determined to arrive early and stay late, always looking out for the children - and to his 15th year of crossing duty come August....

A survivor of the depression, Raul grew up on Runnels and Tom Green County farms and ranches. He embraced the work ethic early. High school attendance was out of the question, but he learned to read and write during spasmodic elementary school attendance in Knickerbocker. Days were never long enough to tend livestock, pick cotton and handle dozens of other chores. Going into town - usually Ballinger, Miles, Veribest or Knickerbockere - was rare.

His English is only "pretty good," but it's better than my Spanish. His kindness, love and patriotic bent, however, are unmistakable.

Morales' patient, caring spirit is evident; he calls it "all in a day's work." He's employed by the City of San Angelo, and is part of a team - both in law enforcement and education - to help

harshly criticized. And yet, they persevere. I'm so glad they do....

My friend, Candace Cooksey Fulton, took careful note of this "shoetying scene." Thankfully, she shared it.

Understandably, some of the motorists may have been late to appointments. To their credit, they patiently waited, honoring the moment. Safety came first. Pulses slowed, and all else could wait. Rarely is a setting so perfect for us to remember there are times - as biblically admonished - to be still and KNOW that He is God.

Medication for "Double Chin" Approved


The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a medication Kybella to help treat the fat layer below the chin which is commonly known as "double chin." Kybella is approved as an injection that is administered into the lower chin area. It is not approved to be administered at any other site on the body. Researchers caution the use of this injection in people who have had an infection or recent surgical procedures involving the area under the chin. The primary ingredient in Kybella is deoxycholic acid, which is a chemical that destroys fat cells. One treatment type may consist of up to fifty injections.

Over one thousand people participated in the clinical trial that led to the FDA approval. The results showed that people who received Kybella showed more reduction in the double-chin fat than people who were taking a dummy injection. Serious side effects that were reported include an uneven smile, nerve problems in the jaw, or trouble swallowing. The more common adverse reactions included swelling, pain, redness, bruising, and some hardness at the injection







With two sentences tucked into a 958-page, \$209 billion budget, Texas lawmakers agreed last month to fund an unusual project in the age of Google: publishing a reference book that had gotten by on private support for more than 150 years.

The next edition of the Texas Almanac, a combination census, atlas, history textbook and government directory, will be supported tion. with taxpayer dollars. The Texas Historical Commission, a state agency, is contracting with a nonprofit organization "for the purpose of developing and producing" the tome. The agency is expected to sign a contract worth up to \$500,000 with the nonprofit Texas State Historical Association, which has published the most recent editions.

The Legislature approved the decision via a rider that was inserted into the budget in the session's last weeks by state Rep. Trent Ashby, R-Lufkin, who said the idea was brought to him by beer distributor John Nau, the current chairman of the Texas Historical Commission and the past president of the Texas State Historical Association. Nau is also one of the state's largest donors to Republican campaigns and groups.

"It became apparent that it is a state asset and that the TSHA could, at any point in time, because of their financial situation, decide correctly that they couldn't afford it anymore," Nau said.

The first edition of the Texas Almanac was published 158 years ago by The Galveston News, when Texas had only been a state for 12 years. The earliest editions were

Lawmakers backtrack on ethics in 2015







