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WHO'S TIGHT?

There are a lot of automobiles and houses that aren't being sold these days — to mention just two commodities — because would-be buyers have found that money is hard to get. Even at record-high interest rates, it often isn't to be had.

This is puzzling to many people who had become accustomed to buying on credit, whether they wanted a summer cottage, some new bedroom furniture or a new model auto. Where did all the money go?

The fact is that, so far as credit is concerned, we probably had too much of a good thing. Even conceding that a large part of today's business in this country must be done "on time", it was becoming too easy for too many people to buy too much. Some curtailment was in order.

So the government stepped in. A "tight money policy" was established to put a brake on a lot of needless spending. This, it was felt, would ease inflationary pressures. People wouldn't be competing so strongly for goods, thus forcing prices up.

But, as so often happens, the planners got some results they hadn't counted on. An unsold house doesn't penalize just the owner and the real estate broker selling it. As long as it remains unsold there is no need for carpenters, painters, plumbers, electricians and others to construct other houses. Not to mention the slackening in the need for building materials. And while brisk demand isn't there to force up the price of that house, or others, a growing population needs places to live, so there's pressure on rental housing, which means higher rents.

Little wonder that there has been a growing chorus of complaints against certain aspects of the tight money policy, particularly since many people think that our political leaders are setting a poor example. The President, for instance, has made it clear that he has no intention of sacrificing any of the features of his extravagant Great Society, which is about as inflationary a brain-storm as was ever conceived. And if you look at other facets of government, you will find a similar cynical attitude. The Tennessee Valley Authority, for example, with the blessing of the President, has just been authorized to borrow one billion dollars to expand its electric generating capacity — while private industry is being ordered to cut back.

It's a tight money policy all right, but not for the bureaucrats and other fat cats.

Specimens of Barbed Wire Used In Early West Given Ozona Museum

One of the most unusual gifts ever received by the Crockett County Museum is a collection of sample strands from barbed wire of vintage as far back as 1868.

The gift announced by Mrs. W. E. Friend, Jr., president of the Crockett County Historical Society, was made by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Sloan of Saginaw, Texas. Mrs. Sloan is the former Miss June Perner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Perner of Ozona.

Mr. and Mrs. Sloan were recently written up in the Ft. Worth Star Telegram for their unusual hobby of collecting barbed wire. There are some 200 collectors in ten states and the Texas Barbed Wire Collectors Association held its state convention in Amarillo in July. "Delegates will discuss the background of unusual wire, swap strands and visit displays in the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum at Canyon," said the advance notice.

The Sloans have 190 types of wire in their ranch home north of Fort Worth. Twenty-seven different species are contained in the collection which the couple donated to the Crockett Museum. The oldest is a piece of "Kelly's Torny Fence" made in 1868 by Michael Kelly in New York. Each piece has its date of use, the maker and his place of manufacture. The newest type of wire in the collection send here was in use in 1892 and is called simply Curtis wire, after its maker, John D. Curtis of Worcester, Mass.

There are many unusual type of wire in the catalogued collection, which is being prepared for display in the museum here. One of the most unusual is called "Spur Rowel" made in 1887 by C. A. Hodge at Beloit, Wis. The wire features round rowels with punched centers that allow them to turn as in a spur, thus pricking a cow but

not cutting her as most barbed wire did. Some examples of the more vicious types of wire are included in the collection. Another of the more unusual types was the "Tack" a double strand wire with a in use about 1878. It featured carpet tack inserted to form a sharp barb.

The Sloans have another hobby, making and selling miniature branding irons.

Canyon Sand Gas Field Extended N' east of Ozona

Tom Brown Drilling Co., Inc., Midland, No. 1 Clayton, in 1-A2-GC&SF, two miles northeast of a 13-mile northeast one-well extension area of the Ozona (Canyon sand) field and 2 1/2 miles northeast of the recently opened two-well Ozona, Northeast (Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County, has indicated production in the Canyon sand with the flowing of 16 barrels of distillate and 25 barrels of load water in 24 hours, plus gas at the daily rate of 728,000 cubic feet.

Flow was through a 10-64-inch choke and perforations at 7,424-642 feet with tubing pressure of 1,650 pounds; and casing pressure, 1,600 pounds. Testing continued.

Slated as an 8,200-foot Strawn wildcat, it was drilled to 8,015 feet.

The extender, Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Addie Clayton, was finalized Aug. 15, 1963, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.1 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 52,200-1, through perforations at 7,584-7,610 feet, completed as a wildcat, production was assigned to the Ozona field.

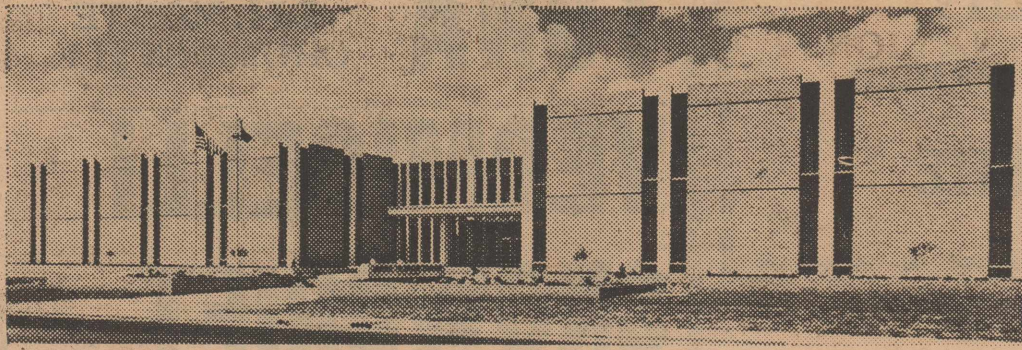

Crockett Field Gains Confirmer Another Assured

A Crockett County field gained a confirmation and another was assured the past week.

The Midway Lane multi-pay field gained its second Atoka gas-distillate producer and a location south extension to that pay with dual completion of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 20 Chambers County, 12½ miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 16 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 243,000-1. Production was through perforations at 7,370-80 feet.

It was finalized Sept. 8 as a third Strawn gas-distillate producer and a location south and east extension to that pay for a calculated, absolute open flow of 20 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 33,600-1, through perforations at 7,230 to 7,276 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Location is 6,450 feet from the south and 4,800 feet from the west lines of Chambers cs! No. 4.

The discovery Ashmun & Hilliard, Midland, No. 1 Chambers County School Land, was finalized Feb. 16 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 15 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 19,100-1 through Atoka perforations at 7,384-434 feet; and for a calculated, absolute open flow of 17.3 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 38,134-1, through Strawn perforations between 7,222-316 feet.

A location north and west extension to Atoka production was assured with the flowing of 38 barrels of distillate, along with 62 barrels of acid water, in 20 hours at Ashnum & Hilliard No. 2 Chambers County, same location.
