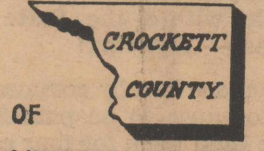

Public Hearing On Interstate 10 Segment Oct. 27

A public hearing on the final route for Interstate 10 through Ozona and from 6.6 miles east of Ozona to 7.2 miles west of the city will be held Thursday Oct. 27, in the district courtroom at the courthouse at 2 p. m.

Announcement of the public hearing was made this week by W. F. Dixon, Resident Engineer, State Highway Department.

Preliminary sketches showing the proposed location of the highway through Ozona and along the east and west stretches are on file in the office of the Resident Engineer in the shopping center.

The proposed route will be more definitely pinpointed in the new sketches than those previously shown by the Department. The four-lane highway will pass through Ozona just south of 14th St., over the present Powell Athletic Field and the Little League baseball park, preliminary sketches have shown. Details of construction may be available at the public hearing.

Cubs and B Team Chalk Up Fourth Win Over Rankin

Undefeated and untied, the junior high Cubs and Lions B chalked up their fourth straight victories here Thursday against Rankin. The Cubs, who have yet to allow their opponents a score won the first game 20-0. The Lions B took a 14-0 from their opponents.

The Cubs jumped out in front in the first few minutes of the first quarter when fullback Phillip Perner recovered a Rankin fumble and plowed through the middle on the next play to set up the scoring play on the goal line. Quarterback Jim Montgomery went over for the touchdown on a quarterback sneak and Perner carried for the 2 points. Holding the Rankin team on downs, the Cubs came back to score again when Perner powered in from the 6 yard line for the second Cub touchdown. The try for extra points was no good and at half-time the Cubs were in front 14-0.

After the half, the Cubs' leading ground-gainer and pass-receiver, David Pagan, was taken from the game with a broken wrist and will be out the remainder of the season. Earlier in the week Donald Olson was hurt in practice and is in the hospital with a back injury. With both boys playing half-back positions, the Cubs are going to be short some backfield men.

The Cubs third scoring play came in the third quarter when Greg Stuart caught a 20 yard pass to set up on the 6 yard line. Perner smashed through the Rankin line for the score. The try (Continued on Last Page)

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. S. L. Butler of Ozona; a brother, Charles Butler of Victoria and four sisters, Mrs. Mae Gibbs, Mrs. Thad Tabb and Mrs. Ben Williams, all of Ozona and Mrs. Dora Bosworth of Galveston.

Foods, Nutrition Program Started For 4-H Members

Rivera Gets Year In Pen on Assault Murder Charge

Samuel Vargas Rivera pleaded guilty in 112th District Court, presided over by Judge Charles Sherrill of Ft. Stockton, Tuesday, to a charge of assault with intent to murder and was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary.

Rivera shot Domingo Cantu the night of August 5, while on the draw behind Cantu's home. Cantu was shot when he went out of his house to find out what all the shooting was about. He chased his assailant for several blocks before he collapsed with a bullet in his chest. He was near death in the intensive care ward of Shannon Hospital for several days after the foray, but is now recovered.

The convicted man has been in jail since the incident and the charge was filed after it was determined that Cantu would live. Rivera was indicted by the Grand Jury on October 26, at which time date for his trial was set.

Oil Field Pits Ordered Closed In Crockett Co.

An official order from the Railroad Commission of Texas has been issued requiring operator of leases in all fields in Crockett County to discontinue the use of salt water disposal pits for the storage and evaporation of oil field brines and mineralized waters in the county.

A copy of the order was received this week by County Judge Bernice Jones. It resulted from a show-cause hearing before the Commission on August 31, which was attended by Crockett County Geologist Kent Johnston.

The operators in Crockett county fields will be required to drain and fill all existing pits so that drainage will be away from such pits and thus minimizing the chance of pollution.

The order must be completed with not later than April 1, 1967 or operators will suffer pipeline severance until the anti-pollution steps are taken.

Fifth Mitchell Field Producer Prolific Gasser

Shell Oil Co. No. 8 Midland in 49-GC&SF, indicated fifth producer and a 1 1/2 mile southeast extension to the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of extreme southwest Crockett County, 34 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed gas at the daily rate of 15 million cubic feet daily on a drillstem test in the Ellenburger.

On the 32-minute test between 12,905-13,227 feet, mud and the 3,000-foot water blanket began surfacing in nine minutes and gas in 15 minutes, flowing at the above rate. The project was slugging mud throughout. Flowing pressure was 4,910, 5,405 pounds; 30-minute initial shut-in pressure was 6,268 pounds. There was no final shut-in pressure due to leak in drillpipe.

Production was indicated earlier with the flowing of gas at the rate of 19.6 million cubic feet daily and increasing to 47.6 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 13,003 feet; earlier it flowed at the daily rate of 376,000 cubic feet when drilling reached 12,905 feet.

Lions Bounce Back On Victory Trail With 20-0 Win Over Menard

The Lions turned back a stubborn Yellowjacket 11 last Friday night 20-0 in Menard with touchdown in each of the last three quarters of play.

Piling up 397 yards total offense, Lions Larry Kilgore, Beto Ramos, and Derold Maney each scored a touchdown. Ramos kicked extra

points after the first two scores.

Until late in the second quarter, both teams moved up and down the center portion of the gridiron but could not dent the opponents' goal line. Lion fumbles and penalties, in particular, helped keep Ozona away from the Menard end zone.

The Lions, after driving to the Menard 26, faked a field goal effort, and injured George Cox, in for one of two offensive plays, picked up a first down inside the Yellow Jacket 10, and Ramos drove over from the 2 to cap the 74 yard scoring march. Ramos kicked the extra point and Ozona led 7-0 at half-time.

In the third stanza, Kilgore took a 13 yard scoring toss from quarterback Randal Clepper, ending a 58 yard drive by the Lions. Ramos again added the extra point.

The Lions' final score was set up by a 75 yard sprint by Sohpmore fullback Fleet Coates, who led Lion runners with 114 yards in 7 carries. Maney got the score from two yards out. The attempt for the extra point failed and the Lions had their 20 points.

Despite the Lions grinding out 319 yards on the ground and 78 yards in the air, the Menard defensive unit toughened up as the Lions threatened the goal line but fumbles, pass interceptions, and penalties helped keep the score down.

The Lion defense, white-washing an opponent for the third time this year was stingy as usual, allowing only 85 yards on the ground and 68 yard in the air to the Yellow Jacket squad, quarterbacked by Jack Kothman. Kilgore led the Ozona defense as he was credited with 9 tackles, followed by Dwight Childress with 8 and Jack Applewhite and Johnny Barbee with 7 each.

In addition to the 16.3 yard average per carry by Coates, Cox gained 17 in 2 tries; Ramos 32 yards in 4 efforts; Maney 29 yards in 7 carries; T. DeHoyos 97 yards in 13 tries; and Clepper, 5 tries for 17 yards.

Grinding out first downs 20-9 over Menard, Ozona completed 5 of 12 passes, permitting Kothman to complete 7 of 22 passes.

The Lions punted once for 18 yards, and Menard 4 times for a 31 yard average. Ozona suffered 50 yards in 4 penalties, and Menard 55 yards on 6 infractions.

Annual Inspection Johnson Draw Dams Made By Officials

Members of the Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors and of the County Commissioners Court, along with Work Unit Conservationist Sam Fitzhugh made the annual inspection tour of the Johnson Draw flood control dams Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Fitzhugh reported the dams in excellent condition, some still holding small ponds of water as a result of recent bountiful rains. Vegetation has made a nice growth on the earthen sections of the dams and the draw-down tubes are in good condition.

Ranch Hand Dies; Buried In Mexico

Encarnacion Camacho, 47, died of a heart attack in Crockett County Hospital last Thursday after being a patient there two weeks. The body was taken to Eagles Pass by Janes Funeral Home where it was turned over to a Mexican funeral home for burial in Musquiz, Mexico.

Mr. Camacho had been employed by Charles Williams on a ranch here for the past five years.

A PSYCHIATRIST SPEAKS

Now you may have a chance to vote for Bobby Kennedy for President in 1968, without waiting impatiently for 1972 to roll around. His proposed running mate is the son of the dovecootes of Arkansas, J. William Fulbright.

These glad tidings were delivered to a waiting world recently in a press conference held in a psychiatrist's office in New York City.

Press accounts of the meeting heralding Citizens for Kennedy-Fulbright were a bit hazy so one must be excused if he wonders what in all get-out it was all about. But "get out" was the key phrase. Somehow it seemed that Dr. Martin Shepard and his kingmaker compatriots were less interested in putting Bobby in the White House than they were in getting President Johnson out. And, reading between the lines, one could easily get the impression that they were more interested in get-

ting the United States out of Vietnam than they were in getting the incumbent out of 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.

In fighting words the psychiatrist declared. "We're interested in getting Johnson out." And while this rude eviction notice may jar the President to the point of causing a traumatic experience, the doctor exhibited a good couch-side manner to the junior Senator from New York.

"We want to get the idea across that Kennedy can run in 1968 and doesn't have to wait until 1972."

We have a suspicion that the psychiatrist's endorsement may be a bit "iffy".

Somehow, we can't help thinking that if Bobby Kennedy were to stop talking about his willingness to have his blood go to the enemy Viet Cong and come out for victory in Vietnam, things would be different, and all the various chapters of Citizens for Kennedy-Fulbright would be less enthusiastic.

Suddenly, in a flash, it dawns on us that we've been through this madness before — when Henry A. Wallace ran on that far-out-left ticket some years ago. And in the light of that flash we realize who it is that Bobby reminds us of: Henry A. Wallace. Bobby Kennedy is the new Henry A. Wallace of American politics.

Zip Code Cards Distributed To Postal Patrons

Ozona residents are being offered an opportunity to Zip Code their mailing lists during the month of October as a feature of National Zip Code Week, 10-15, postmaster Floyd Hokit announced earlier in the week.

Cards have been put in all local boxes, general delivery and Star Route boxes. After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards should be mailed back to the postmaster. Post office personnel will add the zip codes and return the cards to the sender.

Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards, as zip codes represent delivery areas for the postal service.

This Christmas, the zip code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient on-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail that is expected, postmaster Hokit said.

Christmas mail for armed forces personnel should be mailed as early as possible. October 21, through November 10, has been designated for mailing Christmas parcels and greeting cards by surface transportation, in order to insure delivery by Christmas Day.

For Airmail Parcels the period is December 1, to December 10 to assure timely arrival.

Articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal or solid fiberboard, wrapped in heavy paper and tied with stout string. A list of contents, name and address of sender and addressee should be enclosed inside, the parcel along with the APO number, which have been changed to 5 digits and are identical to zip code. Some APO addresses require custom forms. You may inquire about this at the

post office, Hokit stated.

In domestic mail gift parcels should be mailed before December 5, to distant states and by December 14 for local and nearby areas.

Mailing deadlines for greeting cards are December 10, for distant states and December 15 for local delivery. Deadlines for Alaska and Hawaii for surface mail, November 30 and for airmail December 15.

Lobby service and any additional holiday service will be announced at a later date.

Indian Mound Name Recorded In Federal Records

Word has been received that at a recent meeting of the United States Department of the Interior Board on Geographic Names, the name, Indian Hill, submitted by W. R. Baggett for a large Indian mound located on his ranch north of Ozona, was approved for Federal use. The letter from J. O. Killmartin, Executive Secretary for Domestic Geographic Names, stated that this decision will be published in Decision List 6603 and the property description of Indian Hill will be listed therein.

This is the first geographical site in Crockett County named by an individual to be accepted by the Board. Mr. Baggett gave the site its name because of the unusually large Indian mound located on the hill.

Mr. Baggett made his application for the name through the Crockett Coun-

ty Historical Survey Committee last May. The Historical Survey Committee was designated last year as the official state agency to name natural geographical features and have the authority to name any natural land feature in the county, including rivers, mountains, streams, or other water courses in accordance with the practices of the United States Department of Interior Board on Geographic Names.

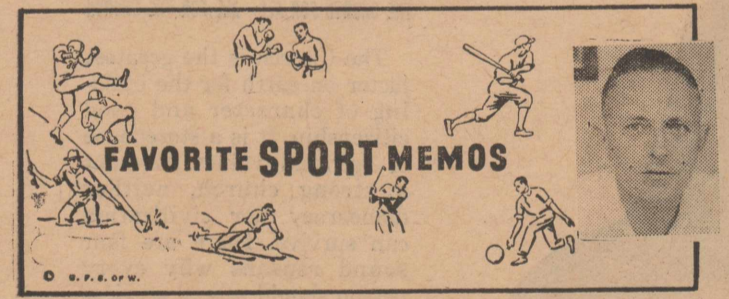
PTA MEETING MON. NIGHT IN CAFETERIA
